OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—The case of Mac-Wherrell has at last been disposed of by the Cabinet and the result is that the death sentence has been commuted to one of im-prisonment for life. T. C. Robinnette, counsel for the prisoner, telegraphed the sheriff and also MacWherrell as to the decision.

Mr. Robinette left last night for Toronto, highly pleased with the result of his day's work in the city.

The Loan Effected by the Premier is Subjected to Criticism.

The Loan Effected by the Premier is Subjected to Criticism.

MONTRAIL, Sept. 29.—The Star, which is supposed to speak for Provincial Treasurer Hall, says:

"The new loan just made by Premier Tailion is being vigorously criticised on the street. As a piece of financing it is regarded as outrageously bad and calculated to have an injurious effect upon provincial securities. It is pointed out that a 8 per cent loan, payable in sixty years, issued at 77.32 is exactly equivalent to a 4 per cent loan at par. Rightly or wrongly the chief responsibility is attributed to the Lieutenant Governor, and it is freely stated that instead of the Lieutenant-Governor acting upon the advice of his Premier, the Premier is practically being controlled by his honor.

"Enquiries at the office of the Credit Froncier Franco-Canadien, of which Mr. Chapleau is the president of the burean d'administration, or chief exceutive officer in this country, elloit the fact that, while M. Brolemann, the president of the Credit Froncier, is one of the directors of the Credit Liceumais, M. EXCITEMENT IN CHINA

Dissatisfaction in High Circles Against the Reigning Dynasty.

THEIR WAR CHEST IS EMPTY Troops—The Japanese Eager for an Advance on Pekin-A Naval

Expert Sums Up the

government:

'The intense excitement in all the provinces of China and the dissatisfaction of the highest officials in the empire have reached points which indicate a probable movement against the reigning dynasty. reached points which indicate a probable movement against the reigning dynasty. The spirit animating the regular army is satisfactory, but the discipline has been much relaxed. The irregular troops upon which the government must now rely are committing great and frequent excesses everywhere. The war chest is as empty as the state exchequer, and the government has the greatest difficulty in purchasing the barest necessities for the troops in the fields."

LONDON, Sent. 29—The Times publishes

London, Sept. 29.—The Times publishes this morning an article by a naval expert, in which the writer compares and coalates the Times' advices from Chee-Foo and the Central News despatch from Tokio. writer concludes that it may be safely affirmed that modern weapons, have not materially modified the conditions of naval

"Japau's next move," he says, "is now question of the greatest importance, hina's fleet is virtually paralyzed and the Chuna's fleet is virtually paralyzed and the Japanese are free to transport a force in any direction. There are two principal courses for them to pursue—first to strike direct for Pekin and second to occupy Formosa. Either course is more probable than a march to Monkden. It seems certain that 25,000 Japanese could take Pekin, when Japan could obtain, so far as Clina is concerned, any terms she is likely to demand. On the other hand the time available is very short owing to the apavailable is very short owing to the approach of winter, and the venture thoughtout inpracticable would be very risky. A force of 20,000 would suffice to occupy not impracticable would be very risky. A force of 20,000 would suffice to occupy Formosa, and a descent upon that island is certainly among the immediate possibilities. Japan seeks territorial expansion and Formosa offers obvious advantages." A despatch to the Daily News from Yokohama says there is a general public desire in Japan to prosecute the war against China in defiance of all obstacles and a general desire that the government make a desperate attack upon Pekin, Japanese parliament will at once vote war credits regardless of party opinions.

Reinforcements are continually departing from Yokobama, Toklo and other places in Japan but their destination is not known.

Japanese have succeeded in entering the Chinese province of Manchuria and that they are advancing upon the capital.

VICTIMS OF THE FLAMES.

Two Lives Lost in a Big Blaze Nanamo, B.C. Sept. 29.—Fire broke out on the east side of Commercial streets and before it was got under control a number of buildings, hotels and stores were completely destroyed. Two lives were lost and three persons badly injured. The fire started in the Royal Hotel at the corner of Wharf and Commercial streets. Thene it burned in a northerly direction along Wharf street destroying the frame fire hall and a carpenter's workshop. Kicking Cows.

If the animal is handled kindly from calfhood and the proper kind of person milks her—one who has sense enough to control his temper—there will be very little probability of the animal developing the kicking habit, says the Americal techniques of the same of the control of the contr can Agriculturist. If the cow's udder is sore, or if one handles tender teats too roughly the cow is liable to kick. If she does it will be wise to handle her more kindly, and gently, lest she repeat the kicking so many times that it be-comes a liabit, for if it develops into a habit nothing may serve to cure her. Young heifers which have just dropped their calves may kick occasionally at the beginning, but if the milker kicks her back or strikes her roughly the chances are that the evil will be aggra-vated, and the cow ruined. Gentleness and kindness with dairy cows is the best plan to avoid having kicking cows. But there are frequent instances where the kicking propensity seems to be trans-mitted in the breeding from dam to offspring, and in such cases it will be a hard matter to effect a cure. As a rule, however, kicking cows are the result of ignorant and brutal treatment by those having them in charge, and intrusted



### HELMHOLTZ.

one of the Greatest Scientific Lights of the 19th Century. Professor Hermann Ludwig Ferdinand von Helmholtz, the celebrated physiologist and physician died on the 8th Septem ber, 1894, from the effects of a stroke of paralysis. He was born in Potsdam, August 31, 1821.

