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



toes From the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, 1907-8. By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution is being made this season of samples of superior sorts of grain and potatoes to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock for

distribution has been secured mainly from the Experimental Farms at Indian Head, Sask., and Brandon, Man. The samples consists of oats, spring wheat, barley, In-dian corn (tor ensilage only) and potatoes. The quantity of oats sent is 4 lbs., and of wheat or barley 5 lbs., sufficient in each case to sow one-twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn and potatoes weigh 3 lbs. each. A quantity of each of the fol-lowing varieties has been secured for this distribution :-OATS.-Banner, Wide-Awake, White Giant, Danieh Island, Thousand Dollar, Improved Ligowo, all white varieties. Black oats are not recommended for gener-al cultivation, a few samples, however, are available which can be sent if specially asked for. listribution has been secured mainly from

asked for. WHEAT .- Red Fife (beardless) ; Preston.

Pringle's Champlain and Huron (early bearded sorts); Percy and Stanley (early beardless varieties).

BARLEY.-~SIX-rowed.—Mensury, Odessa, Mansfield and Claude. Two-rowed.—Stand-well, Invincible, Canadian Thorpe and Sid-

DINDIAN CORN (tor ensilage). - Early sorts. Angel of Midnight, Compton's Early and Longfellow ; later varieties, Selected Lea-ming, Early Mastodon and White Cap Yellow Dent.

POTATOES. - Early varieties, Early Whi Prize and Rochester Bore. Medium late varieties, Carman No. 1 and Late Pur tan. These later tarteties are as a rule more productive than the earlier kinds.

Only one sample can be earner whose. plicant, hence it an individual receives a sample of cats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley, Indian corn or potatoes. Lists of names from one individual, or application for more than one sample for one household, cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Fa.ms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time before the 15th of February, after which the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Ap-plicants should mention the variety they prefer, with a second sort as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order in which they are received, so long as the which they are received, so long as the supply of seed lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappoint-ment. Those applying for Indian Corn or potatoes should bear in mind that the corn is not usually distributed until April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed from here until danger from trost in transit is over. No postage is required on mail matter ad-dressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

A recent arrival from the West reporta

an alarming increase in the number of patients in the insane asylums in Mani-In the Brandon asylum alone it is stated that there are over seven hundred patients. Many of these are from the ranks of recently arrived immigrants, the lonesome life on the prairies, and the absence of the surroundings to which they were accustomed is said to produce such a depressing effect that it unbalances their minds. This particularly applies to the women.

Rambow reports from the West are not borne out by recent arrivals, from that section. Money is tight enough in Ontario, but a crow bar is required to turn over a dollar in many parts of the West. Lack of transportation for the grain crop and ready money to pay for the same is the cause of general complaint. Merchants are shortening up their credits and order from the wholesales as they receive remittances from customers. The banks are extremely cautious, and make only small advances on gilt-edged securities. The real estate boom has received a solar plexus blow that will take some time to recover from, and the labor market is flooded. Take it all around Ontario is as favorably situated as any country under the dome, and when we compare conditions here as they exist elsewhere there s little ground for complaint.

The Dignity of the Courts.

Since his accession to the Bench, Mr. Justice Riddell has distinguished himself by his evident determination to uphold to the full the dignity which doth hedge the British judiciary. It was he who in isted upon being preceded on his every entrance into the court room, by the sheriff wearing his sword and his cocked hat. He has several times reprimanded barristers for addressing remarks to the court without rising from their chairs. One of his ebuilitions was the announcement of his intention to preserve the purity of the well of English undefiled, by discouraging the use of slang in his court, overlooking the fact that the slang of one generation is the accepted idiom of the next. A few weeks ago he rebuked a witness for using the phrase, "throw down." Meanwhile, the lawyers around the courts are chuckling maliciously over the fact that the learned justice himself referred to one of the parties in a case before him as an "easy mark."

GOVERNMENT CREAMERIES. The Province Controls the Majority of Them in Alberta.

