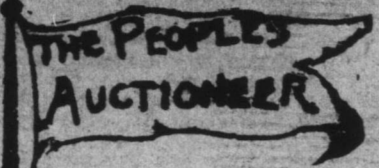

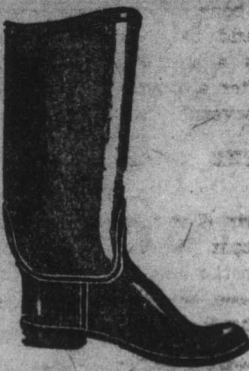
"Diana," he cried, "why are you sitting in that absurd fashion, looking as melancholy as Niobe? You want every one to know that you are unhappy."

FINAL SIGNATURE MAY BE DEFERRED.
PARIS, Nov. 24. The departure of Herr Von Simson, German plenipotentiary, who was sent to Paris in connection with the protocol to the Peace Treaty, will likely delay final signature until December 1 and will also delay the enforcement of the treaty, according to the Presse de Paris.

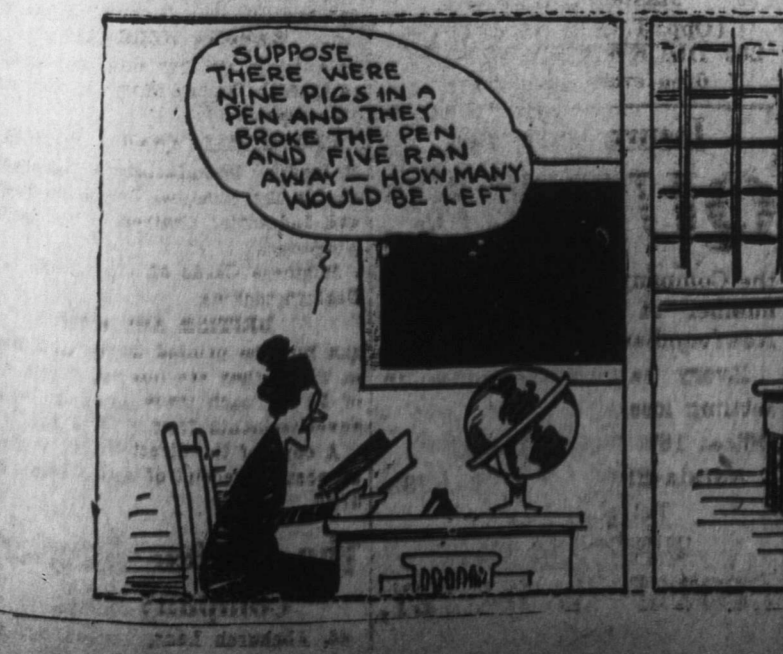
THREE DEAD IN FIGHT WITH POLICE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. Canada has been elected to a governing body of International Labor office, and her election is regarded here as a remarkable triumph. It came after a struggle which has lasted for several weeks.

ONLY THEMSELVES TO BLAME.
DUBLIN, Nov. 24. Official notice was given today that no more prisoners will be liberated conditionally or unconditionally for hunger striking and that hunger strikers must themselves be responsible for the consequences of their acts. It was also announced that there would be no further amelioration of prison treatment given any prisoners convicted under the defence of the Realm Act. This notice is regarded very seriously in Irish political circles.

BANK CLERKS TO STRIKE.
DUBLIN, Nov. 24. Bank clerks throughout Ireland will strike on December 31st, unless the directors of the Banks consent to reorganize their Union, an action which they have hitherto refused to take. This was decided upon at a conference of the Irish Bank Clerks Union held today. Fifty-six delegates at the meeting voted unanimously in favor of the strike which will affect thirty-seven hundred Bank clerks in Ireland.

ITALY'S NEW FOREIGN MINISTER.
ROME, Nov. 24. Tommaso Tittoni, Italian Foreign Minister, has resigned and Vittorio Scialoja, Minister without portfolio, has been named to succeed him according to the Epoca.

