The Department of Agriculture of Manitoba has issued its final crop bulletin; but the estimated yield of grain of all kinds, as given in the August bulletin, has not been realized. The total grain crop was 30,442,552 bushels. The acreage for next year is much in excess of this year.

Mail advices from Greece report an active demand for currents from Russia, and state that the stock left there at the middle of last month did not exceed 60 000 tons, all of which, it was expected, would be needed for consumption in consuming countries before the next crop is

Mail advices from Baltimore state that one of the most remarkable features in the canned goods situation there is the fact that seconds tomatoes cannot be bought any cheaper than standards. The stock of seconds is said to be held by packers who are firm believers in higher prices.

Another deputation from this city has interviewed the government at Quebec requesting a grant towards building the pro-posed bridge from Longueuil to Delorimier avenue. 



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

THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The bank statements for November mark a continuance of the improvement in the business situation indicated in the returns for October. Circulation, of course, shows a small reduction; as is usual as the result of the close of navigation and the consequent diminished movement of agriculture produce. But in all the other principal items there is a gratifying advance. Deposits on demand have increased \$2,700,000; which shows that merchants have been enabled to add considerably to their balances in the bank. It is always a good sign when this class of deposits advances; more especially when it is coupled with an increase in those bearing interest. The greater activity on the Stock Exchange is shown by the larger volume of call loans, and this taken in connection with the increase in deposits, would seem to indicate that the contraction in the volume of current loans is due either to the withdrawal of accomodation paper or to the fluctuations of some F. HYDE & CO., large corporate account. A million and a quarter is a very small portion of \$213,000,000, and it is possible that this reduction would be easily explicable were the details at hand.





The act of incorporation of the Kemptville Lumber Manufacturing company has been extended to include the manufacture of dcors, sashes, etc., and the capital stock has been increased from \$12,000 to \$25,000.

A prominent grain man, just returned from a Western trip, says: "In all my experiences I never saw the farmers in such good spirits as they are this winter. A more happy and contented lot of men it would be hard to imagine."

An organization of American lumbermen has been effected and resolutions adopted asking Congress to place lumber on the dutiable list, requesting lumber dealers to furnish to Senators and Representatives full information in relation to the needs and condition of the lumber industry, and invoking the aid of Congress in establishing reciprocity with southern countries.

Merchants at Langdon and other Dakota towns have entered a complaint that Dakota farmers along the boundary line now snunggle their wheat across the border and sell it in Manitoba, where they get 10c more a bushel. The upshot of the kick may be that Dakota farmers will move into Manitoba, take up farms and raise wheat where they can get living price for it.

Letters patent of incorporation have been issued to Hugh Ryan, John Ryan, James T. Madden and others as the William Ryan Company of Toronto (Limited), with a capital stock of \$15,000. Also to Vassar E. Tanner of Mt. Forest, W. A. Fraser of Egremont, Donald K. McArthur of Hopeville, George Watson of Proton and John Jackson of Minto, as the Mount Forest Woolen Mills Company (Limited), with a capital stock of \$15,000. Also to Duncan H. McNab and others as the Chesley Chair Company (Limited), Chesley, with a capital stock of \$20,000.

According to a Calcutta despatch to the London Times, the official weather forecast says that the winter rains will be generally normal with, perhaps, a slight excess in Upper India and Rangoon. Over 30,000 people are on the relief work in Upper Burmah, where the scarcity is widespread. Fortunately the paddy crop is now being reaped in the lower provines. It is estimated that 1,880,000 tons of rice are available effect that the last week has been rainless. Owing to the previous rains, however, the number of those requiring relief in the northwest provinces has been reduced from 25 to 30 per cent. Rains at Bombay have considerably contracted the area of distress.

