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Some of the Reasons.

Until the appointment of Major Leonard as Chairman in November, 1911, no member of the Transcontinental Railway Commission had any experience in or knowledge of railway building or construction.

The standard of the road was decided without regard to its suitability for the country which it was to serve, and without any intelligent estimate of the business which it could legitimately be expected to develop.

The method of inviting tenders resulted in only five contractors tendering for 50 miles of the work.

Several contractors from among all the contractors and sub-let them to 100 sub-contractors, who, under reasonable conditions, would have bid first-hand for the contracts.

The eleven contractors were paid \$8,300,000 in profits for the work they sub-let to others.

The New Brunswick section is strongly condemned as being a political and not a commercial proposition. It parallels the Intercolonial, it carries nothing, and its premature construction is costing heavily in interest charges.

Already trees are growing on part of the right-of-way, rails are rusting, ties are rotting, and there is no traffic.

Contracts were not let to the lowest tenderers, and advance information was given the first the Government of the day wished to favor.

Contractors were over-paid at least \$5,300,000 by allowing for excavation in clay as though it had been in solid rock.

More than \$1,200,000 was paid to contractors for excessive "over-break."

Had the modern railway practice been followed and the principle of "momentum grades" adopted, \$6,200,000 would have been saved without impairing the road's efficiency.

Curves of a shorter radius would not have impaired the usefulness or increased the cost of construction, and \$2,400,000 would have been saved.

Had the best modern railway practice in the matter of bridges been followed, \$2,970,000 would have been saved.

If a proper arrangement had been made for filling 20,000 ties there would have been a saving of \$3,250,000.

Through laxity in calling for tenders, sixteen engine houses at \$30,000 more than necessary.

Sixteen elaborate stations were built where four were needed, equating \$204,000.

Editorial Notes.

The Berwick Board of Trade has sent the following telegram to A. de Witt Foster, M. P.: 'The Berwick Board of Trade asks that you use your influence to prevent a renewal of the lease of Windsor branch, now under consideration of the Government, until a guarantee is given that the evening service from Kentville to Middleton, and the morning service from Middleton to Kentville, are maintained throughout the year. Very quick action is necessary.'

Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening was an important one, as the estimates for the year were passed at this meeting. Mayor Chambers was in the chair and all the Councilors were present. The Streets Committee reported no work done during the past month other than clearing the streets and sidewalks of snow at a total cost of \$51.65.

The Finance Committee reported receipts during the month, \$977.37. The expenditures during the same time amounted to \$856.07.

A letter was read from the Wolfville Fire Co., complaining that the instruments of the Firemen's Band had been taken out of their hands and requested that same be called in. The Clerk was instructed to notify persons having these instruments to return same to the town office.

Mr. A. C. Johnson was re-appointed superintendent of streets, water sewers, &c., at a salary of \$500, each department to contribute to this amount in proportion to work done.

Coas. Haycock presented his resignation as a member of the School Board much to the regret of the Council. No action was taken, as it was hoped Prof. Haycock would be invited to remain a member of the Board.