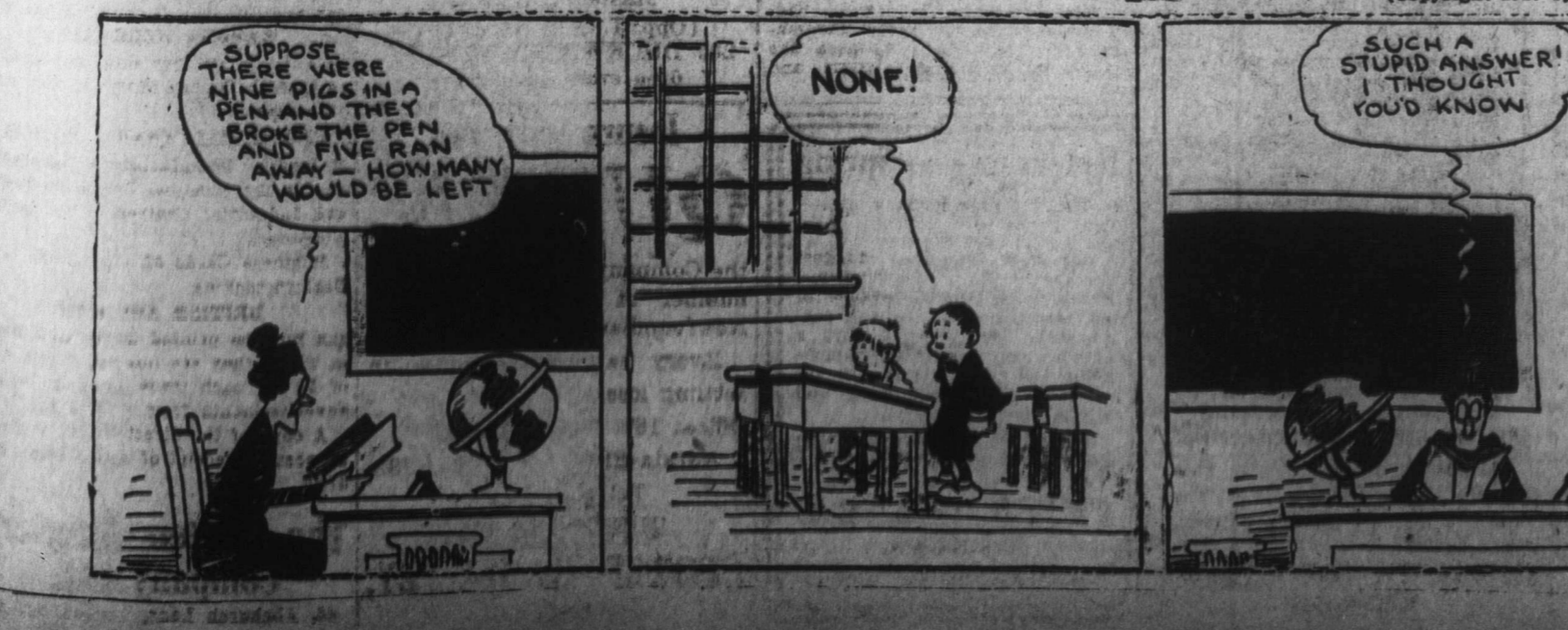

Thrilling Rescue.

S.S. "LEHIGH" SAVES CREW OF
"BIANCA."

(Charleston American.)

After towing the disabled steamer
Wahatukum to Charleston, the Ship-
ping Board steamer Lehigh, Capt.
James Deal, entered Charleston
from Liverpool, having aboard the
shipwrecked crew of the schooner
Blanca which went down at sea.

The Wahatukum herself had a ship-
wrecked crew aboard which she had
picked up. The Lehigh came on the
Wahatukum in an opportune moment.
The vessel was leaking badly, was
short of fuel and provisions, besides
having the ten seamen to care for
which she had picked up from a
foundering barque. The rescue of
the Wahatukum took place northwest
of the Bermudas, three days before
reaching Charleston. As the Lehigh
nearly pelt she flashed a wireless
message to send out provisions for
the vessels, which was done when
the ship arrived off the bar. The
Wahatukum was towed to quarantine
by the tugs Cecilia and Wabun, and
yesterday was under way.

This homeward bound trip of the
Lehigh has been a memorable one
for her young master, Capt. James
Deal, a Charleston boy. Men whom
he rescued declare there are no
words which can adequately express
their gratitude and thanks. A story
that breathes of bravery true to the
best traditions of the sea is told by
Capt. M. Burke, of St. John's, Nfld.,
master of the schr. Bianca, which
foundered at sea shortly after he and
his men had been taken aboard the
Lehigh by Capt. Deal. In speaking
of the rescue, Capt. Burke said:

"The schr. Bianca was bound from
Labrador to Gibraltar with a cargo
of codfish. The second day out we
ran into rough weather and sprang
a-leak. For four or five days we
were in a most deplorable condition.
My men had to stand by the pumps
and work in desperation.

"On the evening of the 31st of Oc-
tober, we saw the lights of a steamer.
We waited till she came abreast of
us and then fired our fare-up dis-
playing the Union Jack pointed
downward. The vessel, which proved
to be the Lehigh, answered our sig-
nal and stood toward us. When in
speaking distance I told Capt. Deal
that we had lost our boat and that my
men were all but exhausted. A boat
was sent out from the Lehigh. This
was about 7 o'clock. By 9 o'clock we
had all been taken aboard the rescue
ship.

"I shall never forget the treatment
accorded us. It is to be expected of
a vessel to render assistance when
the distress signal is given. To be
saved from the sea is one thing, but
to receive such treatment after res-
cue as was shown us is another.
There is no doubt about our being
in a desperate condition, and a few
more hours would have settled it for
all time."

The schooner Bianca was valued at
about \$100,000, according to Captain
Burke. She carried, when she left
Labrador, 10,350 qts. of codfish.

The Lehigh brought a stowaway, an
English woman, reported to be the
wife of a mate on the ship. She was
discovered when the ship was three
days out from Liverpool. Among the
crew was Mr. W. W. Clarke and Mrs.
Florence Clark, who applied for their
discharge upon the arrival of the
vessel in port yesterday.

The steamer Wahatukum was in bal-
last from Rotterdam to Newport
News.

traveller who has recently returned
from a journey through Alaska to the
shores of the Polar Sea, tells an
amusing story concerning an Irish
prospector she met there.

