THE SEASONS.

Vernal Equinox—Spring begins March 20th., 8h. 12m., Evening.
Summer Solstice—Summer begins June 21st., 4h. 34m., Evening.
Autumnal Equinox—Autumn begins September 23rd., 6h. 48m.
Morning.
Winter Solstice—Winter begins Dec'r 22nd., 0h. 51m., Morning.

ECLIPSES.

I.—There will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon on the 6th day of January, visible in the eastern parts of this continent. The Moon rises partially eclipsed at Quebec 4.23 ending 6.2. At Montreal 5.29 ending 5.53. At Toronto it begins 4.35 and ends 5.48.

II.—On the 17th of June there will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, not visible in America.

III.—On the 2nd of July there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, not visible in these parts.

IV.—On the 11th of December there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun, to Canadians invisible.

PLANETS.

Venus will be an Evening Star to the 26th of September, and from that date a Morning Star to the end of the year. Mars is an Evening Star throughout the year. Jupiter is an Evening Star until June 30th, and a Morning Star from that date to October 22nd, and again an Evening Star after that date. Saturn will be a Morning Star until March 30th, and an Evening Star from that date to the end of the year. The brilliant Sirius has a non-luminous companion star, discovered by Mr. Clarke, with his new and powerful achromatic telescope.

The following Table, constructed upon philosophical considerations of the attractions of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by experience of many years' actual observation, furnishes the observer, without further trouble, with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding, and that so near the truth, that in very few instances will it be found to fail :—

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

Grocers—£7 10s. per £100 on their rental.

Gas Works—An annual duty of £200.

Livery Stable Keepers—An annual duty of £20; on each two-wheeled carriage, 15s.; on each four-wheeled carriage, 20s.

Inn-Keepers having vehicles for the use and advantage of customers—for each two-wheeled carriage, 20s.; for each four-wheeled carriage, 10s.

Pawnbrokers—An annual duty of £50.

Hawkers, carrying a pack—An annual duty of £2.

Hawkers, using a cart and vehicle—An annual duty of £5.

For each pleasure-horse, 30s.; for each working-horse 12s. 6d. Horses daily and constantly employed in the owner's work or business, by which he gains his maintenance, to be considered working-horses.

Vehicles for hire—For each two-wheeled vehicle, 20s.; for each four-wheeled vehicle, 30s.

Stage-Coach, Omnibus, or Stage-Waggon—when drawn by one or two horses, 40s.; when drawn by four or more horses, 60s.

For each close carriage, or corresponding winter vehicle, £5; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by two horses, 60s.; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by one horse, 50s.; double dennet, &c., or do., 40s.; gig, calèche, spring cart, or do., 30s.; waggon or vehicle, not above specified, or winter vehicle, adapted for draught of two or more horses, 20s.

Theatres—Annual duty of £30 (and assessments) on proprietor.

Proprietors of Caravans of wild beasts, Circuses, &c., to obtain permission from His Worship the Mayor, and pay £25 therefor, and £10 for each subsequent day that the same is open.

Proprietor or proprietors of each steam ferry-boat plying from Laprairie or Longueuil, an annual duty of £50 currency.

Bank or bank agencies, annual duty of £100.

Fire Insurance Companies, or agencies, annual duty of £50.

Marine Insurance Companies, annual duty of £25.

Telegraph Companies, annual duty of £100.

Brokers or money-changers, annual duty of £25.

Produce-brokers, money-lenders, and commission merchants—an annual duty of £20.

Distillers, or agents of distillers—20 per cent on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Brewers, or agents of brewers—15 per cent. on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Ball-alleys, skittle grounds, nine-pin alleys—an annual duty of £12 10s.

Brick yards, an annual duty of £10.

Horse-dealers, an annual duty of £2 10s.

TAXES COLLECTED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE.

For licenses issued to carters and others using hackney carriages, or vehicles for the conveyance of passengers or transport of goods, wares, merchandise, building materials, produce, or other articles in the city of Montreal.

Hackney-Carriages.—For every cab, calèche, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$5; for every four-wheeled carriage drawn by one horse, \$7; for every coach or four-wheeled carriage drawn by two horses, \$9; for every omnibus or stage coach, \$16.

