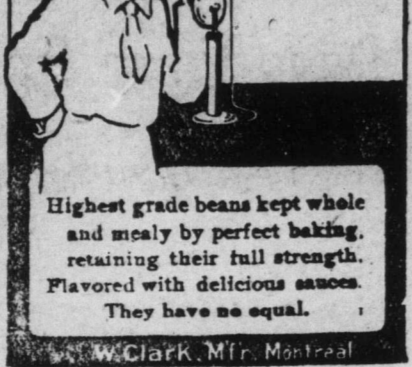
CHAPTER XXVII.

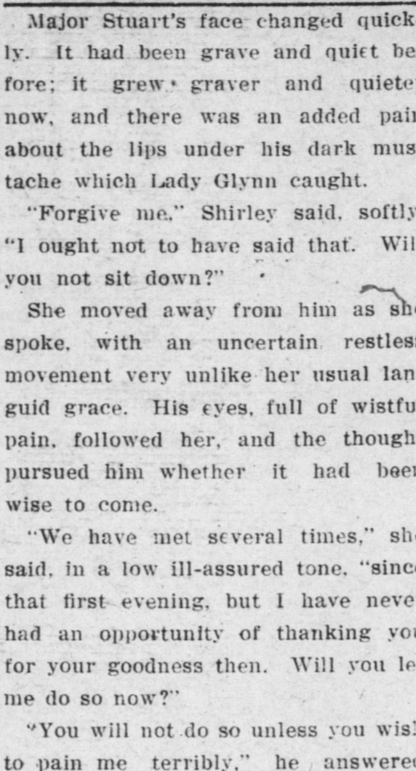

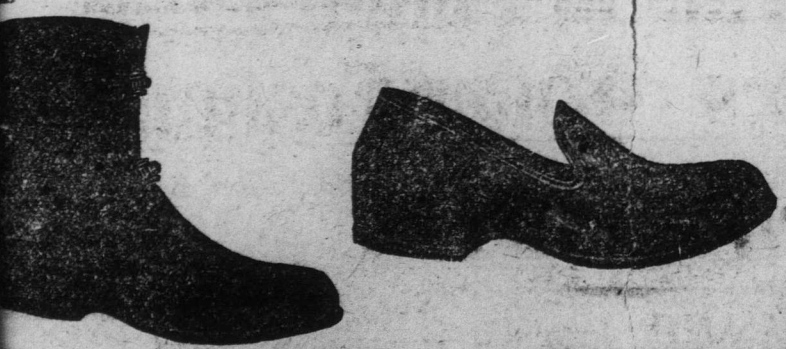

Some Different Kinds of Silence.

How many different kinds of silence there are! The dictionary helpfully defines silence as the state or act of being silent. Further investigation discovered that "silent" means "free from sound or noise, absolutely still." "Freedom from noise" sounds like a purely negative quality and not at all variable, doesn't it? Yet it seems to me that many silences are positive. And surely you have noticed how much one silence may differ from another in quality. For instance, take the silence of a church during the prayer, and the silence of a crowd of spectators at a football game during the instant while the ball is in the air after a kick.

Again, the silence in a perfectly empty room is quite different from the silence of a room which has an occupant, no matter how still he may be keeping. There may be entire freedom from noise in the second case as well as the first, and yet when you enter the second room you feel the different quality of the silence.

The silence of the woods is quite different from the silence of a deserted street. And don't you think the hush of the woods in winter when the trees are bare and there is snow on the ground is somehow quite different from the warm summer silences?

When I was a child we often used to go into the woods early in the morning on Sunday. A favorite walk took us to the top of a hill whence we could see the towns and cities for miles around, although we were too far off to hear any of the city noises

except the church bells. We would point out the various objects of interest to each other, taking a child's delight in finding "our house" among the clusters of dwellings. And then my father would almost always say "See how quiet it is. Isn't there something more peaceful about the silence on a Sunday morning than on a week-day?" And sure enough, it did seem as if the Sunday morning silence gave us a richer sense of peace and serenity than the silence of week-days.