Like many of his countrymen (says
Mrs. Cameron) his ruling passion was
a hatred for everything Scottish. One
day he and his two companions came
across a tribe of Eskimos ruled over

Can We Prolong Life?

our medical correspondent dealt with
the contention of the French scien-
tist who claims, by the introduction of
certain glands into the human body,
to be able to prolong life, and make
old men young again, it is interesting
to recall the discoveries of other
scientists who claim to have found
the elixir of life.

One of the most amazing theories
put forward was that of Metchnikoff,
who recommended those who wanted
to live long to drink sour milk. His
prescription was taken up by thou-
sands, but so far there has been no
great increase in the number of cen-
tenarians as a result of the sour milk
crave.

The famous French physician, Dr.
Browne-Sequard, claimed to have in-
vented an "elixir of life," a serum
which he proposed to inject into the
veins of the aged and the jaded, while
a Swedish doctor spent many years
working on his theory that the secret
of perpetual youth lay in the intro-
duction of a certain serum into the
thyroid gland, or "Adam's Apple,"
which, according to experts, is the one
mainly identified with ageing of the
body.

Extraordinary results are claimed
for the method of treatment invented
some years ago by M. Quinton, of
Paris. He contended that all living
creatures had their origin in the seas,
and that our complex bodies were
simply large collections of cells and
cellular bodies to be found in the seas.

Quinton argued that by injecting a
preparation of sea water into the

and he was sent to the hospital at
the base. Naval surgeons decline to
discuss the case freely, but it is said
that Harley has drunk seven gallons
of milk since last Wednesday. He has
gained several pounds, but he is not
yet regarded as out of danger.

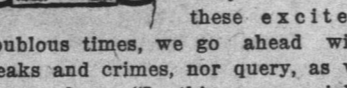

The Senate and the Treaty.

If the failure or refusal of the United States Senate to ratify the Peace Treaty has not killed it entirely, it has at least placed it in abeyance for a considerable period. All compromise efforts to bring about ratification failed, the resolutions all being overwhelmingly defeated. Having done so much toward rendering the Treaty nugatory, the Senators went home to promptly, perhaps, forget all about it. At any rate they will not give it much concern, until next session, when it is not assured that it will not meet a similar fate.

British statesmen are not saying much with regard to the recent action of the Senate in dealing with the Treaty, and it is understood that the reasons for this lack of comment are that it is an entirely American question of domestic politics, and that any expressions from them might give offense and be taken as an attempt to influence United States politics. The newspapers, however, are not quite so circumspect, the Liberal press laying particular stress on the fact that should America not stand by her agreement with regard to the Peace Treaty and the League of Nations, the world will be thrown back once more into "the whirlpool of competitive armaments."

Be that as it may, there are yet some hopes entertained that some compromise of ratification will be accomplished at next session of the Senate, opening on December 1st, and already friends of the Treaty have undertaken to ask that President Wilson ascertain from the other powers interested just what reservations they would be prepared to accept. No matter, in this relation, what may be agreed upon, the whole affair will still be subject to the will of the Senate. The Constitution of the United States requires that any treaty negotiated by the President must be ratified by at least two-thirds of the members of the Senatorial Chamber before it can become effective. From the first it was viewed that in the present instance this was impossible, the Senate being hostile to President Wilson on

personal as well as on political grounds.

Severe criticisms were launched at the President by his opponents from the beginning to the ending of the war by political (Republican) opponents. At the start of hostilities he was denounced, for hanging back and charged with lack of generosity in failing to support Belgium; accused of want of courage in avenging Germany's numerous insults to the American people, and up to the time of America's entry into the arena of war the President's policy was generally disapproved. Even after the United States had "gone in," in 1917, Wilson was attacked because of an alleged lack of preparation, and generally the whole conduct of the American campaign was criticized, the President's opponents making capital out of any material that came to hand. Censure was directed at him when the armistice was concluded, and he was accused of having enabled the Germans, by his personal negotiations, to secure too favorable terms, an interference in a strictly international affair which even his personal friends as well as his political foes severely and caustically condemned.

The Republicans, whose added hostility he went out of his way to seek by his direct appeal to the people in the autumn of 1917, against that party, were not to be placated, and when Wilson returned from Paris, he was under suspicion and had incurred the personal as well as the political ill-will of a majority of the American people. In any case he had a majority against him in the Senate, chosen it maybe and aligned for battle against him, because of his special appeal made to the gallery. This majority was lying in wait for Mr. Wilson with political bludgeons in their hands, and they have not hesitated to use the bludgeon. The Treaty has been put out of the Senatorial arena, if it has not been killed outright. Some of its opponents claim that it is dead, and so far as the present Senate is concerned it is. Whether the action of the Senate in refusing the necessary two-thirds vote will enhance the reputation or increase the prestige of the American Congressional institution, must be left to the world to decide. The Senate submerged the national credit into a personal animosity, and their rejection of the Treaty must necessarily involve their country into many immediate and instant dangers, two of which are damage to American credit, and embarrassment to American foreign trade.

Egg-Collecting Beginning Again.

