BERLIN, April 5 .- Count Herbert Bismarck has consented to run for the Reich-stag in the interest of the agrarian party.

A Royal Wedding Deferred. Sofia, April 5.—The marriage of Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria and Princess Maria Louise, daughter of the Duke of Parma, has been postponed until April 20.

A Hundred Buildings Burned. Vienna, April 5.—A fire at Podhaiczyki, near Sambor, in Galicia, destroyed 100 buildings, including the schoolhouse, and three persons perished in the flames.

Severe Fighting in Sumatra. SINGAPORE, April 5.—Severe fighting has been reported from the district along the Tamiang River, in East Sumatra. Forty Dutchmen were killed or wounded. The Dutch claim a victory.

Many Deaths from Cholera.

LONDON, April 5 .- The British Government has sent a circular to the postoffice officials in Great Britain and Ireland, notifying them that since March 22 there have been 51 deaths from cholera in l'Orient, in the Department of Moriban, France.

Congress of Nihilists.

VIENNA, April 5.—Leading Nibilists are arranging a secret meeting in Russia near the Austrian frontier at Whitsuntide, to enable refugees from Poland, Austria, Hunenable refugees from Poland, Austria, Hungary and Roumania to take part therein. As an indication of the Nihilists' during activity, the Czar recently sound in one of the imperial albums a portrait of the Nihilist who was executed for complicity on the assassination of his father. The strictest inquiry in the household failed to solve the mystery of its appearance there.

The Loss of the Sultan's Steamer. CONSTANTINOPLE, April 5 .- The censors are suppressing all reports of the disaster to the Suitan's palace steamer, by the foundering of which some 60 persons are said to have perished, and journals print-ing stories of the calamity have been seized by the authorities. The publication of the fact of the accident caused a great sensa-tion.

On the same day the horses attached to the carriage containing Horcki Pasha ran away, and he jumped from the carriage and was killed.

The Cruel Khan of Khelat

Bombay, April 5. - It is reported from Quetta that Mir Khudadad Khan, Khan of Khelat and Sovereign of Beluchistan, has murdered his Prime Minister, has mutilated several of his advisers, and is torturing many of his high officials whom he has imprisoned in dungeons. He is supposed to have learned or suspected that there was a plot among his men of state to assassinate him. The Indian Government has demanded an explanation of his conduct, and troops are held in readiness to enforce the Government's demands.

Regarding Bering Sea. Paris, April 5.—The Court of Arbitra-tion regarding Bering Sea resumed its seasion to-day. Hon. E. J. Phelps, counsel session to-day. Hon. E. J. Pheips, contended in behalf of the United States, contended that the British supplementary report was inadmissable. The admission of new evidence at this stage, Mr. Phelps said, was a gross injustice to the United States, because it deprived the United States of any chance to adduce rebutting testimony.

Sir Charles Russell, in replying to Mr. Phelps, in behalf of Great Britain, paid a tribute to the late James G. Blaine, whose

The House Gets Right Down to Business.

Debate on the Address in Reply to "The Speech."

Compliments and Side Shots Exchanged by the Leaders.

Mr. Waters on Hand With Woman Suf irage Meazures — The Estimates Brought Down Without Delay.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE, TORONTO, April 5. After yesterday's formalities the Local Legislature to-day began earnest labor. Almost every member was in his place, and the spick-and-span new chamber gave a fitting background to the wise men or its floor, while in the galleries were many citizens, who listened attentively to the de bate on the moving of the address in reply to the speech from the throne.

The speech of Mr. A. S. Allan (West Wellington) mover of the address, was able, concise and well delivered. He recalled to the memory of the House the fact 100 years ago Governor Simcoe, with his sixteen commoners, inaugurated the first Legislature of Ontario. The present buildings were a credit to the Province and to the somewhat ungrateful city of Toronto. The business outlined in the speech from the throne was of considerable importance. The Government had acted wisely in deciding to set apart a Provincial park in the northern part of the Province The opposition which had been manifested to the work of the Agricultural College at Guelph had died out—an earnest of the good work that institution was doing. Traveling dairies had also done good work. There had been some criticism concerning the administration of the crown lands of the Province but no tenable objections had been made. During the reign of the present Government 4,234 square miles of timber had been disposed of at a value of \$5,127,000. This meant a block of land 65 miles square—not a very large tract. Legislation concerning juvenile offenders was necessary, although the proportion of children offenders in the Province was very small compared with the old country or the United States.

The speech of Mr. McKechnie (South Grey), who seconded the address, was most creditable. After a graceful reference to the good qualities of the leader of the Opposition, he culogized the leadership of the Government by Sir Oliver Mowat, the accession of the Democratic party to power in the neighboring republic should be a cause for rejoicing. The order scheduling Canadian cattle would probably be rescinded, thus giving Canadian stockraisers an opportunity of extending their trade. Cheese exports had increased very materially, there being now 9,000,000 pounds exported to Great Britain every year. Proceeding, the honorable member expressed satisfaction at hearing that the Government proposed to establish a national park. Fierce Forest Fires COMPARE

In Pennsylvania, New Jersey and North Carolina.

