Curious. According to the cable despatch today Lord Lansdowne proposes to exclude from the purview of the Veto Bill, among other matters, legislation affecting the Prerogatives of the Crown. Should this proposal meet with the support of the majority of the peers, as is by no means unlikely, it will afford a curious commentary on actions of the Lords themselves. For the Lords themselves have shown the greatest hostility to the prerogatives of the Crown in the creation of peers. In the 18th Century, the Lords endeavoured to take away from the Crown the unrestricted prerogative of creating peers. In the 19th century, the Lords refused to allow Sir J. Parks who had been created a life peer to take his seat, alleging that the prerogative of creating life peers had been lost by disuse and the Crown gave way. Lord Lansdowne himself is the author of a bill which is now before Parliament which practically proposes to take away the whole of this prerogative. Yet in face of all this, the Lansdowne following profess a desire to safeguard the prerogatives of the Crown from the imaginary attacks of the People's House.

Fire at Musgrave. Eight Families Burned Out. Mr. Jesse Whiteaway received a message from his agent at Musgrave Harbor yesterday saying that a big fire had occurred there which burnt down ten houses and rendered eight families homeless. The principal business stores of the place are in ruins including the shops of Ambrose Whiteaway, Moses and Charles Whiteaway. The text of the message is as follows:—"Big fire raging, houses and stores swept; Barbours' store safe yet."

A second telegram in reply to an enquiry by Mr. Jesse Whiteaway for more particulars, said:—"Fire quenched; eight families homeless; J. Whiteaway lost all shop and store, also the shops of Charles Whiteaway, Moses Whiteaway, Jr., and Moses Whiteaway, Sr." The business people carried heavy stocks at this season of the year so that the loss is a serious one on them.

The Musgrave Fire. The estimated loss in the Musgrave Harbor fire is about \$50,000. The private dwellings destroyed are J. R. Whiteaway's, Moses Whiteaway's, Jr., Adam Whiteaway's, Charles Whiteaway's, John Whiteaway's and Moses Butt's. The shops and stores, flakes and wharves destroyed belonged to J. R. Whiteaway and Wm. Whiteaway. All the water side buildings were swept. There is no insurance carried except by John Whiteaway, and that is only partial. They saved nothing. It is believed that there were only about ten or a dozen men home, as the rest are at the Wadhams at the fishery.

Rifle Club Contests. Yesterday was an ideal one for rifle firing and the members of the St. John's Rifle Club contested for the Murphy prize and the W. J. Higgins junior prize. Some very good scoring was done and the Murphy prize was won by Mr. E. McNah on a score of 89 while the Higgins prize fell to Mr. Geo. Langmead with a score of 72. Thursday of last week the H. D. Reid challenge medal and J. P. McLoughlan handicap prize were contested for but the weather was stormy and foggy rendering good scoring difficult. Mr. W. H. Rennie won the Reid prize with a score of 87 and the McLoughlan premium by Mr. S.W. Norman with a total of 80.

From Labrador. The S. S. Beothic, Capt. Parsons, returned from Labrador at noon yesterday. The ship went as far north as Macovic. Fishing schooners from Newfoundland had arrived down to White Bears, Horse Harbor, Indian Harbor, Smokey, Holton, Bolster's Rock, Grady, etc., and all stations south of Round Hill Island and taken up their trap berths. There is no ice on the coast worth speaking of; the few scattered lots that were between Francis Harbor and Cape Charles are nearly all melted, and driven to sea. The Beothic brought up several people who had been on Labrador all winter, including Mr. Carson and child, Mr. Tiffany (of Revillon Freres), Rev. Mr. Purchase, Mr. Kabonock, also Mr. Soper and Mr. J. Murphy who came from Battle Harbor. There is just a sign of fish from Battle Harbor to Spear Harbor on Jigger.

Should Take Care. Yesterday afternoon and evening many boys could be seen bathing and swimming at such places as Sliding Rock, Kenny's and Long Ponds. Now that the swimming season is on boys should devise great care so that the unfortunate accidents of last summer may not be repeated. Think Banker Lost. The dorics "broke the water" and grub cans of the men, and in one was an old cap and coat evidently quickly discarded by the seaman. The dorics are now on Bowring's wharf and being taken charge of by the French Consul. The Huron has now 700 qtls. to her credit for 9 dorics.

