MR. CARLING AND PAUPER CHIL-DREN IMMIGRATION.

Mr. Carling is unfortunate in his de fenders. Our city contemporary, for example, points to Mr. Carling's assisted mmigration policy as worthy of praise. What is one of its chief features? The wholesale importation of pauper children from the workhouses and slums of old

Some pertinent evidence is to be found in the Auditor-General's report recently issued. There we find bonuses of thousand of dollars paid for adults as well as children, but principally for children, some of whom, as has recently been proved, were shipped direct from the work-houses to Canada. No wonder that the Prison Reform Commission, in its recently issued report, protests in these strong terms against the system pursued by Mr.

"The importation of children taken from "The importation of children taken from the reformatories, refuges and workhouses of the old world, the commissioners are forced from the evidence they received to regard as fraught with much danger, and as calculated, unless conducted with the utmost care and prudence, to swell the ranks of the criminal classes in this country. Therefore they strongly recommend that if individuals or associations be permitted to continue such importations (and still more strongly if such importations receive aid from the public treasury) such precautions be taken as will effectually prevent the bringing into this country of children of parents known to be criminal, or of children who have spent their whole lives in an atmosphere of vice and crime; who are so saturated with evil and know so little of good that their reformation, if at all possible, must be a work of much time and of patient, skillful, charitable effort." Carling: In the name of common sense, is it not time that this sort of thing were stopped?

Assam call special attention to mission work in that country. The first society to enter Assam was the American Baptist Missionary Union, which in 1836 established a station at Sadiya among the Nagas, a hill tribe on the borders of Assam and China. From that point their work spread southward among the Khamtis, Shans and Garos, until now they have 30 churches, with nearly 2,000 church members. One of their stations is at Kohima, to which place some of the refugees from Manipur fled. The next society to enter the field was the Welsh Presbyterian, which since 1841 has carried on a successful work among the wild Khasis of the Khasia and Jaintia hills. Their principal stations are Shillong, the capital of Assam, Tura and Gauhati, and their churches unpber 72, with 1,869 church members. A number of the churches in both missions are self-supporting. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel (High Church, England) has schools at Shillong, Sylhet and Gauhati.

He remarked that he bought a number of Irish cattle last spring, and after keeping them for twelve months they only left him a profit of £6, while for keeping the Canadian cattle for three months he had made an equal profit on their sale.

"Mr. George Roy, Forfar, was, equally high in his praise of Canadian cattle from a remunerative standpoint as the gentleman named. Sheep Washing.

Alphonso Young, of Union county, Ohio, nters his protest against sheep washing, s follows: "As sheep washing time is near as follows: "As sheep washing time is near the farmer is asked in this article to stop this uscless work. Don't wash the sheep; it is cruel and cold on the sheepherd and the flock, is a waste of time, and is a great trial to man and sheep, death to many of the flock, and sometimes to many of the men. No one is benefited by washing wool on the sheep's back. All wools must be cleansed by a prepared water and in a building with all necessary fixings for scouring and drying. Wool can be cleansed in no other way. Wools are bought by the manufacturers on a scoured basis, and the estimate of shrinkage can be made just as easily before the sheep are worried through the cold creek or river water as after, and can be sold for its full value just as well. If the buyer and farmer do not know the right or true value of unwashed wool it can be found. Wool wants all the natural grease until cleansed for the factory—which it keeps anyway. Washing sheep is as bad as the winds and storms. There is a temptation in washing to sell uncleansed wool for cleansed. There is a temptation all the way from the starting of the flock to the water till cleansed for the factory to vary from the correct per cent. of shrinkage. There ought to be only one time and place for scouring wool, and that is when wanted for use and where it can be done thoroughly."

Plant Swindles.

Jacob Moore, of Attica, N. Y., to whom the fruit-growing public is largely indebted for several new varieties, gives in a public or several new varieties, gives in a public circular a statement of the impositions practiced in disseminating old fruits under new names. The Isabella grape is renamed Payne's Early and sold as an early variety. Another name given to it is Eureka. Catawba has been renamed many times. The Concord, under the names Maine and Chapman's Seedling, has been heralded as carlier than the Concord and at high prices, and great numbers of it have been sold at Worden. The same course was pursued with the Cherry currant when it was new and rare. Many of the plants, when they bore, proved to be nothing but the common small red currant. Mr. Moore says that many seedsmen have made a practice of renaming vegetable seeds. What is the remedy for these impositions? Simply that the public which purchases such plants and seeds shall take more pains to become better informed of the character and value of such varieties, and off whom they are buying, and especially to select old, standard, well proved fruits, and omit new and highly-lauded sorts, which most commonly turn out with some unexpected defect after a few years' trial which consigns them to the rejected list.

Dairying is a business that will pay according as the one who conducts it will take the trouble to learn all there is to be learned about it and then use the knowledge to the best advantance or use it in a half-hearted way. In butter dairying the returns come in every week or month, the feed raised on the farm is consumed there and the manure made keeps the farm improving. Feeding cattle for beef is a risky business, and the only kind of stock that we can keep, aside from dairy cows, is sheep and pigs, and I guess the pig men this year would tell a tale of woe if they told the whole truth about their business. A. M. E., of Organ Cave, W. Va., writes:

"I intend to use common salt as a tertilizer for corn on a piece of land with clay subsoil. How much should I put on? Would it be better to mix with wood ashes, or hen manure, or land plaster? Will the salt prevent the grub from working on the corn?" Answer—As to the last question, I must answer "No." What little salt we can safely apply on soil, for any crop, will have very little effect on insects, or weeds either. As to the mixing with other substances, I consider it very much the best plan to mix the salt with ashes or hen manure, using just as little salt, and just as much of the other ingredients, as practicable. We should not forget that salt contains no important plant food, while hen manure is a most excellent complete manure, and ashes contain at least the two important mineral elements of plant food. Salt may stimulate, and thus give you an immediate effect, or it may not.—[Farm and Fireside. thus give you an immediate may not.—[Farm and Fireside.

Can I garnishee her month's wages? Ans.—Yes, if she is unmarried and the debt was not contracted before March 23, 1889, since which time the \$25 exemption of wages does not apply where the debtor is unmarried and has no family dependent on him or her for support. The daughter must be of age or you must prove that the goods were necessary in order to make her liable for the debt to you by her.
