

Indian Miracle Makes Another Getaway From the Jail; Takes Brown With Him

Prisoners Cracked Turnkey Over The Head in the Corridor and Both of Them Scaled Jail Wall

Countryside is Being Searched For Fugitives, Who Made Off in Direction of Lake— Evidently Had Arranged the Little Plan During the Night.

Nelson Miracle, the lithe young Indian is again at large and with him enjoying liberty is Clarence Brown alias Pritchard, alias Kenville, etc. Miracle, as far as is known has never resorted to an alias. He didn't need to. To him mere prison bars and stone walls are as nothing.

Both Miracle and Brown scaled the jail wall like flies this morning and departed in the general direction of the lake shore. The whole countryside is out on the watch for the two fugitives and they will likely be captured before very long. They did not get a very long start.

Governor Bush shortly after 7 o'clock this morning heard a rumour and suspecting something had happened hastened out into the jail yard and was just in time to see Miracle and Brown disappearing over the jail wall.

Right then it may be mentioned the mystery of how Miracle got out of the jail yard on the 5th of last September was explained and it is a mystery no longer.

It was evidently a plan arranged by the two prisoners during the night and it was successfully carried out. Just after 7 o'clock this morning Turnkey Phipps went to the cells and let the prisoners out into the corridor for breakfast. When his back was turned one of them laid Phipps out with a blow on the head and the two got into the jail yard and over the wall as stated.

Both men are thinly clad and Brown wore only slippers. Neither is well equipped for rough travelling over the country and the cold weather may compel the two to seek shelter at some farm house.

The International Bridges at Niagara Falls has been notified and the officials there are on the watch for the two men who may try to cross the line.

Both are lithe young fellows as was proven by the skilful way they got over the jail wall.

Sheriff O'Loughlin has been busy all day at the jail holding an investigation. Turnkey Phipps was recently appointed.

The Jockey Clubs Cannot Carry On With the High Rate of Assessment Charged

If the Dominion Government should say that Jockey Clubs may only take five per cent of the pari-mutual receipts and at the same time the Ontario Government should insist on collecting \$10,000 a day from mile tracks and \$5,000 a day from half mile tracks, then it means that racing cannot carry on. Such was the main feature of the claim of the deputation of horsemen who waited on Hon. Peter Smith, the Provincial Treasurer; Hon. Manning Doherty, Minister of Agriculture, and Hon. W. E. Raney, Attorney-General at the Parliament Buildings. It was pointed out as an example that the Woodhines' best record for a seven-day meet showed a net profit of \$40,000 and if the tax was increased from \$1,250 a day to \$10,000 a day, the difference in taxation would be \$61,250, thereby making a net loss of \$21,250.

Take it from Public
It was also pointed out that should the Dominion Government not impose any regulation on pari-mutuals there is nothing to stop the jockey clubs, who desire so, to take a large percentage from the betting and thus reap rich harvests, even at the same time paying the tax. But the deputation pointed out that such

was not the desire of the respectable clubs. They did not want to take any larger share from the betting than would make them a fair profit on their investment, but to insist on \$10,000 a day would tend to make such clubs who are trying to be fair with the public, continue racing and take it out of the public. The deputation was quite large and made up of the following: Col. Hendrie of Hamilton, John Madigan of Fort Erie, A. M. Orpen, Samuel McBride, George Beardmore, J. Kilgour, R. J. Christie, Dr. King-Smith, E. T. Malone, W. P. Fraser, W. M. German of Welland, and Mr. Ballantyne, of the legal firm of Ludwig & Ballantyne.

Several Suggestions
The deputation offered several suggestions. They asked that the Government allow the race track men a percentage on their investment; while another suggestion was that the mile tracks be taxed \$2,500 a day. The Government was also asked to wait until the Federal House announced what tax it was going to impose on the operation of the pari-mutuals. The Ministers promised to give serious consideration to the proposals, and would further advise the track owners.

Body of a Russian Who Had Been Missing Since the 9th February Found at Thorold

The body of a Russian, Steve Morask, aged about 40 was found in the mill race at Thorold yesterday afternoon.

