The following letter on rats is taken rom the columns of the Daily Mail: Sir.-Commander Kenworthy's article on the cost of the damage done by rats is a timely warning in view of the approach of this year's national rat week, which is arranged for the week commencing November 2. As in former years, local authorities and the general public throughout the country will be urged to take concerted action against these destructive and dangerous pests.

While statements of the total damage done by rats are of necessity only approximations, there is no doubt that it amounts to a very large sum in the aggregate, and the figure mentioned, £70,000,000, is by no means an exaggeration. It must be remembered that civ-




