





INTRODUCTORY.

The County of Elgin lies on the northern shore of Lake Erie, and extends from south-east to north-west, over a distance of sixty miles. Its breadth from north to south varies from 10 to 25 miles. It covers an area of 765 square miles; and embraces 491,200 acres of land, chiefly in the hands of hardy and industrious settlers. It is composed of ten Municipalities, and are, in order, beginning at the western extremity; Aldborough, Dunwich, Southwold, St. Thomas, Yarmouth, Malahide, Aylmer, S. Dorchester, Vienna and Bayham. St. Thomas is the Capital, and is invested with the Municipal powers of a Town Corporation; Vienna and Aylmer with that of Incorporated Villages—the rest being Township Municipalities. It is divided into two electoral divisions—the three first named Municipalities forming the West Riding, and the other seven the East Riding. The surface is undulating, the soil fertile, and a very small portion of it (if indeed an excepception must be made) unfit for cultivation. The climate is mild and uniform—the extremes of heat and cold being considerably tempered by close proximity to the Lake. As a consequence, there are few sections of country in Canada in which the labours of the husbandman have been so successful in filling his barns with plenty, and in securing to him a home surrounded with all the comforts and luxuries of advanced civilization, and all the joys and delights of enlightened society. Many of the inhabitants are among the oldest settlers in Canada; many have been born and brought up to manhood and advanced age within its borders; while great accessions have been made to the population by immigration from nearly every state in America, and from every country in Europe. Its growth in this respect has been rapid; and the confidence inspired by the various fields which the settlement offered for the exercise of patient toil and honest industry has produced an independent yeomanry, each living upon his own freehold estate, the lord of his own manor, enjoying the blessings of peace, and the sweetness of contentment. Thus, the wilderness receded rapidly before the axe of the hardy pioneer; and a tract of land which, sixty years ago, served only to shelter wild beasts; and to offer a bare and scanty subsistence to a few aborigines and the faminishing wolves that were there companions in their forest homes, is now covered with smiling fields, bearing abundance of golden grain, and dotted with homes in which over thirty-three thousand persons find peace and plenty, the security and dignity of freemen, and the rewards of honest, industrious, and enterprising citizens. The log cabin has disappeared to give place to the frame dwelling; and that in its turn is being rapidly succeeded by the brick mansion, embowered in orchards, approached through rich green lawns, or tastefully arranged flower gardens, furnished with the best skill and taste of the modern Cabinet-maker, and filled with evidences of the higher, the more refined and the more enduring pleasures that spring from a cultivated intellect, and elevated moral feelings.

In the year 1803, the Hon. Col. Talbot was authorized to form a settlement of the waste lands of the Crown; and he, with great wisdom and forethought, laid out lands and located the emigrants seeking a home in Canada, establishing thereby a prosperous and happy home for thousands of those who are now independent, whose industry is an example to settlers in any country. London was located by him to actual settlers, himself setting the example by going into the woods and cutting down the first tree. He landed at Port Talbot-a beautiful spot in the Township of Dunwich, on the banks of Lake Erie-on the 21st of May, 1803. At this date, a trace of civilization was not to be seen anywhere within the County, nor nearer than Long Point-60 miles eastward of Port Talbot. For six years, few immigrants were attracted by the Talbot Settlement; and it was not until 1809 that settlers first began to drop in. In that year he built on a stream below his dwelling, a grist mill, which, in 1812, was burnt down by a marauding party of Americans. He never rebuilt it. The roads were, however, so unpracticable, that settlers at a distance preferred going by boat to Long Point with their grists, while others made use of a hand mill of simple construction; and others yet of the stump of a tree hollowed and conveated into a mortar by means of fire, in which, by the aid of a pestle, they

succeeded in reducing their corn to a state better calculated to afford nour-The difficulties and privations of the early settlers can be understood in their full force only by those who actually experienced them. There is no part of Canada in which the immigrant of to-day suffers anything like them. Beyond what the soil, under a simple process of culture. yielded to them, the early settlers could command little. Wheat was of the value of Two dollars a bushel, and then it took eighteen bushels to pay for one barrel of salt; and one, to purchase a yard of grey cotton. The late James Hamilton of London, that for many years occupied with respect and honor the position of Sheriff of Middlesex, was the first to offer the County of Elgin the advantages of trade and commerce. In 1817 he landed at Port Stanley with a few goods; such no doubt as the exigency of the settlement required in those days, and with the assistance of Mr. John Warren carried on business at St. Thomas, under the style of "Hamilton and Warren." Bela Shaw and Biglow afterwards made their appearance to engage in the same pursuits.

