



STRONG PROTEST BY J. C. ELLIOTT

Terms Sir James Whitney's Stand on Tax Reform Reactionary and Penalizing.

THREE - FIFTHS CLAUSE

Government Should Take Steps to Carry Out the Expressed Wishes of the People, He Says.

WOODSTOCK, Jan. 9.—(Special.)—
Tax reform, local option and workmen's compensation were three of the
subjects discussed tonight by J. C.
Ellfott, M.L.A., for West Middlesex, at
the open meeting of the Young Liberal Club of Woodstock. As the representative of a rural constituency,
he made a vigorous protest against
what he termed the reactionary stand
in reference to tax reform taken by
Sir James Whitney, and emphasized
the injustice of the present system to
the farmers of the province, who were
penalized for being industrious. "Sir
James, however," said Mr. Elliott,
"sounded his whistle and the Conservative members of the committee step-

James, however," said Mr. Elliott, "sounded his whistle and the Conservative members of the committee stepped into line."

Mr. Elliott did not like the three-fifths clause in local option. "In my own Village of Glencoe," he gave as an illustration, "altho 133 votes were polled for the bylaw, and only 59 against the bylaw was defeated by, one-fifth vote. The time has come in this province when, in view of the tremendous sentiment expressed by the votes against the license system, the government should take some advanced step to carry out what clearly is the will of the people."

In regard to workmen's compensation, Mr. Elliott declared that the Liberals felt that longer delay on the part of the government should not be tolerated. "Six years have gone by alredy." he reminded his hearers, "and this session there simply must be lagislation. If the government does not bring in a bill, Mr. Rowell has promised to do so himself."

Will equality of treatment in the matter of freight rates between the east and west be brought about by the Dominion Railway Commission, or must the basic principle at stake be enunciated by parliament?

The hearing now on at Ottawa before the Dominion Railway Commission may result in great good, but its progress so far has been disappointing. To an observer, it looks as the the lawyers were running away with the court. Chairman Drayton apparently does not command the situation as did the late chairman, Hon. J. P. Mabee. In the trial now going on there is frequently a babel of voices, and a stranger entering the courtroom might well wonder what it is all about.

The commission has its courtroom in the handsome station recently erected at Ottawa by the Grand Trunk Railway Company. Another item of interest was the fact that if one wished to travel he had to wait for a party. Stories were related on the Indians' hospitality which gave a far different head to the American aborogines impression of the American aborogines than that which is usually held. The period of the war of 1812 was dwelt upon quite fully and showed how great a sacrifice the Canadians of that day made for their beloved country.