Quite different from any other silence, I am sure even the most majestic-of-fact will admit, is the hush that fills the atmosphere just before a great storm breaks. There is a quality of tension and suspense in this hush that is as different from the silence of peace as black from white.

Again, what a difference there may be in the quality of the silence when falls between two companions. I well remember one day when a good friend and I went out to walk in the woods. We were not angry, but neither were we in harmony, and the silence was full of the quality of constraint. A few days later we took the same walk again. This time we were in perfect harmony but not in the mood for speech, and so again we were silent. But what a different silence it was, a silence that lay between us not like a pall of constraint, but like a band and a benediction.

So silence, like everything, is a subjective as well as objective and takes its quality from mind as well as matter.

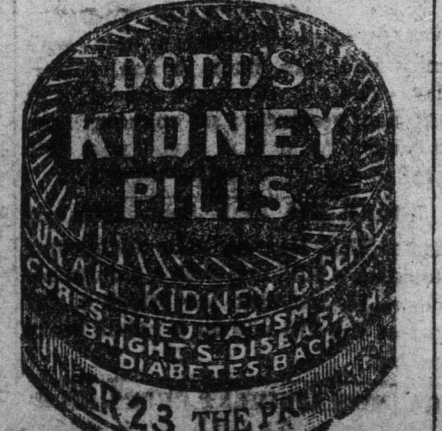

Splendid Work of the Firemen.

The fire last night which destroyed the beautiful Methodist Church of Cochrane Street was the most menacing to the city of any since the great conflagration of 1892. The firemen did magnificent work in confining the fire to the area of the church edifice, and they earned the gratitude of citizens by their skilled and heroic labor. Their success in preventing the spread of the fire to Mr. Rendell's house is one which is highly commendable. Some of the firemen worked hard on the auto shed and other outhouses close to the north side of the church, exposed to the fierce heat of the furnace which raged inside the building and in peril from the danger of the falling of the burning steeple and the high chimney stack of the church. The firemen however by skilled direction endeavoured to make the steeple and the chimney fall inside the building. Immediately the chimney began to totter, the firemen directed the force of several hoses on it and threw it down inside. As to the steeple they kept the water playing on the street side of the steeple and that side maintained its strength the longer while the church side was weakened by the fire and a few minutes after the chimney fell, the steeple fell inside. The firemen were fortunately aided by a downpour of rain and the wet snow which lay on the roofs of the

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

BERLIN, Jan. 18.

Vossische Zeitung says circumstantial reports are current in well informed quarters that Germany is on the verge of a Naval Chancellorship under Admiral Von Pirpit. It is asserted Dr. Von Jagou and the latter's under Secretary Zimmerman leave the office at the same time with him. Dr. Solf, Colonial Secretary, is mentioned as likely to be the new Foreign Secretary. This story which must be taken with the utmost reserve, it alleges Von Bethmann Holweg becomes Viceroy of Alsace and Lorraine in succession to Count Von Wedel, who will leave the office in consequence of the failure of the Government in the recent crisis in the conquered Provinces. The Vossische Zeitung adds that the statements come from dependable authorities in such a categorical form that it cannot refrain from giving them immediate publicity, although it is unable to vouch for their accuracy. The Kaiser had a conference yesterday with the Chancellor of War, the War Minister and Chiefs of General Staff, his military cabinet.

LONDON, To-day.

The work of revision of the Committee of International Congress of Safety at Sea, was practically brought to a close last night. The

American Wireless systems all agreed to suggestion of European delegates. This agreement preserves intact the private code signals of any country reserved for war. It is made of the Commercial code, and only one code will be used for any distress call. This will assure its being understood by all ships within range; the Americans have been unsuccessful in their contention as to the number of men manning each ship. The adoption of the provision for rafts aboard ships against the contention of the Americans, was carried. The Americans, however, forced the concession that never more than one-third of life-saving craft should consist of rafts and always two-thirds or more of lifeboats where a ship carried both. The arbitration feature of the conference was again obtruded.

