HOLY DAYS IN JUNE.—St. Barnabas' Day, June, 11th falls this year on the second Sunday after Trinity. Saturday, 24th June, being St. John Baptist's Day, and Thursday, 29th June, being St. Peter's Day, there will be celebrations of the Holy Communion at 8 a.m., and Morning Prayer and Holy Communion at 10 a.m.

On Wednesday evening, 17th May, a special service was held in preparation for the Holy Communion, and on Whitsunday, those recently confirmed received their first Communion.

NOTES ON PARISH FINANCE.

People sometimes forget that Church expenses go on all summer as well as at other seasons, and neglect to make up arrears of offertory and pew rent. This neglect causes embarrassment and makes the Wardens' task thankless and difficult. Besides the congregation is the loser if interest has to be paid on bank over-drafts.

The Wardens would like to know to whom to credit the contents of envelopes which are not numbered. Be careful to put your number on your envelope, and note the amount enclosed, and save trouble.

Are you in arrears of offertory? Perhaps not. Any way, to make sure, and to save the Wardens the rather unpleasing duty of sending you a "reminder," examine the chart near the door; look along the line opposite your number and see if there are any blanks. If there are, you "appear" to be in arrears, and the Wardens would like to "hear from you," because possibly there is a mistake, and Wardens are not infallible. It is not so easy as it looks to keep some 70 accounts, and mistakes are likely to occur in Church finance which do not occur in business, because in Church matters some people are much more "casual" than in business matters.

If you are in arrears, it is better to make it up before the quarter-day reminders are sent out. If you get a reminder, pray don't imagine that you are personally insulted: *you* are not in the habit of insulting people; why imagine that the Wardens are?
