THE JOHN EATON FIRE.

An Inquest Opened Last Night Before Coroner Johnson.

SUPERINTENDENT BAKER ON THE STAND.

Crown Officials Fishing for Evidence as to the Cause of the Fire.

Baker Says There Were Four Sets of Keys for the Premises--Was Engaged Six Weeks Before the Blaze--Formerly There Were Two Watchmen on Duty--At the Time of the Conflagration There Was One--Night Watchman Rodgers Says Baker Gave Him a Bottle of Whiskey That Night--Evidence in Conflict.

An inquest into the origin and cause of the fire which destroyed the John Eaton Company's premises on the morning of May 20 last was opened before Coroner Johnson last night in the Police Court room.

Richard Baker's Evidence. Richard Baker was employed as superintendent of store for about six weeks previous to the fire. Mr. Pierson had been superintendent of the store.

Had no financial stake or money in the business of the store. He was paid \$250 a week, paid up by himself. When he went with the John Eaton Company his business ceased, so far as his salary of \$15 a week was concerned.

John Eaton carried keys, so did W. A. Thompson, and he thought Boyce Thompson was the one who had the keys. He was not in witness reported to Mr. W. A. Thompson, but could not say whether he heard or not.

At 10 o'clock the witness said he filled the furnace up, but the next morning he didn't recollect whether he filled the furnace or not.

Witness was locked in at 6 o'clock by Mr. Baker, who came back every night before he went to bed.

The Queen Dismisses Her Lords and Commons.

And Prays the Blessing of Heaven to Rest On Their Labor.

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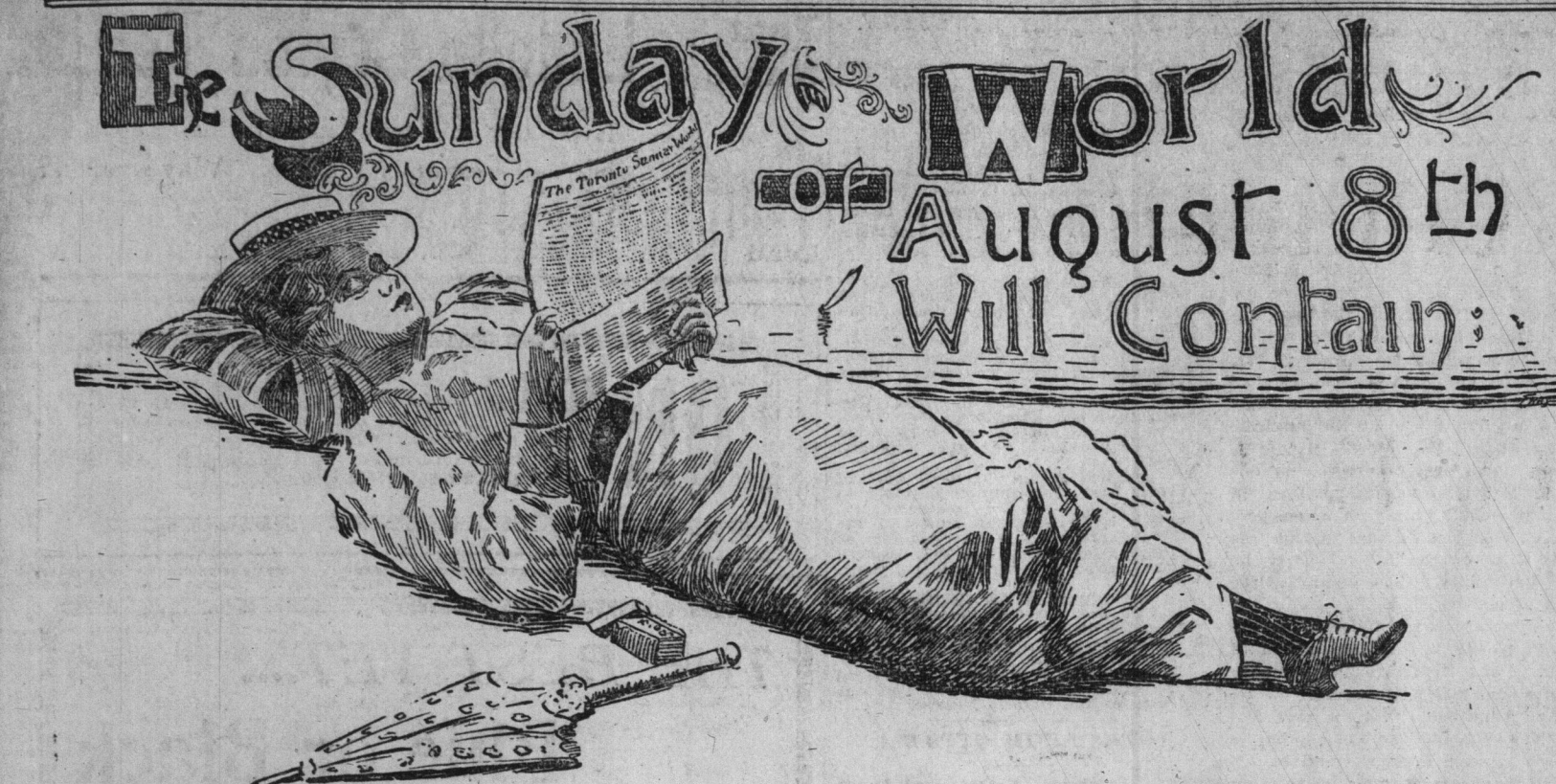

