Warfare in Dublin Rages Around Four Courts.

Republicans Fighting Behind Barricades-- Numerous Fires in Irish Capital-- Attackers Capture Three Parts of Stronghold.

FIGHTING IS SEVERE.

LONDON, June 30. A despatch to the Times from Dublin 2.30 o'clock this morning says the Free Staters attacking Four Courts are commanded and being personally led by Brigadier General Daly. After a brisk artillery and machine gun fire, General Daly led his men from the south side of the Liffey, across Grafton St. and bridge. Gun fire had broken down the gate and so briskly did the Free State soldiers make their ascent they did not suffer any serious casualties. As they crossed the courtyard rifle bullets and arms brought down the inner doors and as they fell the defenders poured a withering fire upon the attacking forces. Two rebel soldiers were killed outright by gun fire and ten others wounded in the hand-to-hand fighting which followed. Twenty-two Irregulars threw up their hands and surrendered, while Rory O'Connor, with Brigadier General Trayner and 150 men retreated to the far corner of the Court. Quickly throwing up a barricade they are now holding the Free Staters at bay. The despatch to the Times adds that O'Connor had been given an opportunity to surrender but declared his intentions to fight to the death. The Free Staters captured a great quantity of rifles, machine guns, and explosives. It is thought that by some secret means, many of the original garrison have made their way into the city where they have seized Hamman's Hotel in Sackville Street, turning out the guests on five minutes notice.

and the Irregulars will be confined to Dublin, there are encouraging indications that the country districts may escape with comparatively light disturbance. The correspondent declares that there is no sign whatever that the besieged in Four Courts have any intention of surrendering and adds, "The besiegers' fire has been concentrated mainly on the western wing and at 2 o'clock this morning the top floor of this wing was shot away for fifty feet. The rest of the building is also beginning to show traces of the constant firing but the damage at present is superficial."

FIRES REPORTED IN DUBLIN.

LONDON, June 29. A late edition of the Times contains a report of the pilot of an aeroplane the newspaper sent to Dublin yesterday, where it arrived at five p.m. The pilot says smoke was drifting from ten to fifteen miles to sea from fires burning in the city, but that he could see little but empty streets and courts barricaded with sandbags. "Dublin was still burning though how extensively I cannot pretend to measure," he said.

A FURTHER REPORT.

LONDON, June 29. Free State troops rushed Four Courts at a late hour capturing three parts of the building according to a Dublin despatch to the Times. The operation was put through without severe firing.

MAIN FLOORS CAPTURED.

LONDON, June 29. Two main parts of Four Courts, Dublin, have been captured by the Provisional Government forces, according to a despatch to the Central News. Commandant Barry and 22 men were taken prisoners. Rory O'Connor and Liam Mellows in the smaller building have been summoned to surrender.

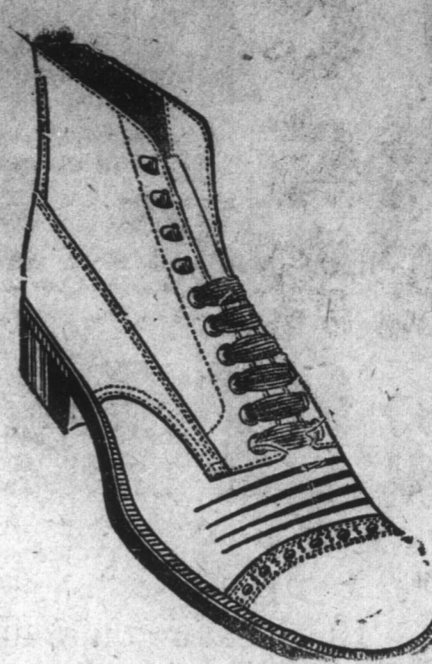

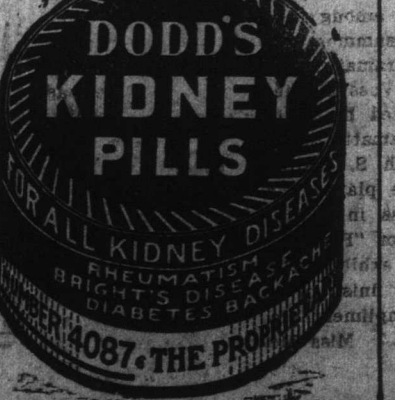

When Shall Their Glory Fade?

