PARIS HEARS OF DECISIVE BRITISH VICTORY IN BELGIUM

GERMANS REPULSED ON WHOLE FRONT

CAMPAIGN IN NORTH NEAR ITS END

PARIS, Dec. 11.—Reports reaching here this evening tell of a decisive British victory in Belgium. While details are lacking, it is said that the Germans have been repulsed for a considerable distance, losing heavily. Military circles say that if this is true it will probably prove the turning point of the campaign in the north.

Seven Hundred Men of the Engineers' Corps Will Be Sent to France or Belgium Next Week To Prepare a Hospital Base and Make All Preparations For the Arrival of the Contingent.

Whitby Stirred by Midnight Murder, Supposedly Deed of Two Tramps. POLICE HOLD SUSPECTS Victim Had Just Time to Telephone Alarm for Police Before Dying.

Three of Five Austro-German Columns Converging on Warsaw Repulsed With Enormous Losses—Seven Attacks on Russian Trenches Ended Disastrously.

SALISBURY, Eng., Dec. 11.—Preparations are being made to move the Canadian contingent to the firing line in France or Belgium. It is expected that the Canadian Engineers, consisting of about 700 men, will leave next week to build a base hospital and otherwise prepare for the arrival of the contingent. No. 2 Company Engineers from Toronto, consisting of 250 men, in command of Captain Irving, four brigades of infantry and the divisional signal company manoeuvred in the rain today.

Toronto City Council by a vote of 14 to 2 last evening decided to construct the floor street section of the big Don viaduct of steel. After discussing the question all afternoon, the vote to adopt the board of control's report showed only Ald. McBride and Rowland opposing, with Dr. Wicklett, the other pro-concrete men, absent.

William Stone, 21, telegraph operator at Whitby station of the Grand Trunk Railway, was fatally wounded by a revolver bullet at 12.37 yesterday morning, and died shortly after telephoning an alarm for Chief of Police MacGroarty, and acting on information sent to the Toronto police two men who gave their names as Cecil and Albert Connors, 17 and 18, and brothers, were arrested as suspects in the case by Detectives Croome and Montgomery of the Toronto police force as they arrived in East Toronto on a freight train which had been shunting in the yards at Whitby about the time of the murder.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 11.—The following statement from the general staff of the Russian commander-in-chief was issued tonight: "In the direction of Mlawa, the Germans, on Dec. 10, kept up a strong offensive throughout the day and night, but we succeeded in repulsing them. Our troops, themselves taking the offensive, gave chase to the German columns, which, in some places, retreated in disorder. In the region to the north of Lovicz the enemy made some fierce attacks on the night of Dec. 8-10, and through the whole of the following day. We repulsed these attacks and inflicted enormous losses on the Germans.

RUSSIANS SOUTH OF CRACOW ARE FORCING GERMANS BACK Enemy Approached to Within Fifteen Miles of Warsaw Before Meeting Severe Check—Whole German Campaign May Fall to Pieces. (RUSSIAN OFFICIAL)

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Dec. 11.—10.55 p.m.—Reporting to his congratulations on the victory of the British squadron over the Germans off the Falkland Islands, Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, today cabled the Japanese minister of marine as follows: "With the sinking of the Scharnhorst, Goebenau, Leipzig and Nürnberg, the whole German squadron which had its base at Tsingtau at the break of the war has been destroyed and the base itself reduced and captured. This event in the conclusion of the active operations in which the allied fleets have been engaged in the Pacific for four months. Tho it has fallen to a British squadron in the South Atlantic to strike the final blow, it was largely owing to the powerful and untiring assistance rendered by the Japanese fleet that this result has been achieved." British Had Luck. "And the enemy turned west again the honors would have rested with the Japanese and Australian squadrons moving forward in the general combination. I take the opportunity of your excellency's cordial message to express on behalf of the British and Australian navies earnest recognition of the valuable naval assistance of Japan."