The work of egg-collecting for the soldiers in the three military hospitals will begin again this week. It will be remembered that for the past two years or so the ladies of the Daughters of Empire have engaged in this patriotic work, and now that they are about to resume the excellent service every available person should endeavor to supply an egg a week for the collectors.

Capt. Burke's Story

Of The Loss of Schr. "Bianca"

The Telegram this morning had the pleasure of a visit from Capt. Mark Burke, master of the ill-fated auxiliary schooner Bianca, the report of whose loss has already been announced in our columns. For further details we are indebted to Captain Burke who has put in the following official statement, written at sea on board the s.s. Lehigh (the rescuing steamer) en route to Charleston, S.C. November 10th, 1919, immediately after the crew were taken from the waterlogged and sinking Bianca.

STATEMENT.

"This is to certify that the motor schooner Bianca, of St. John's, Nfld., 408 tons gross, 313 tons net, left Indian Tickle, Labrador, carrying a crew of nine men (including the master) on the 21st day of October, having on board 10,350 quintals dry codfish, and bound to Gibraltar for orders. (Follows extract from the ship's log, taken from memory, as all papers, etc., were lost.) Experienced fine weather October 21st and 22nd with westerly winds; carrying all sail with engine going; compass course S. by E. and pumps carefully attended to. On Thursday, 23rd October, wind backed from eastward with heavy swells heaving in from South. At 4 p.m. tried pumps, but found no water. Tacked ship under whole sail breeze with engine going. Ship putting bows under and taking some water on deck. At 6 o'clock the engineer reported water over the keelson. Sounded well and found over three feet of water in hold. Stopped engine at once and rigged bilge pump, hand pump and forward engine pump. After all three going together they sucked at 8 o'clock p.m. One hour later the engine running the bilge pump stopped and no further good could be got from it during night. At five o'clock Friday morning, 24th October, the hand pumps were not capable of keeping ship free. On discovering water gaining, called all hands and commenced to jettison cargo. Weather fine all day, with moderate south wind. Latitude at noon 51.30 north; longitude 49.39 west. At 5 p.m. leakage increased, and it was decided to run for the nearest land. Engine was kept going the course taken by compass being N.W. At midnight wind had increased and was blowing steadily from north. At 4 o'clock Saturday morning, a N.N.E. storm forced us to alter course to S.W. and secure hatches. At 6 a.m. we cut through bulkhead and threw more cargo overboard for the purpose of lightening ship, keeping pumps still going. Jettisoned cargo all that day. Sunday, Oct. 26th, sea was moderate. Latitude at noon 47.40 north; longitude 59 west. Pumps continually going. On Monday, Oct. 27th wind was S.W. and ship not making so much water, as the jettisoning of 1200 qtls. of fish had made her more buoyant, and she did not labor so heavily. Our next decision was to make a try for Gibraltar, and on Tuesday with all sail set and engine going, pumps still working, wind then west, we set our course for that objective. Being until morning, lowered sails at 8 o'clock, keeping engine working. On Wednesday, Oct. 28th, a storm of wind blow from S.W. Set close reefed mainsail and mizzen storm sail and hove ship to. Noon heavy sea making, wind having veered into west. Kept pumps going. Midnight, gale

increasing. At 8 o'clock Thursday morning, shipped a mountainous sea which broke the mainboom, tore mainsail to shreds, broke skylight and flooded cabin, taking away engine room companion and filling engine room, putting engines out of commission. This wave smashed life-boats to splinters and carried away the poop rail on both sides. It also, so great was its force, tore open ship's side and the port waterway. Water in engine room stopped bilge pump engine, as well as main engine, consequently crew unable to give time to anything but hand pumps at which they worked like trojans. At noon it was exceedingly stormy and a tremendous sea running which continued all night. Through it all the pumps were kept going, the crew doing wonders under such difficult conditions. At 4 o'clock on the morning of 31st October, wind began to take off, and at 8 o'clock we hoisted the forestaysail and lower mizzen storm-sail and made course to the S.E., wind then being N.W. Latitude at noon 46.40 north; longitude 40.20 west. Ran all that day before wind and sea with only the forestaysail set. At 6 o'clock in the evening saw light of a steamer, bearing by compass S.E., and at 7 o'clock saw the steamship herself bearing by compass S.W. and distant about a mile. Called for assistance by burning a flare-up. In another few minutes, to our great delight we saw both side lights of steamer heading toward us. Learning that our boats had been smashed, a volunteer crew launched one of the steamer's lifeboats and shortly afterwards we had the extreme good fortune to be taken safely on board the good ship Lehigh, Capt. James Deal, bound for Charleston, South Carolina. The captain, officers and crew received us with every mark of good will and succour and bestowed every comfort at their disposal upon us. To our exhausted crew the rescuing ship came like a gift of Providence, and we were scarcely on board ere kind hands directed our exhausted men to the crew's quarters, where they were stripped of their sodden garments and clad in dry underwear, and falling into the berths provided were soon in dreamland, thankful for the timely arrival of the Lehigh and grateful to the manly hearts on board who outried each other in the kindness shown the exhausted men of the Bianca. When the Lehigh's boat came alongside the waterlogged ship, orders were given the crew to bring nothing with them but jump for dear life, and neither captain, mate nor men saved nothing but as we stood. No thanks of ours can convey to Capt. Deal, his officers and men how thoroughly we appreciate the whole-hearted kindness shown us. The traditions of the sea were nobly maintained by the master of the Lehigh and his gallant crew, and on behalf of the Bianca's company, who sign this statement with Captain Deal and his true-hearted sons of the sea all the good luck and prosperity that life can give.