Many Square Miles of Woodland Denuded.

Dwellings, Cattle and Grain Destroyed Farmers Narrowly Escape With Their Lives.

HOLIDAYSBURG, Pa., April 5.—The most destructive fire that has visited this locality for many years occurred on Reservoir and Loop Mountain last night. The burned territory covers an area of 32 square miles, and heavy gales of wind rendered the work of fighting the flames ineflectual.

Six farm houses in Morrison Cove, 35 head of cattle and vast quantities of grain were destroyed by the fire, and the farmers had barely time to escape with their lives. The greatest individual loss is that of Johan Yingling, which is estimated at \$5,000.

The Rearing Spring book manufactory was wrecked by the hurricane, and several other houses suffered a like fate. The total loss so far as ascertained is about \$55,000.

the head of the barrel broke and the contents ran along the floor to a lighted lantern an dtock fire. In an instant the warehouse was in a blaze, and the men were forced to flee for their lives. As barrel after barrel exploded the flames shot 70 feet up in the air. In addition to the noise from the explosion of the 12,000 barrels of Bourbon, 7,000 cattle in the pens were bellowing, and the roofs of the pens were on fire soveral times.

TRADE OF THE WEEK

The wholesale trade of London has this week improved under the pressure of an increased demand from various parts of the country. One feature of this spring that has made trade as brisk as it has been is the comparatively good roads. The transition from winter to spring has been all that could be desired from the point of view of the traveler, the snow drying up under the scorching influence of March winds, unaccompanied by the usual heavy rainfall, and leaving the roads as passible now as they generally are in the first days of May. This agreeable feature of the season has enabled travelers and customers to get around, and to do business with much greater zest than seemed probable a week or two ago. Of course we are not out of the woods yet; a few days' heavy rainfall, with cold, might set back business to a considerable extent. Despite all favora considerable extent. Despite all favorable indications, however, there has been a good deal of paper-renewing, and the scarcity of ready cash is heard oftener than is desirable. From the Northwest the report is that money is tight, that settlers generally assert they must wait for another good crop, which we all hope will come this year, before they are fully on their legs, and there are a good many deferred lege, and there are a good many deferred accounts in consequence.

Drygoods merchants are as hopeful as their fellows in other lines of business, but their fellows in other lines of business, but they freely confess that their prospects will be largely governed by the crop outlook. They find payments rather backward, especially from the Northwest and British Columbia, and not much improvement can be expected before midsummer. There is considerable interest in the outlook for cotton. On this subject a well-known United States authority sends us the fol-

That high prices should prevail in pork products is not to be wondered at, when, in addition to the alarming shortage in America, England is 1,000,000 head short, Ireland is 1,400,000, and Denmark, from whence Great Britain draws a great share of her bacon supply, reports 40 per cent. under the usual supply. Unofficial reports indicate the world's hog crop, Jan. 1, was about 10 per cent. less than in January, 1892. The packing past season was about 3,085,000 hogs less than the previous season. Average weight was from 8 to 10 pounds less. The natural product fells short about equal to 270,000, 000 pounds of sides, 370,000 tierces of hams, 275,000 tierces of shoulders, and 320,000 tierces of lard. Hogs packed since March 1, have been 575,000, against 730,000 a year ago. In sympathy with this condition of affairs, other animal food products such as beef naturally tend high. The outlook for the feeders of good beeves in Western Ontario this spring should therefore be most encouraging. Thus far, local demand has been sharp at very fair prices, but for export there has been little moving. In Chicago we notice the business of exporting to Great Gritain is not nearly on so generous a scale as last year, in one week recently 108 cars less going out than in the corresponding week last year. United States cattle of the best grade have been selling in London, Eng., markets at 12½ cents, an advance of 1 cent on the prices ruling a year ago. In Chicago good beeves have been selling up to 6 cents, and with a continuance of the late slack supplies some of the commission men them selves look for a two months' era of high prices that will be memorable in the history

Of course, as Advertiser readers are ware, United States and Canadian cattle both go into Great Britain on an equal footing, each being subject to the scheduling order which practically precludes anything but thoroughly fattened animals. anything but thoroughly fattened animals.

In the opinion of a leading Canadian exporter scheduling would probably shade prices about \(\frac{1}{2}\) cent less than if the order had not gone into effect, so that under the abnormally low supplies feeders should realize remunerative prices through Ontario. A well-known cattle shipper informs us that after a visit to Great Britain, he has reached the conclusion that Canadian dealers will make some money early in the season if make some money early in the season if they buy right and get a fair rate of freight. Despite this view, a cablegram from Liverpool this week asserts that the market there is weak, at the following prices, which are calculated at \$4 80 to the prices, which are calculated at \$4 80 to the pound: "Finest steers, 11\frac{1}{2} cents; good to choice, 11 cents; poor to medium, 10 cents; inferior and bulls, 7\frac{1}{2} to 9 cents. There are still a good many States cattle coming forward, and general home supplies are also fair."

