Dominion Parliament.

The past week saw more important matters discussed in the house present session in regard to work of an effective kind was kept up from Monday until the last of the sittings. For the first time, perhaps, since the discovery of silver in the newer sections of Ontario, the Dominion house was brought into verbal conflict regarding a dispute concerning mining matters and legislation. The now celebrated legal battle between the Florence Mining company and the capitalists and investors who acquired the Cobalt Lake silver proposition was revived, or rather introduced, by Mr Clarke, of South Essex, who reviewed the case from the standpoint of the Florence claimants, notwithstanding that the Ontario government had disallowed the contention that that company bad a prior right to the property, This decision was supported by the minister of justice inaemuch as he advised the government not to disallow the judgment of the Ontario courts in favor of the Cobalt Lake company. Much partisan bitterness characterized a useless discussion, Hon Mr Aylesworth rather inconsistently assailing the Ontario government for not deciding otherwise than it did in the matter.

The ever present question or tele-Dinos rates and service in Canada was once more brought forward by the resolution, on Monday, of Mr Haughton Lennox, in which the government was urged to initiate measures to remove alleged long existing abuses in respect to the charges and system in vogue in this country. The honorable member was impressed with the fact that Canadians were paying altogether too much for the privilege of talking over the wires, From seports he estimated this excess to be in the vicinity of 100 p. c. as compared to other countries.
