When horses are, trying to start a team, I was told years ago by my physics teacher, they are exerting all the time a pressure equal to the resistance they have to overcome. It is the sudden quick jerk, plus the pressure, that starts the load.

I thought of that the other morning as I lay in bed dreading to get up. All the time I lay there, I was exerting a mental pressure all but sufficient to overcome the resistance of my laziness. All I lacked was the quick jerk.

Now it seems to me that's always the way when we put off some duty. We really mentally do it all the time we are putting it off, and thus waste a lot of energy before we give the quick jerk and finally accomplish the task.

Isn't that one of the reasons why people who work systematically, accomplish so much with so little effort—that is, because each duty has its routine place and therefore none of them are done mentally before they are done actually, with the consequent waste of mental energy? How about it?

A young girl wrote me the other day to ask how to treat pimples and black heads.

For her sake, and for the sake of all the women who write me that sort of question, I take this opportunity to make it plain that I am not running a beauty column, that I do not claim any special knowledge on the subject, and that I can't as a rule, answer that kind of question.

At the same time it just happens that I recently heard a very good doc-

tor telling a young woman how to treat a lot of blind pimples that had broken out on her face, and I am glad to pass along the advice as it seemed to help her.

"Pimples are very often caused by dirt," he said. "You think you keep your face perfectly clean, but you don't. That's not an insight. Very few people do. If you live or work in a dirty army city an ordinary soap-and-water washing will keep your face clean. So when pimples break out, take a nail brush and soap and scrub your face long and hard. Then bathe it in alcohol and then anoint it with boracic acid ointment.

If the pimples come to a head prick with a needle sterilized in some antiseptic, touch with a drop of hydrogen peroxide, and then rub on the ointment."

Ottawa, October 14.—Though evidence is not lacking that the proposals for reciprocity negotiations with the United States are arousing a more or less concerted opposition, it is freely stated in Government circles that such negotiations will be proceeded with very shortly.

Probably but for Mr. Fielding's disposition the Government's proposition would have gone forward ere this.

His intimation to Secretary Knox of his readiness to proceed is expected to be sent almost any time now.

This would look as though Canada were taking the initiative, but there is a denial that such is the case. It is stated that it was Mr. Knox who in June last wrote suggesting further conferences, which could not be gone on with at the time.

So far as can be ascertained the Government is disposed to look upon the impending negotiations as implementing an undertaking of some months ago.

The view is further expressed that with the possible exception of agricultural machinery, the commodities to be considered will be natural products exclusively rather than manufactures.

### Seized Helpless Boy.

Held Him as a Shield, While Man Pumped Bullets at Him.

New York, Oct. 12.—A police dragnet has been thrown out to-day to capture the man known by the name of "Picties," who last night seized a helpless 12-year-old boy, son of Chas. Fisher, and held the lad's body as a shield, while another man pumped bullets at him. The screaming boy fell with a bullet in his brain, while Harry Greenwald, known as "Big Clark," a prize fighter, who fired the shot, blew his brains out when pursued by a crowd.

### Making a Cheek.

Man's Arm Sewn to His Face.

With the skin of his right arm sewn to his face and the whole arm and head firmly enclosed in a heavy plaster cast, a patient at Guy's Hospital is now undergoing one of the most remarkable cures ever attempted at that institution.

As a result of a slowly developing growth on the right cheek most of the upper jaw and overlying tissues had to be removed six years ago. After the operation a hollow, large enough to hold an hen's egg and devoid of skin remained. The present operation is an attempt to cause a portion of the growing skin-tissues of the arm to take root over the denuded area so as to provide a new cheek.

At the operation, which was performed ten days ago, an area of skin two inches square was lifted from over the right biceps, so that three edges were free, the fourth side being left attached to the arm. The patient's arm was then raised and bent over the head, so that the bend of his elbow touched his forehead. The free end of the flap was then drawn over the sunken part of the cheek and stitched to the side of the nose and mouth. The whole arm and head were then firmly bandaged, and a strong plaster cast was applied.

### DETERMINED PATIENT.

"The skin flap had to be left attached to the arm," one of the surgeons explained yesterday, "so that it could have some blood supply until new vessels have formed at the point where the flap is sewn to the nose. In ten days' time that is three weeks after the operation, we shall cut away the square of skin from its remaining attachment on the arm and sew it over the remainder of the gap. We can then remove the patient's plaster cast and free him from his uncomfortable position."

As a rule these operations fail because the patient is unable to withstand the pain of his cramped position and tears the arm away before the flap has properly taken root.

