LONDON, Aug. 3 .- The Chronicle's St. Petersburg correspondent learns that over 50,000 persons died of cholera in Russia-Caucasus in July. These figures do not include the deaths from cholera in Asiatic

St. Petersburg, Aug. 2.—It is again reported that cholera has appeared in Mos-cow. The disease has made its appearance in Riasan, a town and capital of the Government of Riasan, 110 miles southeast of Moscow. The epidemic is decreasing in the Volga districts, but is tnecessing in the Don territory, including the Government of Rostoff, where 1,055 new cases and 447 deaths occurred in one day.

"Changes Are Lightsome." BERLIN, Aug. 2 .- Attention is called by the press to the rapidity of the changes made in the army by the present Emperor. Since his accession to the throne eleven generals have been retired, namely, Dink-lage, Kuobbe, Schulenburg, Freyeun, Hein-nuges, Hover, Heydelrook, Schlerber, Bardeleben, Hook and Scharbeten. The Prussian army consequently is now com-manded by men as inexperienced as is the Emperor himself.

An Old Estate in Danger.

London, Aug. 3.—Lord Henry Augustus Bruce, who is a brother and heir to the Bruce, who is a brother and heir to the Marquis of Ailesbury, and others interested in the preservation of the splendid estate known as Savernake Forest, Marlborough, Wilks, have carried to the House of Lords the question whether Savernake Forest shall be disposed of to meet the encumbrances upon it, and to relieve the present Marquis from his load of indobtedness. The judicial tribunals have already decided in favor of the sale. Lord Henry Bruce, however, has all along been opposed to the disposal of the estate, believing that when the Marquis and his debts disappear in the course of nature there will be no difficulty in restoring the glory which used to attach to the magnificent seat of the Bruces.

The question was argued before the House of Lords, and in behalf of the sale it was maintained that the trustees had sanctioned the sale and the Court of Appeal had consented to it. Sir Horace Davy appeared for Lord Henry Bruce and the other opposing relatives, and the case is likely to occupy days in hearing.

Will Leave Bismarck Alone.

BERLIN, Aug. 3.—Gen. Von Caprivi has made a bold attempt to destroy Prince Bismarck and discredit Count Von Walder-Bismarck and discredit Count Von Waldersce, and to retain the imperial favor. He has
falled signally, and now, instead of leading
an attack upon the chief foe, he is
engaged in detending his own position, a
task which may prove too hard for him.
When the Emperor returned from Norway
a bundle of over 300 hostile newspaper
articles, clipped chiefly from the foreign
press, was presented to him by Caprivi.
These articles were accompanied by an
elaborate report, which it was hoped would
convince the Emperor of the malignity and claborate report, which it was hoped would convince the Emperor of the malignity and baseness of the one to whose inspiration the criticisms in the papers were attributed by the Chancellor. Gen. Von Caprivi, who was laboring under considerable excitement, took special pains to direct attention to the attacks which were more particularly aimed at the Emperor. The Emperor was advised by the Chancellor to have recourse to legal measures and to stop the press war. Thanks to the intervention of a more temperate councilor, perhaps Count Phillip Eulenburg, his Majesty decilined to take Caprivi's advice, and he was brought to understand that public opinion would not be with him if he went much further in his present policy.

THE TEST MOTION.

LONDON, AUG. 3.—The Times says the division in the House of Commons on the address in reply to the speech from the throne will possibly occur on Tuesday next. It has been reported that the speech from the throne shall be read on Monday. The amendment to the address will be moved from the back Opposition benches. After the case of the Government is stated Mr. Gladstone will speak, and no one in the front Opposition benches will take part in the debate. As the Government does not desire to prolong the discussion, it will be for the Parnellitest of determine whether the debate shall continue beyond the second night.

Great political activity is noticeable in London now. Around Pall Mall and Carlton House terrace scores of prominent Liberals hover, coming and going, Mr. Gladstone's headquarters being the center of attraction. Mr. Gladstone receives frequent visits from John Morley, Sir William Harcourt, Lord Rosebery, Earl Spencer and others of his immediate political circle, with whom he carnestly discusses the formation of the new Government and its initial steps in legislation. The Reform

The Reform and National Liberal Clubs are meanwhile the rendezvous of the rank and file of the party, and here groups of well-known workers can constantly be seen discussing the situation, chiefly in speculation as to the make-up of the Cabinet.

COMING APPOINTMENTS.

