EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Chairs for Damages—The Observatory—Mr. James Laut.

All the members of the committee were present at yesterday's meeting. A petition was received from the superintendent and deputy superintendent of the Toronto observatory, asking for a grant of \$800 to the observatory, for the purpose of purchasing a new instrument.

My Boyes was asking for employment. The application was filed. It was decided to pay William Flanagan \$438 for damage to cab.

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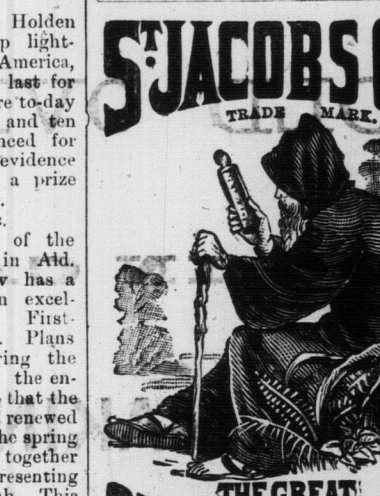