Miss Elizabeth Kivell, 159 East Gerrard street, is in St. Michael's Hospital with a fractured skull as a result of being struck by a motor car at the corner of Wilton avenue and Mutual street last night. There is little hope entertained for her recovery. Fawcett A. Reid, of 30 South Drive, vice-president of the A. T. Reid Co., was driving the motor. After taking the woman to the hospital he went to the Court Street Police Station and there told his story. He said that he had come south on Jarvis street and turning along Wilton avenue he had to stop at the corner of Mutual st. to allow a farmer's wagon to pass. When the wagon passed, he said, Miss Kivell stepped from the sidewalk and at the same time he started his machine. He stopped again and so did Miss Kivell. A Misunderstanding. Thinking, he said, that she was going to allow him to pass, he commenced along the street. When he was about to pass her, she started, he says, to walk across the street, with the result that his mudguard struck her, knocking her to the pavement. At the time this car was traveling very slowly. He was not detained by the police. Miss Kivell was employed by the T. Eaton Company. She came to Toronto from Bowmanville, and was about 30 years of age.

### GERMANS ATTACK ALLIES AT YPRES

Three Attempts to Gain the Trenches Have Been Repulsed.

### CZAR REACHES TIFLIS

His Enthusiastic Reception Has Relieved Anxiety at the Capital.

#### Summary of News.

Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, Dec. 11.—The French and German official statements of today indicate that the new attempts of the allies to throw back the Germans in Belgium have been checked, and that in the region of Ypres the Germans have returned the attack.

The Paris announcement states that several German attacks were made, and that three of them were repulsed. It is admitted, however, that at one point the Germans succeeded in reaching one of the first line trenches of the allies. Elsewhere in Flanders, however, continued progress is reported. The German statement says that gains have been made in Flanders.

Conflicting statements are made about the fighting in the Argonne region. The French War Office asserts that two German attacks there were repulsed, and that the allies have pushed forward several trenches. Berlin reports success in attacks on French artillery positions east and west of the Argonne forest.

General Mackensen's army is within 15 miles of Warsaw, according to Petrograd, which also says that the Austro-German armies are showing less impetus in their attacks, and that these have failed to relieve the Russian siege of Crauw and Przemyl.

Berlin accepts the destruction of Admiral Von Speer's squadron by the British fleet under Sturdee as accomplished, also word of the sinking of the Nürnberg has not yet reached Berlin. The cruiser Dresden, the last survivor of the five German warships, is reported to have sunk, but the news is not confirmed.

Empress William, announcement of whose illness was followed by various unauthenticated reports, that his condition was serious, is said to have improved considerably.

Czar at Tiflis. The czar has arrived at Tiflis. His enthusiastic reception in the Caucasus has relieved considerable anxiety at the Russian capital.

Constantinople officially reports the defeat by Turkey of a Russian attempt to disembark a force south of Batum. M. Ribot, French minister of finance, in a statement showing the financial strength of France and her need at present to have recourse to a loan.

Advices from Nish, Serbia, assert that the Austrians are retreating in disorder all along the line, and that more than 100,000 men have been taken by the Serbians.

TRENCH LOST AT YPRES WAS QUICKLY REGAINED. German Offensive Failed in its Object After Spirited Action.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Dec. 11.—In the west, both the French and the Germans claim that they have made progress in the Argonne region and Flanders. It is evident that the Germans, with a view to stopping the advance which the allies are making in Flanders, attempted an offensive in the vicinity of Ypres and succeeded in taking one trench from the French.

