

The present struggle, Dr. Jordan contends, is the result of six years of plotting and conspiracy by

Dr. Jordan resigned his place with the university to become a director of the Million-Dollar Peace Foundation, es-tablished by G. Edward Ginn. Mr.

Ginn, a publisher, died a year ago.
At present, Dr. Jordan believes, there is hope for universal peace, not much, he conceded, but still hope that it will come eventually. World peace, he holds, is merely a matter of education. As proof he cites the increasing diffiwith which wars are begun.



Witnesses Do Not Agree on

Cause—No Explosion as

Motor Perfect. [Canadian Press.]
PARIS, June 18. — 10:20 p.m. — The British Royal Naval Flying Corps today began an investigation of the aeroplane accident yesterday, which resulted in the death of Lieut. Warneford, the Canadian aviator, who recently de-

stroyed a Zeppelin airship, and Henry B. Needham, an American writer. Accounts of various persons on the scene at the time of the accident disagree as to the cause of the fatal drop. A defect in the tail of the aeroplane or propeller, or imprudence on the part of Warneford, are among the explanations offered. That the accident was not due to an explosion, or to motor trouble, as the first reports said, was shown by an examination of the motor today. It was found to be in perfect

Those who say that the aviator failed Those who say that the aviator failed to exercise proper precaution cite the fact that the machine fell when Warneford was steeplechasing. He was about three hundred feet up at the time, according to several witnesses, who assert that he took unusual risks. It is said that he had been steeplechesing for some minutes with increase. chasing for some minutes with increas-ing speed and daring, and that suddenly the machine, from a cause as yet unexplained, and which probably will remain a mystery, was seen to tip over and dart downward. Witnesses of the accident were examined today by members of the Royal Flying Corps.

Needham's Strap Broke, The witnesses said that Warneford eedham tumbled out as it darted toward earth. Needham had been strapped to the seat, and had the strap not given away he might not have been killed, as the machine at the time he fell from it was only about 50 feet in His Seat Taken From Him, the air. It was at its maximum height when Warneford fell. In falling Needham hit the propeller blade of the air-craft and his death was almost in-





UNEVENTFUL WEEK

War Stocks Are Again Most Active Feature - Locomotive Shares Soar.

New York, June 19.—Weekly market summary: The week in the stock market was dull and uneventful, trading at all times keeping within moderate bounds and partaking largely of a professional character. War stocks were again the most active features as a group, but their course was variable, with a majority of net declines. Only one issue, Baldwin Locomotive, scored a new high record, touching 64%, a gain since last Saturday of 5½ points.

Coppers and other metal stocks were strong at the outset on higher prices in the domestic markets, but these shares, with kindred issues, fell back later on the heavy break for copper in London. The higher prices for certain finished materials in steel and iron were helpful to United States Steel and the shares of less prominent companies.

Prominent railroad stocks were irregular, with intermittent selling for European interests. Passing of the Chesapeake and Ohio dividend had no marked effect, such action having been foreshadowed weeks ago. Shares of other roads whose affairs are pressing towards financial readjustment were were fairly steady.

Easy money continues to be the foremost factor in the general situation, rates for all periods, including over the year, falling to lower levels. The demoralization witnessed in the foreign exchange markets was, in its potential aspects, the most important development of the week. The moneys of virtually all European countries moved to higher premium for the American dollar. Further large sums of British gold came from Canada, but this inflow offered only partial relief to the delicate international credit situation.



A proposal to substitute Carbex dark buff bricks for the white facing bricks originally provided for at Riverview school was contained in a clause of No. committee's report, but Trustee Silerwood declared that although as chairman of the committee he must move the adoption of the clause, he could not support it, because both the ported unfavorably on the proposed change, which also would involve an additional cost of some \$500.