Carts, Trucks, Waggons and other Vehicles.—The licenses for carts, trucks and other vehicles used for the conveyance of goods, wares, merchandise, &c., shall be divided into three classes:—

The first class shall include all carts, trucks, waggons, and other vehicles running within the city for hire or reward, not otherwise expressly provided for, and shall pay.—For every

cart, truck or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$2; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse, \$6; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two horses and made to carry a load under 4,000 lbs. weight, \$7; for every heavy waggon, float, or other four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two or more horses, and made to carry heavy articles or materials weighing 4,000 lbs., or upwards, \$9; for every Diable, \$1.

The second class shall include all carts, waggons, or other vehicles used by merchants, traders, manufacturers, or contractors, for the conveyance or delivery of the articles or effects dealt in, manufactured, or made use of by them, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$2.50.

The third class shall include all carts, waggons, or other vehicles used by expressmen, bakers, brewers, distillers, farmers, or gardeners, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$5.

Parties obtaining licenses as aforesaid, shall moreover pay the annual assessment on all working horses, employed in drawing the above-mentioned vehicles or carriages, at the rate of \$2.50 each, and also twenty-five cents for each number granted by the Chief of Police.

Dogs.—License of \$3 for every female dog; and \$2 for every male dog.

Milk.—An annual license of \$1 for selling milk.

For every additional $\frac{1}{4}$ mile for above description of goods, 10c.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter-Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, pass, if prepaid, for 3 cents per half-ounce, but if posted unpaid, are charged 5 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 3 cents per half-ounce, if prepaid; 5 cents, if unpaid.

The rates on letters to the United Kingdom will be:

By Canadian Packet, 6 cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet, 8 cents per half-ounce, advancing by one rate for each half-ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be pre-paid, or they will be charged a fine of 3d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

N.B.—With the exception of those marked with an asterisk, all are to be sent by *Canadian Line* only; for Cunard Line, add to the above rates 2 cents for each rate for letters.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction,—“By Canadian Packet” or “By British Packet,”—and in that case, they are kept over for the packet designated. “By Canadian Mail” is not a distinctive superscription, for any mail for Canada is a “Canadian Mail” by whatever packet forwarded.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, via England, must be pre-paid.

The rate on letters for the United States, 6 cents if pre-paid, 10 cents if unpaid.

Registration Charges.—For registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 8 cts.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5 its.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, special rates according to weight.

No letter can be forwarded as registered, unless postage and registration fee are both pre-paid.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on parcels, by Parcel post, to any place in Canada, is 12½ cents per half-pound, (with 5 cents additional, if registered.) No parcel must exceed four pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices-current, hand-bills, and other printed matter of a like character; and on books bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices-current, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Dominion of Canada, or to and from the United States:—

1.—Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts and botanical specimens, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Dominion, or to an address within the United States, on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce; and when received from the United States, addressed to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered, on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2.—The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No letter or communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and, in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents,

such as "Seeds," "Roots," &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate above mentioned.

3. Book and newspaper manuscript, and printers' proof-sheets, (whether corrected or not,) maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass,) and sheet music (whether printed or written,) to any address in Canada or the United States, may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on pre-payment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed-matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery on such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Patterns of Merchandise and Samples between Canada, and the United Kingdom, and certain other countries :—

4.—Patterns of merchandise and samples may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom and Denmark, France, Italy, Belgium, the German States, Netherlands, Portugal and Switzerland, by the Canadian packet mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions :

A—The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article, sent as a pattern or sample, be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

On this point an explanation in a subsequent Departmental Order, it appears as follows :

B—It has hitherto formed part of the Imperial Post Office regulations that "*samples or patterns must not be of intrinsic value*," but in consequence of the difficulty that has been experienced in determining what is, and what is not, a pattern or sample of merchandise of intrinsic value, this prohibition has been removed.

The modification is a verbal one, and will not alter nor enlarge in any way, the character of the transmissions permitted to pass by pattern post.

The special prohibition as to intrinsic value, has, it is understood, been withdrawn, not because the question of value will not still influence a decision as to whether an article offered for transmission by pattern post is a genuine commercial sample (or pattern) or not, but because as a general proviso it could not well be enforced; inasmuch as every article whether properly a pattern or sample, or not, has necessarily more or less of an intrinsic value, and might be held to be amenable to a strict construction of this prohibitory clause in the regulation.

C—The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck, or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be en-

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tirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts.