LONDON, To-day.

The charges of bribery and corruption in connection with the centeen supplies of the British Army, which has aroused widespread attention in British Isles for some time past, were the matters brought up at Bow Street Police Court against eight Army officers and non commissioned officers and eight civilians. Crown Prosecutor Muir, after reading the formal charges against the accused, three of whom two officers and one civilian did not appear, occupied the entire day reading the correspondence relating to what he described as this traffic bribery. Muir contended the evidence should be showed the persistent receipt of bribes by military men from the civilian defendants, the gifts being handed to them in order to influence any contracts and to prevent complaints about high prices. The cases were adjourned until January 24.

ALBANY, To-day.

A strike of 5,000 employees of the Delaware and Hudson railroad Company's lines from Rouses Point, N.Y., to Wilkesbarre Penn., began this morning as a result of the refusal of the Company to grant the men's demands for the reinstatement of two of their number.

Shoes May Soon Retail at \$10.00 per pair.

New York, Jan. 13.—In the opinion of speakers at the annual convention of the National Shoe Retailers' Association, which closes with a banquet to-night, the retail price of shoes may

soon reach \$10 per pair. "Pure shoe laws" already adopted in twenty-five states, and several measures of the same nature now pending in Congress, were given as the chief causes for increasing the price of footwear. Both speakers and a majority of the 200 delegates present denounced the legislation which would cause all shoes not made entirely of leather to be

stamped "adulterated" or "substitute leather." The shoe retailers were told that if all shoes were made of all leather 2,000,000 more hides per annum would be required in this country alone, and with hides practically in control of the large packing houses, it cannot be foreseen to what heights shoe prices might soar.

Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting.

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitiate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—

Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this, amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jameson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Dudley, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.

I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter been employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewes, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov8,14

The Far East.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-day.

Germany, America, England, Japan, France and Holland are mutually sounding each other with a view to a mutual guarantee of the straits open to the Far East and the Pacific Ocean. Since the close of the Russo-Japanese war Holland has been uneasy as to the future of the Dutch Indies, the vast trade and wealth of which are most important to the Netherlands. The Dutch statesmen have been seeking means to insure preservation of the status quo in the Far East as they realize the impossibility of building a sufficient naval establishment to defend their possessions in the Indies.

France and England are said to regard the plan with favour. Germany is not disinclined to part in it, but is sceptical as to its success. President Wilson and Secretary Bryan are said to have received the hint sympathetically and are said to be considering the scheme an excellent solution of the situation in the Far East. What is said to be the real obstacle to the establishment of the entente will be the difficulty of getting America and Japan to join in the same convention and this may wreck the scheme before it emerges from the present indefinite suggestions.

Paris, January 8.—Eugene Gilbert, the French aviator, narrowly escape death while flying over Paris to-day, when he descended on a roof, through which his aeroplane broke, and was wrecked. Gilbert was making a trial trip in a new army monoplane carrying a heavy load with which he had descended from the aerodrome at Issy-Moulins. He had flown to Paris where he circled the Eiffel Tower at a height of 1,000 feet. He then cut off his motor in preparation for a glide to the earth. The aeroplane descended so rapidly that the aviator and he would be unable to avoid the buildings and, as he could not restart his motor, he picked out the most promising landing place, the roof of a factory. The aviator escape injury.

Cancer Cured by Radium.

Declares London Physician.

London, Thursday, Jan. 8.—The London Times this morning publishes a statement concerning the treatment of cancer by radium at the Middlesex Hospital, which, it declares, records the most important advance yet achieved in the campaign against this disease. The statement is made by Dr. W. S. Lazarus-Barlow, under whose direction the treatment was carried out.