To-morrow, July 1st, is the sixth anniversary of the Battle of Beaumont Hamel, that fatal engagement in which the pride of Newfoundland spent their efforts in attempting to accomplish more than demi gods could have accomplished, and in their doings so were mown down by German machine gun and rifle fire, yet gamely persevering had all but reached their objective spite of the intensive and terrific storm of bullets from the enemy lines, when they found to their bitter disappointment that the task essayed was impossible. They had done all they could, all that was humanly possible, and withstood the tornadoes of shot and shell hurled upon them, yet they never for a moment quailed, never hesitated to carry out orders, and in their failure scored the greatest of successes, by proving their gallantry and demonstrating, not only to the British army, but to the world; that Newfoundlanders were worthy the tribute paid them by their Brigadier, after the action, "Better than the best." So in commemorating their heroism to-morrow let us all join for a moment in silent prayer for those who endeavoured to conquer odds that were too great for them, but whose sublime courage teach an object lesson to all who come after. These failed not in the hour of trial, and for this the admiration and praise of an Empire will never die or fade. Beaumont Hamel—the name is indelibly imprinted on our memories. Never, so long as Newfoundland remains the gem of the ocean, will July 1st, 1916 be forgotten. Heroes all, the men of the battalion of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, who went into action on that fated morn, were as steady as if on parade, and went "into the jaws of death, into the mouth of hell" as coolly and calmly as though they had formed up for inspection. "We shall remember them." These four words are eloquent. They need no amplification. Those who died, cut off in the prime of manhood gave freely, made the supreme sacrifice willingly. With bowed heads, for the anniversary of their death is no day of rejoicing, but rather of solemn commemoration, let all do honor to the men who fought and died for God, for King, for Country and for the freedom of the world. The following verses from the pen of P. E. Goldsmith which were published in the London Times of August 28th, 1917, contain sentiments to which we all can subscribe, and which are fittingly appropriate to the day, which Newfoundland for all time will honor, and revere in memory of her heroic sons—

Washed by a sea of English grey,
And they named it Newfoundland at sight;
It's rather the Land of Heart's De-light.

Now after close five hundred years
You give us back with fearless eyes,
Dimm'd with glory but not with tears
The greatest gift that a land can prize.

You give back all that there is to give
The young who die so the Land may live,
Nor will it otherwise.
Die? They are weary, God gave them rest.

Fall? They are raised for evermore!
Whether on Beaumont Hamel's crest
Or "Caribou Hill" by the Turkish shore,
Never their glory can fade or fall
Who have won the greatest Cross of all,
Nor e'er their country dies!

Ah! Men must know you to understand,
Have seen the cliffs of your rugged land,
Have seen the mist come rolling down
The hills that guard the glistening bay.

Have seen the schooners creeping in,
And smell the homely smell within
The fishing port asleep,
And in the rivers flowing free
Through the spruce woods to the sea
Have known the pools at break of day.

Where silver-coated salmon play,
And seen the tangled river's brink,
Where caribou come down to drink,
And beavers build and creep.

All this is shared with those who fell,
It is the Land they loved so well.
For many a soldier lying low
In some French village-battle glow,
Sees before his blood is spent

Regatta Deadlock.

The Boat Clubs' Extraordinary Demands Precipitate Heated Discussion—Committee Adjourns Indefinitely.

Unless boats can be obtained elsewhere than from the C.L.B.C. Old Comrades and C. C. C. Boat Clubs, it is unlikely that the Regatta will be held this year.
After a heated discussion at their meeting last night of the extraordinary demands made by the Boat Clubs with respect to sweepstakes, the Regatta Committee adjourned indefinitely.
The Telegram learns to-day that Mr. J. L. Noonan, the veteran secretary, Mr. F. W. Hayward and other prominent members of the Committee have expressed their dissatisfaction with the situation by tendering their resignations.