D—The rule which prohibited the transmission through the post, as patterns or articles of cutlery, &c., has been rescinded; and scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like articles, are now allowed to be forwarded by the post as samples, provided they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags, and to the persons of the officers of the post office. Such articles, however, must be so packed that they may be easily examined; and it is made a rule that any packets containing such articles, which may be found to be insufficiently guarded, shall not be forwarded through the post.

No packet of patterns or samples, posted for delivery within the Dominion, must exceed 24 oz. in weight.

A packet of pattern or samples sent to France or Portugal, must not exceed 18 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

The limits of weight are as follows:

Canada.....	24 oz.	Belgium	8 oz.

None of the articles named in the rule D may be sent as patterns or samples to any place abroad, except Germany, Belgium and the British Colonies, and not to those places when addressed "via France."

There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and the prices of the article.

Any infringements of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail-bags will apply to patterns and samples; any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Transmission of Patterns and Samples within the Province of Canada:—

Patterns or samples of merchandise and goods for sale may be posted in Canada to be forwarded to any place within the Province, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce, under the following regulations:

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened—or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the offi-

cers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II.—The packet may bear on the outside the address of the sender in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended—also a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the articles enclosed—inside there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet at the option of the sender; it is also permitted to affix a label containing the same.

III.—Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter, or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules is to be rated and treated as a letter.

IV.—The rate of 1 cent per ounce is to be prepaid by Postage Stamp,—and if such rate be not fully prepaid by the stamp affixed—the package is to be rated with the deficient postage and a fine of five cents in addition.

V.—Packets of samples and patterns may be registered on prepayment by postage stamp of a registration fee of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate—and provided such packets be duly handed in to the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be given for such packages when presented for registration.

VI.—No packet of samples or patterns must exceed 24 ounces in weight; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Book Post.—Books, bound, or unbound, posted in Canada, and addressed to any office in the Dominion, British America, and the United States, are chargeable with the rate of one cent per ounce which must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom *vice versa*, by Canadian steamer, at the following rates:—For each packet:

V.—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by

book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment, or vellum.

Book packets addressed to the United Kingdom can be registered on payment of the ordinary registration fee (8 cents) in addition to the postage.

Book Post to France.—For a packet of printed matter, or single newspaper, book, &c., not over 2 ounces 4 cents.

Ditto, exceeding 2 ounces, and not over 4 ounces 8 " "

Ditto, " " 4 ounces, " do 8 ounces 16 "

Ditto, " " 8 ounces, " do 16 ounces 32 "

And so on, increasing 16 cents for every additional half-bound.

The Book-post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at delivering post office:

For a paper published 6 times a week 30 cents per quarter;

Do do not 13 times a week 15 " " to 30 cents per quarter;

Do do not 2 times a week 10 " " to 30 cents per quarter;

Do do not 1 time a week 5 " " to 30 cents per quarter.

When the above rates are not paid in advance, by either publisher or subscribers, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers.—Transient newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid two cents each, by postage stamps, or they cannot be forwarded; except only British newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers and news-agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States newspapers, to regular subscribers, are charged 1 cent each on delivery. (Transient papers two cents each.)

Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada.—

The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, will henceforth be one cent per four ounce weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contains one or more numbers.

Any fraction of 4 ounces to be charged as a full rate.

Periodicals weighing less than one ounce per number, posted in Canada for any place within the Dominion, when sent singly pass for one-half cent per number, if prepaid by stamp.

POST OFFICE.

The above rate will be payable on delivery on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Canadian Periodicals, posted for United Kingdom by Canadian Packets:—Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom by Canadian Packet, on pre-payment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.

This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom. No package of Periodicals can be sent through the post if it exceed four pounds in weight.

Postage Stamps.—Postage Stamps of the respective value of $\frac{1}{2}$ cent for small periodicals; 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices current for the United Kingdom; 3 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 6 cents for United States rate; 6 cents for Canadian Packet; and 8 cents for Cunard Packet,—are provided for sale to the public.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause: To enclose a letter or letters, or in writing intending to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or to enclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspaper sent by them to their subscribers,) is an offence punishable by a penalty of not less than ten and not exceeding forty dollars.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on Canada.—All the Money-Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, are authorized to draw Money-Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz.:

On Orders up to \$10	5 cents.
On Orders over \$10, and up to \$20	10
On Orders over \$20, and up to \$40	20
On Orders over \$40, and up to \$60	30
On Orders over \$60, and up to \$80	40
On Orders over \$80, and up to \$100	50

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.—The Money-Order Offices in the Dominion also draw upon all the Money-Order Offices in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each, as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:

On Orders up to £2	25 cents.
On Orders over £2, and up to £5	50
On Orders over £5, and up to £7	75
On Orders over £7, and up to £10	\$1.00

Money Orders on the Lower Provinces.—The Money Order Offices in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, draw also upon Money Order Offices in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland. The Orders like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money, and for sums up to £10 sterling. The terms are:

For Orders up to £5 26 cents.