SOME MILITARY NEWS.

The Queen Express: Appreciation of the Jubilee Turnout Fall Camp. Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 6.—A militia general order was promulgated yesterday, containing much of interest. Amongst other matters is the following, commemorative of the Queen's reign of 60 years.

The following special army order, dated June 23, 1907, is promulgated for general information: The Commander-in-Chief is commanded by the Queen to express Her Majesty's approval to General, His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, K.C., of the admirable arrangements made by His Royal Highness, not only for yesterday's military procession, but also for the excellent and carefully considered disposition of the troops along the line of route. Her Majesty further recognizes the very efficient services rendered to His Royal Highness by Major-General Lord Methuen, C.B., C.M.G., commanding the home contingent.

The Queen also desires to express her gratification at the appearance, upon this occasion, of the excellent and carefully considered disposition of the troops along the line of route. The Commander-in-Chief desires that the necessary steps may be taken to make Her Majesty's approbation known to all who were on duty during the occasion.

Fall Camp. A number of fall camps are authorized to be held, the only one in military district No. 2 being at Sault Ste. Marie on Aug. 9, when the Sault Ste. Marie Rifle Company will undergo their annual training. The regulations issued are as usual.

The following corps are granted permission to drill at their headquarters: The Governor-General's Body Guard, the Second, Tenth, Thirtieth, Nineteenth, Thirty-eighth and Forty-eighth Battalions.

The formation of a new squadron, to be designated A Squadron, is authorized, with headquarters at Huntington, Que.

The above changes will date from July 1, 1907. Localization—17th Levis Battalion of Infantry, No. 4 Company. The headquarters of this company is changed from New Liverpool to St. Nicholas, Que.

Nomenclature—The 46th East Durham Battalion will in future be known as the 46th Durham Battalion of Infantry.

Mr. Senior has been commissioned to look after the interests of his paper in connection with the coming meeting of the British Association here. He arrived, tired and travel-worn, at an early hour yesterday morning, led by the true instincts of his profession, and the requirements of a thirty years' experience, went forth immediately to see what he could see.

Mr. Senior's first impressions of the Queen City of the banquet colony were favorable as they will be lasting. He admires the quaint mixture of the antique and the modern in the architecture of our public buildings and the somewhat grotesque appearance of our parks, more particularly of Queen's Park. Coming as it does from one who has been accustomed to gaze upon the stately homes of England, this latter statement is not surprising.

In short, typical English journalist that he is, The News representative shares the growing admiration of his countrymen, or our countrymen, if you will have it so, for Canada. Never before, says he, has this Dominion been so much brought before the eyes of the British, and the Continental public as well, as it has been in the past twelve months. This condition of affairs he ascribes largely to the visit of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the Jubilee pageant.

The present Premier, in his estimation, has done more to make Canada score first among the colonies than any Canadian representative in the Old Country. Stationed at old St. Paul's during the time of the great cosmopolitan pageant, Mr. Senior observed that Sir Wilfrid seemed to be the only one of the Colonial Premiers known of the multitude, and accordingly everywhere applauded.

