PRISONERS TO EARN FOR THEIR FAMILIES

By Outdoor Work and Wholesome Surroundings it is Hoped to Work Reform in Those Who Have Fallen.

[By Special Wire to The Courier] TORONTO, May 28-The Ontario overnment in a new policy of conucting industrial farms in the province is aiming to do away in practical fashion with the depriviation and want suffered by the wives and famlies of indigent men who have been sent to jail for idleness.

By a series of important regulations arranged for at the last Legislative session and now put into working shape, the earnings of a person sentenced to an industrial farm will, hereafter be applied to his own maintenance and that of his immediate dependent relatives. His wages will also be applied to payment for his ransportation to a place of employnent on his release.

The main object of placing these nstitutions on a new basis of efficiency is to provide open-air employment with moral and physical reformatory methods for persons other wise lying in idleness in a common jail. Jail maintenance will also be out down materialy by making the industrial farms self-sustaining.

The whole program is presented as mother phase of a progressive social reform policy and Ontario is the first place in the world to attempt the tution of these reformatory initutions for the common prison.

The regulations are prefaced xtracts from the acts relating to dustrial farms, showing what perons are eligible for custodial care hereat and referring to the section which states that any person convicted of being found drunk or disorderin a public place within three onths after a prior conviction for a like offense may be committed to an ndustrial farm for an indetermined eriod not exceeding two years. The objects of an industrial farm

The Regulations

The regulations are 67 in number given authority to compel everyone to be employed. Facilities are to be provided for every form of farm

The dietary is prescribed with the object of providing plain, wholesome nourishing food, suitable for persons employed in the open air. Vegetables grown on the farm are to be provided in abundance, but the nitrogenous oods, such as meats, are limited in