Beerhaim says: We hear from Hungary that the facilities at present enjoyed in the exportation of flour against wheat imported free of duty are likely to b discontinued at the end of 1897. For several months, however, millers have been cramped in this trade by the new decree which stipulated that an equal quantity of flour must be exported to the wheat imported, that is to say, for every 1,000 tons of wheat imported 1,000 tons of flour must be exported, thus depriving the miller of the extra profit which he obtained when 60 per cent flour was taken as the equivalent of wheat. In the ten months ended October 31st, Austria-Hungary imported under these regulations 420,000 quarters of wheat, and 284,000 quarters from Servia against 371,000 last year.

The Iowa State crop report values the farm products of that State this year at \$133,654,000. The Bureau estimates that the hog cholera has cost the State \$15,000,000 in actual and prospective losses. The average for the State in loss from cholera is 30 per cent, or nearly one-third of 6,000,000 hogs in the State.

The Corn Trade News says:—The weather in Germany has been seasonable and the crop prospects give rise to no compisints. The preliminary estimate of the yield of the 1896 potato crop of the Empire is 5,500,000 tons below the preliminary estimate of the 1895 crop, but is not greatly different from the revised final estimate of 1895. The proportion diseased, this season is 9.9 per cent, against 28 per cent last year.

There have been large arrivals of fresh frozen fish, for which the demand is only for small lots. Herrings are 5 to 10c per 100 lower, at \$1.20 for large, and at 40c to 50c for small. Tommycods have also declined 25c to 50c per barrel, with sales at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per barrel. Smelts are dearer at 5c to 61c per lb. Haddock are selling at 31 to 31c per lb cod at 3c, steak cod at 4c. Frozen B. C. and N. B. salmon are steady at 11c to 12c per lb; halibut at 8c, and Manitoba pickerel, whitefish and trout, 7c.

The twenty second annual report of the directors of the Dominion Commercial Travellers Association shows that the total income for the year was \$34,866. Of this amount \$4,642 had been paid for working expense, \$21,746 for benefits, leaving a surplus of \$149,596. The number of new members received during the year was 330, making a total membership of 2,712. Twenty-one members have been removed by death, and the sum of \$20,050 has been paid to their beneficiaries, and \$1,000 has been reserved from last year. It has been decided to hold the annual dinner in the Windsor Hotel on December 22nd.

A notice has been issued by the City Clerk directing attention to Sec. 23 of the by-law concerning markets, which provides that all persons selling or offering for sale on the public markets or in private stalls, grain, notatoes or any vegetables shall be held to give the following, weights for bags: Oats, 68 lbs.; potatoes and turnips, 90 lbs; peas, 120 lbs.; buckwheat, 96 lbs.; beans, 120 lbs., and corn, 112 lbs. All persons violating the above provisions will be prosecuted as the law directs. The weights in question are in all cases avoirdupois.

A summing up of the wheat situation presents interesting conclusions. Receipts of wheat at primary markets have been decreasing this week and receipts of spring wheat are moderate. The theoretical stocks back in farmers' hands are looked upon as reduced. Although supplies of winter wheat are believed to be light, primary receipts since July 1st have been about 11 per cent more than last year. The Government figures indicated very high conditions of winter wheat, confirmed by State reports, although since December 1st there have been advices of froat damage and inact injury. Wheat is not a tropical plant nor are conditions which produce froat injury consonant with inact's damage. The visible is decreasing rapidly. Exports on old purchases continue heavy, but fresh purchases are light. Stocks affort to Europe are increasing, and Russian exports are heavy. Holiday duliness generally prevails both here and abroad. As to Argentine conditions reports are conflicting, the markets which buy from the Argentine showing apparently no apprehension of injury.



Several packers, it was reported, were using round tins and fancy 5 and 10-pound boxes this season. Shipments from the Santa Cista Valley for the season of November 21 amounted to 28,889,220 lbs.

