For ten or more.
The above are hoifted at the eaft or weft yard-arm, according to the quarter the veffel firlt appears in, with the addition of * ball in the centre of the yard, until the veffels, can be feen, when one or more of the following deferiptive colours will be hoilted at the maft head.
A Union, For a flag fhip with or without a fquadron. Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker.
Do. wish a blue'pendant over it, for a frigate.
Do. with a white pendant over it, for a fmall armed veffel A red flag, pierced white, for a packett.

For the information of Travellers between Windfor and Parrfborcugh, \&c.

1HE Parrfoorough packet fails regularly between Windfor and Parrborough twice in every week; and occalionally three times ; but always from Parrborough every Monday in the Summer feafon, wind and weather permitting, fo as to be at Windfor on Tuefday, and will fail from the cee the firft high water that happens, at or after 8 o'clock in the forenoon of that day.-The paffage money for each perfon is five fhillings, and the freight for horfes and neat cattle, is feven fhillings and fix pence per head. The veffel is 42 tons burthen, and has good accommodations for paffengers; and likewife for taking over horfés, neat cattle, fheep, \&c.

## SUGAR FROM THE BEET-ROOT.

Doftor Achard has publifhed, at Berlin, the refults of a fecond trial, made on a large fcale, to extraat fugar from the be et root under the direction of a commifion appoiated fo: that purpofe by his Pruffian majefty. By thefe refults it appears that $x$ soo quintals of beet-root gave $5952^{2}$ 'pounds of raw fugar ; 450 quintals of refufe, and 100 ounces of raw fyrup. Thirty quintails of beet-root, cultivated accordlag to the procefs of Achard, gave each fix pounds three ounces of ruw fugar. The refufe may be employed as coffee, or to diftil fpirit ; and is more profitable for feeding cattle than beets themfelves. The raw fugar may be refined for every purpofe whatever.

## RECEIPT FOR THE CURE OF THE CANCER. By G. C. Jexжez, of Durbage, Wilts.

TAKE one part of red lead, in fine powder, and two parts of hog's lard ; mix them well together, and with the false thus prepared, $\AA_{\mathrm{P}}$ read on lint, drefs the cancerous fore twice a day.

Mr . Jenner fays he is the more folicitous for the publication of this receipt, faving lately been a winefs to its happy influence in curing a molt inveterate cancer in the lip of a perfon now living in his neighbourhood, and to whom a perfonal reference can be given, if required. He has alfo heard of feveral other inftances of its wonderful efficacy from the moft refpectable authority.

Could the free circulation of air, and cleanlinefs in houfe and perfons, be introduced among the poor, infectious fevers would - rarely occur ; but under the preffure of diftrefs, every ufeful effort is too generally neglected; as much as poffible, however, chey fhould be taught and encouraged, to make exertions that a e not expenfive, and highly falubrious, as wafhing their apartouents, and their furniture, in the cheapeft manner ; and the walls and ceilings with quick lime, an object of very trivial expence to moft individuals.

It would add greatly to the health of the poor, were they to idopt a rule in their families, to have each perfon wafhed from head to foot about once a week ; this might be the evening preceding the fabbath.

In the year 1783 and 1786 , the typhus fever was fo epidemic in Chefter, as to occalion general alarm ; but, with the precautions of free air and clennlincfs, not one cafe occurred of a fccond perfon catching the difeafe, as Dr. Haygarth relates in his letter to Dr. Percival.
'Frefh air and cleanlinefs were the only means which I emloyed to prevent infection. Doors and windows were kept open, as far as the feafon and other circumftances would permit. Curtains were drawn to exclude light, bot not the free circulation of the air. All clothes, utenfils, \&c. ufed by the patient, were immerfed in a veffel of cold water immediately ; and when aken out of it carefully wafhed. The floors were kept clean, and vinegar was fometimes, but not always, employed to firin. kle them. It was thought to be more eafy, and more fafe to remove than correct the poifon.

## OBSERVATIONS ON THE WEATHER.

1. The riling of the mercury prefages, in general, fair weather and its falling foul weather, as rain, fnow, high winds, and llorms.
2. In very hot weather the fall of the mercury indicates thunder.
3. In winter the fifing prefages fro? ; and in frofly weather if the mercery falls three or four divifions, there will certainly follow a thaw ; but in a continued froft, if the mercury rifes, it will certainly fow.
4. When foul weather hopens foon after the falling of the mercury, expeat but little of it ; and, on the contrary, expect bu little fair weather, when it proves fair fhortly after the mercury has rifen.
5. In foul weather, when the mercury rifes much and high: and fo continues for two or three days before the foul weather is fuite over, then expect a continuance of fair weather to follow.
6. In fair weather, when the mercucy falls much and low, and hus continues for two or three days before the rain comes, then expect a great deal of wet, and probably high winds.
7. The unfettled motion of the mercury denotes uncertain and changeable weather.

But to thefe remarks may be added, that, when the barometer fuddenly falls two or three-tenths, withoct any material alteration in the thermometer, and the hygrometer is not much turned tovards moift, a violent gale of wind may be expected. When the hygrometer inclines far towards moilt, with only a trifling defeent in the barometer, it denotes a paffing fhower and little wind; and when the barometer falls coafiderably, and the hygrometer turns nuch towards moift, the thermometer remaining ftationary, and ather inclined to rife than fall, both violent wind and rain arc iikely to follow in the courfe of a few hours.

## Gensral Prognofficks of the Weather.

Amonglt thefe we may reckon fuch as are derived from birds, eafts, infects, reptiles, and plants.

Birds, in general, retain in the quill part of their feathers 2 quantity of oil, which, when they feel an extraordinary degree of moifture in the atmofphere, they exprefs by means of their bills, and diftribute it over their feathers, to fecure their bodies againfi he effects of an approaching fhower.
Swallows in purfuit of the fles and imfects, on which they prey. :eep near the earth in wet weather; and in dry weather, from he fame caufe, they fly much higher.
Domeftic animals, as cows and fheep, but particularly the later, on the approach of rain, feed with great avidity in the open field, and retire near the trees and hedges as foon as they are faisfied. In fine weather they graze and lounge about, eating and ctting alternately with apparent indifference.
The pimpernel, commonly called peep-a-day, or fhepherd's veather-glafs, clofes its leaves before rain, and the down of the landelion is much affected by moifture.

Infeets and reptiles of all kinds, feek or avoid rain according o their refpective habits, by thefe means, giving notice of every hange of weather.