LIQUOR DEALERS LEFT.

The State Take Hold of the Business After July. The State Take Hold of the Business After July.

CHARLESTOWN, S. C., April 6.—There will be no liquor or beer sold in South Carolina, except by the State, after July 1. Four of the most eminent legal firms in the State yesterday decided the matter. Soon after the passage of the law at last session of the Legislature, the liquor dealers of the State employed counsel to test its constitutionality. These counsel yesterday filed their opinion. They advise the liquor dealers to prepare to meet the law as valid, on and after July 1, and that in view of the heavy penalties provided they cannot advise them to continue selling liquor after July 1. To test the constitutionality of the statute the counsel advise that proper preceedings be taken. In the meantime the Governor and State dispenser are traveling in the west and north making arrangements to open the State barrooms on July 1.

LABOR FOR THE UNEMPLOYED.

[F. E. Titus, Toronto.]

How can we best care for that large and ever growing body of citizens who cannot find continuous employment? It is useless to shut our eyes and say they do not exist. It is criminal to sit idly by and see them through deepair driven each year further into degradation. In a land which boasts of a Christianity whose underlying basis is the brotherhood of man, it is a strange anomaly that our system of government, which should be and is the ideal of the marginity, should make no provision whatever

the brotherhood of man, it is a strange anomaly that our system of government, which should be and is the ideal of the majority, should make no provision whatever to afford our unfortunate brothers and sisters the means of earning a subsistence. In Toronto, one in every twenty of the inhabitants applies for charity. In the smaller cities and towns the same thing is true on a smaller scale. Toronto donates to the House of Industry each year from \$10,000 to \$15,000, and this is supplemented by private charity. On the whole it would not be an extravagant estimate to say that \$50,000 is given annually in charity in that city, and with what result? The recipient is degraded. His manhood is debased. His independence is weakened. His habits of industry are destroyed, and he is thus rendered comparatively useless to the community. The next winter the same process is repeated. Is it any wonder that the army of unemployed is each year augmented?

The amount expended annually in Toronto would, if capitalized, furnish a fund sufficient to furnish honest and remunerative employment to those who need it. Every man's labor, if properly directed, will produce more than sufficient to support to find employment, walk the streets in vain. Let us remember that, whether idle or employed, every one is and must be furnished the means of existence by the whole community, and as a fact they are, or else they die of hunger. Then, since the community must support its idle, whether they will or not, ordinary business habits of thought would suggest that it would be cheaper for every city and other municipality and its outlay. Anyone in private life would adopt this method of providing for those for whom he was compelled to provide; yet so far is our Government from a business basis that not only is this not done, but municipalities are actually debarred from having industries of this kind. It is time that our Legislative Assembly enacted some laws which would meet the necessities of our industrial situation.

THE CUMULATIVE YOTE.

(Toronto Daily Star.)

Gerrymandering and bribery are two great and acknowledged evils that cling to our present electoral system of small constituencies. It would be hard to find a more effectual remedy for these evils than is the cumulative vote in large constituencies.

effectual remedy for these constituencies.

Gerrymandering would be wiped out and no more heard of, simply because it would not pay. There would no longer be any political advantage to be gained from it. In any large constituency, returning, say, nine members, where each elector had nine votes, the nine members would truly represent the public opinion of the constituency; and no matter how the boundaries were changed or twisted, the result would be the same—a fair and true representation.

Bribery would have its effective force as an electoral factor so much weakened under the cumulative vote that it would hardly be worth while to practice it. It is well known that bribing is much more difficult to carry on where the constituency is large. Besides this, it would no longer be a question of "turning the scale," when a few voters going one way or the other will decide which party gets the member.

The farmers are beginning to appreciate the importance of this question. It is a proposed plank in the platform of the Patrons of Industry; and it is warmly advocated by the Canada Farmers' Sun, which speaks for 100,000 farmers.

But the order has gone forth, and whatever complications may arise of an international nature are certain to fall directly upon the shoulders of the World's Fair officials.

All day yesterday the north wing of the horticultural hall was packed with men who were ready to have their faces photographed for identification on their passports. They began coming as early as 9 o'olock, and two hours later the stairway leading up to the photographer's room was so jammed with men that the guard, fearing that that portion of the gallery would give way beneath such a great weight, ordered half of the long line to retire to the main floor. Those who did not have recent pictures of themselves were photographed as they were, and those who were photographed with beards will have to the end of the fair or stand again before the camera of the picture taker.