Here and There. HURT ON THE DOCK.—Solomon Gosse, a workman helping to unload the steel rails from the s.s. Querita at the Reid pier to-day, was struck in the head by a rail that was being hoisted out and cut about the face rather severely. WHALER STRUCK.—The s.s. Puma, operating at Batena, struck the rocks at Red Island, P.R., Tuesday. Thinking she was badly damaged the captain came to St. John's. The surveyors who called to examine her found that she was O.K., and the whaler returned to her station to-day.

MAN SERIOUSLY HURT.—As Levi Kent was celebrating the festival of the Coronation at Placentia on Friday last, in setting off fireworks a giant cracker exploded quite near him and he was badly cut about the legs, so much so indeed that he lost a great quantity of blood and had to be attended by two doctors, who put several stitches in the wounds to close them.

For the Asylum. Mr. Kavanock came from Francis Harbor, Labrador, by the s.s. Beothic. His wife said that he was insane and wants to have him kept in the Lunatic Asylum. She told the officers and the captain that he beat her with a skin cuff last week and that she was afraid he would kill her. Some of the crew got a different story to tell. They say that Kavanock, who is a native of Francis Harbor, is not insane and that his wife simply wants to get rid of him. She is the wife of Francis Harbor and has a large circle of admirers amongst the knights of the harpoon on the coast.

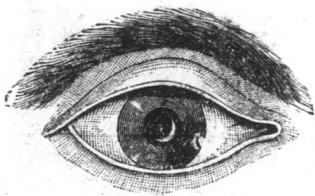
Yesterday's Walking Match

Won by W. Duff in 3 Hours, 23 Min. and 16 Secs.

Yesterday afternoon the sixth annual walking match of 20 miles around Windsor Lake took place, and was won in capital style by Mr. Wm. Duff.

The weather was fine with a nice cool breeze, but there were unfortunately few spectators, certainly not like on former occasions, and only five young men competed, namely, R. Hickey, J. Duff, W. Duff, W. Rendell and A. King. It looks as if interest in this form of sport is on the decline.

The start was made from St. Andrew's Club Rooms, and Hickey and J. Duff got away ahead of their opponents with Rendell 3rd, W. Duff 4th and King last. On reaching Rendell's Mill Road Hickey fell to third place, Rendell forging ahead of him. In this order the crest of Robinson's Hill was passed with J. Duff still leading; time 8 mins. 20 secs. Hutchings' Gate was made in 19 mins. 20 secs., and near here W. Duff who was walking at a splendid swinging pace passed Rendell taking up second place with King and Hickey in the order named about 30 yards behind. With J. Duff only about 12 yards in the lead, Rendell's Bridge was reached. Time, 31 mins. 45 secs., and distance from starting point 3 miles 25 chains. W. Duff's pace was telling and though his brother John was walking well, at about a half mile beyond Rendell's Bridge both were side by side, and soon William putting on steam shot ahead with Rendell third and Hickey and King about 200 yards behind. The foot of Windsor Lake was reached in 45 mins. 31 secs., the distance being 4 miles. 70 chains. Up the margin of Windsor Lake Lake W. Duff had a substantial lead, and after putting on a good spurt Rendell headed John Duff, and a good level piece of road being reached the men now increased their pace. W. Duff kept increasing his lead, and at Hughes' Pond he had greatly outdistanced Rendell. He was 200 yards ahead at the head of the Lake in taking the Broad Cove Road, with Rendell and J. Duff putting up a close fight for second position. The time to Broad Cove Road was 1 hr. 10 mins., 17 secs.; distance 7 miles 40 chains. It looked now like W. Duff's match if nothing untoward occurred, and interest centered in the contest for second place. Broad Cove Junction was reached by W. Duff in 1 hr. 44 mins., 02 secs.; distance 11 miles, 35 chains. The Turnpike Road was reached in 2 hrs., 3 min., 42 secs.; distance 13 miles, 25 chains. Rendell now increased his lead over J. Duff and at Power's Pond the time was 2 hrs., 14 mins., 21 secs.; distance 14 miles, 72 chains. Here Rendell having felt a strain in one of his knees which he hurt some time previously, had to retire from the contest after putting up a plucky fight. Hickey sometime previously had dropped out also, and the race was left to W. and J. Duff and A. King. At Esler's Cottage the time was 2 hrs. 59 mins., 31 secs.; distance 18 miles, 72 chains. W.