The map who was employed at the Ontario Paper Mills has been missing since Feb. 7th when he drew his last pay, a considerable amount.

As most of this money was found on his body, the idea of murder is suggested.

He had been drinking considerably it was known and he probably fell into the water accidentally and was

drowned.
An inquest will be held by the coroner.

On Monday C. J. Coppen, convicted by Mr. Justice Latchford and a jury of the murder of his wife in North Toronto last fall, will learn his fate. Coppen is under sentence to hang on May 5, and on Monday the First Divisional Court will give judgement on his stated case. Coppen will either hang or will be given a new trial.

Frederick Nelson a foreman in the Electrical department at McKinnons died last night at his home at 7 Fern street. He is survived by his wife and four children. The funeral will take place on Monday at 2.30 from his late home to Victoria Lawn Cemetery.

Women's Council Hit High Cost Of Dressing

The Welland Council of Women, which held a meeting here last Monday has gone on record as being opposed to extravagance in dress. At the meeting the question of the present high cost of clothing and materials was brought up and the Council passed the following resolution: "That, whereas the present scarcity of materials and profiteering has so raised the prices of wearing apparel that the supplying of necessities of dress in some families of limited income imparts great hardships, be it resolved that this Council go on record as being opposed to anything but the strictest economy in dress and that it urge all women to do what they can to relieve the present situation by refraining from buying them whenever possible."

The Court of Appeal at Osgoode Hall yesterday refused to upset the conviction of Harry Carrol of Sandwich, who was sentenced by a Sandwich Magistrate to three years in Kingston Penitentiary. Carrol was charged with appearing at two houses while in a drunken condition and offering resistance when the police arrived to take him away. In his possession he had a revolver, and during the struggle shot himself through the arm.

Parisians Now Keep Snakes as Pets; Toads, Too

PARIS, April 24—"Seeing snakes" will be a regular daily experience of husbands in Paris if the newest craze of fashionable women here gains popularity.

A stylishly attired woman, taking tea at the Claridge yesterday afternoon, suddenly opened her handbag and carelessly unloosed a slender green and gold snake, about two feet long, which wriggled to the floor and disappeared up the trouser-leg of a terrified waiter who fainted on the spot.

Rushing to the waiter, the woman calmly extracted the pet, replaced it in her handbag, and swept indignantly out of the restaurant. Afterward she complained to the manager that her favorite reptile was indisposed as the result of having bit on a pibian waiter.

The manager requested her to move explaining that while he had kennels and cat houses, and bird cages, and even an aquarium for his guest's pets, he had neglected to provide a suitable home for snakes.

Today, however, he discovered that no fewer than five women in the hotel own reptile "pets" and refuse to part with the "little darlings" which they maintain are "perfectly harmless." The snakes were obtained by their present owners from Mme. Phisalix, wife of the inventor of the anti-snake bite serum, who is now ill as a result of her refusal to counteract a snake bite because she wanted to make a scientific experiment.

Mme. Phisalix herself, however, does not think snakes are suitable pets. She prefers toads which she says are ever so much more affectionate, never forget a kind act and

Tieper Trial Nearing the End; Next Week Should See Close of Famous Trial

Accused's Brother Testified Yesterday For Him and Made Some Points For the Defence—Teiper's Sister Shows Deep Interest in Her Brother's Trial

BUFFALO, April 24—Medical experts called yesterday at the defence to swear it was probable that John Edward Teiper was knocked unconscious by the blow he received on the night his mother and brother were killed, were put through a severe grilling by District Attorney Guy B. Moore. As a result discrepancies were produced in their testimony.

Dr. Edward J. Meyer sat with Mr. Moore while the defence experts were on the stand. Dr. Meyer testified for the prosecution. He swore that it was possible, but highly improbable that Teiper was knocked unconscious. Dr. Meyer examined the defendant 35 hours after the tragedy.