English v. Canadian Journalism. Comparing the English to the Canadian and American style of journalism, Mr. Senior was obliged to yield the palm to the latter. "London papers have been ridiculing your style for the past half-century," he admitted, "but now they are slowly beginning to copy it. When I first came over there with my American ideas we laughed at him and dubbed it 'new journalism.' We go in for the refinements of a ceremony, while you adhere more to descriptive work. I must admit your style has its merits."

Through this is his first tour of Canada, it is not the first time Mr. Senior has been on this continent, having represented The Daily News at the Chicago World's Fair. He is an enthusiastic traveler, carrying with him a complete outfit of tackle, and edits the evening department of The Field, one of the oldest and best sporting papers in London. He has also contributed a number of popular works on this subject.

Should the opportunity present itself, he expressed the desire to drop his line at periodic intervals between Quebec and Pictou, Canada. One thing is certain, some creeks within excess of Toronto are threatened with depopulation.

Mr. Senior, whose pen-name for years has been "Red Spenser," is one of the most accomplished of descriptive reporters of the Old Land possesses. His style is piquant and picturesque, and his graphic descriptions of Royal processions, Parliamentary proceedings and the annual convalescence of such bodies as the British Association, Social Science and Trades Congress, and great religious conventions have been generally awarded the palm by his pressmen. It is safe to predict that his picturesque sketches of his visit to Canada and the Toronto proceedings of the British Association will like other work of Mr. Senior's facile pen, be reprinted as a memento of the Jubilee visit to Canada.

It may be added that Mr. Senior is an old champion of "Ebor" of The World, who has always been an admirer of "Red Spenser's" admirable work.

B., \$696,401, increase 10.4 per cent.; totals \$22,328,022, increase 12 per cent.

TROUBLE OVER FISH.

A Seizure of Canadian Fish at Duluth Which Will be Made a Test Case Under the Dingley Bill.

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 6.—An issue in which a number of large fish companies are said to be interested has been raised here. A vigorous protest has been made by the A. Booth Packing Company against paying a quarter cent duty on fish from Canada, imposed by the Dingley bill. Collector Willcutts of this port yesterday levied on a cargo of fish on one of the Booth steamers. He takes the position that the fish levied on cannot be admitted free, as they were caught in Canadian waters by Canadian fishermen. The company, however, has filed a protest in which it is stated that it is an American corporation, composed of citizens of the United States; that the fish were caught by nets owned and transferred by it; that for this reason the fish should be admitted free under a provision of the Dingley bill which allows citizens of the United States to bring in fish free of duty which they caught in foreign fish waters.

The decision of Collector Willcutts will be appealed to the Secretary of the Treasury, and if the company is decided against there it is said it will be taken out court as a test case.

HOUSE BLOOD FOR DRUNKENNESS.

A San Francisco Doctor Has Discovered a Cure for Alcoholism.

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—Dr. Fred W. Evelyn, head of St. Luke's Hospital in this city, has just made public the results of 15 years' experiments by which he claims to have found a certain cure for incoercible horse blood, or, in other words, for the transmissibility of hereditary taint of alcoholism in the British Army in Zululand, and he has introduced it into the human system. What vaccine has been to smallpox he says vaccine will be to hereditary or acquired alcoholism. The doctor declares that he has been successful in all cases where sedatives or narcotics were not used.

Debs is Had at Judge Jackson.

Pittsburg, Aug. 6.—Eugene V. Debs left today for Turtle Creek, where he speaks this evening. Before leaving the city Mr. Debs denounced Judge Jackson of West Virginia for issuing the injunction restraining him from interfering in any way with the Monongah Company or its employees. Mr. Debs said: "This injunction attempts the right of peaceable assembly and effectually suppresses free speech. If it is sustained, and I have no doubt it will be, it sweeps away all constitutional safeguards, and delivers us, bound hand and foot, to corporate capital."

An Old Educator Dead.

Harford, Conn., Aug. 6.—Dr. James Hammond Trumbull, Yale, 1842, who held degree of LL. D. from both Yale and Harvard, died at his home here today in his 76th year.

MARRIED AN OLD MAN.