The Annual Conference opened yesterday morning in Gower Street Methodist Church, under the Presidency of Rev. T. B. Darby, B.A. After the usual devotional exercises, the retiring President addressed the Conference, reviewing the work of the past year. In the course of his remarks he spoke of the difficulties the church had to face; but in spite of these the church is in a good healthy condition. The slight decrease in membership gives no cause for alarm, the falling away having been amongst the revival of 1909.

The election of President for the ensuing year then proceeded with. The Rev. A. A. Holmes, of Freshwater, was selected by a large majority. In congratulating the new President, Mr. Darby was glad to welcome his old University friend and chum to the office, and trusted that the same good will of the brethren which had elected him would be his during the year upon which the Conference has entered. Mr. Holmes, who has been stationed at Freshwater for the past year, and was a member of the last General Conference, entered the Methodist ministry about twenty years ago. The newly-elected President thanked the Conference for the honour it had conferred upon him, and briefly stated an incident which he thought changed his life and led him to stay in the Newfoundland Conference.

Rev. Charles Leach, of Western Bay, was re-elected Secretary of the Conference. A vote of thanks was passed by the Conference to Revs. T. B. Darby and Chas. Leach for the service which they did so capably and favourably for the church during their term of office.

The Rev. C. Hackett was appointed Statistical Secretary; the Rev. F. R. Matthews, B.A., Journal Secretary, and the Revs. A. Royle and G. Godfrey were appointed assistant secretaries. A committee was appointed to compose an address of loyalty to the 65,000 Methodist people of this island to Their Gracious Majesties through His Excellency the Governor.

At 11.30 the President conducted the Annual Conference prayer meeting. The meeting was one of spiritual power, and the earnestness of the prayers augurs well for the future history of Methodism in this island. The Stationing Committee gave their report for the benefit of the Conference. The Conference then adjourned until 2.30 p.m.

Afternoon Session. Conference opened at 2.30, the President in the chair. After the singing of a hymn a prayer was offered. Minutes were called for and adopted. The reports from the different districts were read by the respective secretaries and referred to the committee. The usual routine business being transacted, Conference adjourned to sit on committee to meet and report.

Evening Session. A fairly large congregation assembled in the body of the church to hear the report of the state of work in the various districts. The meeting opened with singing and prayer under the presidency of the Rev. A. A. Holmes. The minutes were read and

received. Reports of work in the districts were read and showed a decrease in the church membership. Revival services were held in all the districts and many had been converted. The Twillingate District is laboring under most unfavourable circumstances and its Chairman, Rev. W.T.D. Dunn, spoke very frankly and candidly about the smaller institutions which exist in that district and which so menace the work of the church and cause the service of the young men to be of such a trying experience that a decrease in that district is what may almost be expected.

The Harbin Circuit reported an increase and feels thankful to God for the outpouring of His Holy Spirit.

The Rev. Dr. Moore, General Secretary, was asked by the President to address the congregation. He felt he was never before in such a meeting in which the state of the work of the church had been discussed so frankly, and brotherly as it was in the meeting. He congratulated the Conference on such a splendid and excellent meeting conducted in such a spiritual and beneficial way. If a reporter were present he would suppose to see the paper the next day with a big headline that the Rev. W. T.D. Dunn had spoken unfairly about the small institutions of Twillingate District. But Mr. Dunn in his opinion said what he should have said. He threw no scorn or sarcasm upon the institutions of Green Bay but he had spoken and placed before this conference facts which the Newfoundland Conference has to attend to and which the great Canadian Methodist Church is doing all in her power to remedy. While the different ministers and laymen spoke the Doctor's heart burnt within him and he prayed: "God help us." He has asked the church as a whole to touch those influences which tend to debar the working of the Methodist Church throughout Canada in the propagation of Christ's kingdom on earth.