"I had awful cramps" continually the first four or five days," the patient stated, "but they are not so bad now. I have stood it for ten days already, so I think I can hold out to the finish."—Daily Mail.

### From Sierra Leone to Canada Without Address.

At the conclusion of the solemn and sad ceremonial the choir touchingly rendered the hymn, "Peace Perfect Peace," and the Lord Bishop pronounced the Benediction.

### Bonuses for Peary's Crew.

By yesterday's mail the Newfoundlanders residing in St. John's who were in the Roosevelt under Commander Peary on the memorable trip which culminated in the discovery of the North Pole, received a letter from President Hubbard, of the Peary Arctic Club, New York. The missives say that it afforded the Club great pleasure to adopt Commander Peary's suggestion that each man receive a bonus of \$125 in recognition of his valued services at the expedition, and enclosed a cheque for the amount. Each man was praised for the valuable aid rendered the Commander. Messrs. John Wiseman and John Barnes, firemen, who assisted in the work of taking tidal observations, were given extra pay for this work which occupied 8 months, and they received an additional cheque for \$75. The men who received these reminders of the Club's appreciation and the welcome remittances are: — Thomas Gushue, mate; John Murphy, boat-swain; Bank Scott, 2nd engineer; scamen John Barnes, Denis Murphy, John Coady, John Wiseman, Richard Butler, Patrick Skeans, Patrick Joyce, and William Pritchell, the latter second cook of the ship.

### Took Prisoners Back.

Const. J. J. McDonald who came by the express yesterday left for Sydney by last evening's Bruce express with P. Brian and W. Callahan in custody, to be tried at Sydney before Magistrate Forbes for stealing \$100 from a schooner belonging to C. T. Straight, and laying at Sydney Harbor. Both men were handcuffed together, and a crowd was at the station to see them leave. McDonald is an officer of the Provincial Detective Force, of Nova Scotia, and is well known to Newfoundlanders. He had charge of the men in the stacks of the D. I. S. Co. at Sydney, for several years. He recently returned from British Columbia where he captured two men for robbing one of the C. P. R. expresses. Only a slight clue was left when the men—Brian and Callahan stole the trunk from the schooner. In the bottom of the dory which they used to take the trunk away was found a cleanser for a revolver which the captain identified as his. The watchman then remembered the chaps who took the dory, and from his description of them McDonald succeeded in tracing them.

### A Dare-Devil Adventurer.

The career of John B. Moisant is no less amazing than the feats with which he has been startling the aviation world. He settled down when he was eighteen in San Salvador, the Central American Republic, being the first to introduce Edison's phonograph there. Then he ran a large salt works on the coast, inventing machinery to deposit on his land salt water, which on evaporating left the salt behind, as well as a tidal motor, which raised a million gallons of water a day by the action of the waves. He worked this for several years. Then he organized a raid on San Salvador because he heard that two of his brothers had been thrust into prison. His brothers were released, but his salt property, which he valued at \$40,000, was confiscated. So Moisant organized another raid, which was unsuccessful owing to the U. S. A. Government. After that he went to Paris, and there succumbed to the fascinations of aeroplaning.