THE RESOLUTIONS.

The resolutions which are the cause of the deadlock, now existing, are as follows:—

At the joint meeting of the C.L.B.C. O.C. BOAT CLUB and the C.C.C. BOAT CLUB held this date the following resolutions were passed:—

RESOLVED—That in the opinion of the C.L.B.C.O.C. and C.C.C. Boat Clubs that in view of a Society sweepstake now selling in the city and other clubs and societies contemplating sweepstakes on the Regatta that we cannot see our way clear to compete against these Clubs and Societies.

FURTHER RESOLVED—That in view of this fact we the C.L.B.C.O.C. and C.C.C. Boat Clubs jointly decide to take no part in the 1922 Regatta unless these clubs and societies withdraw their sweepstakes.

AN AWKWARD POSITION.

These resolutions were read by President Hiscock who then expressed the surprise that their receipt had

caused him. He had received a promise from Judge Morris that only the two Boat Clubs would be permitted to have wheels of fortune on the race course. He had reported this to the Committee and complete satisfaction had apparently been felt. Until Monday last, he had not been aware that sweepstakes had been issued by certain fraternal organizations. The Regatta Committee, through the action of the Boat Clubs, was placed in an awkward position. The public was greatly surprised and disappointed, and objected to such concessions to the Boat Clubs.

OUTSIDE THEIR CONTROL.

Mr. W. J. Higgins, K.C., M.H.A., President of the Committee, explained the exact situation. There would be no Regatta if the Boat Clubs failed to take part. He could not see what the Regatta Committee had got to do with the matter. They had assisted the Boat Clubs to the limit of their jurisdiction, by obtaining for them the use of the green for wheels of fortune. So far as sweepstakes were concerned, it was a matter over which the Committee had no control. The solution lay with the public, who, if in sympathy with the Boat Clubs, would buy only their sweepstakes. It was up to the people to make it valueless for other organizations to have sweepstakes. The Regatta Committee was asked to do something entirely beyond their province. Mr. J. P. Crotty agreed with Mr. Higgins. He thought it necessary to find out if the boats would be placed on the pond. If the Boat Clubs had a grievance, it was certainly not with the Regatta Committee.

A WRONG IMPRESSION.

Several members of the Boat Clubs present, declared that they had been given the impression that the wheel of fortune concession included sweepstakes. Mr. Crotty explained that what had actually been said was that it was unlikely outside organizations would issue sweepstakes when the Boat Clubs had the wheel of fortune concessions. Hon. F. MacNamara suggested that the outside organizations which have sweepstakes should be asked to withdraw them.

Mr. Wight of the C.L.B.C.O.C. Boat Club said there was no grievance with the Regatta Committee. He said his club was in a bad condition financially. If they consented to place their boats on the pond would the Committee guarantee their losses, if any, on sweepstakes. Mr. J. L. Noonan expressed his indignation at this extraordinary request. The whole affair was ridiculous. It was most unparliamentary and he was disgusted with it.

SHOULD PROTECT CLUBS.

Mr. F. F. Collins, President of the C.C.C. Boat Club, said it was up to the Committee to protect the Boat Clubs. Mr. J. Meehan complained of the fact that while the Boat Clubs wanted assistance, they would give no information. Some further discussion took place and the information was learned that the Boat Clubs objected to sweeps altogether, but in particular to a certain one which was on the market and which they said, competed unfairly with them. President Collins said it was up to the Club to protect the Boat Clubs. Mr. Meehan said they were not going to go deeper into the hole and might just as well give up this year as next year.

Mr. Meehan—"Will you rent your boats?"

The answer from the Boat Club representatives was a decided negative. They also refused to loan them to the Committee. Asked if they would sell, Mr. Collins said they might, and went further by stating that they were not out for making money and they had been unfairly treated by members of the Committee.

Mr. Higgins pointed out that they were arguing in a circle.

Mr. Ruby suggested that the Boat Clubs should be requested to meet again to further consider the matter. The meeting adjourned indefinitely with the proviso that if the Boat Clubs desired to further discuss the situation, the Committee would be called together to hear their new propositions.

MORE RESOLUTIONS.

A meeting of the Boat Clubs was afterwards held and the following resolutions were drawn up. These do not improve upon the situation, as it is very improbable that outside organizations will withdraw their sweeps, nor is it likely that the Boat Clubs will be financed.

LAWRENCE PARKER.

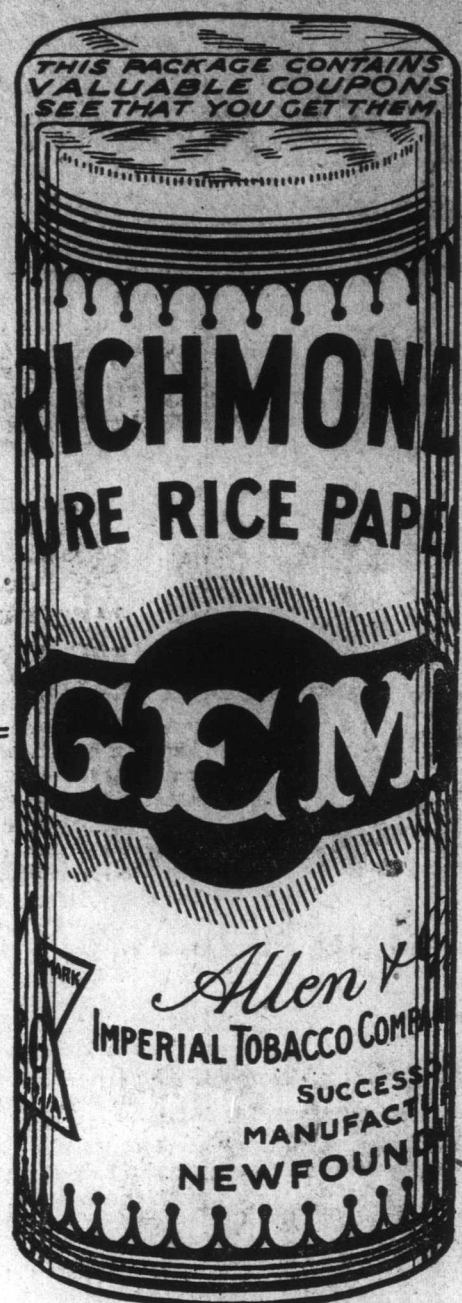

Household Notes.

Broken glass should be wiped up with a wet wool rag, which can be wrapped in paper and thrown away.
When preparing cucumbers for eating, raw, peel and serve soon after cutting. Do not soak them in water.
If the dogs upset your garbage can, fasten a hook in a post in the back yard and hang it out of their reach.
Green peas and carrots are delicious served with spaghetti, to which a little grated cheese has been added.
A little shaving cream will make the wringer turn more easily, and will not drip and put dark spots on the clothes.
To test cantaloupes for ripeness, press the end firmly with fingers, and if it yields easily the melon is usually ripe.
Small pieces of melon pulp are excellent marinated in French dressing and served on crisp salad. Serve very cold.
If water is left on vegetables after they are cooked, they will become soggy and unpalatable. Drain them immediately.
An excellent lap-board to use when mending undergarments is a magazine. It can be curved and adjusted at will.
If you have to handle butter, first rinse your hands in hot water, and then chill them. The butter will not stick to hands.
If mayonaisse curdles, put a drop of ice-cold water in a very cold bowl and beat the mixture slowly into it, little by little.

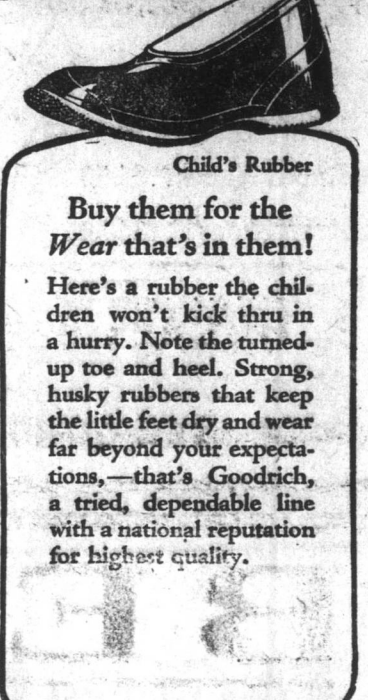

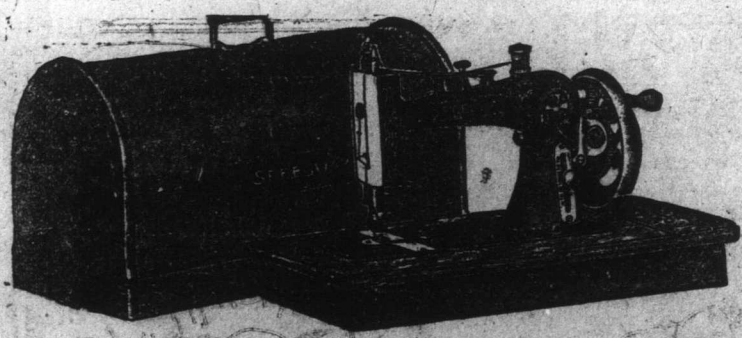

A Notable Anniversary

The four hundredth anniversary of the introduction of printing into England by William Caxton—the first English printer—was celebrated at South Kensington Museum, on Saturday, June 13th, 1877, by the opening of a loan collection of articles, appliances, and machinery connected with printing. At the banquet, which followed, upwards of four hundred guests were present, including the Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone, presiding, the Emperor of Brazil, the Archbishop of York, Sir Charles Reed, etc. Mr. Gladstone in proposing the memory of William Caxton, the first English Printer, after giving an eloquent description of Caxton's career proceeded to say: "I hold in my hand, a volume to which I beg everyone to direct his eye, because I think it may be called the climax and consummation of the printing art. Since the clock struck twelve last night the people at the

University Press, Oxford, have printed and sent us this Bible—they have sent several copies, one of which will be presented to the Emperor of Brazil. The Bible held up by Mr. Gladstone, was printed at Oxford, bound in London and delivered in South Kensington Exhibition Buildings literally within twelve consecutive hours. The event was quite the sensation of the day, and copies of this "Caxton Bible" as it was called, are scarce, if not unobtainable.

St. John's Municipal Council. PUBLIC NOTICE.

The attention of the Public is called to the Sections of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1921, regarding the keeping of Dogs within the City Limits, and within one mile thereof.
 Section 197—The owner of every dog or bitch kept within the city limits or within one mile thereof in any direction, which is six months old or upwards, shall register such dog or bitch at the City Hall on or before the first day of July of each year, and shall pay to the City Clerk such fees as the Council may determine, for the uses of the city.
 Section 198—The City Clerk shall supply such registered owner with a metal tag for each dog or bitch registered, with the number of registration stamped thereon, and the owner of every registered dog or bitch shall keep on such a dog or bitch a collar with the tag attached thereto.
 Section 199—No owner shall allow any dog to bitch to run at large in the City unaccompanied by some person in charge thereof, the owner shall see that the same is securely housed between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.
 Section 200—The owner of dog or bitch who contravenes or fails to comply with the foregoing sections shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding five dollars.

Municipal Council
WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Outerbridge, Vincombe, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

The minutes of last meeting being confirmed, the following matters were given attention.

LT.-Col. (Rev.) T. Nangle, who was present, discussed with the Council the site on which the Memorial is to be erected, to commemorate those of the Newfoundland Regiment who fell in the Great War. The site referred to is the Custom House Hill (the Beach), which has been decided upon by the Memorial Committee as being the most suitable place. The beautifying of the surroundings, etc., was discussed, and will be given consideration at a later date. The gentleman intimated that he would, at an early date, submit plans and other details in connection with the Memorial to the Council, for approval. The Board informed him they were only too willing to assist him in any possible way.

Messrs. Gibbs and Barron, on behalf of Fitzpatrick, asked whether it is the intention of the Council to proceed with the opening up of the new road, connecting Prince of Wales Street and Franklin Avenue with Pennington Road, which matter they stated was decided upon by the late Council. It was ordered that the plans and all previous records be looked up, and tabled at next meeting, so that the fullest consideration may be given same.

The Secretary of the T.P.U. complained of the condition of Water Street. Repairs to portions for which the Council are responsible will likely be undertaken on Monday next, while the Street Railway Company are to be notified to have the portions for which they are liable also repaired.

Mr. P. H. Hudson called the attention of the Board to a fence recently

erected at the junction of Pennington Road and Prince of Wales St., stating that if same was allowed to remain the street would be considerably narrowed. The Engineer stated the fence was only temporary, while the erection of a dwelling was proceeded with.

Application of Susa Shipping Co., for installation of hydrant on their wharf, was granted. They undertake to pay all expenses incurred in this connection.

Mr. F. McKay asked that sewer be extended, Alexander St. The Engineer is to submit estimate of cost for next meeting.

Mr. Walter Lawlor, on behalf of Central Cabmen, called attention to the necessity of installing sanitary arrangements at this stand. The Engineer will report on this matter.

Application of Mr. McNamara, to lay concrete platform in front of premises, Queen St., was granted.

Colin Campbell, Ltd., submitted price for "Tarvia" road oil, and it was decided that order be placed immediately for a supply. In this connection it may be mentioned the Council have decided that level streets only will be treated with "Tarvia." This, no doubt, will meet the wishes of the many horse owners who protested against its further use.

The Ntd. Board of Trade forwarded report of the sub-committee appointed to consider the supply of light and power to the city. The report embodied many suggestions as to the inspection of poles, wiring, etc. The Council will give this very important matter their best consideration at an early date.

The contract for the construction of concrete cover for Conduit at Windsor Lake was awarded Mr. Wm. Edney.

The Secretary of the Ntd. Road Commission forwarded communication in reference to Motor Car Taxes. The City Clerk informed the Board that, up to date, 452 cars have been registered and \$96,470.00 license fees issued. With very few exceptions, the cars registered are owned by citizens. ply to various districts throughout the Island, the owners residing in such districts should be compelled to pay their motor taxes, as well as residents of the city. Many people are of opinion that for every car registered the Council gets half the fees. Such is not the case. The city of St. John's can only retain for its purposes an amount defined by the Act. The balance, which is very much more than that received by the city, is expended on roads in outlying districts.

During the past week, Foreman Power, of the Sewerage Department and his men have been engaged in cleaning out the trunk sewer. This work was very trying, and could only be performed while all traffic was suspended. On the recommendation of the City Engineer, several manholes will be constructed on the line of the trunk sewer, to insure proper ventilation.

Permit will be issued Mr. G. S. Doyle to erect sign board on vacant property, Water St. West.

Messrs. Marshall's Garage informed the Board of their intention to inaugurate a passenger service between Water Street and the Higher Levels, and for this purpose, they recently imported a new passenger truck. They extended an invitation to the Mayor and Councillors to make a preliminary trip over the proposed route. This will be done during next week.

The dust problem was the subject of a lengthy discussion. The Council, with the limited apparatus at their disposal, are doing all possible to remedy the annoyance. The inconvenience caused by the destruction of the Motor Sprinklers is to be regretted, and the matter of adjustment had not, as yet, been finalized by the adjusters. Every effort is being made, however, to arrive at a satisfactory settlement, and it is hoped to have the service resumed in a few days.

The following matters were referred to the City Engineer, for investigation:

(1) Retaining wall, rear of Gowet Street.
(2) application of Semi-Ready Clothing Co., to install motor on their premises, Water Street; (3) Request of Wm. L. Gosse, for permission to make alterations to buildings, Plymouth Road.
Council employees are, at present, engaged in making improvements at the corner of Monkstown and Cedar Roads, so as to relieve the danger of collision at this point.