A long hypothetical question governing Teiper's story of the blow he received was put to each expert by Roscoe R. Mitchell of defence counsel. The gist of the question was "Is it probable that Teiper was rendered unconscious by a blow which left no physical evidence other than a swelling the size of an egg on his right temple, the swelling being a quarter of an inch high and not black and blue?" The experts replied that it was probable.

In cross-examining the experts the district attorney emphasized the fact that not one of them has at any time been in medical attendance on the defendant. He demanded of each if

Meyer was not better qualified to testify on this phase of the case, as Dr. Meyer had seen the swelling and examined the defendant. Several admitted Dr. Meyer was while others evaded a direct answer.

Grace Teiper's Memory Lost
Dr. James W. Putnam and Dr. Julius H. Potter swore that Miss Grace J. Teiper's memory for the period extending from two hours before the tragedy until twelve days afterward was irretrievably lost. Dr. Putnam testified that Miss Teiper's present mental condition was such that she should be called in the morning as a witness for her brother if at all. He said Miss Teiper must rest afterwards.

Miss Teiper was beaten almost to death on Orchard Park road on the night of January 30, 1916, when her mother, Mrs. Agnes Teiper and her brother Fred Teiper was murdered.

Miss Teiper was in the courtroom all day yesterday. She seemed to take a keener interest in her brother's trial than at any previous session. She will probably take the stand on Monday morning, it was said.

Fight Between Brothers
C. Harry Teiper, the defendant's brother was recalled yesterday afternoon by the defence. He had been a witness for the prosecution. Harry went over the details of the defendant's transactions connected with

DECISION SOUGHT IN BOOZE CASE

BRIDGEBURG, April 24—The \$400 collected by the customs from C. B. Meines of Buffalo, from whose automobile was taken 260 gallons of whisky and a 10-gallon keg, will be held pending a decision to be handed down by the customs department at Ottawa, it was stated here today.

"Paying his \$500 fine does not entirely clear Meines here, as under the Canadian law he is charged with defrauding the government by not reporting exports."

"Whisky is perfectly permissible" as an export. The offense, however, lies in connection with his failing to report that he had the whisky in transit. Of course he would not be allowed to enter the States with it but that is not up to the Canadian customs, the say.

Another bond of \$400 taken from Buffalo men who were recently caught in the same predicament, with about the same quantity of whisky, is being held pending a decision by the federal officials at Ottawa.

It is believed that an organized gang is at work along the frontier buying up and smuggling the best Scotch and other imported goods from Canada to the states. Several sharp lessons have already been taught to them, but the practice goes on just the same.

As Result of Nervous Strain, Girl Wife Suffers Nervous Collapse — Her Story May Differ Materially From Husband's When She Goes to Trial Next Month.

CHESTER, April 24—After deliberating for eleven hours and fifty minutes a supreme court jury at 10.25 o'clock last night brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against James L. Odell, indicted with his wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, for the murder of Edward J. Kneip on the night of January 7. Immediately after the verdict was announced Odell was sentenced by Justice Robert Thompson to die in the week of June 13.

Weighted down by the nervous strain of the trial and her own heroic efforts to save the life of her husband through a sacrifice of her own honor, Mrs. Odell suffered a complete relapse at the Monroe County Jail this morning shortly before the hour set for the opening of the final session of court. A mere slip of a girl physically, her superb carriage through the trying ordeal of the last three days was purely on the strength of her supreme endeavor to do her utmost for the man she loves.

Although the outcome of the present case may have considerable bearing on the trial of Mrs. Odell due to be called for the latter part of May, it is believed that the defense in her case will take such

course as will give it a decisively independent aspect, or present condition is such that an important event is expected before the calling of her case next month, which is expected to have an important bearing on the jury's attitude toward her. In the testimony which she gave in the trial of her husband, she did not go into the details of the actual killing of Kneip, her lawyer asserting his legal right to prevent his client from incriminating herself.

Story May Differ
Her story therefore may differ materially from that told by her husband when she goes on the stand in her own defense. If she chooses to lay all the responsibility for the murder on his shoulders, the jury may be inclined to accept her version of the affair rather than her husband's particularly if by that time it shall appear that an attempt was made in the present trial to shift the blame to Mrs. Odell, as popular opinion seems to regard certain parts of Odell's testimony.