A prominent Liberal said this evening that Mr. Gladstone has made up his mind to announce certain appointments which will be sure to cause a sensation. He has long felt it unfair that Englishmen should absorb all the offices, and he would prefer to have representatives of all parts of the kingdom in the Ministry. He has, therefore, according to the informant, decided to apportion a few offices to the Irish leaders. Arthur O'Connor will be officed apportion of Fieb Secretary. But these gentlemen will not be made members of the Cabinet, as Mr. Gladstone does not care to irritate the Queen too much, leat she exercise her privilege of refusing to receive members of the Cabinet whose appointment is not agreeable to her.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 3.—Secretary A. Thompson, of the Chamber of Commerce, an authority on the subject, in an interview on Canadian retaliation in the matter of the St. Clair Flats Canal, which they claim is in Canadian territory, said:
"The Canadian claim that the entire

canal runs through Canadian waters an territories cannot be upheld for a moment In the first place Great Britain concede territories cannot be upned for a moment. In the first place Great Britain conceded exclusive ownership, control and jurisdiction of the canal to the United States by the treaty of Washington, ratified in 1871. On Sept. 4, 1888, resolutions passed the Senate requesting the Secretary of War to report whether channels in ordinary use in Detroit and St. Clair Rivers, including St. Clair Flats Canal, were in waters under jurisdiction of the United States, or the Dominion of Canada. Under date of Nev. 14, 1888, the Secretary of War made a report showing that 525 feet of the north end of the eastern pier is in Canadian territory, but it is of really no practical importance. The canal is 300 feet wide and the boundary line crosses in such manner that 50 feet of the upper end is in Canadian territory, leaving a clear space of 250 feet between the westerly pier and the international boundary line — ample room for navigation. The Town of Strathroy Again Afflicted.

Its Large Knitting Mills in Ruins.

The Roman Catholic Church Also Destroyed. Several of the Mill Girls Seriously Injured.

Awful Leap by Four Young Women Heartrending Scenes—A Large Num-ber Thrown out of Employment -Loss Estimated at Over

\$130,000.

STRATHROY, Ont., Aug. 2.—This afternoon about 5 o'clock the alarm bell at the
Strathroy knitting factory pealed forth half a dozen sharp claps. Citizens at once surmised that the knitting mills, the chief commercial industry of the town, must be on fire. The conjecture proved only too true. Through some cause or other the fire obtained a foothold in the picking-room, and though in three minutes a stream of water from the company's hose was brought to bear on the blaze it was found

IMPOSSIBLE TO STAY THE PROGRESS of the flames which leaped with awful rapidity from room to room and flight to flight in an incredible short space of time. Every portion of the massive six story building was enveloped in flames. As soon as the fire was noticed the alarm was given

building was enveloped in flames. As soon as the fire was noticed the slarm was given to the factory hands, who immediately began a mad rush for safety. Though the way of egress was somewhat limited, all might have escaped had some of the unfortunate women not tarried either for clothesorforsomeother equally futile reason, thinking doubtless there would be ample time to secure their exit. It happened, unfortunately, that several of these girls delayed their attempt to escape too long, the result being that some half-dozen found themselves in the top part of the building. Then ensued abeatreending seene such as has never heretofore been witnessed in Strathroy. Those who were unfortunately penned in by the fire appearing at the upper windows, and rent the air with screams for help. On the ground their more fortunate fellowemployes searched in vain for ladders with which they might save their friends. The scene for a few minutes beggared description. One young lady, Miss Esther Davidson, seeing that all hope of rescue was vain, sprang to the exhaust pipe and slid down as far as it reached, then LEAPED FOR LIPE TO THE GROUND, a distance of twenty feet. The onlookers

At the other end of the building, immediately above the storeroon, appeared a number of terrified faces at the windows, and before the arrival of ladders these poor girls, becoming desperate, had one after another smashed the windows and endeavored to jump upon the solid root of the storeroom. Nearly all succeeded except Miss Maggie Head, who DROFFED IN THE ALLEYWAY between the two buildings—the main portion and the storeroom—bruising herself badly and breaking her leg. Of those who dropped to the roof the most unfortunate was Lizzie Head, sister of the one just mentioned, who had her leg broken and back hurt, besides sustaining injuries all about her face and arms. Miss Hanna Dell also jumped, but succeeded in getting off with no bones broken, though her back is badly hurt, and she may have sustained internal injuries. Miss Aggie Butler, Miss Maggie Boyle and Miss Della Welsh also MADE THE AWPUL LEAR, but were not wounded so serious least the

Two bundred-people have lost their means of itvelihood, and every citizen of Strathroy feels keenly the loss which the town sustains. Many a home depended on the earnings of the employee in this factory.

The prevailing opinion is that had the panie not set in all the employes could have escaped without injury. NEW CURE FOR BLINDNESS.

It is Being Tried on T. J. Hayden, of Brooklyn, the Blind Amateur Actor.

It is Being Tried on T. J. Hayden, or Brooklyn, the Blind Amateur Actor.

New York, Aug. 2.—Thos. T. Hayden, who, until he was stricken blind a few years ago, was one of the best-known amateur actors in Brooklyn, has placed himself under the care of Augustus Theiss, of No. 115 West Fifty-second street, who promises to cure him of his affliction in a year's time.

Mr. Theiss bases his practice in all cases of blindness on the theory that the remedial agent should be brought into close contact with the blood vessels. In order to effect this he uses a steel wire brush containing 33 wires which he places in contact with the skin, and then by means of a spring drives them into the flesh for an eighth of an inch or more, leaving 33 distinct punctures in the skin. Into these punctures he rubs an oil which purifies the blood, but which, coming into contact with the flesh, causes great pain for a few moments.