A final dividend of one-half cent on the dollar has been declared on the estate of McLachla Bros., and this winds up a film whose failnre was one of the most diastrous that ever took place in Canada. McLachlan Bros. were wholesale dry goods merchants and failed about seven year ago, bringing down with them the wholesale firm of Lindsay, Gilmour & Co. The conbined liabilities of the two firms were in the neighborhood of one million dollars. The Bank of Toronto was a large credite. The firm had been carrying a number of supply houses, and their assignment was the direct cause of the failure of from fitteen to twenty retail firms throughout Ontario. A third dividend of four cents on the dollar has been declared in the matter of the Montreal Paper Mills Company, Limited, in liquidation.

The Winnipeg Commercial, says: Prices are lower in Manitoba country markets, but prices are so irregular that it is difficult to give any regular quotations. The nominal price for No. 1 hard wheat to farmers, at 18c freight rate points to Fot William is 63c which is 3c lower than a week ago, but prices vary very widely, ranging all the way from 59c at westem points to 66c at other points. The markets are governed by local conditions at different points. TO OUR READERS.

To all our readers we extend the hearty good wishes of the season. A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year may seem to be an old saying; but it means much. It means that at this one season of the year we rise a little above the level of hard commonsense. It means that we permit a little of heart-felt sentiment to permeate the cold atmosphere of business, just once in the year. It means that we are not all merely money-making machines, but that we have still those capabilities of cherishing those we love, which modern science and finde-siecle ideas take so much pains to eradicate. It is still merry Christmas with most of us-no matter how bleak the out-look may be. And that it is so, is a proof that hun an nature is stronger than cynicism, and that it is love and not money which dominates the world.

THE ENGLISH IN EGYPT.

For once, French diplomacy seems to have over-reached itself, and the race which produced a Talleyrand and a Cambaceres appears to have been defeated by the simple honesty and straightforwardness of the British policy in Egypt, for the decision of the Court of Appeals at Alexandria that the cost of the British expedition against the Dervishes in the Soudan cannot be taken from the Egyptian sinking fund promises to make the English hold on Egypt stronger than it was before. The advance of the Auglo-Egyptian column up the Nile was undertaken for the purpose of reasserting the authority of the Khedive's government over at least a portion of the Soudan. As the benefits resulting from breaking the power of the Mahdi's wild hordes and establish ing a safer and more scientific frontier would chiefly belong to Egypt, Great Britain not unnaturally insisted that the cost of the campaign should be defrayed from the reserve funds which have been accumulated under Lord Cromer's progressive and enlightened administration of Egyptian affairs. The sum of \$2,500,000 was accordingly appropriated as a first instalment in pursuance of this policy The anti-British Court of Appeals, composed of two French, one English, one Egyptian and one Austrian member, has declared this expenditure illegal and ordered its restitution. England has instantly paid it back. in obedience to the Court's decision. The amount is a mere bagatelle m the finances of the British Empire, but its payment will constitue another reason for prolonging the British occupation of Egypt.

French influence undoubtedly in spired the decision of the Alexandra Court. If Egypt had defrayed the expenses of the Nile expedition, her claims to its consequent benefits would have been clear. With the Khedive's flag once more floating over Khartoum and the better part of the Equatorial Provinces brought again under Egyptian rule, France might have asserted, with some show of plausibility, that England's work of reconstruction in the land of the Pharaohs had been accomplished, and that she ought to withdraw. Bat the French saw only the opportunity to manifest their hostility to Great Britain by inflicting a rebuff upon her before the Court of Appeals Their action has made the prosped of British evacuation more rudefinite than ever. The capital of the joint-stock banks of Great Britain stood in October last at £76,241,000, of which £59,704,000 was held in England and Wales, £9,302,000 in Scotland, £7,109,000 in Ireland, and £125,000 in the Islands. The market value of this capital, however, is on the average three times its face value and amounts to £223,515,000. The average premium now stands at 2.10 per cent, against 1.97 per cent in 1895. The increase in deposits in the British banks, including the Bank of England, is one of the phenomenal developments of the past ten years. The Bank of England deposits stood with it (unless in the case of absolute at about £31,000,000 in July, 1886, and about £65,000,000 in July, 1896. Deposits and current accounts in the other banks of the United Kingdom, including an estimate for those not reporting, were £550,000,000 in 1886 and £730,000,0000 in 1896. THE LAW OF TRUSTS.