Mrs. Odell is only eighteen years old, yet according to her testimony and that of her husband she has experienced more of the rude shocks of life than most women of three times her age.

Time Situation in Bridgeburg Is in a Muddle, and Folks Hardly Know Where There at

BRIDGEBURG, April 24—Bridgeburg schools have reverted to Standard time, while the official time in this frontier town is daylight saving, and has been since the 1st of April.

The banks, Post Office Customs, offices, stores, etc., are all on the new time, while most of the local plants are on the new time, with the exception of the largest, the shipyards of the Allis-Chalmers company. Also, none of the railroads at the new terminals here recognized the new time, being on standard time.

The question of parents' time, of course, largely governs pupils. When the schools went on the new time there was much complaint, as the majority of workers still remained on old time. So now it has been necessary to put the school clocks back an hour.

The result is a considerably mixed-up situation here. The children are starting for school at 10 o'clock, new time, and quitting studies at 5 p. m. new time.

COURT APPROVES NEW UNION OF "MIDDLE CLASS"

NEW YORK, April 24—Supreme Court Justice Gavegan today approved articles of incorporation for the "Public's Union, Inc." purporting to be "a growing union of middle class people," formed "to benefit in any way those who are not either organized manual laborers or high-salaried executives."

Purposes of the new organization also listed in the petition were "to help relieve class oppression, to regulate and classify all forms of voluntary services, to serve in emergency crisis and to secure representation of all middle interests in all legislative action."

POTATOES AND GARDENING

What reason there has been for the extraordinary rise in the price of potato is not clear. The blame is laid on United States buying to help cover a shortage across the border. But potatoes are held in car-lots at many points, passing from one speculative hand to another, merely

on the strength of a bill of lading, and the price is shoved higher each time. Potatoes are \$6 a bag, and there is no protest from any authority in the name of the consuming public. If the public complacency will endure a price ix times as high as the pre-war price for a necessary that is the base of nearly all meals, then the extortion will not abate. But the

high price will surely turn extra attention to back-yard gardening this year. Toronto back-yards and vacant lots produced \$100,000 worth of vegetables in the war period. If potatoes were generally grown this season, in the vacant soil in and about the city, two months' supply might be produced locally. But the gardening fever does not seem to be epidemic, and perhaps the Colorado beetle will find his fodder rather short. During the food shortage back yard gardening was a matter of patriotism but today the food shortage is much greater than it was then. We shall see if back-yard gardening can be made a question of pocket. If potatoes at \$6 a bag are not sufficient motive, then the outlook is hopeless, and the country will have to go on until mounting food prices force partial depopulation of the congested cities and towns, and repopulation of the farms.

POTATO BOYCOTT GAINING GROUND

MANY RECRUITS SWELL RANKS OF THOSE WHO ARE "FASTING"

TORONTO, April 23—The potato situation becomes more interesting each day as more organizations endorse the protest against high prices and agree to restrict their diet for a month, by which time it is hoped, that the familiar tuber will have been reduced to prices more suited to its humble origin and history. Through the enterprise of the Regent, Mrs. W. R. Jackson, the Municipal Chapter of the L.O.D.E., comprising 38 primary chapters with a membership of about 3,000 women, have agreed to the potato fast of one month. The annual meetings of the Women's Liberal Association and the Women's Patriotic League also took favorable action yesterday.

STANDS OR FALLS BY EXCESS PROFITS TAX

LONDON, April 23—Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today that he intended to stand or fall by his original proposal to increase the excess profits tax to 60 per cent from the present 40 per cent rate. The Chancellor, said, however, that if proposals subsequently were introduced for the taxation of war acquired wealth the extra 20 per cent would be remitted.

TONS OF STOLEN SILK RECOVERED

NEW YORK, April 23—Five men are under arrest today. Five tons of stolen silk valued at \$218,000 have been recovered and the police believe a band of thieves who have stolen millions of dollars worth of merchandise from freight cars in the last two years has been unearthed. Further arrests are expected.

