

The whole arm and head were then firmly bandaged, and a strong plaster cast was applied.

"The skin flap had to be left at tached to the arm," one of the surgeons explained vesterday. "so that could have some blood simply until new vessels have formed at the point where the flap is sewn to the nose In ten days' time that is three weeks after the operation, we shall cut away the square of skin from its remaining atachment on the arm and sew it over the remainder of the gap. We can then remove the patient's

As a rule these operations fail because the patient is unable to withstand the pain of his cramped position and tears the arm away before

the flap has properly taken root. "I had awful cramps continually the first four or five days," the patient stated, "but they are not so rad now. I have stood it for ten days already, so I think I can hold out to the



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
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
