Mayor of Toronto Sought to Buy Street Railways So That Two Fares Would Not Be Charged -Controller Says Bill Will Pass.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 22. Adam Beck's prestige is on the wane in Toronto. The workingmen of the city are beginning to realize that he is ready to go to almost any end to further his hydro-electric scheme, and to keep under cover the fact that the Government is paying more for electric

energy from Col. Green and his company than any other company pays at the Falls. That is said to be one of the reasons that he is so bitterly opposing the purchase of the Toronto Electric Company's holdings in this city, and fighting even his compatriots in this city.

city. Cut Out Extra Fares. Mayor Hocken, when elected to ofce, and long before that, always told the workingmen of this city that when made chief magistrate he would en-deavor to do something for the workng people. It was with this end in view that he and Controller McCarthy entered into negotiations with Mr. R. J. Fleming to purchase the holdings of the company in this city. He thought that in that way he would be able to give to the workingmen a single fare ride to any part of the city. As it is now the Toronto railway only runs to certain points in the city, and thousands of workingmen, who live farther out, have to transfer to the York radial lines and pay an extra fare, because the company, although a sub-

Allies To Accept Terms of Powers

London, Tuesday, April 22.—The allies have at last formally replied to the powers in regard to the latter's proffered offer of mediation with Turkey. They accepted the terms of the powers without any absolute



A GRAVE ADMISSION.

A damaging admission has been made by Sir James Whitney, probably because the facts were about to be disclosed in another quarter.

Sir James acknowledges that Provincial Secretary Hanna was offered and accepted a campaign subscription in 1908 from a firm holding contracts with the Ontario Government.

Taylor, Scott & Co., the firm in question, were at that time, and for some time afterwards, making woodenware at the Central Prison, with prison labor. They had a financial claim against the Government, but were refused by it a flat to enable them to bring the claim into court. At the public accounts committee the other day, Mr. Taylor was asked if he had intimated to Sir James Whitney that he would expose a member of the cabinet unless the fiat were granted. He refused to answer the question. Sir James now alleges that Mr. Taylor used language that "sounded like intimidation.' Whatever passed between them, it is significant that shortly afterwards the Government permitted the claim of Taylor, Scott & Co. to go to arbitration-on the eve of the election of 1911. The arbitrator awarded the firm \$21,000.

An ugly word has been sometimes applied to the subscriptions of Government contractors to election funds. Sir James says that Mr. Hanna knew that the acceptance of the Taylor subscription was against the rule of the Ontario Government, and expressed regret at having done so. In Great Britain the atonement would be the minister's resignation. This is not expected, but Sir James can make some amends by removing the gag from the public accounts committee, which has been applied by its chairman, Mr. Ferguson, assisted by Mr. McGarry. Mr. Ferguson has ruled that the questions asked of Mr. Taylor shall be expunged from the official record. It is a dangerous precedent James allow it to stand?

THOS. CAMPBELL. A POET WHO ONCE HAD A WIDER VOGUE

(By Special Arrangement With the Winnipeg Telegram.]

An English critic has recently remarked that Thomas Campbell had a far greater vogue than Wordsworth his contemporary. Today, however, little of Campbell has survived, while Wordsworth has taken his place as possibly fourth in rank among the chief glories of English song, being urpassed only by Chaucer, Shakespeare and Milton. Everyone is familiar with Campbell's poems, "Ye Mariners of England," "Hohen Linden," "Lochiel's Warning," and the "Exile of Old Lady-How old are you. little Erin," but I venture to say that probably few of my readers know of him as the author of "The Pleasures of Hope." And yet this was the appellation by which he went in his own age, and it is said that the author of "The Pleasures of Hope" became teribly tired of it, too. But it was the Hope" poem that first brought him fame. It was an April hazard by the young Edinburgh poet in 1799, and instantly won him recognition in his own country and in England. I have an early edition possibly a third or fourth, published in Edinburgh in 1811, and illustrated by those handsome ed into the Art Museum. 

