Printed and fold by JOHN HOWE, at his Printing-Office in George-Street, near the Parade. Signals made at Fort George, when Veffels are coming into Halifax Harbor:

One Ball For one square rigged vessel.

One Ball, half hoisted, For two do Two Balls close, For three do.

Two Balls feparated, For four, do

A Pendant of any colour, For five do.

A Pendant under one ball For fix do.

A Pendant over a ball half hoisted, For seven do.

A Pendant under two balls close, For eight do.

A Pendant between two balls separated, For nine do.

A Flag of any color For ten or more.

The above are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the vessels, can be seen, when one or more of the sollowing descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mass head.

A Union, For a flag ship with or without a squadron.

Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker.

Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a frigate.

Do. with a white pendant over it, for a small armed vessel.

A red flag, pierced white, for a packet.

A blue pendant for a merchant ship. A red pendant, for a merchant brig.

A white pendant, for a topfail floop or schooner.

A red, flag for a neutral man of war.

Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant ship Do. with a red pendant under it, for a neutral merchant brig. Do. with a white pendant under it, for a do. sloop or schooner.

Enemy's Signals:

A French Jack for an enemy's fleet.

A blue pendant under a French pendant, for an enemy's ship.

A red pendant under a do. for an enemy's brig.

A white pendant under a do, for an enemy's floop or schooner A Union Jack over enemies signals, denotes the vessels to be

prizes.

Signal of Diffress:

In cases when immediate assistance is necessary, a ball at the mast head, in addition to the descriptive colours of the vessel in distress, and guns occasionally, until the signal is attended to.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1804.

HE first of the Moon, January 26th; the middle will be at 4. 58m. and end at 10h. 12m, afternoon, apparent time. At the middle the Moon will be eclipsed 43 digits on the south Limbs the Moon will rise eclipsed, so that the beginning of the

Eclipse will not be visible.

Feb. 1 rth, the Sun eclipfed in the morning; the end will be at 7h. 7m. ten minutes after the Moon has rilen; the Moon's lat. at the true conjunction will be 41° 32" 8 N. visible angle of the Moon's way, with the Ecliptic 5° 39° 19"; horizontal parallax 58° 59" 4; apparent femidiameter 16' 4" 5, and of the Sun 16' 15"; hourly motion of the Moon in lat, 3' 13"; hourly motion in the Ecliptic 35' 0' 7.

For the information of Travellers between Windsor and Parrfborcugh, &c.

Whit Tuefday

HE Parrsborough packet fails regularly between Windsor and Parriborough twice in every week, and occasionally three times; but always from Parriborough every Monday in the Summer feafon, wind and weather permitting, fo as to be at Windfor on Tuesday, and will fail from the ce the first high water that happens, at or after 8 o'clock in the forenoon of that day.—The passage money for each person is five shillings, and the freight for horses and neat cattle, is seven shillings and fix pence per head. The vessel is 42 tons burthen, and has good accommodations for passengers; and likewise for taking over horfes, neat cattle, sheep, &c.

SUGAR FROM THE BEET-ROOT.

Doctor Achard has published at Berlin, the results of a second trial, made on a large scale, to extract fugar from the beet root under the direction of a commission appointed for that purpose by his Prussian majesty. By these results it appears that 1500 quintals of beet-root gave 5052 pounds of raw fugar ; 450 quintals of refuse, and 100 ounces of raw fyrup. Thirty quintails of beet-root, cultivated according to the process of Achard, gave each fix pounds three ounces of raw fugar. The refuse may be employed as coffee, or to diffil spirit; and is more profitable for feeding cattle than beets themselves. The raw sugar may be refined for every purpose whatever.

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CURIOUS ANECDOTE

IN THE HISTORY OF THE DOMESTICATION OF ANIMALS.

RECEIPT FOR THE CURE OF THE CANCER. By G. C. JENNER, of Burbage, Wilts.

