

made to Britain in East Africa. The Heligoland light is an electric one, and the most powerful in Germany, and is claimed by the Germans to be the most powerful light in existence. The light consists of cluster of three revolving lights, having a lighting power of 40,000,000 candles, a magnitude of light which from figures alone is hard and diffigult to realize. The lights are on the searchlight principle, and the cluster is surmounted by a single light of the same kind and size, that can be revolved independently and three times as fast as the three lights. The sin gle light is put into use in case of accident to the cluster of three. The electric power is generated by two steam-engines and boilers, running

belt-driven electric generators.

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



WESTERN FISHERY.

So far as trawling is concerned the fishery on the Western Banks is now over for the season and it is estimated that upwards of a million dollars worth of cod has been landed, the most valuable in the history of the staple industry in that centre. Even better results than that would have been obtained but for the adversities met with, such as the scarcity of bait and the constant appearance of ice on the grounds. All the vesels got payable trips and many big trips were secured. The onours of high-liner again fell to Skipper Tom Hollett, the well known jowler, with Skipper Vatcher Cluett, of Belleoram, a close second. Their catches were 1,500 and 1,300 quintals, respectively. Other noted fish-killers as Captains John Lewis, Inkpen. Critchell and others were well up to the thousand mark. When the Prospero was passing there all the banking fleet had left the grounds and gone to their home ports to outfit for the Grand Banks voyage, though number of Channel. 



The Germans adanced about half a mile and started entrench themselves about nine

"At midnight the two western battalions the Tenth and Sixteenth, formed up in the rear, received orders to charge. For more than two hundred vards they were exposed to a heavy rifle and several machine guns but they kept right on until they reached the German trenches. Here the westerners re-took the guns and also captured some prisoners, who surrendered when about to be bayonetted." Capt. McCuaig, while at headquarters was wounded by shrapnel but his injuries are not serious.

Lieutenent G. M. Ainslee, of the Sixteenth Battalion, who was wounded in the charge described by Captain McCuaig, said he was in Ypres when the shelling started on the afternoon of the 22nd and on returning found his battalion ready to go forward.

#### **Unparalleled Feat.**

(From the New York Tribune.)

There has been a great deal of grumbling in England at the slowness of recruiting and the failure of munitions and supplies of all kinds. Much of this has doubtless been taken too eriously. As for recruiting, it has at east kept pace with equipment, and the cry for conscription may safely be attributed to party motives. Munitions have not been produced rapidly enough to equal the demand, but nothing like the demand has ever been known beore. It must be remembered, too, as Mr. Lloyd George points out that

Great Britain has been supplying her Allies, yet in spite of this curcumstance there is at present a considerable reserve. Nearly three months ago a French observer remarked in "Le Temps" that, contrary to the popular opinion. Great Britain had worked miracles in the way of organization, and expressed the belief that no country in the world could possibly have done more. He was perfectly satisfied as a result of his own investigation that conscription would never be necessary, and his judgment was entirely in accord with that of Mr. Lloyd George to-day, that the creation of so great an army in so short a time was feat hitherto unparalleled.
