



They profess to be jealous of Canadian autonomy, and are apprehensive-too apprehensive-that our rights of self-government and the full control over our own affairs are being threatened by certain centripetal tendencies in the Empire. They pin their faith to British institutions, but claim that the genius of the British Empire is decentralization, giving to each colony capable of self-government "the status, liberty and power of a free nation. Their patriotism cannot be impugned, but they claim that Canada should attend strictly to her own business, and not participate in wars of her own making or be drawn into Imperial federation or any scheme which would delegate to an inter-Imperial body powers now exercised by the Canadian Parliament, or any control over Canadian affairs.

The Opposition press in this Provance is fond of attributing to Sir W frid Laurier and the Cabinet sentiments expressed by Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Monet. These members have been accused of insincerity in criticising Government measures, and of inflaming Nationalist feeling in Quebec, with the connivance of the Government. Mr. Monet's withdrawal from public life on ground that he had disqualified himself for any assistance from the Liberal party, without which he could not afford to remain in Parliament, is a sufficient answer to these calumnies.

The Russians refused to talk, but the Chinese say that on July 11 and 12 the Japanese captured and occupied, with 4,000, men one of the eastern torts near Port Before reinforcements rived the Russians cut off the 4,000 troops in the fort and exploded mines which resulted in the killing of every

Japanese soldier there. The Chinese report also that the night before they left Port Arthur Russian torpedo boat sunk a merchant ship near Port Arthur, mistaking her for a Japanese transport, Many Chinese on board the merchantman were drowned, but the entire crew of the steamer and a number of her Chinese passengers were rescued by the Russians.

If this story is true the steamer in question probably is the Hipsang, belonging to the Indo-China Navigation Company, which is 42 hours overdue from New Chwang, and which was reported to have struck a mine. The local agents of the Hipsang say they believe the steamer to have been lost.