A Splendid Piece of Engineering Work.

The New Big Pond Dam Has Been Completed -- Will Save Enormous Quantity of Water That Formerly Went to Waste

The proof that good engineering work can be accomplished in Newfoundland is afforded in the new dam that has been constructed at Bay Bulls by the engineering staff of the Newfoundland Company. The dam is a splendid piece of engineering work, and it may be said, in purpose of this dam, it may be said, is to save an enormous quantity of water that formerly went to waste, with the result, very often, that when the water was most needed it was not available. The public will remember some few weeks ago, when the street railway had to be closed down. Everybody knew, somewhat vaguely, it must be admitted, that the "shortage of water" had caused this, but few were aware of the actual meaning of that phrase. As it is known throughout the whole city, the electricity required to run the street-railway, as in the case of

water, the biggest of them having always been Big Pond, with 31,000,000 square feet. Second Pond came second with fifteen million; Middle Pond third with eleven million. Cochrane Pond has eight million square feet of water. The big trouble in the past, has been that the extra water resultant from snow-melting, heavy rainfalls and other causes, has flown over the old dams, down to the Forebay, and, because the silt leading to the plant itself was filled to its utmost capacity, from the Forebay down to the sea. Thus it was wasted and when the dry weather came could not be utilized. A shortage of water, so vitally necessary to the creation of electricity, therefore resulted, and a shortage of electricity was the additional result. It is perfectly obvious, from this, that the only thing to do was to construct an additional dam that would preserve the extra water so that it could be used when the dry weather came. There was a dam at Big Pond which saved 270,000,000 cubic feet of water. This dam, which had a depth of water of nine feet, was fourteen feet from the sill of the water-gate. It was always regarded as being the mainstay of the plant at Petty Hr., as it saved most of the extra water that was saved. Even at that the quantity saved was away below the quantity required, and nothing remained but to construct a new and bigger dam that would save the water resultant from melting of snow and heavy rainfalls. Consequently early in June of this year a large gang of men, numbering nearly a hundred, was set to work under the engineering experts of the Company, and their work ended in the past week. In the place of the old dam that stood there, there is now a splendid one that is well worth a visit of inspection from anyone interested in feats of engineering and good workmanship. It is actually six hundred feet in length, and at one place, for a length of two hundred feet, runs to a height of thirty-one feet, whereas the old one was only fourteen. Where the old dam saved nine feet of water, with an area of thirty-two million square feet, or fully 270 million cubic feet, the new one reserves twenty six feet of water with naturally a larger area, and its storage capacity is calculated to be over three times as great. The old dam was three hundred feet in length, while this is twice as long. The first one had two concrete piers at the gate, each running fourteen feet in height. The present one also has two piers, but they run to a height of thirty-one feet, and are thirty-three feet long at the base. They are also five feet wide. Between those piers are the four gates, two those at the bottom and two half way up. The top gates are the first used, the bottom ones being used when the water gets down to where the top gates are of no further service. The bottom ones are last used because the water pressure there is too great to allow of their being opened. The main part of the dam is made of earth fillings, and measures about a hundred and twenty feet in width at its base and ten feet at the top, being the shape of a pyramid. The pond, too, has increased in size, several marshes having become covered with water. This new dam will therefore save all of the enormous quantity of water that has up to now gone to waste and left the plant short in dry weather. The present supply of water is sufficient to generate enough electricity for all present lighting, power and the present street railway system. Should the latter be extended and enlarged, however, as has been contemplated for some time, additional electricity and therefore additional water would be essential and impossible to be done without. If such a contingency arose other water would have to be gotten, as the present plant uses all the water available in this district. In other words, it takes all of the available water of this area to generate the electricity required for present needs. The new dam at Bay Bulls Big Pond now reserves all the extra water possible, and it would be of no use to construct a bigger dam, as the present one is built at the greatest capacity. It is calculated that this reservoir will hold all the water that formerly went to waste; or, in other words, the several reservoirs are capable of holding all the drainage of the Petty Hr. water shed.

Fortunes From Sweets

CHOCOLATES TAKE THE PLACE OF WHISKEY.

Chocolates, so American papers say, are taking the place of the now prohibited whiskey, and fortunes equal to those formerly made in oil or rubber are being made in the manufacture and sale of confectionery.

America always was the country of candy of every description, and even thirty years ago ran France close in the manufacture of the finest and most costly sweets.

The great increase in sweet-eating in the States dates from the time of the Civil War of sixty years ago. In 1850 all the candy made in America was worth no more than half a million pounds; in 1913, the year before the Great War, it had risen to nearly thirteen million pounds, and in this year the output will be greater still.