Edmonton, Nov. 28.—The Alberta Gov-ernment has now secured the control of the manufacture and sale of butter in over half of Alberta. They refuse to sell this butter to consumers, and will only sell it to retailers who order a regular supply all the year around. This rule is adhered to in spite of the fact that a supply of butter cannot be produced in the Province sufficient for home con-sumption. A large portion of the butter sold by the Government is shipped out of the Province to points in British. Columbia, Yukon Territory and even to China and Japan. There are 20 or 22 creameries in operation in the Province. The creameries under Government con-trol do not interfere at all with the others, it is stated, their idea, not being to compete with other creameries in order to lower the price, but to provide creameries where there were none estab-lished. OF TOWNSHIP OF WARWICK.

A By-law to provide for drainage work in the Township of Warwick, in the County of Lambton, and for borrowing on the credit of the municipality the sum of \$252,30 for completing the same. Pro-visionally adopted the lith day of Nov. 1907.


Whereas Thomas Brush, a party to be benefited by the drainage work has peti-tioned the Council of the said. Township of Warwick, to have the Six Side Road Drain

And whereas thereupon the said Council has procured an examination (under Section) 76 of the Municipal Drainage Act,) to be made by C. A. Jones, being a person com-petent for such purpose, of the said area proposed to be drained and the means sug-gested for the drainage thereof and of other lands and roads liable to assessment under the Municipal Drainage Act and has also

the Municipal Drainage Act, and has also procured plans, specifications and estimates of the drainage work to be made by the said C. A. Jones, and an assessment to be made by him of the lands and roads to be benefited by such drainage work, and of lands and roads liable for contribution thereto, stating as nearly as he can the prothereto, stating as nearly as he can the pro-portion of benefit, outlet liability, and injuring liability which in his opinion will be derived or incurred in consequence of such drainage work by every road and lot or portion of lot, the said as-sessment so made heing the assessment hereinafter by this bylaw enacted to be as-sessed and levied upon the roads and lots or parts of lots hereinafter in that behalf spec-ially set forth and described, and the report ially set forth and described, and the report of the said C. A. Jones in respect thereof and of the said drainage work being as follows:

follows : Petrolea, Sept 4th, 1907. To the Muncipal Council, Township of Werwick. GENTLEMEN: -- In accordance with instructions re-ceived from your Honorable Body I have made a survey for the extension of the 6.7 sideroad drain, con. 1, S.E.R., of your Township, to a more efficient outlet.



Electric Power by Christmas.

Electric Power by Uhristmas. Two of the Westinghouse single phase locomotives to be used by the St. Clair Tunnel Co. in drawing its trains through the St. Clair tunnel, arrived in Port Huron Moday. 

distribution has been secured mainly from the Experimental Farms at Indian Head, Sask., and Brandon, Man. The samples consists of oats, spring wheat, harley, In-dian corn (tor ensilage only) and potatoes. The quantity of oats sent is 4-lbs., and of wheat or barley 5 lbs., sufficient in each case to sow one-twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn and potatoes weigh 3 lbs. each. A quantity of each of the fol-lowing varieties has been secured for this distribution :--

lowing varieties has been secured for this distribution :--OATS.-Banner, Wide-Awake, White Giant, Danieh Island, Thousand Dollar, Improved Lugowo, all white varieties. Black costs are not recommended for gener-al cultivation, a few samples, however, are available which can be sent if specially asked for. asked for.

asked for. WHEAT.—Red Fife (beardless); Preston, Pringle's Champlain and Huron (early beardless varieties). Revenue Surgeries Margaret (Margaret Margaret (Margaret) BARLEY, .- Six rowed. -- Mensury, Odessa, Mausfield and Claude. Two rowed. -- Stand-well, Invincible, Canadian Thorpe and Std-

Only one sample can be sent to each ap-plicant, hence it an individual receives as sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley, Indian corn or potatoes. Lists of names from one individual, or application for more than one sample for one household, cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Fa.ms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time before the 15th of February, after which the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Ap-plicants should mention the variety they preter, with a second sort as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order in which they are received, so long as the which they are received, so long as the supply of seed lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappoint-ment. Those applying for Indian Corn or potatoes should bear in mind that the corn that potatoes should bear in mind that the con-is not usually distributed until April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed from here until danger from frost in transit is over. No postage is required on mail matter ad-dressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.