The Couple Did Not Live Happily, Separated, and a Double Tragedy Was Resulted.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Aug. 6.—H. A. Dalley, a well-to-do Jenison man, shot his wife last night. This morning he took poison and died while in charge of the officers. The woman may possibly recover. Last April Dalley sent a letter to Mayor Swift of Chicago, saying he wanted a woman of mature years as a wife. The Mayor gave the missive to the newspapers as a literary curiosity. The result was that Dalley received nearly 800 answers from women who wanted a home. Out of the lot Dalley selected Mrs. Hattie Newton, a Chicago widow. Three months ago they were married. Dalley was 70 years old and his bride 45. Their life was unhappy. Dalley became very jealous when his wife returned to Chicago for a long visit. They quarrelled bitterly, and he three days to return to her allegiance as his wife. The time was just night, but she refused to resume wifely relations. He forced his way into her bedroom, and pressing his right side against her heart, fired as the woman seized the muzzle and pushed it aside. The charge penetrated her right side. She staggered from the house in her nightgown, and fell bleeding on the door-step of Luman Jenison's house, where she was found. Dalley was arrested, and as there is no jail in Jenison, he remained in custody of officers until morning, when he was to be taken to Grand Haven. Before taking the train he was allowed to enter a saloon and drink several glasses of beer. At the bar he fell backward in spasms. He had managed to slip strychnine into the beer unperceived, and was dead in a few minutes.

MEYER STUCK IN THE BATH.

Another Man Was Thumping His Wife and He Couldn't Help Her.

New York, Aug. 6.—Melville C. Brown, an attorney of Laramie, Wyo., has filed an affidavit in which he swears that Mrs. Sarah Ann Angell, who is seeking to prove a marriage with the late Jay Gould, admitted to him that she never was married to Gould, nor was he the father of her daughter.

MRS. NACK'S APPEAL.

The Woman Asks Happy Women Who Have True Husbands for sympathy.

New York, Aug. 6.—The World this morning publishes the following interview with Mrs. Nack, the alleged accomplice of Martin Thorne in the murder of Goldensuppe: "I ask those women who are happy, and who have good, true husbands and pleasant families and happy homes, not to judge me too harshly, for, in my opinion, no woman who is happy in her married life can ever realize what terrible temptations follow unkindness and neglect on the part of a husband, and what those temptations sometimes lead a wife to do."

FITZGERALD MADE A SENSATION.

The Ex-Priest and Firebug Broke Loose From His Lawyer at Rochester.

Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 6.—John M. Fitzgerald, ex-priest and convicted firebug; William Hall, alias "Kid"; J. James Williams, printer, alias "Will"; and Albert McIntyre, all charged by the Rev. Father O'Leary of the Church of the Holy Redeemer, with deserting from his \$250 by threats of death and exposure of gross immorality, were held for the grand jury by Magistrate Fines in the Police Court this morning. Fitzgerald created a sensation by refusing to follow the advice of his counsel, David N. Salisbury, and waive examination. He made a speech in which he denounced the newspapers and demanded to be put on the stand in his own behalf. He said also that he wanted his case tried separately from the others. Bail was fixed at \$2000. Williams secured it. The others are still in jail with good prospects of staying there until their cases come up.

CATHOLIC CLERGYMAN FINED.

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ASSAULTED AN OLD LADY.

A Cowardly Attack on Mrs. McDonald, a Widow, at Morrisburg.

Morrisburg, Aug. 6.—A strange case of assault occurred here this morning on Mrs. McDonald, an aged widow, living alone in a small house in the rear of St. James' Church. Mrs. Nixon, whose husband had been killed at her door and thinking it a call for her to attend Mrs. Ullman, opened the door, when she was seized by the throat and thrown upon the floor. Her cries aroused Rev. Mr. Anderson of St. James' Church, and his father, the elder Mr. Anderson reached Mrs. McDonald first and was met by a young man, who said: "Go in quick; men are in there." Rev. Mr. Anderson, who was close at hand, sized up the situation and said to his father, "This is the man," and struck the fellow with a light stick, which was not heavy enough to fell him, and he succeeded in getting away, leaving his hat behind him, which may lead to his arrest. Mrs. Nixon was insensible for some time, and is now in a very weak condition.

YELL OVER THE BANK.

A Little Boy Entirely Mangled at the Falls—He Fell 100 Feet.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Aug. 6.—James Demont, a little Italian boy, 11 years old, fell over the bank of the gorge here this morning and landed on the tracks of the gorge road, 100 feet below, receiving fatal injuries. The little fellow had been wandering about the top of the bank near the foot of Chilton Avenue, gathering wood, and was alone. How he came to fall is not certain. He was picked up by a passing car and brought to this city. The strangest thing about the matter is that there seem to be no broken bones and the injuries are mostly internal, one being the rupture of his abdomen.