For Orders over £5, and up to £10 50 "

The Money Order Post Offices in the Dominion are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland; and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

The Post Office Savings Banks, established by Statute in the last Session of Parliament, commenced operations in Ontario and Quebec on the 1st April, 1868.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Savings Bank Post Office, the Savings Bank regulations may be read by the public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed on the cover of the Pass Book supplied to each depositor.

4. Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits are received daily, during the ordinary hours of Post Office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a Depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorised by the Postmaster-General.

5. The Postmasters of the Savings Bank Offices will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the Payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

6. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, and the sums paid in or withdrawn, are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in, is sent to the depositor from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque, payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

7. Every depositor's account is thus kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices which at the time may best suit his convenience, and exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the Pass Book, in proof of identity—whenever paying in or drawing out money.

8. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits lying in the ordinary deposit accounts, but when a

depositor has \$100 deposited, he or she may request the Postmaster-General to transfer this sum to a special account; and will then receive a Certificate of such special \$100 deposit, bearing interest at 5 per cent per annum.

9. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors for paying in, or drawing out money, nor for postage on communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will be always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

12. Additional Post Offices will, from time to time, be authorized to act as Savings Bank agencies.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz.:

Books, Printed Papers, Drawings, Paintings, Prints and Photographs, of a treasonable or seditious or of an immoral or indecent character.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

The importation of Arms and Munitions of War, otherwise than from Great Britain or the British possessions, is not allowed, unless by special permission from the Minister of Customs.

NOTE.—An addition of 5 per cent on the Duties imposed by the Act is made on all goods paying *ad valorem* as well as specific duties.

Section 8 of 31 Vic., cap 44, is repealed, and the following Section is substituted for it as Section 8 of said Act by 33 Vic., cap 9.

Value for Duty.—The value for duty of goods, on which an *ad valorem* duty of customs is imposed, imported into Canada by sea, shall be the actual value of such goods at the last place at which they are purchased; and the value of such goods for duty, if imported from the United States by land or inland navigation, shall be the actual value of such goods at the last place at which they are purchased for importation into Canada, and whence they are directly conveyed without change of package to Canada; and whatever be the country from which the goods are imported, or in which they are purchased, such value shall be ascertained by adding to the value of such goods at the place of growth, production or manufacture, the cost of transportation, whether by land or water, and of shipment and transhipment, with all expenses included from place of growth, production, or manufacture, to the place where the goods are purchased, and if they are purchased in the United States, then to the place whence they are directly conveyed to Canada as aforesaid; and such value shall include also, the value of any box, case, sack, package, or covering of any kind in which such goods are contained; and all export duties on such goods, and all costs and charges incurred prior to their purchase.

Packages delivered before Examination.—All the packages mentioned in any one Entry, although most of such packages may have been delivered to the importer, shall be subject to the control of the Customs authorities of the port at which they are entered, until such of the packages as have been sent for examination to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been duly examined and approved, provided such examination take place within three days after the delivery of the package or packages into the Examining Warehouse, and after twenty-four hours' notice by the importer to the collector; and a bond shall be

given by the importer conditioned that the packages so delivered shall not be opened or unpacked before the package or packages sent to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been examined and passed as aforesaid, provided they are examined within the delay aforesaid; and the packages so delivered, or the goods if lawfully unpacked, shall, if required by the Collector of Customs, be returned to the Custom House, within such delay as may be mentioned in the bond under a forfeiture of the penalty of such bond; provided that the Collector shall use due diligence in causing such examination to be made, and may if he sees no objection, permit the remaining packages to be opened and unpacked, as soon as those sent to the Warehouse have been examined and approved.

