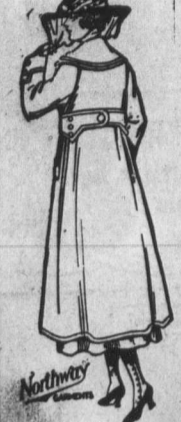

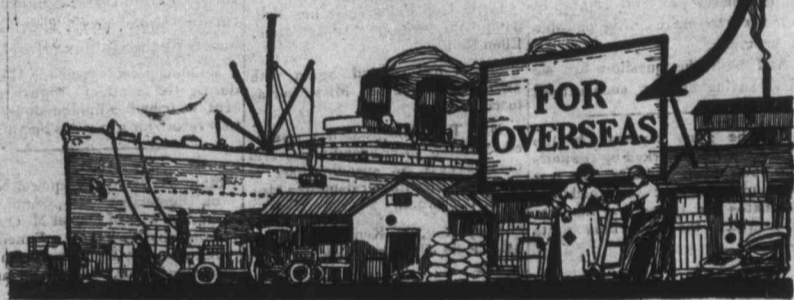

cost of material for producing a paper. Butter paper which I formerly paid 18 cents per pound now costs me 50 and 60 cents per lb.

But I think our home merchants are to blame for a good deal of the money that is sent abroad. As a farmer I can get only 40 cents per pound for butter when the purchaser from the stores is charged 55 cents. I have been told lately that my beef is little in demand and yet when I try to purchase a roast or stew in the market I am asked almost famine prices. Clothing boots and shoes are so high when I compare mail order prices that I am inclined to think that our merchants are unduly raising prices and excusing themselves by saying the war causes it.

Would it not be well for some commission to be appointed to visit some of our towns and inquire what prices our farmers are receiving for our products and what the same goods are sold at in the stores, and also about what per centage of profit the merchant receives on what he sells us. If the per centage of profit is reasonable I for one will spend my money at home to keep business active, as money is our financial blood. But if the home merchant is so unpatriotic as to demand more than his "pound of flesh" or reasonable profit, I shall stay at home and shop by mail.

Merchants would profit by taking the people into their confidence.

**NOTICE**

**TO UNITED STATES CITIZENS IN CANADA.**

By the United States Military Service Convention Regulations, approved by the Governor-in-Council on 20th August, 1918, MALE CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES IN CANADA, WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED BY THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, except those who have diplomatic exemption, ARE MADE SUBJECT AND LIABLE TO MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA, AND BECOME ENTITLED TO EXEMPTION OR DISCHARGE THEREFROM, UNDER THE CANADIAN LAWS AND REGULATIONS. The regulations governing this liability are published in the Canada Gazette (Extra) of 21st August, 1918; copy whereof may be obtained upon application through the post to the Director of the Military Service Branch of the Department of Justice at Ottawa.

UNITED STATES CITIZENS of the description aforesaid who were IN CANADA ON 30th JULY, 1918, HAVE SIXTY DAYS FROM THAT DATE within which TO EXERCISE AN OPTION TO ENLIST or enroll IN THE FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES, or TO RETURN to the United States; and THOSE WHO for any reason SUBSEQUENTLY BECOME LIABLE TO MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA HAVE THIRTY DAYS FROM THE DATE of the accruing OF SUCH LIABILITY within which to exercise the like option. It is stipulated by the Convention also that certificates of diplomatic exemption may be granted within the optional periods aforesaid. EVERY CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES TO WHOM THE REGULATIONS APPLY is required to REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR under the Military Service Act, 1917, FOR THE province or DISTRICT WITHIN WHICH he is, in the manner by the regulations prescribed, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF HIS OPTIONAL PERIOD and will be SUBJECT TO PENALTIES IF without reasonable excuse HE FAILS SO TO REPORT. For the information of those whom it may concern Sections 3 and 4 defining the requirements of registration, with which it will be necessary strictly to comply, are set out substantially as follows:—