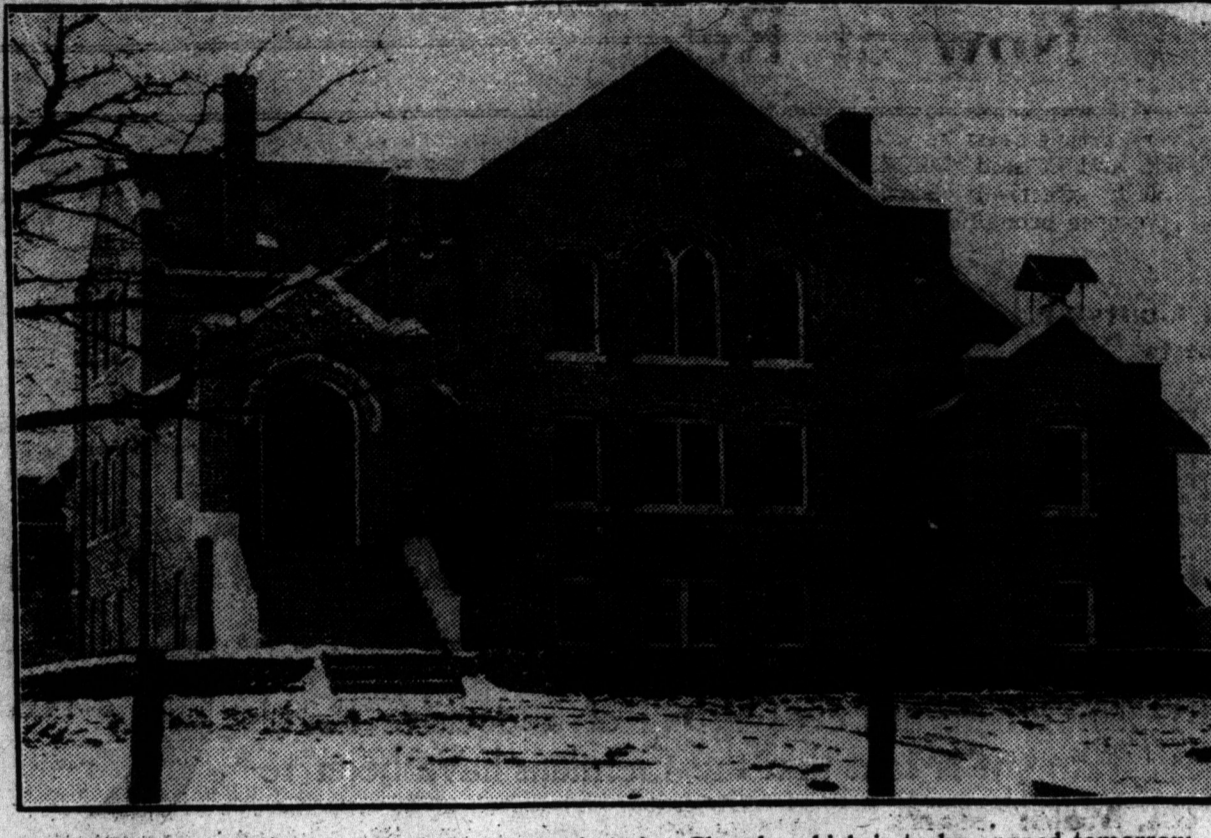
Elsewhere along the front there have been artillery duels, with occasional infantry attacks on first one side and then the other.

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### Sturdee's Naval Victory Cost Only Seven Lives

LONDON, Dec. 11, 3:15 p.m.—The secretary of the admiralty has received a cable despatch from Vice-Admiral Sturdee of the British squadron, stating that in the battle of the Falkland Islands, in which the German cruisers Scharnhorst, Gneisenau and Leipzig were sunk, the British casualties totaled seven men killed and four wounded.

William Stone, victim of murder, was shot at Whitby. Two brothers were held as suspects. The police say from their investigation it appears that two persons were concerned in the shooting.

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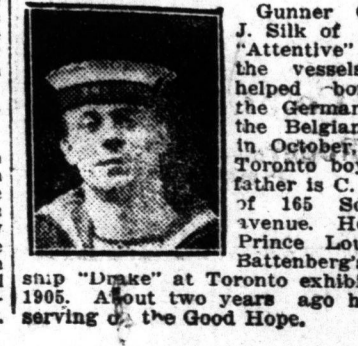

STEEL WON FIGHT VIADUCT TO START

Some Members of Council Still Were Unconvinced, But Voted.

HARRIS MADE A SPEECH

Told Why He Liked Steel Concrete Expert Was Also Heard.

(Continued From Page 1) A petition, signed by one hundred of the residents, asked that the council construct the viaduct of concrete.

Harris wanted Commissioner Harris to advise council on whose opinions he based his report favoring steel construction before the members of the council should be asked to decide on whether to build until after the discussion.

Wicket called attention to a number of letters from engineering authorities which he laid before the members of the council. He declared that he thought the report of the commissioner of works was based on unsound premises, and that in regard to the commissioner's contentions of weather effect on reinforced concrete the effect was equally injurious to steel.

"Safety we must take first and foremost into consideration," declared Ald. Hitz, after which several came into consideration the question of noise, beauty and cost. On the question of safety, he said he had not as yet been convinced, but thought the steel the noisier, uglier and more expensive according to the way the tenders appeared at first glance.

Singer Had New Light. Ald. Singer said he had been called up on the telephone by a concrete man who gave him information on the subject which he had never before gained, and to get an opportunity of verifying the statements made to him he wanted to refer the matter back for a week.

He was a member of the Canadian Society of Engineers, the American Society, and the Great Britain organization. He was one of a number who investigated the Quebec bridge disaster, and a consulting engineer in the drafting of a standard for the profession in reinforced concrete construction.

Commissioner Harris's reply was the longest address ever made by a civic official to the council; in it he took up one by one the statements made by aldermen derogatory to steel and refuted them. Referring to a huge paper advertisement which recently appeared in all the papers, he declared that many of the bridges referred to there were not built of reinforced concrete, but of masonry concrete.

It also will advise council, said the commissioner, that it is a mistake to think concrete construction cheaper than steel. A concrete viaduct, to comply with the Ontario Railway Board specifications, would cost infinitely more than steel.

Government Will Attend to Comforts in Big Camps in New Ontario.

TO CLEAR MUCH LAND

Several Hundred Austrians and Germans in Montreal to Be Sent North Soon.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, Dec. 11.—Owing to the large number of Austrians and Germans in Montreal who are to be interned, and the difficulty of finding accommodations for them without considerable trouble and expense, every effort is being made to expedite their departure to the work that is being provided for them.

All the Toronto regiments are ready to be sent to any army or accoutrements left at home by the members of the first contingent to be returned to the regimental headquarters at the armories.

To Cut Road Thru Bush. Arrangements have also been made with the Quebec Water Power Commission for the sending of 400 or 500 men up to Parent, on the N.T.R., where they will begin the cutting of a 40-mile road thru the bush.

Prisoners to Be Well Cared. Before the men can be sent up to the northern camps a good deal of work is necessary to provide them with clothing, to make arrangements for supporting the families of the married men, and to organize the camps and the transportation.

THE present vogue for the collarless blouse demands that the neck be attractive and the woman who has not been blessed with a white, slender throat is doing all in her power to obtain one.

(Only half this quantity need be made if desired.)

A thin neck, in which the cords are unusually prominent, is never beautiful, but with care and perseverance it can be much improved. Massage is absolutely necessary, if the neck requires fattening, and one of the best preparations for this purpose is a mixture of equal parts of raw white of an egg and almond oil. Beat these thoroughly and rub into the flesh. Use brisk, firm strokes to promote circulation and knead the flesh beneath the skin. Work the food into the pores by dragging the finger tips over the surface with a rotary motion.

If you are not familiar with the use of a complexion brush follow these directions when scrubbing the face. Select a brush with soft, long, soft bristles and use as hot water as you can stand, to which some liquid green soap has been added. Rub the brush over the skin with a rotary motion. After scrubbing for three or four minutes rinse the throat with warm water and then with cold. Then apply the cream.

