Whole Austrian Armies and Entire Artil-

lery Resources Checked By Rock-Like

London, June 18.—The Austrians, according to the Evening Standard, now occupy the west bank of the Piave, from the Conegliano Railway to the Zenson bend, a distance of a mile and a half. They have thrown fourteen bridges across the river. These, how-

Paris, June 18.—Ninety-two Austrian divisions, consisting of 80 divisions of infantry and 12 of cavalry, have been hurled into the greatest battle that Italy has yet fought, according to an official announcement at Rome received here through the Havas Agency. Seventy-one of these divisions have already been identified.

The forces engaged comprise three-fourths of the whole Austrian army and the choicest troops under the command of Field Marshal army and the choicest troops under the command of Field Marshal Boroevic. The number of men in an Austrian division is not exactly known, but the number of divisions engaged would indicate that approximately one million Austrian soldiers has been thrown into the battle.

Paris, June 18.—Eighty thousand Germans were killed, wounded or made prisoner during the offensive between Mondidier and Noyon, Capt. Andre Tardieu, who accompanied Premier Clemenceau to the front on Sunday, told Marcel Hutin, editor of the Echo de Paris, upon his return to Paris.

"This is a figure which should make even Ludendorff reflect," he said.

"One cannot insist enough upon the exceptional importance of the counter-attack of divisions under Gen. Mangin against the right flank of Gen. von Hutiner's armies," he continued. "This magnificent operation has nailed the enemy to the spot and completely checked the advance toward Compiegne. German officers who were made prisoner do not attempt to hide their chagrin at their inability to reach Complegne, which they admit was their objective."

Dejection Reigns In Fatherland

With acknowledgments to the Toronto News.

Geneva, June 18.—The enthusiasm created by the first German offensive has passed, and a feeling of profound dejection reggns among the German people, according to an interview with a neutral diplomat, who has just arrived in Geneva from Berlin in La Suisse. The people at home expected a quick victory from the early reports in official bulletins, and above all, a quick peace. The principal question asked in Berlin last week was: "Have we entered Paris?"

The economic situation in .the interior of Germany, the diplomat declared, is becoming more and more serious. Germans, both military and civilian, now realize and virtually admit, that the constant arrivals of fresh American troops will turn the tide

The diplomat concluded his interview with a statement that during a recent secret sitting of the Reichstag the question of autonomy for Alsace-Lorraine was discussed officially for the first time since the beginning of the war.

THE WAR SITUATION

Austria's offensive against the Italian front has been checked for the moment, if not brought to complete failure. Fighting has ceased in the mountains from Lake Garda to the Plave, where the Allies broke up the first enemy blows. Along the Plave the Austrians have been unable to advance from the western bank of the river.

Balked at Start.

Despite months of preparation and a stupendous preliminary bombardment, the Austrian attack in the north Aslago Plateau and between the Brenta and the Plave, collapsed almost at its inception before the stout resistance of the French and Italians. Although their offensive began Saturday, the Austrians on Monday had given up, at least momentarily, their efforts to reach the Venetian Plain to the south. In counterthrusts, the Italians Monday regained positions in the mountains. Around Montello, just below where the battle-line reaches the Plave, the Italians still hold their positions awaiting further efforts, but the enemy made no attack there Monday. The enemy command is reorganizing the units shattered in the effort to overcome the important height. Unable to Debouch.

Between Zenson and Fossalta, a distance of less than three miles, the Austrians succeeded in crossing the river after having been defeated in efforts to debouch north and south of these points. Zenson is east of Treviso, and if the Plave line should break while the northern line holds, the Venetian Plains would be opened to the invaders.

Concentrated Fire of Italian Artillery and Repeated Counter-Attacks Inflicting Great Casualties On Teutons -No Important Success For Enemy After Three Days Furious Fighting.

Italian Army Headquarters, June 18 .- (By the Associated ess).—Bitter fighting is in progress along the Piave River. The Austrians are sustaining large losses from the concentrated fire of Italian batteries. Repeated counter-attacks are being made by Italian infantry, inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy.

Paris, June 18.—Havas Agency.—That the Austrians, after three days of furious fighting, have not gained any really important success, confirms the newspapers in their opinion that the offensive has falled.

L'Homme Libre says that the Italian resistance to every attack encourages the best hopes, and is convinced that an Italian victory is assured owing to the excellent spirits of the Italian troops.

Rome, June 17.—In their attacks between Zenson and Fossalta, along the Piave, the Austrians have been stopped everywhere, says an official statement issued tonight by the Italian war office. In the mountain region and around Montello there have been no infantry attacks by the enemy.

The statement reads: "On the mountainous front and around Montello the enemy did not renew his infantry attacks. During the day a successful thrust was carried out by our troops. We occupied several positions, capturing machine guns and some hundreds of prisoners.

"Important actions developed south of Montello and along the Plave in the zone between Zenson and Fossalta, but the enemy everywhere was stopped by our counter-attacks. The only mention of the fact was that in connection with the day of humiliation and prayer set aside by the Government, when Rev. Mr. Taylor of Brayside, Ont., a commissioner to the assembly, asked that all present remember their enemies at this time, and pray that they might experience a change of heart. The question was not discussed by the assembly, but left to the discretion of the commissioners themselves.

The following is the comment of Capt. Morrow regarding the reported action of the assembly, written from the base hospital at Toronto:

"Let the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church meet in London, England, instead of London, Ontario, in one of those bomb-wrecked churches, the parishioners of which, in numberless cases, have lost their nearest and dearest through the foulest practices of the bomb-dropping Huns. Then the general assembly would scarcely pass resolutions calling upon Canadian Presbyterians to pray for the Germans. I would dearly love to hear what sort of resolution would be made or what kind of prayers would be uttered for the Huns overhead as they drop their bombs, wiping out our schools, homes and hospitals. I think we had better pray for some people in the general assembly when we hear such talk.

But this is surely a more important duty than inconclusive argument and



Secrets of Health and Happiness

Persistent Ringing in Your Ears a Call For Expert Aid

"Innitus" is the medical pundit's technical name for this nuisance. There may or may not be a little deafness, disziness or even high blood pressure if head noises are "in your midst." In any event, it is an unappy distemper. If there is chronic inflammation or a discharge present, this must be treated. When closing the outer ear diminishes the noises, successful treatment is possible and the ear sounds are often cured. If a constricting band lessens the tinnet labyrinth of the ear or its walls. There irritations or weakened blood or fluid may be found responsible.

If closing your ear with your hand or a bandage does not stop the sounds, treatment will not have much of a victory to its credit. Hardened drum and ear bones are then suspected to be the evildoers.

SIR JOHN WILLISON'S ECONOMICS.