Figures mean so little. Let us put it in this way: In one day of twenty-four hours Miss America—aided no doubt to some extent by her brothers and sweethearts—consumes twenty-four large truck-loads of sweets of all varieties and flavours. In a year the factories of her country turn out eight thousand railway trucks full.

And this, mind you, is the Government's estimate, but cannot, of course include the very large extra amounts of popcorn, pulled candy and the like which are made in private houses, in boarding schools and the like.

It takes an army of over fifteen thousand people merely to make the drops and lozenges, the sticks and cubes which disappear down America's throat every day in the year, and an even larger number of people are employed in distributing and selling these delicacies.

Trains Without Wheels

A POSSIBILITY OF THE FUTURE.

The time may soon come when we shall all be travelling to and from our work in trains without wheels. This may seem a rather startling prophecy, but the idea is by no means new, and the present troubles of railway transport have forced it to the front as a possible solution of our difficulties.

But how can a train possibly travel without wheels?—one will naturally ask. The answer is quite simple. The reader has doubtless often noticed that when two pieces of wet glass are placed together they slip about and glide over each other with perfect ease.

This is explained by the fact that the two pieces of glass are not really touching each other, but are separated by a thin film of water, on which they glide or float without the least friction. Directly the water is all squeezed out, the pieces of glass stick together and are not easily moved.

This is the underlying principle of the wheel-less train. A French engineer has invented a method of replacing the wheels by means of hydraulic skates or shoes which glide over flat rails, and between the skates and the rails a film of water under pressure is interposed. As the water escapes, it is recovered again by suction, and passes back into the water reservoir.

The train really slides along on a film of water, and magnets are used as a means of propulsion. Since there is no friction in this method, a speed of a hundred miles an hour or more can be obtained without much effort.

Furthermore no brakes are required, for by shutting off the water-supply the train immediately comes to a standstill.

Timber Mines.

Men employed in driving a new gallery in a gold mine at Charlotte Plains, in Victoria, Australia, have made an astonishing discovery. At a depth of 300 feet below ground they have come upon pieces of timber perfectly preserved, which have every appearance of having been sawn and shaped by the hand of man.

This timber lies in the bed of an ancient river now being worked for gold, and the timber is oak. Now, oak has the peculiar property of lasting for centuries when buried in water or wet sand. Oak piles have been taken out from under old wooden bridges, constructed by the Romans, and found as sound as when they were put there, nearly 2,000 years ago.

Oak, known as bog oak, is found buried in Irish peat bogs, and is perfectly black, intensely hard, and very valuable. At present there is an absolute famine in seasoned oak wood, but if we could suppress Bolshevism and open up Russia to trade, that famine would soon be ended. Just before the war it was discovered that the bed of the River Moksha, for a length of over 400 miles, is simply full of magnificent old oak-trees bedded in sand.

The river is shallow and broad, and the oak can easily be raised. As a matter of fact, a company was being formed to work these wonderful deposits when war intervened.

Smaller deposits are found in England. There is a pool in the River Dart, known from time immemorial as Oak Pool, in the eastern of which

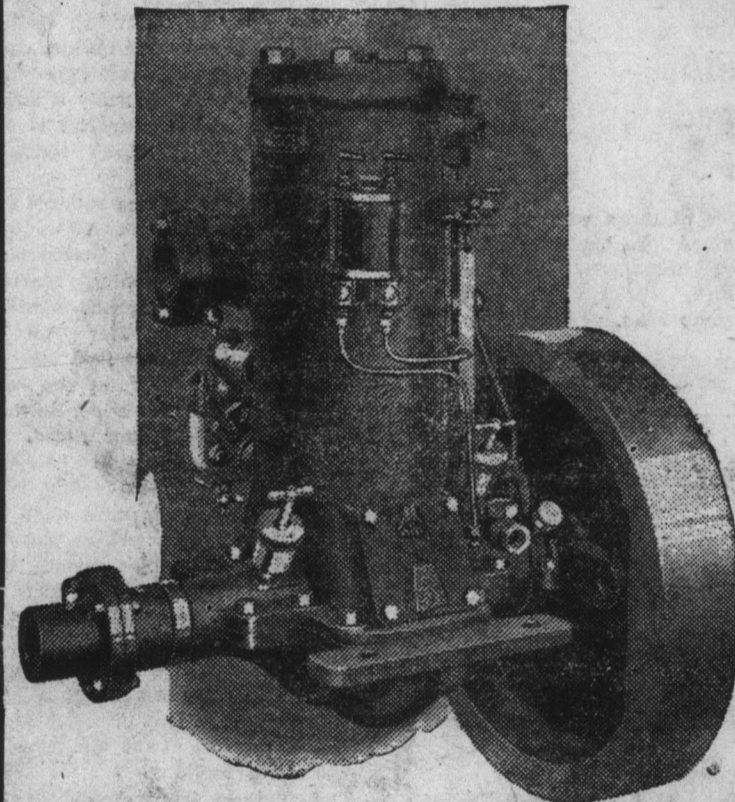

Two Falls Contrasted.

NIAGARA AND THE VICTORIA OF ZAMBESI.