TAKE one part of red lead, in fine powder, and two parts of hog's lard; mix them well together, and with the false thus prepared, spread on lint, dress the cancerous fore twice a day.

CLEANLINESS AND WASHING.

Could the free circulation of air, and cleanliness in house and persons, be introduced among the poor, insectious severs would rarely occur; but under the pressure of distress, every useful effort is too generally neglected; as much as possible, however, they should be taught and encouraged, to make exertions that are not expensive, and highly salubrious, as washing their apartments, and their furniture, in the cheapest manner; and the walls and ceilings with quick lime, an object of very trivial expence to most individuals.

It would add greatly to the health of the poor, were they to adopt a rule in their families, to have each person washed from head to foot about once a week; this might be the evening pre-

ceding the fabbath.

In the year 1783 and 1786, the typhus fever was fo epidemic in Chefter, as to occasion general alarm; but, with the precautions of free air and cleanliness, not one case occurred of a second person catching the disease, as Dr. Haygarth relates in his

letter to Dr. Percival.

Fresh air and cleanliness were the only means which I employed to prevent insection. Doors and windows were kept open, as far as the season and other circumstances would permit. Curtains were drawn to exclude light, but not the free circulation of the air. All clothes, utensils, &c. used by the patient, were immersed in a vessel of cold water immediately; and when taken out of it carefully washed. The shors were kept clean, and vinegar was sometimes, but not always, employed to sprinkle them. It was thought to be more easy, and more safe to remove than correct the poison.

OBSERVATIONS ON THE WEATHER.

1. The rifing of the mercury prefages, in general, fair weather and its falling foul weather, as rain, fnow, high winds, and florms.

2. In very hot weather the fall of the mercury indicates thunder.

3. In winter the rising presages frost; and in frosty weather, if the mercury falls three or four divisions, there will certainly follow a thaw; but in a continued frost, if the mercury rises, it will certainly snow.

4. When foul weather he pens foon after the falling of the mercury, expect but little of it; and, on the contrary, expect but little fair weather, when it proves fair shortly after the mercury

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oole 5. In foul weather, when the mercury rifes much and high and fo continues for two or three days before the foul weather is quite over, then expect a continuance of fair weather to follow.

6. In fair weather, when the mercury falls much and low, and hus continues for two or three days before the rain comes, then expect a great deal of wet, and probably high winds.

7. The unfettled motion of the mercury denotes uncertain and

changeable weather.

But to these remarks may be added, that, when the barometer suddenly falls two or three-tenths, without any material alteration in the thermometer, and the hygrometer is not much turned towards moist, a violent gale of wind may be expected. When the hygrometer inclines far towards moist, with only a trifling descent in the barometer, it denotes a passing shower and little wind; and when the barometer falls considerably, and the hygrometer turns much towards moist, the thermometer remaining stationary, and rather inclined to rise than fall, both violent wind and rain are likely to follow in the course of a few hours.

General Prognosticks of the Weather.

Amongst these we may reckon such as are derived from birds,

easts, infects, reptiles, and plants.

Birds, in general, retain in the quill part of their feathers a quantity of oil, which, when they feel an extraordinary degree of moisture in the atmosphere, they express by means of their bills, and distribute it over their feathers, to secure their bodies against the effects of an approaching shower.

Swallows in pursuit of the fles and infects, on which they prey.

he same cause, they fly much higher.

Domestic animals, as cows and sheep, but particularly the later, on the approach of rain, feed with great avidity in the open field, and retire near the trees and hedges as soon as they are saissied. In sine weather they graze and lounge about, eating and esting alternately with apparent indifference.

The pimpernel, commonly called peep-a-day, or fhepherd's veather-glafs, closes its leaves before rain, and the down of the

landelion is much affected by moisture.

Infects and reptiles of all kinds, feek or avoid rain according to their respective habits, by these means, giving notice of every change of weather.

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
