Man in the Moon.

According to Prof. William H Pickering, the noted Harvard astronomer, who recently made a study of the moon from an observatory in Kingston, Jamaica, there are evidences of existence of a race of superior beings on the earth's satellite which has heretofore been regarded as barren and devoid of all forms of life, both vegetable and animal. Professor Pickering, who has spent many years as an observer of the heavenly bodies, suggests that a careful study of the surface of the moon through a telescope lens unquestionably reveals vegetation in ts on the moon's surface, parrly in and around the craters of some of the extinct volcanoes.