**REGULATIONS**

3. EVERY MALE CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED IN THE LAWS of the UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, not including those who have diplomatic exemption, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF THE TIME LIMITED BY THE CONVENTION within which the Government of the United States may issue him a certificate of diplomatic exemption, SHALL TRULY REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR BY REGISTERED POST, and in writing which is plainly legible, his name in full, his occupation and the date of his birth; stating also whether he is single, married or a widower; and if the latter, whether he has a child living; and stating moreover his place of residence and usual post office address in Canada; and, if he reside within a city or place where the streets and dwellings are named and numbered, the name and number of his street and dwelling; or if he reside in another place, the lot and concession number, section, township, range, and meridian, or other definite description whereby his place of residence may be located, having regard to the custom of the locality in which he lives; and IF WITHOUT REASONABLE EXCUSE HE NEGLECT OR FAIL TO

REPORT IN THE MANNER and with the particulars aforesaid within the time limited as aforesaid, HE SHALL BE GUILTY OF AN OFFENCE, AND SHALL BE LIABLE UPON SUMMARY CONVICTION to a penalty not EXCEEDING FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS, AND TO IMPRISONMENT for any term not exceeding six months, and moreover he shall incur A PENALTY OF \$10.00 FOR EACH DAY after the time when or within which he should have registered during which he shall continue to be unregistered.

4. EVERY UNITED STATES CITIZEN WHO HAS DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION, although not otherwise subject to these regulations SHALL WITHIN TEN DAYS after the granting of the same truly REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR, in like manner and with the same particulars as required by the last preceding section; and in addition he shall embody in his report a true and complete statement of the particulars of his certificate of diplomatic exemption. NEGLECT OR FAILURE without reasonable excuse to comply with the requirements of this section SHALL CONSTITUTE AN OFFENCE PUNISHABLE IN THE MANNER AND BY THE PENALTIES provided in the last preceding section.

### Still Advancing Beyond German Lines.

Nearing Cambrai and St. Quentin.

New York, Sept. 8th.—The Associated Press tonight issued the following:—

The British and French armies continue to cut their way into the German lines on various sections of the lower part of the battle line in France.

Notwithstanding the bad weather which has caused somewhat of a slackening in the violence of the operations, Field Marshal Haig's forces have materially encroached upon Cambrai and St. Quentin, while farther south the French armies are pressing eastward on the old Noyon sector towards La Fere and Laon and northward from Soissons in an auxiliary manoeuvre with the same objectives in view. Between the Vesle and the Aisne Rivers, where the American troops are fighting with the French additional ground has been gained by the Allied forces.

#### RAPID ADVANCE OF BRITISH

The British now are standing at Villeveque, six miles from St. Quentin, having carried out an advance over a ten mile front on the general line of Epehy-Rosbecourt and Vermand. To the north the greater part of the Havincourt Wood, one of the German strong points barring the way to Cambrai, has been captured.

So rapid has been the British advance along this portion of the front that they now are in the positions they held before the big German drive of last March. In these positions the Germans are offering stout resistance to further progress by the British.

#### FRENCH SWEEP FORWARD

Gradually the French are working their way around the St. Gobain forest north of Soissons in the movement that aims at the outflanking of La Fere and Laon and all the German positions east of this region. They have reached the outskirts of the village of Servais on the north edge of the forest and two and a half miles from La Fere, while a short distance to the north they have taken the village of Mennessis on the St. Quentin Canal. This latter gain brings the French within a little more than eight miles of St. Quentin.

### 500 Enter British Army in One Day.

New Record Made in New York City.

(New York Herald, Wednesday)

Five hundred applicants for admission into the British military service were accepted yesterday at the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission No. 220 West Forty-second Street, and hundreds of other applicants who besieged the office were turned away on account of the inability of the examiners to care for the crowds.

Never before in the history of the mission have more than 350 men been accepted on a single day. The average last week was two hundred a day.

Owing to the inadequate facilities for handling the crowds that thronged every available inch of space in the office, at two o'clock it was found necessary to close the doors. The rest of the afternoon was spent in disposing of the applicants, some of whom had been waiting since early in the morning.

One hundred and seventy three of the applicants accepted joined the Jewish battalion for service in Palestine. Four thousand Jews have enlisted in the battalion in New York in the last six months. The first detachment of 268, who went to England for training on February 28th., and the second detachment of 400 who followed on March 21st., have seen two months of service in the trenches in Palestine.

The British Army gained 165 recruits yesterday, and the Canadian Army 135, while the Siberian Expeditionary Forces received twenty five recruits. Many of the recruits were British West Indians of whom 1,500 have enlisted at the New York office in the last seven weeks.
