





'We were crossing Bilapho Pass at bout an 18,000-foot height when an Italian porter, named Chenoz, who was carrying the rone, strode ahead. vas about three paces behind when suddenly without a word or a cry he lisappeared, carrying the rope, which vas the only means of extrication Having only one extra rope remaining, he head guide called down the creasse and a faint reply showed that benoz, who was far below was still live. Six started after the head guide. who was back in an hour and a half hen Chenoz was extricated from a 0-foot depth. He was still consciou nd was carried to camp. Everythin ssible was done for him, but he d

he same night from shock." The letter describes the work of the xpedition on the Siachen, or Rose Glacier, which is the largest and long est in Asia.
