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

#### Canned Air.

Nearly everything is successfully anned now-or "tinned," as they say England. Canned air is the newest thing to be added to the many varieties. The jaden Londoner pining for breath of really fresh air no longer need rush off to the seaside for his ozone. Every station of the Central London Railway will soon have its own apparatus for mixing electrically produced ozone with the atmosphere at the platform level and in the adjoining "tube," so that its patrons can enjoy the health-giving elements while travelling to and from their of-

ped with the patent ozone mixing system of ventilation, six thousand to seven thousand cubic feet of ozonized air are pumped into the station and its adjoining "tube" every minute from seven in the morning until one o'clock at night. As a result the acrid, dampish odor so noticeable in some of the earlier-built "tube" systems has utterly disappeared.

What look like two large wooden packing boxes, perched on the roof of the booking office, contain all the apparatus necessary for the revivification of the "tube's" atmosphere. couple of square yards of cocoanut matting, kept wet by a constant stream of water trickling over it, acts



It appears that when Messrs. Grace nd Larkin learned that they were pranded as untruthful they wrote the Mayor asking him to call a meeting so that they might be given a chance to vindicate themselves of the unleasant stain on their characters.

A meeting was then held and the collectors produced documentary evilence by handing to the Mayor water oills which contained the figures in the writing of the collectors. This settled the controversy in favor of the collectors. By a unanimous vote the 'ommittee fully exonerated the colectors from all blame and ordered the vhole proceedings to be recorded in ne minutes for future reference. This eing a public matter and an importent one, we will anxiously await the ction of the Mayor and Council in this connection.

In a second article descriptive of the Durbar ceremonial, T. H. Preston, of Brantford, who represented the Canadian Press Association thus tells of a much-talked-of incident:
