lakes, said: "We in Michigan feel that we are vitally affected. We feel that the lakes are part of our property. The waters are ours, in trust, and it is our duty to keep them up for the future." "The Government has improved those lakes," suggested Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, who

was presiding. "But the lakes are mine-and Canada's," persisted Mr. Dougherty. "You will not get much net advantage to national commerce if you help one artery by injuring another."

"More than 80 per cent. of our iron trade goes over the lakes at a cost of one mill per ton mile. Witnesses have told you they could increase the cargoes of ships by as much as 25 per cent. if adequate water is maintained. Such an increase would be reflected materially in the production cost of American iron and steel which is so important a barometer in the competition in foreign markets."




