

THE BATTLE OF ARMAGEDDON.

Is It About to Eventualize?—If So, Where Do You Stand?

At Salonika, the historic seaport of Old Greece, now for two years or more a great heterogeneous army has been gathering. This army is often spoken of as a mystery, and the question is often asked, what is it doing, and if it is doing nothing why is it there? Certainly, to date, it has not appeared to be doing very much excepting to be increasing in numbers of men and nationalities gathering there. In this historic and most important region of the Old World, so vividly mentioned in ancient story and scriptural history, nations from all ends of the universe appear to be sending their quota of armed men. The soldiers of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales are there. Their relations in blood from Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Canada, and we of Newfoundland have a few men there. There are soldiers there from the many tribes of India and from those countries and Isles of the Sea that are British in heart and so defenders of Right and Freedom. Our brothers in arms are there from wonderfully glorious France, from sunny Italy, now determined Italy. They are there from dauntless little Montenegro, from fearless Serbia, who has always been the defender of liberty. Soldiers are on the line of battle from Greece itself and from near-by Albania. You will find the soldiers of the many peoples of far-flung Russia there, and representatives in perhaps small but not negligible quantities, from the United States of America, from Portugal and from many other countries. Opposed to them are soldiers from all the numerous nationalities making up the German and Austrian Empires and from those of Bulgaria and Turkey.

Representatives of nationalities from all parts of the world, I believe, you will find there. Japan has her ships of war doing duty in the Mediterranean cruising to Salonika; China if nothing else has her labourers there; historic Egypt is represented there, and Jews are there from all parts of the world. Not very far away the holy city of these wonderful people is (as I write) practically surrounded by British troops and those of her Allies, and that city which has been vainly fought for, for so many centuries, looks now like being won back for the Jewish race. Strange things are happening in this quarter of the world, things that should make one pause and think. But apparently we are so far away from the scenes of the actual bitter fighting, from those districts scourged with slaughter, fire, disease and famine, that though in the past three years and

ika will likely move forward and make an attack upon the armies of the Central Powers. If so this would likely be the biggest and bloodiest battle of the whole war, and as you have seen the contestants would number practically all the nations of the earth. In any case this might be the decisive battle of the war, if the Allies won. For that fight the Allies will need every soldier they can get, and they will need the best. It may therefore be that the Doctrine of Predestination is not right, and if there are not certain people predestined to eternal damnation as nothing can be done for them. Otherwise one would have thought that this world struggle between Right and Wrong, or Christ and anti-Christ, if you like, would have moved them. But it hasn't and quite probably it never will and the end of the world will come and they will be dead before they know they were alive. Still there are some people who are only asleep that we wish to arouse to their duties.

First.—Some young men who are physically fit and in line for the Nfld. Regiment who are not yet there.

Second.—Parents who are acting wrongly by their sons and by their religion, by holding them back or not spurring them to the fray.

Third.—Any politicians and leaders of the people who are not leading the people as they should.

Then I wish to speak to all that great body of people, men and women, boys and girls who are not in line for the Regiment, but who can all do something for the Regiment, be it apparently small or great. And in this I include all young men who have offered for the Regiment, and have been rejected, as their duty does not stop here. All of us cannot give large donations to every Patriotic Fund, but we can spare something, and if we have to deny ourselves something, the denial makes the donation more valuable. We can all use our influence to help and not discourage recruiting and if necessary to put through Compulsory Service. We can help and encourage those who have gone, or are going to the Front, and we can perhaps help and cheer those of their relatives or others who are left, and who perhaps need both our help and cheer. We can help those who may return battle-shattered, and if it may be that some shall never return any more to those who loved them, perhaps their relatives need our further help. This is no time for anybody to be thinking only of their own physical welfare. Of that entirely, you should be thinking at no time, but now how can you?

FOR IF SO—WHERE DO YOU STAND!

Possibly we are now heading for the prophesied Battle of Armageddon. Armageddon, the place of prophecy, was always presumed and even said to be in that part of the Old World near Greece. The armies of many nations now gathering together in and near the Grecian port of Salonika, it is thought will make a move to battle in the Spring of 1918, when the remnants of the Serbian, Montenegrin and other armies there will be properly refitted and reorganized. Following their usual plan of campaign doubtless the Spring of 1918 will see an overwhelming drive by the Central Powers against the gallant army of Roumania, which might easily be overpowered, now that its Russian Ally, on its wing, is going to fail it and that it neither has nor can get a proper base of supplies. But in order to stay a crushing of the Roumanian Army, in accordance to our promises, the Allied Armies in Sardinia

WAR NEWS.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

CLOSING DOWN ENEMY BUSINESS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26. Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo to-day decided that under the Trading with the Enemy Law, the business of all insurance companies incorporated in Germany or her allies or of enemy countries, is to be liquidated with the exception of life insurance companies which are allowed to continue existing contracts.

AFTER ENEMY ALIENS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26. New York's many miles of waterfront is to-day guarded by police and soldiers, the latter being posted in some more important parts to prevent enemy aliens from approaching the barred zone. By an order to-day received from Attorney General Gregory, alien enemies will be allowed till 8 a.m. on Thursday to vacate prescribed areas in New York and vicinity. All employers of alien enemies will be held accountable for any infraction of the regulations by such employees. They must furnish the United States Marshal with a complete list of all employees with their nationalities and addresses.

RAPID PROMOTION.

LONDON, Nov. 26. Moscow is under control of the Bolsheviks. M. Moralefu, a private soldier, has been appointed Commander in Chief of the Moscow military district.

ARTILLERY ACTIVITY.

PARIS, Nov. 26. Violent artillery activity is continuing in the Verdun region east of the Meuse where the French are organising the ground they captured yesterday to the north of Hill 344, says to-day's war office statement.

JAPANESE MISSION RETURNS.

TOKIO, Nov. 26. Viscount Ki Kugif Ishii and the members of the Japanese Mission to America, arrived home to-day after an uneventful trip. No formal reception was given the returning mission. In accordance with the wishes of Viscount Ishii, a special train with the members was met at Tokio by Premier Terachi, Foreign Minister Motono, with other cabinet members, friends of members of the party and chiefs of staff of the army and navy. Newspapers give much space to statements by the mission regarding the vast work of the United States. Viscount Ishii has made no statement regarding the work of the mission itself.

Parcels for Nfld.
Forces Overseas.

- (1) Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight.
- (2) Parcels addressed to members of the Newfoundland Forces Overseas should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcels may be delivered or forwarded if it should prove impossible to deliver the first. The original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and Customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the BACK of the parcel.
- (3) If a second address is not furnished at the time of posting, and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribution.
- (4) Parcels containing articles of a personal nature or of special value will be returned, if a request for their return in case of non-delivery is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.
- (5) This plan is being adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, which states that the present procedure of holding undeliverable parcels at the Dead Letter Office until instructions are received as to their disposal is resulting in the waste of a large quantity of perishable foodstuffs, which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels addressed to soldiers.

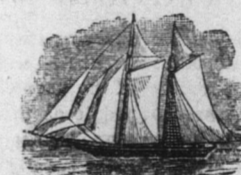

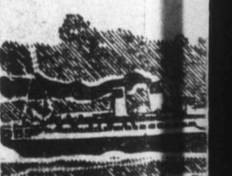
