NEW LAKES CANAL. Washington, May 13 .- The work of transforming the lake cities into Atlantic ports which has been taken up by the Northwestern Steamship Company of Chicago, which has constructed four sister ships, 255 feet long, to ply regularly between Chicago and European ports, and announced their sail-ings to begin in the present month, is expected to benefit greatly inland ports for Hamburg, Liverpool and London, load ed with machinery, canned and boxed meats, lard and other products of the great manufacturing and producing section fronting upon our inland seas.

These vessels, according to a letter received by the Treasury Bureau of Statistics from the manager of the company, are of the lake type of construction, but built with a special view to combination of lake and ocean traffic and are supplied with special facilities for rapid loading and un-loading. They pass necessarily thru the Canadian canals, the Welland and St. Lawrence, to the head of deep water naviga-tion at Montreal, and will in their trip traverse 73 miles of canals and pass thru 46 locks, depending on their own propelling power thruout the entire voyage. It is estimated that the time occupied between Buffalo and Montreal, between which the canal system extends, will be about turee



The Government Self-Satisfied.

This and similar publications have elicited another communique from the Ministry of the Interior concerning the help given by the Government. This document recalls that the Government provided the stricken territories with loans from the stricken territories with loans from the emergency fund, which the peasants raise by taxation, and appropriations from other sources, amounting to 5,014,519 roubles, to which was afterwards added the sum of 171,000 roubles. These sums must have been sufficient, it is remarked, because no further demands for assistance have been made by the local authorities. [Sic.] Detailed reports are given to show the people are being fed and amply provided with seed corn, but these are contradicted by the following statement at the end of the

"However," says this official report, "in the southern provinces (all the famine districts are in the south of Russia, as in Siberia) a large part of the rural population is composed of persons who are not enrolled in the local communes, and who farm on rented land or follow manual trades. They naturally suffer with everybody else in time of want. They have no claim upon support from public funds and supplies, to which they do not contribute, and as they are landless they are without. and as they are landless they are without any means of support."

The report states this landless and creditless portion of the famine population was hard hit. Accordingly, with Imperial sanction, the Red Cross strengthened its resources and undertook their care. 