While Niagara Falls will continue to hold their own as a mecca for sightseers and other travelers, they must henceforth submit to competition with another natural wonder, the Victoria Falls of the Zambesi, as the Victoria Falls of the Zambesi, as the Victoria Falls becomes frequented by tourists. Louis Livingstone Seaman describes his visit to Victoria Falls and contrasts them with Niagara, as follows: "Our approach was made by rail from the Indian Ocean at Belra, near the mouth of the Zambesi (that hotbed of micro-organisms, described by James Bryce as the most deadly in the world), and across the narrow belt of swamp and jungle forming the coast; thence up the gradual slope of the volcanic plateau that forms the rest of the continent of Africa.

"By morning an altitude of nearly 6000 feet was reached, and a transition from the excessive heat and moisture of the lowlands was experienced that was most grateful and exhilarating.

"This section still abounds with antelope, elephants, lions and other large game, which feeds excellently on the tall elephant grass or the dense forest of the Zambesi. In the river hippopotami still gambol and boulder in ungainly herds amid the floating islands of rank vegetation and the reeds and papyrus.

"At the altitude, however, came another and less grateful change. The forests were no longer in evidence, but in their stead were vast, level, treeless plains, with parched, stony vegetation, whose anaemic and stunted growth bears witness to the scarcity of moisture that so severely affects Rhodesia and the great stretches of veldt far away to the Transvaal.

"Early in the morning of the third day we were suddenly awakened by the guard and treated by a scene of beauty never to be forgotten. Some ten miles distant five enormous columns of vapor were shooting their smoke-laden shafts hundreds of feet heavenward, while the faint roar of the falls told us the Mosioa-Tunga—the smoke that sounds—was no longer a mystery.

"Each moment increased the beauty and vividness of the scene. With the first rays of the rising sun came a picture of color of wondrous loveliness. Delicate tints of violet, crimson and burnt played through the smoky spray as it shot higher and higher, ultimately disappearing as bright clouds in heaven, while the ever-increasing thunder of the waters lent an added solemnity to the view.

"Hardly could we wait to reach our destination, so great was our enthusiasm. But our hopes were doomed to momentary disappointment, only to be more than realized after a study of the environment; for, notwithstanding their magnitude, the

first view of Victoria Falls is decidedly disappointing.

"Although nearly a mile in width and 400 feet in height, the grandeur of their proportions is eclipsed by the sudden disappearance of the river, as it plunges into a narrow, rocky fissure extending across its entire width. Only at a single central point is there a breach in this fissure through which the falls can be seen and appreciated in their full proportions, where the converging waters rush madly to the narrow canyon below. So restricted is this view that there is an entire absence of that awe-inspiring and almost paralyzing effect which strikes the visitor dumb with wonder and amazement when Niagara bursts on his near vision. On first sight of the Victoria Falls one involuntarily exclaims, 'Oh, how beautiful!' but they lack the majesty of our grand Niagara.

"No single visit can reveal the fullness of their charms, but repeated excursions must be made to their islands and precipices, their grottoes and palm gardens, their rain forests and projecting crags, their rainbows and cataracts and many-sided views of their exquisite setting in the general framework of tropic forests, before their indescribable beauty can be appreciated. The fascination of discovering new and hidden charms from different points of view grows on the visitor and becomes one of the greatest attractions.

"Had the falls been in America, the Indians would have named them Mianchaha, Laughing Waters; for like a coy maiden are their fascinations, half concealing, half betraying their beauties, and requiring much wooing before revealing all their loveliness of hidden treasures and charm."

Items of Interest.

GATHERED FROM EVERYWHERE.

Mrs. Marie Anna Mertens Steinway, of New York, and her son and daughter are named as sole legatees under the will of the late Charles H. Steinway, president of Steinway & Sons, piano manufacturers, sharing between them an estate estimated from five to ten million dollars.

Mrs. George Fraser, Milton of Fin-narey, Aberdeenshire, who has died at the age of 101, leaves a family of six sons and three daughters (all alive except the eldest son), 50 grandchildren, and a large number of great-grandchildren. "Granny" Fraser was a remarkable woman. She could read the newspapers without spectacles, and, during the war, she "did her bit" by knitting socks for soldiers.

That twenty-thousand priests served as officers and privates in the French army during the war and that 3,276 of them had made the supreme sacrifice was one of the points brought out in an address by Rev. Abbe Fournier before the Lafontaine Council of the Knights of Columbus, at Montreal, recently. The Rev. Fournier served in the trenches as a pilot, as an artillery gunner, as a stretcher bearer, and finally as a chaplain.

By her marriage to Lieut-Colonel Hawes in Paris, Millicent Duchess of Sutherland equalled the thrice-wedded record of her immediate predecessor in the title, Mary Duchess of Sutherland. "Mary Duchess" was the duchess who went to prison for contempt of court. She destroyed some documents vital to a suit in which she was concerned. Obituary.

WILLIAM H. DAVIDSON.

There passed away yesterday morning, after a short illness, William H. Davidson in the 76th year of his age. The deceased was a well known figure in the city, his connection with the commercial life thereof, extending over a period of fifty years, and his passing will be felt in business circles for years to come. A Scot of Scots, the late W. H. Davidson was one who was a living exemplification of worth and integrity, a keen student, and to quote from an "In Memoriam" in this morning's News, one "to whom mankind was an open book."