Dr. Moore thought as the ex-President, the church needs more of God—not ministers only but men; not men only but women; not women only but the young. Every service evangelistic and every servant an evangelist is the motto of the church and is what wants to be enforced.

The Rev. Dr. would wish to have spoken with reference to the class-meeting, family altar, Epworth League and the Sunday School had time permitted. In a few moments he showed the societies of the church the wayward and wandering, to reach all to the great shepherd. Taking the discipline he read the rule which said, "you have nothing to do but save souls." From his heart he spoke it. With accent and fervently he read it again and when he took his seat all must have been impressed with such an address delivered so earnestly.

The meeting closed by singing hymn 418, and the benediction pronounced by the Rev. T. B. Darby, B.A., J.G.J.

Thursday morning's session opened by singing hymn 84, followed by reading of Scripture by Secretary. Minutes were read and adopted. No communications. The reports of the Supernumerary Committee were read and passed, item by item.

At 10.30 Rev. Dr. Moore, who represents the Temperance and Moral Reform department, addressed the Conference. He said he travelled 10,627 miles to get to St. John's since the visitation of Conferences, which extends over vast sections of God's footstool. The church is greatly interested and deeply aroused over the work of this department. Dr. Chown, one of Canada's greatest sons, laid the foundation of this wonderful movement with very great foresight and with faith in God and humanity. He deserves to have his name written where it will never be blotted out.

With Dr. Moore were two assistants, J. W. Aiken and W. McGee. He referred to the sad ending of Bro. McGee, and bore testimony to his flaming evangelism and his noble, faithful and self-sacrificing work. This department was organized eight years ago. The department stands for the building up of Christ's kingdom; stands for the righting of every social wrong; for every breathing spark of right where our church carries on its work. This department includes thirty-nine different social and moral departments, which is sleepless in its vigilance and untiring in its efforts. The liquor traffic, gambling, social housing protection, disfranchisement of criminals, the proper treatment for reformation, political corruption, child labour, juvenile delinquents, moral and patriotic training, censorship of the theatre, the suppression of bad shows and immoral pictures, compulsory education, prevention of the sale of bad books and papers, improvement of the laws of the land, &c. Having travelled in the interest of moral reform he is becoming impressed with a few things:

(1) The ease with which the public mind adjusts itself to the conditions of wrong. He described a town in the West and a street known as Red-light Street through which he had to pass, and in which there were twenty-

three women of ill-fame. In that vicinity was a family of father, mother and two beautiful daughters, who at that time were untainted with the evil of the place. Since then the Doctor met the father in Vancouver, and with tears streaming down his cheeks he exclaimed, "Would to God I had taken your advice!"—for both his daughters had gone astray.

(2) In consequence of ease of adjustment of mind to these conditions we lose the power of resistance to wrong-doing. He related an incident in connection with this work in the West. He left the station and sought an hotel in a mining city. He was given a room, but feeling it uncomfortably cold, he sought the sitting-room, and found upon enquiry that the bar-room was the only substitute. He pulled his chair by the fire and began to read. One after another of the miners came to the bar and called for drinks. Finally two men came in and after ordering a drink, said to the bartender, "By the way, Joe, you don't know who got off at the station this morning." Joe guessed, but without avail. "Well," he said, "a Methodist parson is here." The bartender banged the bottle upon the counter, and with words that would burn the tongue said, "We have to be pretty careful around here now, boys, for they are opposed to the liquor traffic wherever they go." (Applause.) J. G. J.

LONDON, To-day. At the closing session of the Eucharistic Congress, a telegram was read from the Pope asking members of the Congress to pray for the Church in Portugal, whose prelates are being persecuted for their faith and traditions.

LONDON, To-day. A dinner was given by the Pilgrims' Society last night in honor of John Hay Hammond, special Ambassador to the Coronation. The speakers were Balfour, Hammond, Birrell and Chancey Dewey, former States Senator. The scene was enthusiastic when a message was read from Washington, intimating that as a result of the Conference between Knox and Bryce the Arbitration Treaty had been practically arranged.

