ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Directors of the County of Carleton General Protestant Hospital, beg to present for the information of the Subscribers, this the Twenty-ninth Annual Report of the proceedings of the Board, together with financial and other statements.

From the annexed statements it will be seen that the income for the year ending January 31st, 1880, was \$10,050.37. A detailed statement of the same, and the sources from which it has been derived, may be seen in the several appendices to this Report.

The Board, in the month of May last, finding the finances of the Hospital in a very depressed state, a large accumulation of debt having arisen, resolved to make a general appeal to the friends of the Hospital. A meeting was called to meet at the City Hall, on May 29th, which was attended by a number of gentlemen from the City and County, including the clergy of the several Protestant Churches in the City. The City was divided into districts, and committees were appointed to canvass them respectively, which was attended with much success, as may be seen by the remarkable increase in the item under the head of "Annual Subscriptions."

It is very encouraging to have found so hearty a response to the call thus made by the Board of Directors, and is an assurance that if a similar effort be made in each succeeding year, there will be little difficulty, on the part of the Directors, in carrying on the work of the

Hospital satisfactorily.

Several of the Towns on the Upper Ottawa were canvassed during the past summer, and although the depression in business was much felt, yet there was according to their means a readiness shewn to help the Hospital. Nearly every one called upon admitted its usefulness, in evidence of which was, that patients from the several districts had been received into the Hospital, and after due treatment returned to their respective homes, either relieved or cured. The particulars may be seen in the schedule under the head of "Residence." Patients are received from every County surrounding the City.

It is to be hoped that this source or revenue will be continued and enlarged as the inhabitants of the surrounding country becomes impressed with the neccessity and duty of maintaining such an institution.

The cost of maintenance, deducting the expenditure on Building account, was for the year just ended \$6,465.89, which divided by the aggregate number of days, 13,200, shews an average cost per patient of $48\frac{9}{9}$ cents.

The average cost per patient in 1877-78 was - 71°_{100} cents. " " 1878-79 " - 48°_{100} "

The above statement shews that the average reduced cost per patient has been maintained for the two last years, and is due to some extent to considerable donations in kind received at the Hospital.

The Directors have managed the means entrusted to their care with a due regard to economy.

It must prove very pleasing to the friends of the institution to see by the large and increasing list of donations of provisions, fuel, clothes and other supplies, that there is a very general interest taken in supplying the necessities of the patients in the Hospital; such donations are as valuable as money, and as there are many who cannot contribute the latter, it is hoped they will do as largely as they can by giving articles requisite in the sustentation of this institution; among this class of contributors they would make mention of an act that might be very much extended. A number of farmers from the adjoining township of Gloucester, brought to the Hospital during the past month, seventeen loads of Cordwood, this was a very pleasing act of charity, and if followed generally by the inhabitants of the surrounding Townships, fuel sufficient for the use of the Hospital might be obtained.

The mortgages alluded to in last year's Report continue to weigh heavily on the funds of the Hospital, but so far the Board have been enabled to meet their engagements.

Since the time the Subscribers last met, the prevalence of Small Pox has necessitated the maintenance of the old Hospital with a separate staff, and thereby largely increasing the ordinary expenditure. It is to be hoped with the efforts now made by the Corporation and the Board of Health, this epidemic will be considerably lessened.

The number of Patients received into the Hospital during the past year was 313; an increase on that of the preceding year (227) of 86.

The Directors are obliged, reluctantly, to refuse admission to incurables, as were they to receive such persons they would be restricting the benefits of the institution from the class of Patients for whose use the Hospital was erected and is maintained. This explanation will be, they are sure, sufficient, especially when it is known that the means at their disposal, nothwithstanding the most urgent persevering efforts, barely suffice to make provision for the treatment of legitimate applicants.

The following extract from the Report of the Government Inspector (J. W. Langmuir, Esq.), may prove interesting and suggestive to the supporters of this Hospital, who will without doubt feel pleased at the commendatory spirit of the Report in reference to the management of this institution:—

"I made a Statutory Inspection of the Ottawa Protestant Hospital

on the 17th of April.

"The house throughout was in admirable order. The wards were neatly kept, and bright and cheerful looking. The beds were comfortable, and the bedding clean and tidy. The air was sweet in the various dormitories, and the general condition of the Hospital indicated good management. There were in residence 34 patients (20 men and 14 women), 10 of whom had been continuously in the Hospital for a year or more, these and a few other inmates, could not be looked upon as Hospital Patients, under the terms of the Charity Aid Act. Some had trifling ailments, but most of them were only afflicted with the infirmimities of old age. The retention of such patients in an Hospital tends very much to lower its standard as a curative institution, and gives it in some respects the appearance of a Refuge. I strongly urged upon the Directors the desirableness of making other provision for these poor old people. The remaining Patients were recent admissions and proper subjects for Hospital treatment.

"The various books of record were examined, and found to be cor-

rectly and neatly kept."

The Board of Directors desire to express their sense of the obligations under which they are placed, to the several gentlemen who have so kindly acted as collectors during the past year—the indigent sick are much indebted to them—their names and the amounts collected may be seen in the schedule attached to this Report.

The Board would also beg to return thanks to the Members of the Medical Staff for their continued and kindly efforts in the discharge of their onerous and important duties in connection with this Hospital.

The Board desire to offer their cordial thanks to those Clergymen, who have so faithfully visited the Hospital during the past year.

The Board return thanks to the Members of the Young Men's Christian Association, for their kind visits to the Hospital, during the past year.

The Board return thanks to the Members of the Ladies' Committee, for their kind visits, and particularly for their generous regard in adding to the necessary comforts of the sick in the Hospital. as may be seen by reference to the appendix at the end of this report.

The Board beg to tender their thanks to C. H. Mackintosh, Esq., proprietor of the "Citizen" Newspaper; also, to C. W. Mitchell, Esq., proprietor of the "Free Press" Newspaper, for their kind and liberal aid in giving gratuitous notices, etc.

The Board desire to return thanks to Messrs. James Lindsay and John Pennock, for their gratuitous services in auditing the accounts of the Hospital for the past year.

The Matron and Staff have during the year been attentive and painstaking in the discharge of their several duties.

In conclusion, they would pray that the bountiful Giver of all good may bless the donors and friends of this institution, and by His grace strengthen them in their endeavours to continue in this good work, thereby fulfilling the desire of the Blessed Saviour, who while on earth commended to His followers the care of the sick and the afflicted.
