BRITISH SCORE MOST IMPORTANT HUNS LAUNCH

Offensive Upon Ancre River Means Much to the Forces of Haig and the Entente Generally - Prisoners Taken in Latest Drive Number Over 5000

London, Nov. 15 .- The battle of the Ancre continues with the British wave still beating eastward toward Bapaume. Beaucourt, another bastion on a hill, was captured yesterday, and the total of prisoners brought in total more than 5,000.

"Our tenacious defence caused us considerable losses," says the German official statement, admitting the loss of Beaumont-Hamel and Divion. And the sanginuary struggle continues with the defenders paying a heavier price than Haig's troops. HIRAUMONT NEXT OBJECTIVE.

The British are battering their way steadily toward Miraumont. The capture of Beaucourt gives them a position on which they can pivot their flank to the north and sweep beyond the Beaumont-Serre line until Mirau mont, an important railway station is practically pocketed.

Two important results have already accrued from this new offensive. German defences of surpassing strength have been smashed and a large number of prisoners have been taken. The British haul of prisoners exceeds the best of any previous two days in the Somme fighting. Adding casualties, the German losses in yesterday's grapple probably equal two divisions.

Hungarian Ex-Premier Looks For

Peace Proposals During the Coming Winter-Twenty-Five Years of Peace Should Follow the Present War

Berlin, Nov. 13, via London, Nov. 15-(Delayed)-The opening of peace negotiations may perhaps be expected with fair prospects of success in the course of the coming winter, according to Count Albert Apponyi, veteran Hungarian leader, and former Hungarian premier. Count Apponyi, who is visiting Germany to deliver two addresses on Hungarian history, expressed his views in an interview given to a correspondent of The Associated Press, in which he discussed the general European situation

"We cannot expect," he said, " to see peace negotiations opened within the next few weeks, while the Roumanian campaign is still undecided. However, I regard our chances for success there as excellent and once Roumania is crushed I think the Entente powers will be willing to consider the question of peace. Roumania was the Entente's last card, and is proving a losing one. We are massing a big army against the Roumanians, and I think that the end will come shortly. Of course our progress on the Transylvania front is slow, owing to the great difficulties of the country and particularly to the deficiency in rearward communications. These communications are far poorer than in the west or even in Galicia and Russia. However, the entry of Roumania into the war has in many respects been really advantageous to us."

To illustrate what he regards as the improving chances for peace negotiations, Count Apponyi referred to recent speeches of statesmen in the opposing camps. Gives Assurance That No Designs Against Neutral Trade Are Harbored, But Expresses Britain's Intention To Stand Firmly on Her Rights.

London, Nov. 15 .- The morning papers generally give no particular prominence to Viscount Grey's reply to the American blacklist note. The Daily Telegraph, however, comments editorially on the reply and says of the American note:

"We wonder whether a more striking example could be found of a manner in which interest and suspicion can cause reasonable persons to be blind to a plain consideration of principle and right. "The blacklist is based on a clear principle of national sover-

eignty. No fair minded American can dispute the justice of this assertion. But the Americans have not regarded the situation from this standpoint. Their eyes have been fixed on the principle that neutrals have the right to trade with any and all the belligerents, and they have not perceived that this right might necessarily be modified if a belligerent exercises his undoubted right to forbid his own nationals to trade with neutral firms.

"As to the American suspicion that the blacklist conceals a design to forward British trade at the expense of neutral commerce, we trust that Viscount Grey's strongly reiterated renunciation of any such design may quiet the suspicion.

"The reply is an expression of this country's intention to stand firmly upon rights which have always been recognized." The Times sars:

"The reasoning of this convinc document must satisfy the government and people of the United States that they have misunder stood the measure against which they thought it right to protest. Their note declared that these measures were inconsistent with the rights of neutrals. Viscount Grey joins issue upon this contention and proves that they do not impair neutral rights as the statute is a piece of purely municipal legislation. We have too high an opinion of American sense of Justice and law to suppose that our right, legal and moral, to adopt these measures can seriously be disputed once their true character is understood."

The difficulty of chartering boats is often responsible for tremendous losses. Through lack of buildings for storage, the flax is often thrown out of the cars, exposed to the weather for months and rendered useless. Ships carrying flax are singularly unfortunate in encountering submarines, and quite a number have been sunk.

Materials made from flax are essent ial in military equipment, tent duck (for which one contract alone called for three million yards), aeroplane cloth, butcher linen, hospital equipment, linings for uniforms, etc.; last, but not least, linen

thread for tents, boots and uniforms. The demands of the war office have been enormous and cotton substitutes the reverse of satisfactory. In the Irish mark et flax that could have been purchased for \$125.00 per ton, in 1913, is now costing \$485.00 per ton. Cost of bleachings, mill furnishings, coal, freight, in fact everything has enormously advanced, in some

cases as much as 300 per cent. Under such circumstances, and taking into consideration the demands of the

war office, which come first, it is not so su rprising that the linen offered to the public is so expensive as that it is so cheap. Pure linen goods are now very scarce and prices are still going higher. This week we learn of an advance in table damask of 75 per cent, on west yarns and 50 per cent on warp, which will make a difference of 25 to 30 per cent, on the finished article. Advances to date amount to from 75 to 125 per cent. over 1913 prices. When war ends there cannot be a sudden slump in prices for the all-sufficient reason that stocks do not exist, and the trade in high class linens could not assume the normal for years to come, owing to the system