This treatment should be given every night if you would have a beautiful neck.

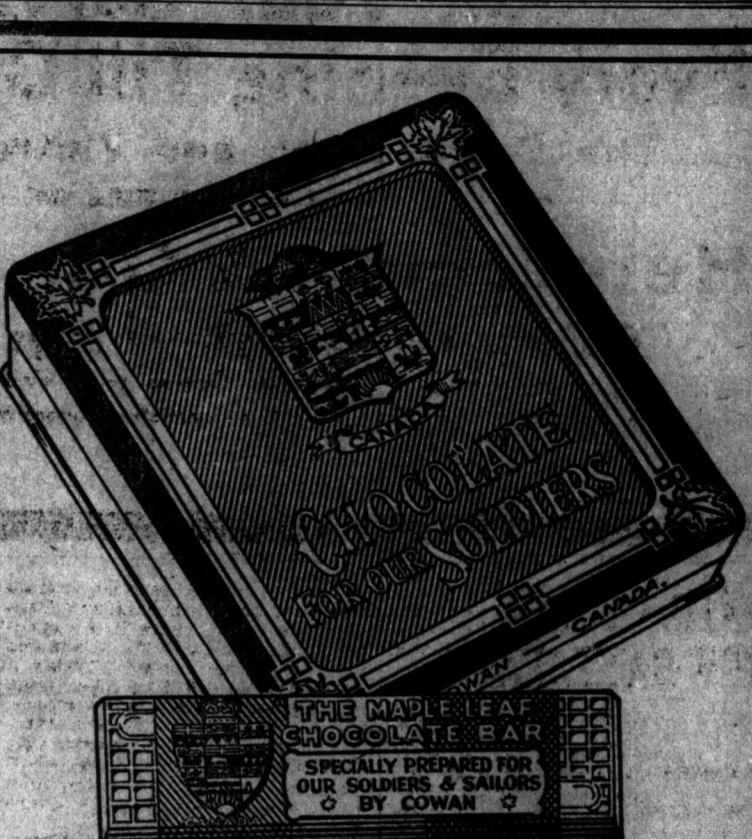

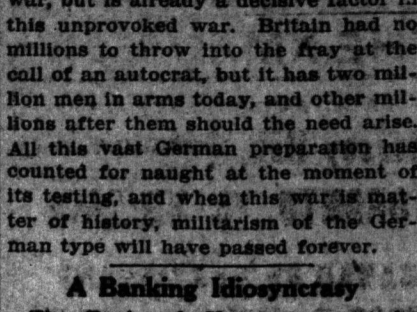

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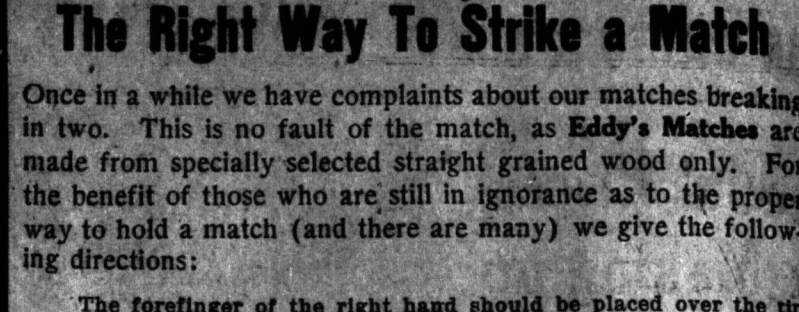

### WIND UP OF BOXING OUT IN CALIFORNIA

#### History of the Game in the West—Dundee Wins Last Fight.

When Johnny Dundee, the New York lightweight, gained a decision over Joe Rivers of Los Angeles, at Los Angeles, it marked the last 20-round battle to be staged in California before the anti-prizefight law became effective. Rivers had a shade over the New York man until the eleventh round. After that Dundee took the lead and had Rivers almost out in the nineteenth and twentieth.

