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

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

Then he screwed a plate into the top rail of the stern of the boat and attached the larger end of the tube to it. Next he fastened an electric motor of the top of his tube, and connected it by two small wires to a storage battery, which he placed in the centre of the boat. Then he dropped the pro-peller wheel into the water, and touchpener wheel into the water, and touched a spring, and away the boat sped.
A small wooden handle projecting from the end of the tube was used to steer with. For two hours Mr. Wright rode about the lake, backing the boat, or slowing its speed, or turning in its length at will.