Collectors to File Invoices.—The Collector of Customs, at all the ports of Canada shall retain and put on file, after duly stamping the same, all invoices of goods imported at such ports respectively, of which invoices they shall give certified copies or extracts, whenever called upon so to do by the importer, and such copies or extracts so duly certified by the Collector or other proper officer, and bearing the Stamp of the Custom House at which they are filed, shall be considered and received as authentic, and the Collector shall be entitled to demand for each certificate a fee of fifty cents, before delivering the same.

COASTING REGULATIONS FOR THE DOMINION.

Sanctioned by Order in Council 28th of July, 1868.

1. Vessels and Boats employed solely in the transport of Goods or Passengers from one Port or place to another Port or place within the limits of the Dominion of Canada, shall be deemed to be engaged in the Coasting Trade, and shall be subject to the Regulations governing the same.

2. None but British registered Vessels and Boats, wholly owned by British subjects, can lawfully be engaged in the Coasting Trade of the Dominion of Canada, and the name of such Vessels or Boats and the names of their Ports of Registry, shall be distinctly painted on the stern of the said Vessels or Boats.

3. Such Vessels and Boats, may, without being subject to entry, or clearance as required by law, for Vessels trading between Ports in the Dominion of Canada, as well as with Foreign Ports, carry goods, the produce of Canada, or goods duty free, or goods duty paid, or passengers from any Ports or places in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, to any other Ports or places in the said Provinces, or from any Ports or places in the Province of New Brunswick, to any other Ports or places in the said Province, or from any Ports or places in the Province of Nova Scotia, to any other Ports or places in the said Province, provided always that the owners or masters of such Vessels or Boats shall take out a license for the season for that purpose from a Collector of Customs in Canada, and that the owners or masters in

taking out the said License shall enter into Bonds of \$500 conditioned that such Vessels or Boats shall not be employed in the Foreign Trade, and provided also that the master of every such Vessel or Boat shall keep or cause to be kept, a Cargo Book in the form prescribed by the Customs Department to be registered by the Collector of Customs who granted the License, in which book shall be entered at the Port of Lading, an account of all goods taken on board of such Vessel or Boat, stating the description of the packages, the quantities, the descriptions and values of the goods therein, as also of the goods stowed loose, and the names of the respective Shippers and Consignees, as far as any of such particulars shall be known to him; and at the port of discharge shall be entered in the said Cargo Book the respective days upon which any such goods shall be delivered out of such Vessel and also the respective times of departure from the Port of lading and of arrival at the Port of unlading.

4. The master of any such Vessel or Boat shall produce his License and Cargo Book to any Officer of Customs, whenever the same shall be demanded, and answer all questions put to him, and such Officer of Customs shall be at liberty to note any remark on the Cargo Book which he may deem proper; and if the Cargo Book shall not be kept in the manner hereby required, and the particulars of all cargo laden and unladen, duly noted therein, the goods and vessel shall be forfeited, and the master shall incur the penalty of \$100.

5. Before any coasting vessel or boat shall depart from any Port of lading in any one of the Provinces of the Dominion of Canada for any other Port in the said Dominion, not in the said Province of departure, an account or report with a duplicate thereof, in the form or to the effect following, and signed by the Master, shall be delivered to the Collector, who shall retain the duplicate and return the original account or report dated and signed by him; and such account or report shall be the clearance of the Vessel or Boat for the voyage and the transire or pass for the goods expressed therein, except for goods under Bond or goods liable to Excise or Internal Revenue duty, which shall require the entries and warrants for landing to be signed by the proper officers as required by Law, and if any such account or report be false, the Master who signed it shall forfeit the sum of \$100.

6. Within twenty-four hours after the arrival of any coasting vessel or boat at the Port of discharge, which requires a *transire* as above described, and before any goods shall be unladen, the *transire* with the name of the place or wharf where the lading is to be discharged, noted thereon, shall be delivered to the collector, who shall note thereon the date of the delivery; and if any of the goods on board such coasting vessel or boat shall be subject to any customs duty the same shall not be unladen until due entry has been made at the Custom House and a warrant granted for the landing thereof; and if any of the goods on board such vessel or boat be subject to any duty of Excise or Internal Revenue the same shall not be unladen without the authority or permission of the proper officer of excise; but no entry shall be required at the Custom House for any goods brought coastwise the produce of Canada or goods on which the duties, whether of Customs or Excise, have already been paid or which are duty free.