Back in the early '90s, when James J. Corbett first stepped into ring prominence, California began to make pugilistic history and ever since that time the Golden State has been looked upon as a great centre for the maintenance and encouragement of this sport. Many championship battles have been fought there, and followers of the foot and fist have been well satisfied with the bouts were scheduled at San Francisco, Los Angeles or any other of the many places where great encounters are decided and titles passed. Two generations of little champions have enjoyed the privilege afforded by the state of California and thousands of followers of the sport have been well satisfied with the results. But all this is to be changed, and the "knights of the glove and squared circle" will have to seek fresh fields outside of California.

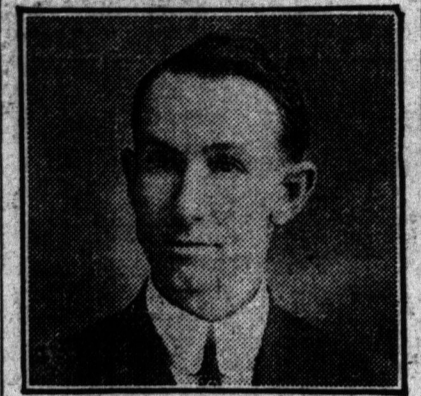
At the recent state election the majority of California's voters decided that pugilism should not be accredited as legal sport, thus making it mandatory for the boxer to settle his differences as to relative merits elsewhere. At midnight of Tuesday, Dec. 15, "pug" will be sounded for other than amateur bouts of four rounds duration in the principal Pacific coast state, and after a rather prosperous quarter of a century, pugilism will be taboo. In recent years the California promoters of this class of sport have given excellent inducements to the leading fighters of the world, and as a result the best men in every class have at one time or another appeared there and several championship titles have been lost and won.

One notable heavyweight contest has taken place in San Francisco since the notable 61-round draw between James J. Corbett and Peter Jackson fought in 1891. This served to bring Corbett into the limelight, and within eighteen months afterward the then young bank clerk had annexed the heavyweight honors by defeating John L. Sullivan in New Orleans, in September, 1892. The young Californian was not considered seriously as a possible contender by Sullivan's legion of admirers, and the Pacific coast was "shaded" when Corbett brought back the championship to his native state.

Among the many bouts between big men decided in San Francisco in the last 12 years the following may be mentioned: Jim Jeffries knocked out Bob Fitzsimmons in eight rounds. This was in 1902, but four years after Fitzsimmons had made at Coney Island in 11 rounds. Jeffries lasted only two rounds with Jack Munroe in the following year, and in 1905 Jeffries retired, only temporarily. Jack O'Brien vanquished Fitzsimmons at

San Francisco in 12 rounds last same year, and in 1908 Tommy Burns, who was the recognized successor of Jeffries, defeated Marvin Hart in 20 rounds. Twelve months after that Burns defeated Jack O'Brien in a 20-round bout at Los Angeles and knocked out Bill Scuire in a single round at Colma in 1910, where two years later Stanley Ketchel was knocked out in 12 rounds by Jack Johnson. The last of the big bouts was the between "Gunboat" Smith and Arthur Polkey last January.

Among the lighter bouts the best leads in each division have been seen in action at San Francisco or Los Angeles during the last 10 years, and the fact that no more championships will be decided in California, for some years at least, will be a source of regret among the host of boxing enthusiasts of the Pacific coast.