After your chicks are three weeks ld, the door of the outer compart ment may be opened so that they can run on the floor of the room. Here they must have plenty of scratching material, and if the weather is fine and mild it will do them good to let them have a run outside for an hour

or two in the middle of the day. Do not, however, be in a hurry to harden them before they are five weeks old, as it is a risky experiment. The great aim with young birds is develop them as quickly as possible, for to get the best price a broiler must grow quickly and be plump. It often the case with spring chickens that run loose on the farm. As the

natural tendency is to make growth and not flesh, the fattening of young birds is almost an art. All newly-hatched birds should have nothing to eat for the first 36 hours. After that a mixture of small seeds and cracked grain may constitute their whole diet for ten days. Their food should be one quart. each, of finely cracked corn, bran and hulled oats mixed with the same quantity of golden millet, rape, Kaffir corn and very sharp fine gravel, crushed charcoal and finely chopped clover hay. After mixing this thoroughly you should pass it through a ine sieve to insure there being no large pieces of corn or oats on which

For the first three days of their feeding put a small pan filled with the mixture in each corner of the hover compartment. Instead of water fill a small drinking fountain with milk which has been scalded and cooled. Leave this food with the chickens for fifteen minutes at morning, noon and again at 3 o'clock,

Two small-sized fountains especially made for brooders cost 18 cents If it is not convenient to buy one of these turn a small cup or jelly glass upside down in a deep sauce and pour the milk around it. WILD WOMEN TURN TO BOATHOUSES

Busy in the Suburbs of Birmingham.

MRS. BELMONT WARNS

American Suffragist Leader Says Mili tant Methods May Come to the United States.

[Canadian Press.]

London, April 22.-An "arson squad" f militant suffragettes succeeded dur ing the night in burning down the Handsworth Park boathouse in a Birmingham suburb. Four pleasure boats and a large quantity of equipme were destroyed.

With the opening of the boating sea-son attempts to destroy skiffs and shells are expected, and along most of he rivers and lakes a close watch kept by special patrols night and day or suffragettes bent on destruction.
"You had better stick to the needle and drop the revolver," was the police magistrate's advice to Annie Bell, the suffragette sentinel arrested outside Holloway jail on the night of April 9 during the imprisonment of Mrs. Pankhurst Miss Bell, who had been found in

ossession of a revolver, with which, he said: "If any many had interfered with me I would have shot him," was sentenced today to three-weeks' imprisonment. She refused to be bound over to keep the peace for a year, and told the magistrate: "Your advice is not of any use at all."

Praises Militants. New York, April 22 .- Praise of the militant suffragettes in England and predictions of serious trouble in Amerca if women do not get the ballot were Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont's farewell theme as she prepared today to sail tonight or Europe as a delegate from this country to the International Women's Suffrage convention in Budapest, open-

ing June 15.

Mrs. Belmont said she approved of everything the English "wild women" have done, and that if woman suffrage is not effected in New York in 1915 militant methods may prevail here.
"The English women will get the vote "The English women will get the votes now before we do, and that will be a disgrace," she said. "People here do not know it, but Mrs. Pankhurst was told by Arthur Balfour and other big men that militant methods must be used if the women would win. Men never won their freedom without shed-ding blood, and the women will not get theirs without fighting."

"STORM SEWERS FIRST"

A significant passage in the Chipman report on storm sewers is as fol-

"The necessity for the prompt removal of the rainfall from the city streets must be apparent to every citizen. The paving of streets and improvement of roadways are delayed, building operations impeded, and vehicular traffic at times practically impossible, due to the non-removal of rainfall. Menace to Health.

"In addition to the inconvenience and loss sustained by the residents on streets not properly drained, there is the menace to public health. This latter danger is increased, where to relieve the surface flooding, connections have been made into the sanitary sewers, the sewage then being flooded back into cellars and basements by

Half Without Storm Sewers. "The central business section of the city is now served by a system of combined sewers, constructed prior to 1892. From time to time since 1892 a few drains have been laid for the removal of cellar water and street water, without regards to any system. Fully half of the city is unprovided with storm sewers.

Sewers Before Roads. "In 1892, when the population was 32,000, the need of storm sewers in the outlying sections of the city was not present. Today, with a population of 49,000, there are demands for pavements and improved roadways, in the sections that were considered as suburban twenty years ago, which demands cannot be granted by the council in advance of the construction of storm sewers."