These were, for several years, the only representatives of the Commercial community in the Connty of Elgin, and it must be said that their enterprise and their limited stock alike sufficed to supply the wants of the settlement with English manufactures, and the growth of foreign countries. Since the days of Hamilton and Bela Shaw, the County has, however, made remarkable progress, and the capital, skill and enterprise now required to carry on our trade and commerce is very extensive; and, as will be seen from the sequel, our mercantile men are not behind those of any other country, in all those qualities essential to upright and successful commercial transactions. An idea of the rapid growth of wealth in the county, as a consequence of the good moral character and hardy industry of the settlers may be gathered from the imports and exports made in successive years, at Port Stanley, the most important shipping port on Lake Erie, and the principal outlet, to foreign markets, of the County. The position of the harbor is one, indeed, of provincial importance, as being, as above stated, the outlet of a County, second to none in the province in fertility of soil, and rapidly increasing productiveness and settlement. It early attracted the attention of the Government, and large sums of public money have been spent in making the mouth of Kettle Creek a safe and commodious harbor. Up to

the close of the year 1856, the large sum of \$190,000 was spent here in erecting piers, and in dredging the basin inside; and a further sum of \$10,000 has been since spent.

Thus Port Stanley is now the chief harbor on the north shore of Lake Erie, from Amherstburg to Niagara—and constitutes the principal outlet of the trade of the Western District when navigation is resorted to—thus adding materially to the wealth and convenience of the County in which it is situated.

We will now look at the advancement of the County from another point of view—namely, the assessment roll which is good evidence of the material wealth of the community. But it must be remembered that the assessed value is never up to the mark of the real value of either the real or personal property it represents.

The following is the equalized assessment of 1871:-

To which if we add the assessed value of the Town of St, Thomas about \$509,000, we have the round sum of nearly nine millions of dollars as the assessed value of the County.

We may therefore safely infer that the real and personal property of the County is worth 12 to 15 millions of dollars, and all that sum acquired within the last 50 years for at that period the lands were freely given away as being of no value. With our present advantages what may we expect the assessment roll will amount to in 50 years hence?

The Railway system of this County is not excelled by any in the Province. It is traversed by four lines. The London & Port Stanley Rail Road was opened in 1856. It is 24 miles long, and connects London with

Port Stanley, and thence by a regular line of steamers with Cleveland, Buffalo, &c. Four regular express trains pass daily over this road—its principal station is at St. Thomas. William Bowman is Superintendent of of the road.

The Great Southern Rail Road passes longitudinally through the County in its greatest extreme length, a distance of over 60 miles, and the Mooretown Branch, which quits the main line near St. Thomas, and crossing the Thames, enters Middlesex, and thence through Lambton to the St. Clair River. The large bridge on this road at St. Thomas, may be regarded as a specimen of architectural skill and mechanism. It is 1,300 feet long—90 feet high and required a million and a quarter solid feet of timber to construct it. It cost about \$40,000. These lines will be completed in 1872.

The Canada Air Line (which is a Loop of the G. W. R., and being a more direct route to the Niagara River) commences at Glencoe, and runs in an easterly direction through the Township of Ekfrid and a very small portion of Caradoc, thence crossing the Thames River and entering the Township of Southwold on Lot. 8, Routh's Survey.

The River Thames is spanned by a handsome timber bridge 820 feet in length, consisting of 3 spans of Burr Truss, each 100, ft. (immediately over River) and about 260 feet of trestle on each side. Its stands about (72 ft) seventy-two feet from low water mark to rail, and contains about 600,000 ft. B. M. (of lumber), costing from \$20,000 to \$25,000—thence bearing south-easterly it crosses the Back Street on Lot 28, N. & S. side—thence in an easterly direction, crossing Kettle Creek within the northern limits of the corporation of St. Thomas.