WASHINGTON, To-day. After a conference between President Taft and Ambassador Bryce, an announcement was made at the White House that the Arbitration Treaty between Great Britain and the States is practically complete. With the exception of a few comparatively unimportant details, the terms of the treaty have been agreed upon. The fight against reciprocity, opened by Senator Cummins, who is presenting a number of amendments to the bill. He denounced it as obviously unjust, and protested against the usurpation of the legislative power by the President. He declared as his belief that the President could not lawfully make a proposal to Canada or accept one from that country.

LONDON, To-day. Lord Lansdowne has given notice that he would introduce amendments of the most sweeping character to the Veto Bill. His design is to exclude from the operation of the bill, should it become law, any measure affecting the prerogatives of the Crown, and to provide that on all issues of great gravity where the sentiment of the country has not been sufficiently ascertained, that a measure pertaining to such an issue must be submitted to a referendum vote.



**Coronation
Blunders.**

The Crown Has Been Dropped and
Thieves Have Carried Off the
Banqueting Plate.

Such a gigantic pageant as a Cor-
onation requires an incredible amount
of organization, and the wonder is
not that an occasional hitch occurs,
but that, as a rule, the great cere-
monial goes off so well as it does.

The Coronation of the late King
Edward was a model in this respect,
indeed, the last Coronation at which
any accident worth mentioning hap-
pened was that of George IV.

Upon the Lord High Steward, the
Marquis of Anglesey, devolved the
task of carrying the crown to the
altar, before the Archbishop placed
it upon the King's head. Apparen-
ly he miscalculated its weight, for it
slipped from his hands.

Everyone who saw gasped with dis-
may, but the peer was equal to the
occasion, and dexterously caught it
before it reached the ground.

A Horse That Frisked.
Much amusement was caused at the
Coronation of George III. by the an-
tics of the steed of the High Steward,
who on that occasion was Lord Tal-
bot. The horse insisted upon enter-
ing Westminster Hall backwards, and
poor Lord Talbot had to call upon
bystanders to help him to turn the
refractory animal the way it should
go.

At the same Coronation the great
diamond fell out of the crown during
the ceremony. The superstitious be-
lieved it to be an omen of the loss of
our American colonies.

Before the Coronation the work-
men struck at Westminster Hall, and
at the last moment the Earl Marshal
was found to have forgotten the
Sword of State. Indeed the mis-
chances were so numerous that after-
wards the King administered a regu-
lar royal dressing down to the re-
sponsible official. The only reply the
wretched man could find to make was
to promise that "it should not occur
again!"

Poor Queen Anne's Coronation.
For rank mismanagement the Cor-
onation of Queen Anne would be dif-
ficult to beat. The small blunders
were endless, but the culmination was
reached when thieves carried off the
whole of the valuable plate used at
the banquet together with the pewter,
china, the beautiful table linen, and
a vast quantity of other property.

The many mishaps that marred the
Coronations of the Stuart Kings are
matters of history. When James I.
was crowned plague-shorn the cere-
mony of all its glory. The crowning
of Charles I. was marked by a dozen
ill omens.

The large carrying the King to the
Palace ran aground. When Laud pre-
sented the King to the people in the
recognised fashion, saying: "I desire
you, by your general acclamation to
testify your consent and willingness,"
dead silence reigned until the Earl
Marshal was forced to tell the spec-
tators that they must shout.

Later it was found that the left
wing of the dove on the sceptre staff
had been mysteriously broken off.
Worse than all, during the ceremony
there was a low rumbling mutter, and
all London was shaken by an earth-
quake.

When the Footmen Fought.

Curiously enough, during the Cor-
onation of his son, Charles II, there
were terrible thunders when none ex-
pected it," says Baxter, the historian.
Also, there was a quarrel between the
Royal footmen and the Barons of the
Cinque Ports for the possession of the
canopy which it was the latter's
privilege to bear over the King's head.
One of the footmen was actually ar-
rested and clapped into prison.

The evil omens marking the Cor-
onation of the unhappy James II. were
really amazing. The crown absolute-
ly refused to remain on the monarch's
head. It had to be held in place by
Henry Sidney. The day was not
windy, yet as the guns signalled the
crowning the great flag on the White
Tower was suddenly torn away.

Later, when the King was return-
ing after the ceremony, the canopy,
which was of cloth of gold, was split
by a gust of wind.