7. Vessels and Boats employed in the Coasting Trade and that shall not have taken out a License for carrying goods and obtained a Cargo Book as above provided, shall report inwards and outwards at the nearest port to their place of arrival or destination and require clearances whenever they depart from any port or place within the Dominion of Canada, and in default of their so reporting the vessel or cargo, the Master shall in such cases be subject to the penalty of \$100 for departing and arriving without due entry inwards or outwards as the case may be; provided that when a vessel shall sail from any place where there is no Custom House, or officer of Customs, it shall be sufficient for the carrying out of this regulation that the owner or Master of such vessel do, as soon afterwards as possible, forward to the nearest Custom House a similar report in duplicate, or lodge the same at the first Port at which he shall touch where there is a Custom House officer.

8. Goods under a removal Bond from one Canadian Port to another Canadian Port, may be carried in any British registered vessel or boat, trading Coastwise with a proper License and Cargo Book upon such goods being properly entered in the Cargo Book and in the account or Transire, in duplicate, the Collector at the Port from which such goods are removed, being required to forward by Mail, to the Collector of the Port for which the goods are destined, all the particulars and description of the goods so forwarded, and the Packages shall be properly marked in Red as now provided, but no goods under Bond shall be carried in any Coasting Vessel or Boat until the Master has delivered an account in duplicate or transire to the Collector of Customs at the Port of lading.

9. No Coasting Vessel or Boat to touch at any Foreign Port unless forced by unavoidable circumstances, and the master of any Coasting vessel or boat which has touched at any Foreign Port, shall declare the same in writing under his own hand, to the Collector or other proper officer of Customs at the Port or Place in Canada where his vessel or boat afterwards first arrives, under a penalty of \$100.

10. If any goods are unshipped from any vessel or boat arriving coastwise, or unshipped, or water borne to be shipped to be carried coastwise on Sundays or Holidays, or unless in the presence, or with the authority of the proper Officer of Customs, or unless at such times and places as shall be appointed and approved by him for that purpose; the same shall be forfeited and the Master of the vessel or boat shall forfeit the sum of \$100.

11. Officers of Customs may board any Coasting Vessel or Boat in any Port or Place, and at any period of the voyage search her and examine all goods on board, and demand all the documents which ought to be on board; and the Collector may require such documents to be brought to him for inspection.

12. No Fishing Boat, or boat used in Ferrying, under 15 tons burthen, shall, except by special license or permission, carry any goods from a Foreign Country, which are liable to duty, under pain of seizure, unless the same (in the case of Ferry Boats) be for the sole use of some passenger then on board.

13. No goods can be carried in any Coasting Vessel or Boat, except such as are laden to be so carried at some port or place in Canada, and no goods shall be taken into or put out of any Coasting Vessel or Boat while on her voyage, by River, Lake or Sea.

14. The Transire Coastwise required by these regulations may in the case of any steam vessel carrying a Purser, be signed by such Purser with the like effect in all respects, and subject to the like penalty on the Purser, and the like forfeiture of the goods, in case of any untrue statement in the transire, as if the transire was signed by the Master; and the word *Master* for the purposes of these regulations shall be construed as including the Purser of any steam vessel; but nothing herein contained shall preclude the Collector or proper officer of Customs

from calling upon the Master of any steam vessel to answer all such questions concerning the vessel, passengers, cargo, and crew, as might be lawfully demanded of him if the report had been made by him, or to exempt the Master from the penalties imposed by these regulations for failure to answer any such question, or for answering untruly, or to prevent the master from making such report, if he shall see fit so to do.

15. The Coasting Regulations of the late Province of Canada, dated the 12th April, 1861, and all regulations heretofore existing in the Province of New Brunswick or Nova Scotia in reference to Coasting in any of the said Provinces are hereby repealed.

Regulation in amendment to the above Regulations adopted on the 31st May, 1870. It having been enacted by Chap. 9 Sec. 22, 23rd Victoria, that the Governor may grant yearly Coasting Licenses to British Vessels navigating the inland waters of Canada above Montreal, although such vessels may sometimes make voyages to Foreign Ports, it is hereby Ordered that the Bonds to be given by the Master or Owner of such vessel, on taking out such License shall not contain the condition provided for in Section 3 of said Regulations, "that such Vessel or Boat shall not be employed in the Foreign Trade," but that it shall be a condition of such Bond that whenever any such Vessel or Boat is employed in a voyage to or from a Foreign Port, the master or other proper officer thereof, shall report inwards and outwards, in all respects, as though he had not received such Coasting License.