Kettle Creek is spanned by a wooden bridge of a total length of about 800 ft., consisting four spans of Howe Truss, each 100 ft. long, and nearly four hundred ft. of double deck trestle, the bulk of which is on east side. This bridge stands about 70 ft. from ground to rail, and contains about 850,000 ft. B. M. of timber, costing from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The station ground at St. Thomas, comprises an area of about 21 acres, and is situated to the west of the London & Port Stanley Railway, at a distance of $\frac{1}{3}$ mile N. of Talbot Street—thence through the Township of Yarmouth almost paralell to Talbot Street, crossing Catfish Creek (at New

Sarum) by a bridge 500 feet long, including one span of Howe Truss. 100 feet, and at a height of 58 feet above water level, contains about 244,000 feet B. M. of lumber, and costing about \$10,000.

The station ground at Aylmer, contains an area of five acres, and i_8 situated on the west side of the Dorchester Road, at a distance of $\frac{1}{2}$ mile N. of Talbot Street, after leaving Aylmer, the line curves gently to the N. in the direction of Tilsonburgh, passing out of the County.

Note.—Distance from Thames River to Aylmer, 25 miles.

ST. THOMAS

The Capital of the County of Elgin, is situated near the centre of the County, in the Townships of Yarmouth and Southwold.

The surrounding country is one of the finest agricultural districts in Ontario. Large quantities of wheat and other grain, are annually exported from this place.

The situation of St. Thomas is exceedingly pleasant. It is built on an elevated peninsula, formed by Kettle Creek and its tributaries, which make the complete circuit of the Town. The scenery in its immediate vicinity is remarkably picturesque and beautiful.

It was incorporated as a Village in 1853, and on the separation of the County of Elgin from Middlesex assumed its present position of the County Town; and a Court House and Gaol were erected on a beautiful site. The former is built of whitefreestone with appropriate devices in front; and the Gaol is built of limestone, imported from the celebrated Kingston quarries. The entire buildings present a superb appearance, and for style, adaptation, &c., are not excelled by any in the Province.

In 1861 the Town of St. Thomas separated from the County of Elgin for municipal and local purposes, and since that period continues to manage its own local affairs without representation in the County Council.

It possesses some good manufacturing establishments, among which may be noticed the large

FOUNDRY AND AGRICULTURAL WORKS of Haggert Bros., which are the most extensive in the County, and designed to supply a want long felt in this section of the country—that is, a first-class Foundry and Machine Works, such as the present really is. Their buildings are brick, four storeys high, the upper storey being finished in purely French style. One hundred hands are employed, and an engine forty horse power used.

St. Thomas Engine and Agricultural Works are carried on by C. Norsworthy & Co. They occupy a large frame building corner of Centre and Metcalfe Streets, and turn out every article in their line. Twenty

hands are employed and steam power used. They manufacture engines, mill gearing and agricultural implements.

FLOUR MILLS.—The New England Flour and Grist Mills on the Gravel Road are carried on by Richard Turville; they contain five run of stones, and can dress 300 bushels of grain daily. Steam and Water Power are used.

Emanuel Rockey's Flour and Grist Mills are situated one mile southeast of the Town. He can dress 150 bushels daily with two ruu of stones. Water power is used.

PLANING MILLS, &c.—The extensive Planing, Door, Sash and Blind Factory of Metcalfe & Morse on St. Catherine Street, is a large building, where twelve hands are employed, and every thing in their line are turned out. The firm has a large Steam Saw Mill on the premises.

Hillis & Son are extensively engaged in the same line of business. Their factory is situated on Queen Street, near Talbot. They employ 10 hands, and manufacture Doors, Sash, Blinds, Scroll Sawing, &c.

James Singer's Factory is situated on Laurence Street. He is exten sively engaged in the erection of edifices of all kinds, and the manufacturing of Doors, Sash, Blinds, &c., Planing and Matching Lumber, and descriptions of building materials.