The courts of the United States are now delivering some very significant decisions in respect to the law of trusts and corporations. At every stage of the suit brought in the name of the People against the North River Sugar Refining Company the distinction between individual and corporate rights and privileges was clearly recognized. In deciding the case at the Special Term Judge Barrett pointed out that the Sugar Trust, to which the defendant corporation had virtually assigned its charter, was not a case of a few individuals in a limited locality united for mutual protection against rumous competition. It was a case of capitalists combining their wealth in corpora tions and utilizing the franchises granted to them to oppress the people.

"First, they utilize the corporate franchises to guard themselves against the dangers incident to personal association. And, second, they central ize these franchises in a single, gigantic and irresponsible power, furnished with every delegated facility for not only in the State but throughout and price of a particular and necessary article of commerce."



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

DISTRESS IN LABRADOR.

Five hundred fishermen, scattered for hundreds of unles along the south and east coasts of Labrador, are in distress, and without the aid which Newfoundland is sending them, many would perish of want during the commg winter. They live from hand to mouth under the best of conditions, and when their one adequate resource fails, starvation stares them in the There is nothing on the bleak face. coast of Labrador to make life endurable to any civilized man. It is only the submarine banks lying off the shores that give value to this land; for these banks are covered with countless animalculae, and small bait fish swarm in from the sea to feed on them; and these fish, in turn, attract the cod, which, in good seasons, cover the banks and crowd into the inlets in enormous numbers.

But it happens, now and then, that

enough to own the boats and tackle they employ. In the best years their reward is a pittance. When the catch is small, a winter of hunger and need is at their doors. They live in a state of bondage, for not a dozen among them are out of debt. Cod is their coin. All their supplies are obtained on credit to be paid for by their cach of cod. But credit has a limit. Owing the traders for the supplies of the past season, with no cod in prospect for nine months at least, the advances made to them are stopped entirely, or are too small to satisfy the cravities of their children for food.

The inglerious uncertainty of the law has again been illustrated in the case of Mr. Davis, ex-water superintendent, in his suit against the city. The Superior Courtgave him damages for being deprived of his employment without notice, which judgment the Cout of Queen's Bench has reversed, holding that there was no contract flxing the term of Mr. Davis' services, and that the Council as a matter of public administration had a light to dispense with them when it deemed it wise so to do. The introduction of cheap iron safes for the right to annuities beyond the promise, export trade has caused considerable dissatisfaction. About two years ago a numher of Cincinnati safe manufacturers, in order to meet foreign c mpetition, began to build safes, at ridiculously low prices. To such an extent was this industry developed that the makers of higher-grade sales have within the last year felt the damage done by these manufacturers. The method employed by the cheap safe makers to obtain export orders was 'o flood foreign markets with their catalogues. giving therein a net price for which their product would be placed in New York city f.o.b. In said prices they did not include any commission for the exporters for their trouble in handling the goods. This caused muc's dissatisfaction among export merchants, who were obliged to fill orders and pay in the majority of cases cash on presentation of shipping receipt without getting the customery 1 or 2 per cent cash discounts which such class of shipments sdmit.

The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council has dismissed two Canadian appeal cases, which they have had under consideration since November 11. The cases were the appeal of the Dominion of Canada against the Province of Ontario, and that of the Province of Quebec against the Province of Ontario, involving the liability of the provinces to the payment of certain annuities to Indians for lands which the latter ceden to the former province of Upper Canada, prior to the formation of the Dominion. The Judicial Committee said it was clear that, under the terms of the treaties, the Indians had not obtained

which was merely a personal obligation of the governor, representing the old province to pay the annuities when they should become due. The Indians, the committee held, had not obtained the right giving them an interest in the territory they surrendered, and the province was not obliged to apply the revenue derived from the surrendered lands to the payment of annuities.

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

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

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