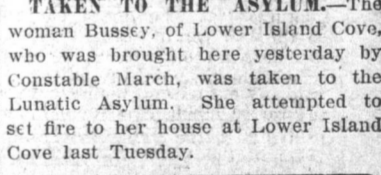

### CRIPPEN TRIAL.

#### Defence Dispute the Identity of Remains

DR. CRIPPEN WILL TESTIFY.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 20. A morning paper to-day finds dramatic revelation in the line of defense from the evidence submitted yesterday at the Crippen trial. Towards the close of a long cross-examination of Prof. Pepper, Chief Counsel Tobin, representing the defendant, obtained Pepper's admission that the presence of a sebaceous gland in the alleged scar found in a portion of the dismembered body would prove that it was not a scar. Counsel Tobin thereupon announced that he hoped to prove by expert evidence the actual presence of such a gland. The importance of the point lies in the fact that identification of the remains hinged on proving the existence of the scar from an operation. Drs. Marshall and Spitzberg, medical experts, who examined the human parts unearthed the evidence which they had given in the Lower Court. This was in confirmation of the testimony given yesterday by Professor Pepper the pathologist, who swore that the flesh was human, but that he could not determine by anatomy the sex of the victim. The cross-examination of experts in which Lord Chief Justice Alverstone who is presiding took part, centered on the alleged scar on the body, which the defense declared was only a wound in the skin. Alfred Aspinall Tobin, Chief Counsel for Crippen, plied Spitzberg and Marshall with searching inquiries, but the medical men were not shaken from their assertion that the mark had been left by the wound of an operation and no sebaceous gland was discovered in the scar area. Spitzberg agreed that if the presence of sebaceous gland was established it would be conclusive evidence that the mark was not a scar. Crippen's "paler than at any time before," followed the evidence with strained intemperance. Dr. William H. Wilcox, the scientific analyst of the Home Office, testified to having discovered in the body a poison which he was satisfied had been taken through the mouth and was the cause of death. This poison was not used by homopathists, which was suggested by the defense. The medical evidence closed the case for the prosecution, and as the site in the courtroom as Mr. Tobin rose to address the court showed the keen interest with which the announcement of the line of defense was awaited. This interest was whetted by the first sentence of counsel who confirmed this earlier statements, of the Press that Crippen would enter the witness box immediately when his Attorney had concluded his address. Medical witnesses would follow, Mr. Tobin said one of these, who had the highest reputation as a microscopic expert, would give conclusive reasons why the mark on the skin was not a scar. Similarly an authority on the subject would say the body might be easily animal, alkaloid, developed after death. The defense, as now known, definitely will attempt to prove that the body found in the Crippen home was not that of his wife. Mrs. Crippen had undergone a surgical operation, the prosecution claims to have found only a portion of a body scar corresponding to the wound left on Mrs. Crippen's body by the surgeon's knife. In this way they have sought to establish the identification. The defense maintain that it was not a scar, that was found, but rather a fold in the skin, and under cross-examination secured from the prosecution's medical expert witness the admission that if the presence of a sebaceous gland on the scar area could be established, it would be conclusive evidence that the mark was not a scar. It was decided to-day to place Dr. Hawley H. Crippen on the witness stand and let him tell his own story of the disappearance of his wife Belle Elmore, the actress, whose murder he is charged with. There has been speculation as to whether Crippen would testify for himself, and the decision of his counsel was not made known until just before the resumption of the trial this morning, when Arthur Newton, announced to the press that this course had been determined wise from the standpoint of the defendant's interest.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LISBON, Oct. 20. There are rumors of a cabinet crisis. The Minister of War, Finance and Public Works, it is believed, will resign.

Special Evening Telegram. RIO JANEIRO, Oct. 20. The statement is published in the newspapers here that the steamer Araguaya, from Southampton, Sept. 26th, and Lisbon, Oct. 3rd, is on quarantine at this port; several deaths from cholera having occurred amongst the immigrants aboard.

Special to Evening Telegram. EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Oct. 20. A fire started in the Chicago Alton Freight House on the river front and spread rapidly to neighbouring structures of like character, causing a loss of more than \$500,000, early this morning.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 20. As anticipated the Bank of England to-day raised its rate of discount from 4 to 5 per cent, in order to protect its reserve, which had been steadily depleted, despite the imposition of the 4 per cent three weeks ago. The reserve this week is expected to show nearly \$10,000,000 decrease. The Egyptian demand already has exceeded the estimates owing to the hasty marketing of the large cotton crop.

India is expected to take gold soon, and the South American demand possibly will appear early, and as very little gold from the mines is going to the Bank of England, a strong protective measure, was necessary. A fresh outbreak of speculation in America and the large number of American Finance Bills placed here also are factors to be reckoned with in the monetary situation of the future.

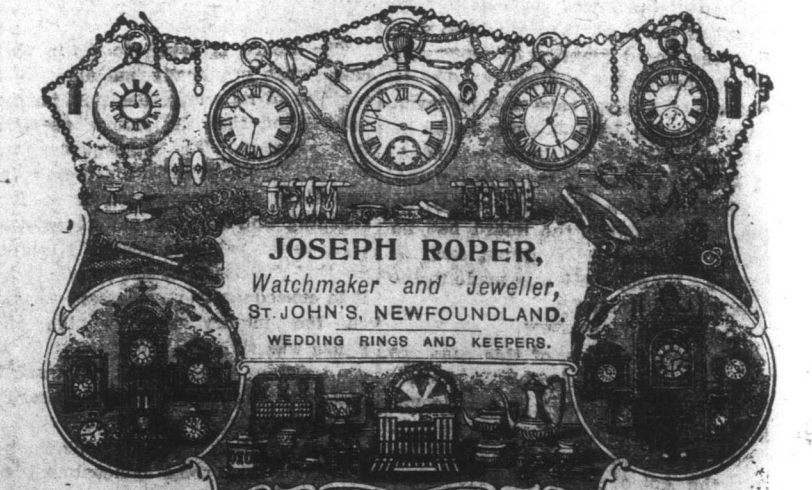