Breweries.—The Elgin Brewery and Malt House on New Street, is carried on by Rich & Geary. They brew 2,000 to 3,000 barrels of Ale, Beer and Porter, and make 6,000 bushels of Malt annually.

The St. Thomas Brewery on the gravel road is carried on by William Reiser. His buildings are frame 40 x 60 feet, two storeys high, where he manufactures a large quantity of Ale, Beer and Porter. He is also a Malter.

Tanneries.—M. T. Moore is extensively engaged in the business. He prepares 10,000 sides annually of sole harness and upper leather, kip and calf skins.

George K. Crocker carries on the same business. His Tannery is opposite the Court House, where 8,000 to 10,000 sides of leather are turned out annually, consisting of Sole, Belting, Harness and Upper Leather, Kip, Calf and Sheep Skins.

William Collinson is engaged in the same. He prepares a large quantity of Kip, Calf and Sheep Skins of the best description.



An Incorporated Village and station on the G. W. A. L. R. R., situa ted in the Township of Malahide on the Talbot Street, 12 miles from St. Thomas, the County Town, and 15 miles from Vienna. This village was incorporated in I871. Up to 1830 there were few settlers and very rude buildings in this locality, when the first store was opened by Hodgkinson & Keith. In 1833 a tailor shop and a school were erected, and two years after the little village obtained its present name after Lord Aylmer, then Governor General of B. N. A. In 1837 a post office was established, and Philip Hodgkinson, the present P. M., appointed to that office. At this period and for several years afterwards the staple commodities of trade were shingles and pine boards, which were estimated as follows:—A bundle of shingles, or I00 feet of lumber, were reckoned at \$1, Malahide currency—at 75cts in store pay, or 50 cents in cash, and wheat per bushel at the same rate—and usage legalized this scale of prices, and was known as "Malahide Currency." But as the price of wheat improved, the Malahide currency declined, and eventually died a natural death with little prospect of ever being revived.

The present population is about 1000, and there are four good churches an excellent school house, town, concert and temperance halls, and is the second place of commercial and manufacturing enterprise in the County.

It is a station on the G. W. Air Line Railroad, now in course of completion, on which are five bridges near the village, their collective length being about 700 feet, and requiring a quarter million feet of timber in their construction. G. W. Griffin, is the contractor.

TANNERY.—Samuel D. York's tannery is a large brick and frame building, where 5,000 sides of leather are tanned annually; 3 to 4 hands are employed

WOOLLEN MILLS.—The Elgin Woollen Mills, situated 1 mile west and 1 mile south of Aylmer, are carried on by Samuel S. Clutton. He employs a large number of hands in cloth making and austom work.

Carriage Factories.—Messrs. Cropp & Newell are extensively engaged in this line of business. They manufacture carriages, waggons, buggies, sleighs, cutters, &c., besides general blacksmithing, and employ 12 hands.

Mr. J. C. Weisbrod is engaged in the same line of business, which is carried on in a large frame building east side of the gravel road and north of Talbot Street, opposite the Tannery. Employs 6 to 8 hands.

Messrs. J. E. McDonald carriage maker and W. Monteith, general blacksmith, carry on an extensive business in a large frame building south on Talbot Street where 12 hands are employed.

Mr. J. A. McCausland is engaged in the same line of business which he prosecutes with equal energy and success. Heemploys 10 hands.



An Incorporated Village, situated on the Big Otter River, in the Township of Bayham. This village was first settled in 1829, and for several years made most rapid and unprecedented advancement in population and commerce, so that in 1851 the number of inhabitants reached 800, and the village was incorporated with municipal powers. At this time the County was divided into two Grammar School Circuits, and Vienna was the place selected for the location of the Second Circuit School, where it continues till the present time. For some years after its incorporation, the village continued to increase in wealth, business and population; the latter having reached 1.200 in 1854.

About that time a conjunction of circumstances arose, which not only impeded its future progress, but to some extent caused a retrogade movement, both in business and population. The circumstances were first a great decline in the lumber trade in this section of the country, and secondly, a terrible conflagration, which with unsparing fury destroyed nearly all the buildings on one side of the principal street of the village.