Mr. Hayden says that the doctor has made two applications of his treatment. In one case he applied his brush 424 times, leaving, therefore, about 14,000 punctures. On his second visit the dose was increased to some 22,011 punctures, making in all over 36,000 minute punctures which cover his skin from head to foot. He says he has suffered greatly, not so much from the pricking as from the rubbing of the oil into the skin which is blistered by the operation. But he can already notice wonderful improvement in the tone of his system. He declares it will be some time before he can expect to have his sight even partially restored, but he is certain the results upon his blood and general system are most decided. In three months Dr. Theiss assures him he will be able to distinguish forms, in six months to recognize friends, forms, in six months to recognize friends, while at the end of the year recovery will be practically complete.

A MODERN PIGMY.

The Little African Aka, Who Is Fifty Years Old and Only Two Feet High.

M. Witchell said: "The oldest nations
which have left a literature had traditions M. Witchell said: "The oldest nations which have let a literature had traditions of a race of pigmies in Africa, and from Homer and Hanno down to the Portuguese navigators of the fifteenth century, specific descriptions of them were given. Homer refers to their war with the cranes. Stanley has proved that the old legend has a basis of truth. There is a pigmy race in Africa and they are human and intelligent, though feeble and timid. They are so shy and hide from the stalwart tribes in such dense forests that it is very difficult to secure a specimen, but one is now on exhibition in Berlin. Her name is Aka. She is 51 years old and 27 inches high, and she was of noble blood and a great belle among her peeple. Such at any rate is the statement made by King Massai, whose warriors captured her in one of his murderous forays.

"Owing to her lineage and intelligence King Massai made her his witch finder, and as such it was her duty to be present at all feasts and other gatherings of his people and point out the man or woman who had caused the last epidemic among the cattle or the people. The negoes of the interior ascribe nearly all unusual evils to witcheraft and think that dwarfs have a superhuman power of smelling out witches. In this capacity Aka caused so many deaths

to witchcraft and think that dwarfs have a superhuman power of smelling out witches. In this capacity Aka caused so many deaths that she sickened of it, ran away, was captured by another band and was sold to a Liverpool trader.

"At Liverpool she was sold to a showman with a miscellaneous lot of apes, lerpards, and the like, and now attracts thousands of visitors in Berlin. In color she is midway between pure black and brightbrown. Her hair is that of a pure negress and her split nose is almost exactly that of a gerilla. Still, she is not bad looking, is quite active in mind, and so must be set down as still a long way above the missing link."

THE ASTOR FORTUNE.

Its Fnormous Growth by Increased Values and Compound Interest.

Mr. Astor's fortune when he inherited it from his father, John Jacob the second, was carefully estimated to be \$150,000,000.

The yield on his fortune is calculated at 6 epercent. Figuring at that rate and compounding the interest semi-annually the income from his fortune would be \$9,135,000 a year, \$761,250 a month, \$175,673 a week, \$25,027 a day, \$1,042 81 an hour, \$17 88 a minute and 29 cents every second.

If the rule of natural increase were followed, calculating at the same rates of interest, the fortune named would be \$159, 185,000 in one year, \$201,585,000 in two years, \$207,915,000 in ten years and \$637, 540,000 in 25 years.

A better idea of Mr. Astor's wealth is afforded by comparative illustration. One million dollars in the standard silver doise in the fortune were in gold he would be worth 552,750 pounds of the precious metal. If the fortune were in gold he would be worth 5,527,500 pounds of the precious metal. If Mr. Astor's fortune were in \$1 bills, which were apread out singly, they would cover 6,640 acres, and if the bills were placed end to end they would stretch out 17,750 miles.

Not only does it differ as to its form of investments, but with regard to its use and transfer among members of the family. The Astor millions are almost exclusively invested in real estate in the city of New York. The money of the family rarely, if over, appears in Wall street for investment in stocks, bonds or other securities.—[New York World.

The signal service observatory at Toronto has issued an interesting statement regarding the weather of July. The month, it appears, was not so very hot after all. It may surprise some to find that the average temperature of July differs only 0.4 in excess of the average of the previous 52 years, but it will have to be considered that the first and third division of the month were decidedly below the normal, and that the second group was only 1.5 above, and as the present makes the strongest impression, the fourth group, the average of which was 74.8, or 7.2 above the normal, convinced many that July had been something extraordinary; in fact there are no less than nineteen warmer Julys than the past month, the warmest recorded being 72.5 in 1854, 78.8 in 1868, 72.0 in 1878 and 73.1 in 1887. The average highest temperature of the past month was 78.8; in 1854 it was 84.8; 1856, 80.4; 1868, 85.4; 1872, 80.7; 1877, 80.2; 1878, 80.4; 1881, 80.3; 1887, 83.4. Although the highest temperature of Toronto—90.7—this has been exceeded in twelve years, the extremes being 98.0 on July 19, 99.2 on Aug. 24, 1854, and 97.2 on July 14, 1892.1 is worthy of note that during 1854 the highest temperatures of June, July, August and September were all considerably above 60.


