Thirty-Seven Miners Killed.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 25.—37 mines of mixed nationalities were killed yesterday afternoon by an explosion in the Oregon Improvement company's coal mine at Franklin, King Co., 34 miles south-east of Seattle. The miners were trying to save the mines from destruction by fire when the explosion occurred. Heart rending scenes were enacted about the entrance of the mines when the list of killed and missing was made out. This is the mining district into which colored miners were brought two years ago at the time of the strike.

The Cattle Horn-Fly,

Precurry at Porty-fourth Avenue North and
Lyadale Avenue, Chicago, is a factory for
the manufacture of what they call "compoboard." This material is designed to serve
instead of lath and plaster, and is described
as follows by the North Western Lumberman.
It is made of ½ inch strips of wood, from §
to ½ inches wide, placed between two sheets
of heavy straw board and united under
heavy pressure with a strong cement. The
process of manufacture is peculiar. Into
the machine that moulds the board are run
two sheets of the straw board from rolls,
one from above and one from below a table
on to which are fed from a feeding device
the strips of wood. A roller running in
atank of the liquid cement rolls upon the inmer surface of three layers of material run
together between rolls and into a hydraulic
press capable of exerting a pressure of 120
tons to the square inch. Ten feet of the
board is stopped automatically for a few
seconds in the press, then run upon
tracks, placed in the dry kilh, and when
taken out is trimmed to 48 inches in width.

The strength of the board as compared
with its weight is marveloux. The ends of
an 18 foot board can be brought together
without breaking or warping it. No conditions can warp it. The new office build