The men under arrest were captured in a roadhouse at Mespeth, L.I., after a fight with detectives. The recovered silk was found in a garage near the road house. The police assert it was stolen March 8 from a freight car in the New York Central yards.

Arrest of a New York business man the police declare, is probable. It is asserted that the man has handled stolen goods valued at more than \$1,000,000.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

KUT HERO TO PAY VISIT TO TORONTO

General Townshend Will Likely Spend One Day in City.
NEW YORK, April 23—It was announced here last night that Gen. Sir Charles Townshend, the hero of Kut, will visit Toronto on May 3, and will probably accept an invitation to deliver an address in that city. De-

tails of the arrangements for his brief visit to Canada have not yet been worked out. He will likely spend only one day in Toronto.

Among those present were Arthur Knowlson, President of the Canadian Club; Fred W. Chibley, President of the Canadian Society; F. Y. Beben of the bank of Montreal; Mr. Francis of the Bank of Commerce; Dr. Lambert, President of St. George's Society; and Lieut.-Col. J. A. Cooper, Chief of the Canadian Bureau of Information here.

FADED TIN-TYPE AND OLD LETTERS GET ESTATE OF \$100,000 FOR POOR ORPHAN
BLOOMINGTON, Ill., April 23—

Two letters stained by time the letters dimmed almost beyond deciphering point, a faded tin-type of a tousel-headed boy, evidently ill at ease and nervous at his first ordeal before a camera were worth more than \$100,000 to Fred C. Harrison, of Vermillion county.

The exhibit influenced a jury in the Circuit court at Bloomfield, Mo., to decide a case in favor of the Illinoisan, which gives him the title to a farm of 680 acres of land near the city. The case has dragged through many courts and finally was carried to the supreme bench, which has just handed down a decision affirming the finding of the jury at Bloomfield.

Harrison became an orphan at the age of four. He was given a home by J. N. Punch, a farmer, and reared as a son, although never formally adopted. When Punch died four years ago

the widow and a half brother claimed all the property. Harrison, who had endearing letters from his adopted father, in one of which was the old tin-type, went into the courts. The letters proved that Punch intended the orphan should share in his estate and that he considered him in the light of his own son. The court then divided the estate of 1,320 acres equally between the widow and foster son.

WOMEN RIOT TO GET GLIMPSE OF ODELLS ON WAY TO COURT

Confessed Slayer of Wife's Betrayer May Know Fate To-day—Seek Manslaughter Verdict—Tells of Events Preceding Killing.

ROCHESTER, April 23—James Odell, on trial for the murder of Edward J. Kneip last January at a lonely spot near the Scottsville road to Buffalo, will know his fate probably before another day closes. The prosecution and the defense finished their summing up late yesterday afternoon. This morning Justice Robert F. Thompson will deliver his charge to the jurors and hand them the case for a final decision. Elmer M. Shager and Hampton H. Halsey, lawyers for the defense, have not waged their fight for the acquittal of the prisoner, but with the idea

that he might be given a verdict of manslaughter, rather than first degree murder. District Attorney Wm. F. Love, however, has insisted that nothing but a verdict of murder in the first degree would be consistent with the evidence as presented.

Interest in the trial of Odell who with his pretty young wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, confessed to the killing of Kneip, reached the apex yesterday, when hundreds of persons the greater number of them women and girls, sought to crush their way into the court house in an effort to catch a glimpse of the prisoners even though they might not gain entrance to the court room. Despite the fact that Justice Thompson cleared the court room of women during the presentation of a portion of the testimony, women spectators were in the majority again today when the prisoners were led into the room.

Father Tells Story.
A dramatic scene was enacted when James B. Arnold, stepfather of Odell took the witness stand on behalf of the prisoner, and told of the incident at his home when Odell and his wife brought Kneip there and questioned him regarding Kneip's assault on Pearl Beaver, previous to her marriage to Odell. "I asked Kneip if he had used force on Pearl," said the aged man, who has grown gray and stooped since the beginning of the trouble that has come into his family. "He said he had 'considerable' I got up from the table in the dining room and went into the kitchen. Jim came out to me a minute later. 'Dad,' he said 'What shall I do.'"