### LATE OPENING FOR BARROW'S CIRCUIT

#### Will Play Only Hundred and Forty Games—Franchises Not Yet Dealt With.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—When the International League Baseball Club owners found up their annual season here late tonight they had not agreed upon a definite plan of transferring the league franchises from Jersey City and Baltimore to Syracuse, N. Y., and Richmond, Va. This, the most important business of the season, had been discussed at length since the meeting began last Monday. While the sentiment of the club representatives was in favor of the Syracuse and Richmond promoters securing the franchises, none of the league officials would say positively that the transfers would be made. President Barrow said that the entire matter has been entrusted to two separate committees, one for the Jersey City-Syracuse deal and the other to take up the Baltimore-Richmond transaction. President Barrow is on both committees. J. J. McCaffery of Toronto, and Charles H. Chapman of Rochester, will aid him in disposing of the Jersey City club affairs, while Joseph J. Lannin of Providence, and Charles H. Ebbets of New York, will assist him in clearing up the Baltimore-Richmond deal. These committees are to report back to a special meeting of the league, which will be called during the second week of next January.

"That the league will continue its eight-club circuit is evidenced by the fact that a playing schedule of 140 games was announced for next season. During the last ten years this league has been playing 164 games, and this, in the opinion of the majority of the club owners, made the season too long. The opening date for 1915 has been set for April 27.

A radical change was made when the player limit for each club was reduced today to 16, but nothing was done in reference to the salary limit, as it was considered that the reduction in the number of players would regulate this. The double umpire system will be compulsory, as it has proved to be entirely satisfactory to all concerned.

The election of a new executive committee was put off until the next meeting, but Joseph J. Lannin of Providence was added to the present committee, which in addition to President Barrow, consists of McCaffery, Shaplin and Ebbets.

None of the club managers had signed contracts for next year when the season ended tonight, but it was understood there would be no changes expected in two clubs, and these are the ones involved in the proposed transfer of franchises.

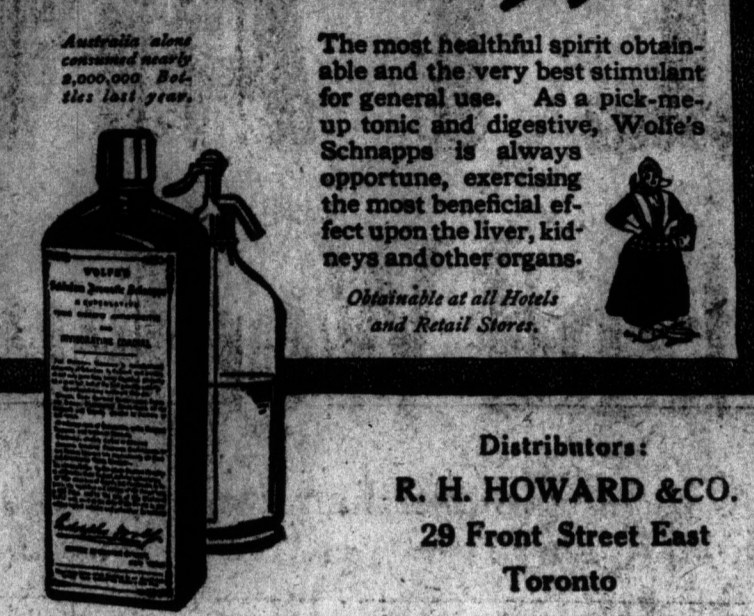

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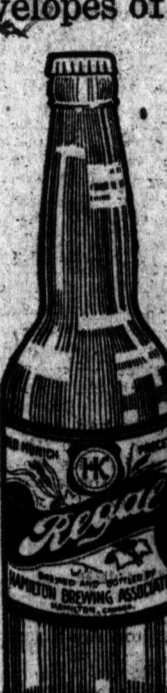

