



At St. Thomas's.

St. Thomas's Church was filled on Sunday night, when Rev. Dr. Jones spoke especially to the sailors and first of all stated that his subject had to the sailors and soldiers. He then spoke of the many soldiers who died n France, and had their resting place marked by the wooden crosses. These wooden crosses suggest three things, by their pointing upwards. downwards, and outwards. These suggestions give us certain thoughts, which, if acted upon, mould the character. The cross pointing upward speaks of duty, which is the highest expression of human character, and which brings its own reward. Adopting a personal note, he continued. telling the young men that they were often told that their discharge from the army meant that their duty was done, but he declared that the spiritual warfare was not over, and that the duties of citizenship were as strenuous as those of soldiering. As far as the reward was concerned, he advised them to avoid all Government jobs, as the later often tended to devoting on possibly vital questions of the country's welfare. He further warned them not to be ptessimists or revolutionists, as the life of Jesus, in His three years of preaching, during which time he spoke not a word against the Roman power, was a living example of the force of personal social service. He told them that money, legislation and organization were only subsidiary things, and that the real moralising force was personal service of the individual man, and emphasized the need of high ideals, and loyalty to the same, asserting that from such would spring a regenerated people. Taking the lesson from the base of the cross as pointing downwards, he declared that manhood was at its best on the battlefield. s character was shown among the soldiers. He quoted the words of Mr. Moody, "character is what a man is n the dark." To develop this character two axioms were to be kept in view, "aim high," and "fight hard." Men were to live up to the high standard set, and to stand and fight together. They were to battle against three evils (1) drunkenness, and to make the prohibition law more effective, (2) gambling, and to countereffect the evil and demoralizing influences of this habit, (3) impurity. In the last named he made a plea for ignorance and hatred of sin, and gave

"My strength is as the strength Because my heart is pure." He pleaded for ignorance and hatred of evil, and also for loyalty to truth, that the passions of evil might be kept down, and character strengthened. The cross pointing upward betokened the need of God. God was not optional. He was the inspiration of duty, and the foundation of morality. Finally, the preacher commended against the foes of righteousness. as one who gave "his heart to God."

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

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