The old man stopped for a moment and brushed his hands across his eyes. It was apparent that his emotions were profound. Again the slow voice went on, while Odell's

ment and brushed his hands across his eyes. It was apparent that his emotions were profound. Again the slow voice went on, while Odell's

girl wife sobbed convulsively.

"I told him do nothing, that you will be ashamed of or sorry for," I told him again. "Jim do nothing that you will be ashamed of." He said, "Dad I will not harm a hair on his head." He went back out into the other room and told Pearl to get her hat and coat on he was going to take Kneip to the police station. They put on their coats and hats and went out. That was the last time I saw them."

In cross-examination, Mr. Love asked the witness to tell what he knew about the large file with which Pearl opened the attack on Kneip on the night of the killing. This, the old man said, had been an instrument used in the house for the purpose of sharpening knives and poking the stove. He had not known that his step-son had slipped the instrument into his pocket when he went out with Pearl and Kneip on the start of that journey across the city and up the Scottsville road, that resulted in the killing.

Sweetheart Testifies.
Viola Williams, the dark-eyed, dark-haired sweetheart of Edward Kneip, was called by the prosecution to testify as to her relations with Kneip and when she had seen the young man prior to the killing. The black-haired mother of the slain youth, Mrs. Mary C. Kneip, and his sister, Miss Josephine Kneip, both testified briefly. Neither was cross-examined. Just before the noon recess a twelve-year-old girl with dark curly hair hanging at her shoulders, Hazel Nember, a niece of Pearl Odell, was called to testify regarding a state of nervousness that she had observed in Pearl before his marriage to Odell. The child added a peculiarly human touch to the courtroom, and in his brief cross-examination of her District Attorney Love was particularly solicitous.



The fate in the Commons of certain measures initiated in the Senate is in doubt. Senator Lynch-Staunton is the father of a measure to compel dealers in German and Austrian goods to advertise the fact. The bill stands for third reading. That it will pass is fully anticipated, therefore it must come to the Commons for consideration.

A daring robbery was discovered in Niagara Falls, N.Y., at Amberg's, a big department store, goods amounting to \$800 being stolen this morning. The robbery was discovered on opening today. It is claimed that an automobile was used and the thieves were evidently familiar with the lay-out of the store, for only the best grades of goods were stolen. The loot was made up chiefly of Men's suits, shirts, ties, etc. Of shirts nothing but silk shirts were taken.

Senator Ross of Middleton, has succeeded in piloting through the Upper Chamber his two bills of divorce, whose purpose it is to provide in Ontario and Prince Edward Island for the dissolution and annulment of marriage through the courts, as in other Provinces but Quebec. There is reason to believe that the Government is favorable to the measures put forward by Senator Ross, who is very close to the Government leader in the Upper Chamber, and that the bills will have the Government sanction and support.

Representatives of the Retail Merchants' Association and the Fruit Growers' Association of Toronto attended yesterday's session of the Legislature when J. W. Curry's bill depriving Municipalities of the right to pass early closing by-laws, except when properly petitioned for by the electorate was considered. By 24 to 5 the committee decided that all by-laws passed under a sub-section of the Factory, Shop and Office Building Act shall cease to be effective on and after April 30, 1920, in so far as they apply to the sale of fruit.

Hon. Nelson Parliament's refusal to recognize whether H. H. Dewar or Hon. G. H. Ferguson is Opposition leader in the Legislature is likely to result in a saving to the Province of \$3,000 a year. While it is understood that Premier Drury and other members of the Government are not entirely satisfied with the decision of the Speaker the fact remains that the \$5,000 salary cannot be paid to anyone as the statute now stands. A compromise is likely to be reached, however, by which the leaders' salary will be allowed to lapse and the Government will undertake to pay the salaries of two secretaries, one for each of the two leaders.
