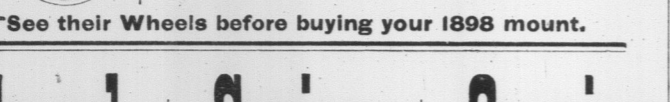

NEWS OF THE WORLD. Spain has 200,000 troops in Cuba. The Sudan campaign will not push on further toward Khartoum till July.

Chicago has a woman for superintendent of streets in the business part of the city. The past negotiations between Nicaragua and Costa Rica has failed—war is probable. The spring cleanup of gold in the Yukon district is expected to amount to \$20,000,000.

The returns from the Maritime sailing fleet to date aggregate nearly 220,000, against a total catch last of 120,000. The Maritime Commission is arranging to build an independent railway to Lake Superior and another to Hudson Bay.

Canada's importers from Cuba in 1895 just before the opening of the rebellion, amounted to \$3,864,234; last year they were valued at only \$333,992. Outlets millers have made a further advance in the price of flour which is now quoted from 30 to 35 cents higher than at the first of the month.

A portion of a new bridge on the Crow's Nest railway was blown down some days ago, carrying with it eight men a distance of 60 feet. Five were killed. Governor Calles of Texas, has ordered the entire railway force to the Mexican frontier to repel any invasion from that country that Spanish sympathizers may make.

The Electric Light and Power Co. of North Wales, who are extracting gold from the water, have purchased a site and will start another at Glyn, East Bay. A conspiracy has been discovered in the palace at Pekin to assassinate Li Hung Chang, Chinese premier and high official. The Chinese accuse them of selling China to Russia.

South American countries of good quality are being shipped in large numbers to the British market and are becoming more popular with Canada and the United States for that trade. The French society for the assistance of wounded soldiers has donated \$100,000 and has asked the subscription for the purpose of affording the American and Spanish Red Cross societies.

The Ontario Government has lately mulcted several fur dealers for heavy settlements in connection with the seizure of fur and other skins. Orders have been protected until 1900. Major General Gascoigne has resigned the command of the Canadian militia and his resignation has been accepted with regret in Halifax, Montreal and Toronto, in which he figured as well as the main cause of his resignation.

Up to the dawn of May Day the war between the United States and Spain was a bloodless one, but now the first battle has been fought and the Don has suffered a heavy reverse.

The scene of the first great naval engagement was not in Cuban waters, as had been generally predicted, but in the far east. The American squadron, stationed in Chinese waters, sailed as soon as practicable after the opening of hostilities, for the nearest Spanish possession, the Philippines, and engaged the Spanish fleet stationed at Manila.

Just what the result of the fight is cannot be determined with any degree of accuracy yet, as the cables are still under Spanish control, and the United States government has not received any official report of the engagement. It was an American victory undoubtedly and the dispatches say that five Spanish war ships were sunk or disabled, with great loss of life among their crews, but no mention is made of the casualties incurred by the Americans, and in a four hours' fight these must have been considerable.

There is another side to the story that has not been told, though just why it has been suppressed, when the cable touching at Manila is controlled by the Spaniards, is not apparent. Practically nothing but the second rate ships of both nations were engaged in the fight and it remains for those with more modern armaments to battle for the supremacy.

Spain in her western maneuvers, but it looks as if the United States would be in practical possession of the Philippines before her troops have even made an attempt to land in Cuba, where the real battle ground should lie. The bombardment of Manila and the reported burning of the fortified portion of the city has aroused Germany, Austria and France to expressions of sympathy with the Spanish cause and has greatly increased the possibility of the trouble developing into a great reaching international complication.