From the same source we take the appended biographical sketch, and beg to offer to the bereaved family that sympathy which friends feel for each other in times of grief and trouble.

William H. Davidson was born at Aberdeen, Scotland, on December 21, 1843. He was educated at the Grammar School there, and subsequently, entered College. At the age of 21 he came to St. John's to the firm of J. & W. Stewart. From 1869 to 1888 he was the buyer for the firm. In 1888 he commenced business as wholesaler and retail family grocer, introducing the marketing of local fruits and preserves. In the nineties he opened business as a Commission Merchant, representing some of the largest and most prosperous Scottish firms. The grounds surrounding his residence, "Bon Accord," he transformed by dint of personal initiative and effort into a marvel of productiveness and beauty. About two years ago he celebrated his golden wedding, and is survived by his partner of two and fifty years, formerly Miss Maggie Scrymgeour, of Greencock, Scotland. With her are left to mourn the loss of husband and father beloved, one son, Mr. Malcolm Davidson, two daughters, Mrs. J. Gunn and Mrs. P. K. McLeod, all of this city, and nine grandchildren. The funeral will take place Wednesday at 3 o'clock.

As baleful as the flood which wrecked that stately town.

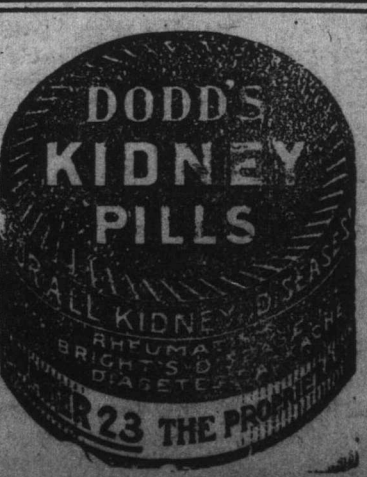

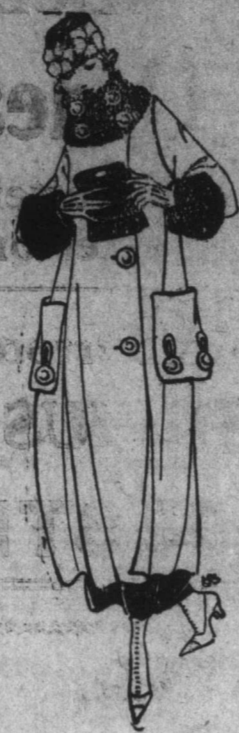

Luckiest Town on Earth

Medicine Hat, the Canadian town where the Prince of Wales recently witnessed a "blow out" of a natural gas well, was styled by Kipling "The town that was born lucky." And the phrase is an apt one, especially in these days, when gas costs twice what it used to, and is strictly rationed into the bargain.

For in the earth beneath Medicine Hat is an immense and apparently inexhaustible reservoir of natural gas, which besides serving as an illuminant, furnishes power for all the manufactories which, since its discovery, have been erected there.

The street lamps are never turned out in Medicine Hat, for the city authorities argue, quite reasonably, that it would be sheer folly to pay a man to turn off and on burners that consume what costs nothing.

Nobody ever dreams of burning coals there; gas fires are universal as a method of heating the houses; gas ovens do all the cooking. And when distinguished visitors come to Medicine Hat the city fathers uncup one of the many reserve wells, and treat them to a sight to be seen nowhere else in the world—a fiery geyser of natural gas extending to the height of the Nelson Column, and which illuminates the whole country for miles round.

Extravagant? Yet But Medicine Hat can afford it. For the wells within the city yield nine million feet of gas of gas every twenty-four hours.

The Making of Mayors.

QUAINT OLD CUSTOMS STILL IN VOGUE.

Each November sees several hundred new mayors come into office, and in many towns the old customs which attended their election will be revived this year.

The new mayor of Hanley, for instance, will drink champagne from a glass a yard long, and so will his councillors. In ruder days anyone falling to finish his draught had the heel taps poured down his shirt-front by two stalwart cup-bearers.

The Mayor of Wycombe will be weighed, while the Mayor of Cork will cast a dart into the water of the harbour as a sign of the corporation's sovereignty over its waters. Limerick's Mayor will receive a ton of coal from the colliers who use that port.

The Mayor of Cardiff must present a marriage dowry to a domestic servant, one who has been at least eight years in the same place, and who bears a good character. The money is the interest of a gift of £1,000 from a former Marquis of Bute, and amounts to about £20. The Mayor on this occasion must deliver a short sermon or discourse on the solemnity of matrimony.

That is not so bad as having to sing the "Old Hundredth," which is the lot of the Mayor of St. Ives, in Cornwall. Not to every Mayor fall this task; for the particular ceremonial which involves it, the procession to the Knill steeps, occurs only once in five years.

The Mayor of Ripon has a horn blown outside his mayoral residence at nine at night. This happens every evening, and must become monotonous before his year of office is over.

The quaintest of all mayoral customs is now extinct. In the ancient borough of Leicester the candidates for office sat in a circle, each with his hat full of beans on his lap. Then an old sow was introduced into the circle, and he was elected mayor from whose hat the animal first ate.
