Utilized Orchards.

The orchard is never injured by fowls, but on the contrary excellent work is done by poultry in destroying insects. Every one who has an orchard and does not keep a flock is losing profit that is more easily secured than in any other manner with poultry, as there is no additional interest on land to add o the cost. The free range of the orchard, with the trees for shade, will assist in greater egg-production, and when the hens have broods of chicks there is no better location than to make each hen comfortable in a little run under a tree, where the chicks can be permitted to have their freedom. It is not well to have the grass too high in an orchard, if fowls are to use the ground. 