All goods manufactured in bond shall, if taken out of bond for consumption in Canada, be subject to duties of excise equal to the duties of customs to which they would be subject if imported from Great Britain and entered for consumption in Canada; and whenever any article, not the produce of Canada, upon which a duty of Excise would be levied if produced in Canada, is taken into a Bonded Manufactory, the difference between the duty of Excise to which it would be so liable, and the Customs duty which would be levied on such article, if imported and entered for consumption, shall be paid as a duty of Excise, when it is taken into the Bonded Manufactory.

*Regulations for the Inspection and Branding of Petroleum,
sanctioned by Order in Council of 30th May, 1868:*

1st. Refined Petroleum shall be tested by Taglibues Pyrometer or by such other similar instruments as Inland Revenue Act, may be approved by the Minister of Inland Revenue, and all such Instruments shall be distributed under the supervision of the Department of Inland Revenue, and shall be used in accordance with instructions sanctioned by the said Department.

2nd. Refined Petroleum which was on the 22nd of May, 1868, in possession of parties who were not Refiners, may be allowed to pass inspection provided it bears a fire test of one hundred degrees of Fahrenheit Thermometer, without giving off vapor that will explode or ignite on the application of fire.

3rd. All Barrels, Casks or Packages containing Petroleum which have been inspected shall be branded with :—

Sec. 17. The name of the Inspecting Officer.

The degree of heat at which the vapor produced by it ignited.

The name of the refiner, or if imported the name of the importer.

4th. Refined Petroleum may be warehoused and removed in bond under the regulations made by an Order in Council on the 27th day of April, 1868.

All Petroleum and Coal Oil manufactured in or imported into Canada, offered for sale without having been inspected, shall be liable to forfeiture, and for every barrel, cask or package (containing not less than 20 gals.) inspected there shall be imposed an inspection fee of.....20 cents.

Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to \$400. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers to the amount of \$200, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Court. J. Fraser Registrar.

Law Circuits.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each county; between Hilary and Easter Terms, and at Michaelmas Term. Clerk of Assizes—Deputy-Clerk of the Crown, *ex-officio*.

Division Courts.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge, but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to action of debt or contract amounting to \$100, injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$40, but not to actions for gambling debts, liquor drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land,

&c., or any toll, customs or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

By an Act of the Parliament of Canada, 33 Vic., cap. 3, it was enacted that on, from and after the day upon which the Queen, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, under the authority of the 14th Section of

the British North America Act, 1867, shall, by Order in Council in that behalf, admit Rupert's Land and the North Western Territory into the Union or Dominion of Canada, there shall be formed out of the same, a Province, which shall be one of the Provinces of the Dominion of Canada, and which shall be called the Province of Manitoba and be bounded as follows: that is to say, commencing at the point where the meridian of ninety-six degrees west longitude from Greenwich intersects the parallel of forty-nine degrees north latitude,—thence due west along the said parallel of forty-nine degrees north latitude (which forms a portion of the boundary line between the United States of America and the said North-Western Territory) to the meridian of ninety-nine degrees of west longitude, then due north along the said meridian of ninety-nine degrees west longitude, to the intersection of the same with the parallel of fifty degrees and thirty minutes north latitude,—thence due east along the said parallel of fifty degrees and thirty minutes north latitude to its intersection with the before-mentioned meridian of ninety-six degrees west longitude,—thence due south along the said meridian of ninety-six degrees west longitude to the place of beginning.

By an Order of the Queen, in Council, of the 23rd June, 1870, Rupert's Land and the North-Western Territory, were, on and from the 15th of July last, admitted into the Dominion of Canada, and on the 23rd of the same month, the Honorable Adams George Archibald was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

Under the provisions of the Act 33 Vic., cap 3, (the Manitoba Act) the Provincial Government is to consist of a Lieutenant-Governor; an Executive Council of not more than five persons; a Legislative Council of seven members, appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor; and a Legislative Assembly of twenty-four members elected by the people. The appointments for the Executive and Legislative Councils have not been completed. The census of the Province has been recently taken, and when the returns of the enumerators are completed, the election of members for the Legislative Assembly can be held. The Province will be represented in the Senate of the Dominion by two members nominated by the Crown, and in the House of Commons by four members elected by the people.