Professor von Helmholtz was one of the

grants of modern science. Like his illustrious collesgue, Professor Rudolph Virchow, he enjoyed a reputation which extended into all the countries of the civilized world and which drev tries of the civilized world and which drew students to the University of Berlin from the four corners of the globe. His long life—he was born just seventy-three years ago—has been one of strict devotion to science. He took little interest in other matters, seldom appered on the platform, except to speak on scientific subjects, and rarely wrote unless to proclaim a new theory defend an old one or reply to a beory, defend an old one, or reply to ersonal attack. Last year, ac personal attack. Last year, accompanied by his wife, a brilliant, entertaining wo-man, he visited the World's Fair as Ger-man representative, and was honorary president of the International Congress of Electricians.

The Professor was born at Potsdam,

His first great production was a treatise on "The Conservation of Force," which was published in 1847, and set forth, clearly and indisputably, for the first ibility of all the manifestations of force i nature, such as light, heat, electricity, chemical and animal vitality. While pursuing his investigations on this subject he demonstrated for the first time a difference in chemical composition between the active and quiescent muscles, and proved, by means of ingenious devices, that thought





HELMHOLTZ.

One of the Greatest Scientific Lights of the 19th Century.

Professor Hermann Ludwig Ferdinand von Helmholtz, the celebrated physiolo-gist and physician died on the 8th Septem-ber, 1894, from the effects of a stroke of paralysis. He was born in Potsdam, August 31, 1821.

Professor von Helmholtz was one of the

glants of modern science Like his illustrious colleague, Professor Rudolph Virchow, he enjoyed a reputation which extended into all the countries of the civilized world and which drew students to the University of Berlin from the four corners of the globe. His long life—he was born just seventy-three years ago—has been one of strict devotion to science. He took little interest in other matters, seldom appe.red on the platform, except to speak on scientific subjects, and rarely wrote unless to proclaim a new theory, defend an old one, or reply to a personal attack. Last vear, accompanied personal attack. Last year, accompanie by his wife, a brilliant, entertaining wo man, he visited the World's Fair as Ger man representative, and was honorary

The Professor was born at Potsdam, where his father was a professor in the "gymnasium," or public school. He studied medicine, and in 1848 was appointed professor of anatomy in the Academy of Fine Arts at Berlin. Later he filled professional chairs at Konigsberg and Heidelberg, and then, in 1871, he was

It would be difficult to describe within reasonable limits all the Professor's contributions to the advancement of scienprincipally to the physiological conditions of the impressions on the sanes. His first great production was a treatise on "The Conservation of Force," which was published in 1847, and set forth, clearly and indisputably, for the first time, the interchangeatomy and indestructibility of all the manifestations of force in nature, such as light, heat, electricity, chemical and animal vitality. While pursuing his investigations on this subject he demonstrated for the first time a difference in



One of the Greatest Scientific Lights of the 19th Century.

Professor Hermann Ludwig Ferdinand
von Helmholtz, the celebrated physiologist and physician died on the 8th September, 1894, from the effects of a stroke of paralysis. He was born in Potsdam

August 31, 1821.

Professor von Helmholtz was one of the glants of modern science. Like his illustrious coheague, Professor Rudolph Virchow, he enjoyed a reputation which extended into all the countries of the civilized world and which drew students to the University of Berlin from the four corners of the globe. His long life—he was born just seventy-three years ago—has been one of strict devotion to science. He took little interest in other matters, seldom appered on the platform, except to speak on scientific subjects, and arely wrote unless to proclaim a new theory, defend an old one, or reply to a personal attack. Last year, accompanied by his wife, a brilliant, entertaining wo man, he visited the World's Fair as Ger man representative, and was honorary president of the International Congress of

The Professor was born at Potsdam, where his father was a professor in the "gymnasium," or public school. He studied medicine, and in 1848 was ap-pointed professor of anatomy in the Aca-demy of Fine Arts at Berlin. Later he filled professional chairs at Konigsberg and

Guilty of Forgery.

HE IS RUN DOWN IN BROOKLYN e Pound Indictments Were Four Against Him for Forgery, and Now He Says He is Sorry.

New York, Oct. 1.—Louis Larivee, 24 years old, who is wanted in Montreal for forgery, was arrested in the Brooklyn postoffice. Up to January last Larivee was in a brokerage business with a man named Gauthier in Montreal. Shortly atterwards he disappeared. Then it was discovered that a number of checks he had discounted at the Bank Nationale, of Montresi, were forgeries. He was traced to Chicago and arrested. He was taken back to Montreal and placed under \$5,600 bail, pending the action of the grand jury. In June the grand jury indicted him, and when he heard this, he jumped his bail. The amount of Larivee's forgeries is not definitely known, but it is thought to be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

Louis Larivee is said to be well connected in Montreal. He was a custom house broker. While the charge on which he was arrested is only that of larceny of a few hundred dollars Queen's Detective Carpenter, who came to Brooklyn to take the prisoner back, says the irregularities will probably reach into the thousands. The complainant against Larivee is the National Bank of Montreal.






