UNITED STATES CONSUL REPORTS TO WASHINGTON.

The People Who are Coming to America -Poor-Law Guardians Driving Out the

WASHINGTON, May 8. - Pauper immigraon from Ireland has for months been nder consideration at the state department. A number of reports relating thereto have been received. Consul-General Merritt of London gives the result of an investigation made at his request in March by the U. S. consul in Ireland.

Merritt says the Irish distress means increasing immigration to the United States, and wholesale emigration, aided by the government is looked upon in many quasters as the only relief from the periodical recurrence of famine. Measures are now afoot to send thousands of poor families from the congested districts across the Atlantic.

Merritt says in the poorer agricultural dis-tricte the situation of the peasantry is miser-able, and the abject poverty is but as sad as it has been for years, and has become the normal condition of life.

Consul Hyst of Cork says: "While I am inclined to believe the destitution and

am inclined to believe the destitution and distress of the western and southern Ireland are great enough and worthy of the assistare great enough and worthy of the assistance that our people are always disposed to give, there's room to doubt whether the picture as shown the outside world is not exaggerated. The boards of guardians and popular bodies are in a measure responsible for this exaggeration, as they, in their anxiety to have the poor rates relieved by the opening of relief works by the government, have made efforts to utilize the distress. It may be safely assumed that starvation point has not been reached, however bad the situation may be, and that however bad the situation may be, and that the local and government authorities have abundant means to relieve actual neces-

The prospects of the amelioration of the present condition in the immediate future are most discouraging. It is altogether unlikely that the government will shortly commence public works in order to give employment to the people, as the policy settled upon is relief by workhouse, or migration.

As to whether the government guardians of the poor or assistants are sending paupers to the United States, some diversity of opinion exists. Consul Burrows, Dublin, says there is no such practice in his district. Consul Wood. the emigration was 89,000, an increase of

says there is no such ce in his district. Consul Wood, Belfast, knows of no organized effort for a large deportation of sufferers or paupers to the United States. No doubt, he says, many will find their way there by the aid of friends and often in a measure by charitable funds. Consul Livermore, Londonderry, understands the government agents with no great success are endeavoring to induce the poor and lazy to emigrate. Eccles, at Sligo, says the poor law guardians scheduled out certain districts under the emigration clauses of the land acts, and in the Sligo union 600 applications have been made and in the western unions considerably more. The bulk of these im-migrants will go to the United States. They pound to each on his arrival. The guardians desire to emigrate those likely to be in a state of chronic poverty at home.

We are informed by some but notoso far as evidence appears, by any person fully authorized to speak for the class said to be aggrieved, that gross wrong is perpetrated by withholding from females the power of participating in elections. A very few societies in Canada, societies which, so far as the public are aware, have not promulgated any new and excellent code of ethics, or even any remarkably practical suggestions for the improvement of the ancient and understood systems, suddenly appear, hold a few meetings, achieve a few addresses not abounding in brilliance and less abounding in proof, and give the world at large to understand, as well as considerable vagueness of expression can allow it. that in the name of universal womanhood they demand that women shall possess universal suffrage.

Permit me to express an opinion that, if women had considered themselves remarkably aggrieved by the existing state of affairs, which so far as they are concerned is a very old state indeed, they would, a considerable period back, have discovered some decided way of expressing their discontent without waiting the assistance of the present well-meaning, respectable, but perhaps mistaken mouthpieces.

If it were expedient to do what should not be done to prove that it should not be done. and to give women, en masse, an opportunity of stating their minds by plebiscite David Dudley Field, President Barnard, of general opinion, can suppose but that an overwhelming majority would declare their belief that the ballot box and the polling booth were matters beyond their sphere.