The cancer department of the hospital, admits only inoperable cases—that is, cases which have passed beyond the aid of the surgeon. In 1912, from June to September, 24 such cases were admitted, and in the same time there were 24 deaths, the mortality rate being 100 per cent. From June to September, 1913, the number of cases admitted was 68. In that time 26 deaths occurred and the condition of 32 patients was so favourable that they were discharged from the hospital, an unprecedented event.

Most of these patients are now going about their daily work. "It is a crying shame," Dr. Lazarus-Barlow continued, "that radium cannot be obtained. I have every reason to believe from statements of manufacturers that radium could be sold at a profit at a few shillings per milligram. The present market price is \$20 and upward."

"In a matter of this urgency it becomes a question as to whether the state should not assume control of the sources of radium in this country for the benefit of the 3,000 persons who annually die of cancer in these islands."

Dr. Jones Writes

Dear Sir,—Answering your inquiry as to my experience with the "Ford," you will remember that it was quite late in the season before I got it on the road and as I was away for six weeks in the Fall, my total mileage was not a large one, only 900 miles. A Word for Our Firemen

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Sir.—Councillor Ryan certainly deserves the thanks of the public for bringing forward a matter that calls for immediate attention, if we desire to aspire to the dignity of true citizenship. All realize that we have a Fire Brigade in this city that is held in the highest esteem, and which enjoys the fullest confidence of the community, but whilst we are ready to admit that, unfortunately we stop there, and do not bother ourselves in enquiring as to how the firemen are treated. As a matter of fact these men are of a quiet retiring disposition, they attend to their duties, the public feel safeguarded and month by month pass on, the firemen expecting a raise of pay, and the public caring little whether they get it or not, the result being they are left. Being under discipline they cannot go out and champion their cause, they mix very little with their fellowman and suffer in silence.

Now, for goodness sake, let every citizen open his eyes and his ears to this fact, and when he has become acquainted with it, let him arise and take an interest in these men who are at all times ready and willing to risk their lives to protect him and his property. The firemen at present work every day in the week except one, and on that day they are supposed to be on hand if an alarm is sounded. They not only are on duty in the daytime but they must sleep in the Hall and be ready at all hours to respond to an alarm, often being called in the dead of night, awakened out of a sound sleep, to fight a fire in the height of a blinding snow storm and intense frost. These men, too, have to forego the comforts of home, except it be for one day out of eight, except at meal hours, and for this they receive the miserable pay of thirty-eight dollars per month. Now, Mr. Editor, I would ask any fair-minded citizen if he thinks this is fair treatment? True it may be said "if they don't like it they can get out," but let me ask, can we as citizens give that answer, and at the same time uphold the dignity of citizenship? Or can we afford to run the risk of losing the capable experienced fire-fighters who now constitute the Brigade? I say no, emphatically, for, in no city of its size have they a better class of firemen than we have in St. John's. We all know, who have to live on sixty or seventy dollars a month, how hard it is to make two ends meet, but how do we expect the firemen to work for us on thirty-eight dollars. I again congratulate Mr. Ryan on his noble stand, and I hope that he will not lose sight of it, until he secures better pay for the gallant firemen.

Cable News.

LONDON, Jan. 18.
For many years no suit aroused such widespread interest in the British Isles as the proceedings opened Saturday at Bow St. Police Court, against eight officers and non-commissioned officers of the British Army, and eight civilians, who are charged with wholesale corruption in a bribery in connection with supplies to the British Army canteens. Thirteen officers, for some cause or other had not answered their summonses, while one civilian was absent on account of illness. The six officers and two non-commissioned officers involved are all connected with the Quartermaster's Department. All have risen from the ranks. The civilians are employees of Lipton, Ltd. They include John Lipton, managing director of the company; James Craig, general manager of the military department company and former president of managers at military headquarters in London, Aldershot and Salisbury. The corruption has been going on for ten years.