The Model School.

EXHIBITION OF PUPILS' WORK. An exhibition of work done by pupils of the Model School was held yesterday and was visited by many parents and friends of the school, including members of the Diocesan Synod. The work exhibited is in all cases excellent and reflects great credit on both teachers and pupils. It consists chiefly of writing, crayon and paint work. There are also samples of wood work done by the boys of the school, who receive their training at Bishop Field College Manual Training Department. The crayon work is quite good, especially when the youthfulness of the pupils is taken into consideration. The Model School was organized some six years ago and takes pupils from the Kindergarten to the preliminary grade. There are at present 360 pupils—boys and girls—on the roll. The headmistress is Miss Purchase and she has an efficient staff consisting of eight assistant teachers. The school is at present situated in the Synod Building, but this does not provide sufficient space for the large number of pupils attending.

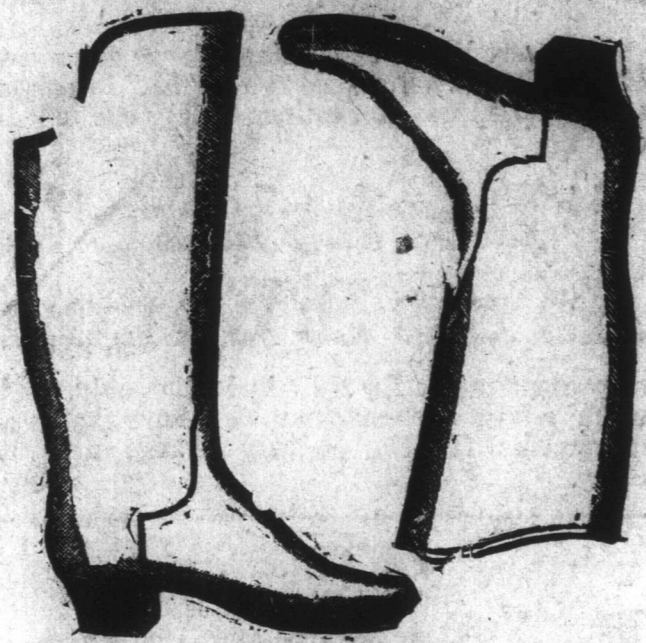

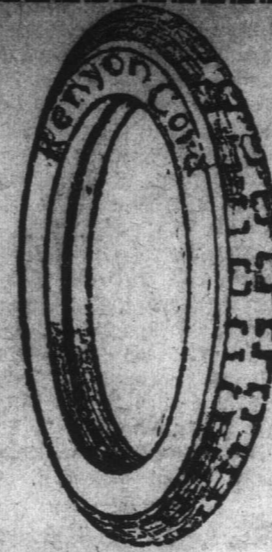

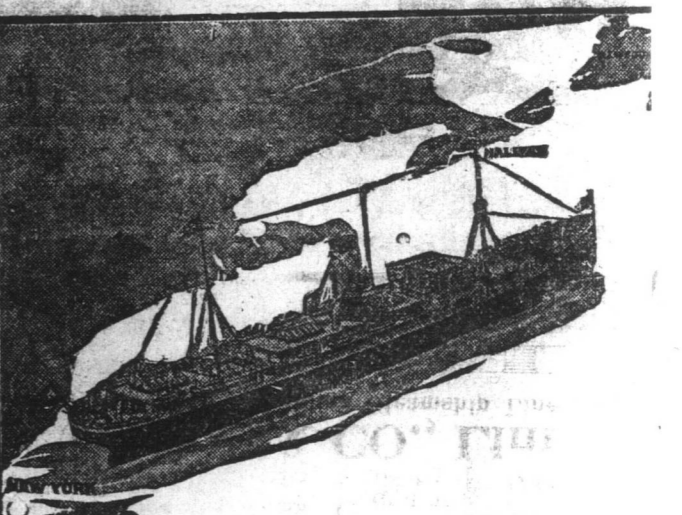