New York city surface cars carry as many passengers each day as there are persons living within the borders of California.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

A recent arrival from the West reporta an alarming increase in the number of patients in the insane asylums in Manitoba. In the Brandon asylum alone it is stated that there are over seven hundred patients. Many of these are from the ranks of recently arrived immigrants, the louesome life on the prairies, and the absence of the surroundings to which they were accustomed is said to produce such a depressing effect that it unbalances their minds. This particularly applies to the women.

Rambow reports from the West are not borne out by recent arrivals, from that section. Money is tight enough in Ontario, but a crow bar is required to turn over a dollar in many parts of the West. Lack of gransportation for the grain crop and ready money to pay for the same is the cause of general complaint. Merchants are shortening up their credits and order from the wholesales as they receive remittances from customers. The banks are extremely cautious, and make only small advances on gilt-edged securities. The real estate boom has received a solar plexus blow that will take some time to recover from, and the labor market is flooded. Take it all around Ontario is as favorably situated as any country under the dome, and when we compare conditions here as they exist elsewhere there s little ground for complaint.

The Dignity of the Courts.

Since his accession to the Bench, Mr. Justice Riddell has distinguished himself by his evident determination to uphold to the fall the dignity which doth hedge the British judiciary. It was he who in isted upon being preceded on his every entrance into the court room, by the sheriff wearing his sword and his cocked hat. He has several times reprimanded barristers for addressing remarks to the court without rising from their chairs. One of his ebuilitions was the announcement of his intention to preserve the purity of the well of English undefiled, by discouraging the use of slang in his court, overlooking the fact that the slang of one generation is the accepted idiom of the next. Meanwhile, the lawyers around the courts are chuckling maliciously over the fact that the learned justice himself referred to one of the parties in a case before him as an "easy mark."







GOVERNMENT CREAMERIES. The Province Controls the Majority of Them in Alberta.

Edmonton, Nov. 28.—The Alberta Gov-ernment has now secured the control of the manufacture and sale of butter in over half of Alberta. They refuse to sell this butter to consumers, and will only sell it to retailers who order a regular supply all the year around. This rule is adhered to in spite of the fact that a supply of butter cannot le produced in the Province sufficient for home con-sumption. A large portion of the butter sold by the Government is shipped out of the Province to points in British Columbia, Yukon Territory and even to China and Japan. There are 20 or 22 creameries in operation in the Province. The creameries under Government con-trol do not interfere at all with the others, it is stated, their idea not being to compete with other creameries in order to lower the price, but to provide creameries where there were none estab-lished. Only expert men are employed as butter makers in the Government-owned creameries so that a good quality of butter is invariably insured. latter are the agricultural colleges main-tained by the neighboring States. The contest that excites the keenest interest each year is the team competition in live stock judging. The student teams this year were from the State colleges of Indiana, South Dakota, Kansas, Texas, Ohio, Iowa, and Missouri, against all of which was pitted the team from the Ontario Agricultural College. This trophy put up as the prize was won last year and the year before by the Ontario team, and last week they won it again. Under the conditions of the competition it now becomes the property of the Agri-cultural College, where it will have a permanent home. permanent home.

Electric Power by Christmas.

Electric Power by Christmas. Two of the Westinghouse single phase locomotives to be used by the St. Clair Tunnel Co. in drawing its trains through the St. Clair tunnel, arrived in Port Huron Monday. They will not be placed in com-mission, however, until the other five are here. The normal capacity of one of these engines is 760 horsepower, but can be work-ed up to 1,200 horse power. Two of them will make a locomotive capable of pulling a 1,000 ton train up the two per cent. tunnel grade. The trip will be made from Port Huron to Sarnia, nearly three miles, in seven minutes. The large power house on Military, street, Port Huron, which will supply electricity for the Port Huron and Sarnia Tunnel yards about co-npleted, the machinerv being run with a full load on for the first time on Thersday of last week. The power house is Dirolo feet in size, and two stories high ; is fireproof, being built entirely of concrete. It contains four batteries of boilers, an automatic coal hand-ling apparatus, two turbos, which include turbines and dynamos, and a large amount of auxiliary apparatus. 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