TOKIO, Jan. 18.
The indications are that the loss of life on the island of Sakura, which was devastated by the eruption of the volcano Sakura Jima, may be larger than had been supposed. A report received here to-day from an official of the Interior Department, who was sent to Kagoshima and its vicinity to investigate, states 9,000 of Sakura's estimated population of 19,000 had been accounted for up to the evening of the 16th. Other figures are expected to be found in other directions, but the loss of life is evidently be extremely heavy.

HALIFAX, Jan. 18.
A wireless to-night from the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co's liner "Chigley," from Halifax for West Indies, reports having taken off Capt. Johnes and crew of the waterlogged Nova Scotia schooner "Ladysmith." The schooner registered 674 tons, and was bound for New York, lumber laden.

LONDON, Jan. 18.
Baron Strathcona and Mount Royal, High Commissioner of Canada, is seriously ill, suffering from prostration following a sharp attack of laryngitis. He is 94 years old, and his condition gives rise to considerable anxiety. At 8 p.m. Sunday, he was still alive.

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.
Premier Whitney's condition remains unchanged.

LONDON, Jan. 18.
The coronation of Emperor Yoshihito has been fixed for Nov. 1st.

Man Fell Into Hold of Steamer.



The incorporation of this charitable Association having been completed the formal first general meeting of those who signed the Memorandum and Articles of Association was held at Government House by permission of His Excellency the Governor, last Saturday at 3 o'clock, the following being present:—Mr. Charles P. Ayre, Hon. John Harvey, Mr. R. F. Horwood, Hon. W. C. Job, Dr. Cluny Macpherson, Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Mr. I. C. Morris, Hon. R. Watson, Hon. M. G. Winter, Mr. Brian E. S. Dunfield acted as Secretary of the meeting. Messages of regret of inability to be present were received from the Right Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, P. C., and Hon. George M. Johnson, Judge of the Supreme Court. Hon. W. C. Job was voted to the chair to open the meeting. His Excellency the Governor was immediately elected an Honorary Member with all powers, and was appointed a Director and President of the Association, and was asked to take the chair. The remaining eight directors required were balloted for and the following were elected:—Mr. Charles P. Ayre, Mr. W. G. Gosling, Hon. John Harvey, Hon. W. C. Job, Dr. Cluny Macpherson, Right Hon. Sir Edward P. Morris, P. C., Hon. Robert Watson, Hon. M. G. Winter. The meeting then elected by ballot the Hon. W. C. Job and Hon. Robert Watson to act as Directors to represent the Association on the Council of the International Grenfell Association which will control and administer the affairs of the Mission. The remarkable volume of medical and surgical care and relief given during the period under review impressed the meeting. 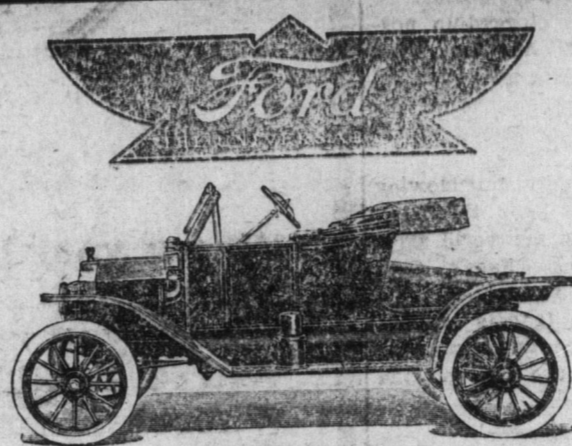

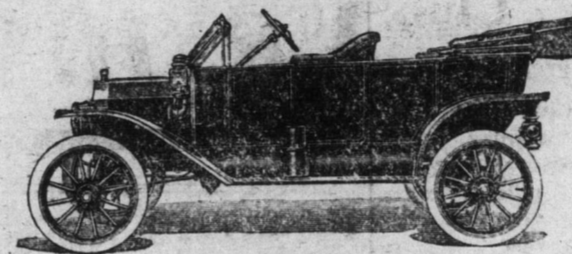