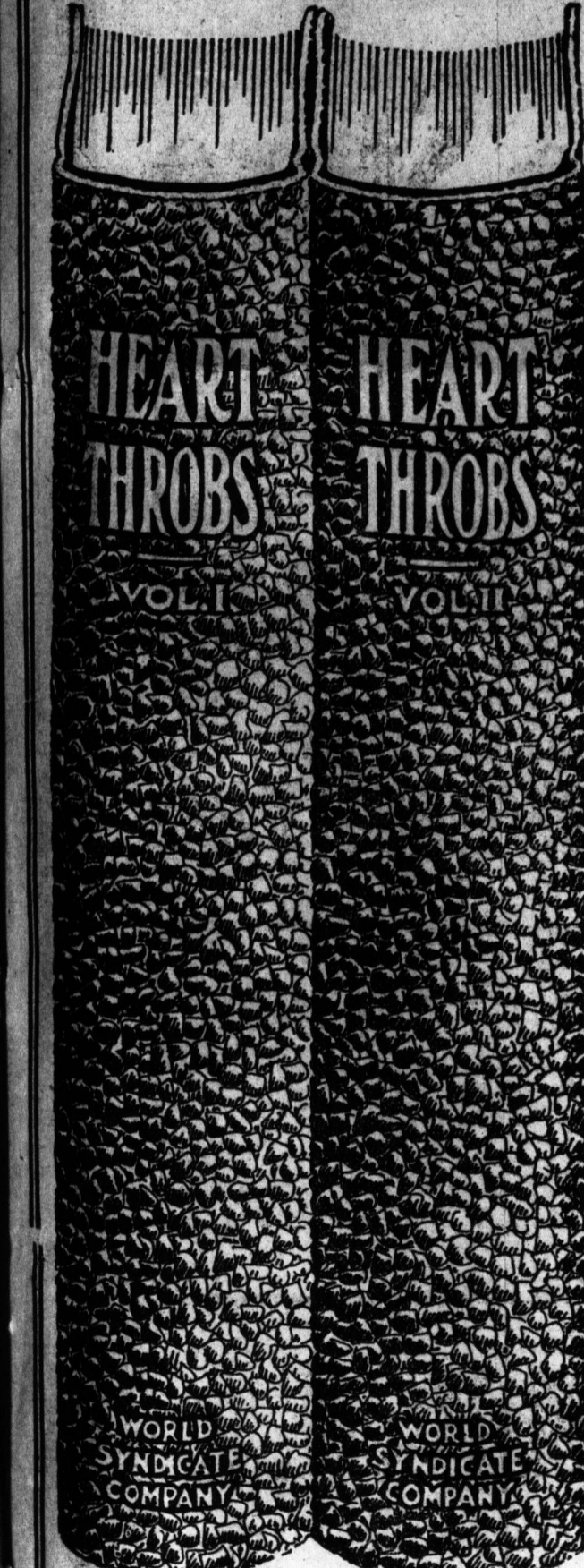

### LIMITED STOCK DEALINGS BEGIN IN NEW YORK TODAY

Financial District Encouraged—Preparations Ready—Will Prevent Liquidation—List Abbreviated—No International Issues—Actual Minimum Prices Given.

Canadian Press Despatch. NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—After one hundred and eleven days of involuntary inactivity, a condition imposed by the European war, which caused a suspension of regular dealings in all the leading financial markets of the world, the New York Stock Exchange will reopen tomorrow for limited dealings in stocks. The financial district was distinctly encouraged today by the prospect of a return, even the partial, to the established order of things, and all preparations to meet the reopening were perfected, including the re-employment of many clerks and messengers received during the last few days by brokers from all sections of the country.

Among the stocks that will not appear on the open list and which will be dealt in privately are a number of the so-called international, including Union Pacific, Baltimore and Ohio, New York Central, Illinois Central, United States Steel and American Mining. The principal reason for the omission of these stocks is that they are held largely abroad, Canadian Pacific and Southern Railway being especially favorites of the Berlin market.

Condition Improved. That the condition of the international list as a whole has improved appreciably is shown, however, in the latest list of minimum prices quoted by the exchange. These are on the basis of July 30 quotations, but in a number of important instances sales recently made were from two to five points above that level.