"'Twas of cloth of gold," writes
Aubrey, "and my strength, I am con-
fident, could not have rent it, and it
was not a windy day."

It is the fervent hope of all King
George's loyal subjects that his own
crowning will be unmarred by any
untoward event.—P.W.

ROSEBERY'S SUGGESTIONS.

Germs of Great Imperial Conclave to
be Seen in the Present London
Conference.

London, June 19.—At a memorable
gathering to-day in Westminster Hall,
which, as the chairman, Lord Rose-
bery, pointed out was traditionally
the hall of William Rufus and cer-
tainly was the scene of the trial of
Warren Hastings, and where Staf-
ford and his master confronted their
judges, the Lords and Commons lunched
the visiting overseas M. P.'s, the
members of the conference also be-
ing guests.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier sat on the left
of Lord Rosebery, with Speaker Low-
ther and Sir Mackenzie Bowell on
the other side. Rt. Hon. M. Botha
and Lord Strathcona were neighbors
at Premier Asquith's table. Also at
the main tables were Sir Frederick
Borden, Premiers Sifton, Morris,
Gouin and Roblin, Hon. Mr. Brodeur
and Senators Power, Loughheed, Wat-
son and Casagran.

Lord Rosebery described the gath-
ering as one of the home backwoods-
men with the backwoodsmen of the
Dominions, and delivered a character-
istically witty speech. He did not be-
lieve that any Parliament had yet
reached final shape.

The principle of our Empire allow-
ed each part to settle its own affairs,
but there was an interest higher and
common to all, the interest of the
Empire. What were we doing to
make ourselves worthy of our inheri-
tance? In imperial conference, might
we not see the germs of a greater
conclave, representing imperial as-

**pirations, reflecting the unity of the
Empire permanently, thus forming
the most august parliament the
world had ever seen?**

"I believe that some day we shall
wake up to find ourselves a federated
empire," he concluded.

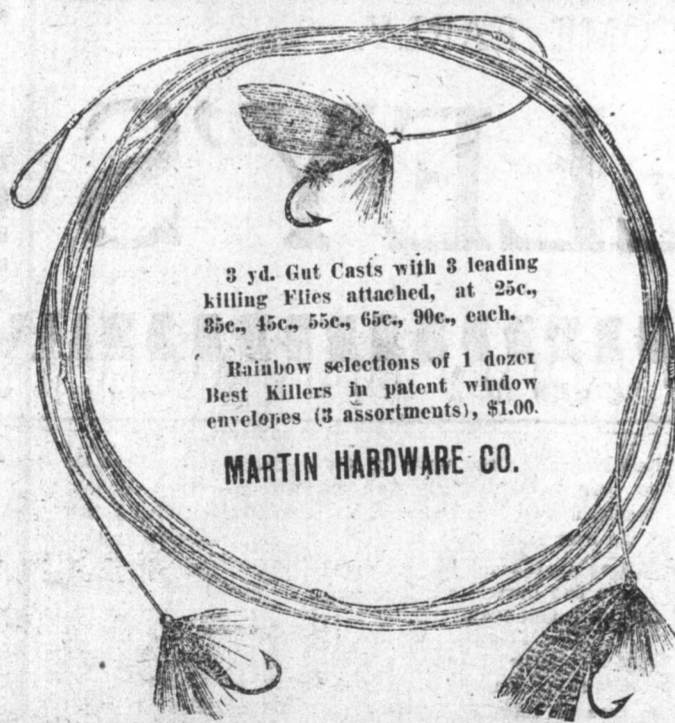

SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

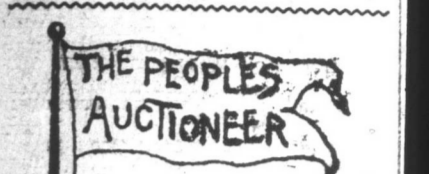

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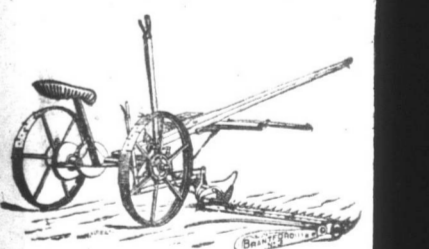
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
