

### JUDGE GREGORY SCORES A KINGS COUNT MAGISTRATE

#### At Opening of Circuit Court at Hampton This Morning.

Magistrate's Return of Case Which Was Poorly Written, Badly Spelled and Not in Proper Form Draws the Judge's Wrath.

HAMPTON, N. B. Jan. 14 (Special).—The January term of the Kings County Circuit court opened this morning at 11 o'clock, Judge Gregory on the bench. The grand jurors were: Charles E. Titus, Julian Kettle, Thomas Gillies, William Chaney, D. O. Laughy, Early Harmer, Benjamin Belding, George Manning, Thos. Davis, John Dalling, George Wilson, F. P. Gray, R. A. Marsh, E. R. Demill, John J. Purdy, Charles Fisher, Andrew Keith, George Suffer, Henry Chapman, Wilmer Daniel, Charles Hughes, George Raymond, Andrew S. Byles.

R. A. Marsh was selected foreman. His honor in his charge said there was but little criminal business to be brought before him and in the one case J. M. McIntyre would represent the attorney general and give them any aid in the case they might require. He gave an outline of the case as drawn from the magistrate's return, which he described as a scandalous document in form spelling and general appearance and a disgrace to any magistrate to say nothing of a stipendiary.

The criminal case referred to by the judge was that of Ernest Garret against Thomas Moshans for assault at Sussex October 6, 1907.

The case was the outcome of a drunken squabble between two men of no reputable character and ought not to have been brought into this court, taking up the time of officials and grand and petit jurors.

The complaint is absent in the States, either because he is afraid of getting into the toils of the law or that the matter is too frivolous to occupy his attention. His honor left the matter entirely in their hands. The grand jury found no bill, and having no presentment to make were discharged as also magistrates after a few words of good advice from the judge.

#### STEEL COMPANY BUILDING UP THE INSANITY

##### PLEA FOR THAW

BOYERTOWN, Pa. Jan. 14.—When daylight dawned today the full extent of last night's horror when Rhoades Opera House was burned was apparent. The list of dead is placed at 150 and the injured at 75. How many were killed may never be known for among the victims of this awful disaster were a number of visitors and some strangers. It is estimated that there were four hundred persons in the playhouse when the explosion of the gas tank which was being used in connection with moving pictures occurred. An amateur performance of "Scottie" had been given for the benefit of St. John's Lutheran Sunday School was being produced when the explosion occurred. Some one yelled "Fire!" and in a remarkably short time the centre of the opera house was a blazing furnace.

### NEWS FROM FREDERICTON

#### Supreme Court of Nova Scotia Unanimous in Its Favor.

##### Judgment Delivered at Halifax

FREDERICTON, N. B. Jan. 14 (Special).—The annual meeting of the trustees of the Victoria Hospital was held last evening. The receipts for the year were \$9,884 and expenditures, \$9,450. Forty-five cases of typhoid fever were treated during the year but only eight came in after the installation of the water filtration plant in May and the other thirty-seven from outside the city. Many men hunted the woods throughout the area as they supposed if he found the ice weak he would go overland to his brother's. The general belief is that he is dead. The search for the body has been unsuccessful.

### NEWS FROM CHARLOTTETOWN

#### IS PROSPEROUS

##### Annual Meeting of City Council Shows That Year Has Been Very Successful.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I. Jan. 14 (Special).—Our city is strong financially and the operations for the past year have been very successful notwithstanding the stringency in the money market. ### THE WEATHER.

### MONTEAL STOCKS

MONTEAL, Que., Jan. 14 (Special).—Trading in stocks was unusually interesting today in view of the decision in the Dominion Steel-Coal appeal case in favor of the Steel Company, and the announcement of the stock and bond issue of the Montreal Street Railway. In consequence of this announcement the price of Steel Railway declined from 180 to 180. The chief interest, centered in Steel in view of the judgment at Halifax. Yesterday there were some protechnies in price, declining from 19 3/4 to 14 on what was said to be selling by Ross interests. Today, at the opening, the price bounded back to 18 and rose to 17, after which it eased off a fraction. Iron, preferred, which was hammered from 90 to 44 yesterday, opened today at 50 and advanced to 54. The balance of the market was strong but quiet. Leading features were Power 67 1/4; Mexican 49 5/8; Nova Scotia Steel 62; Dominion Coal, preferred, 80; Laka of Woods 79.

**SCOTT ACT IN ALBERT COUNTY**

Frank E. McDonald Sent to Jail for Thirty Days for Violation

Albert, N. B., Jan. 13—Frank E. McDonald was convicted by Police Magistrate Blight for a Scott Act offence and went to jail for thirty days, Saturday, despite the fact that McDonald had laid a criminal charge against Blight accusing him of wrongfully receiving and secreting some liquor taken from him without any process being issued.

Magistrate Blight and J. H. Irving, the constable, were before Timothy J. O'Connor, J. P., at Harvey on the charge and the hearing was adjourned at the request of A. W. Bray, attorney for McDonald, to allow time to procure the attendance of the informant. McDonald's attorney says he will proceed against Mr. Blight for the wrongful imprisonment of McDonald.

On October 14 last in the night an iron safe was broken open in a barn or outbuilding near his home, was broken open with a crowbar and several bottles of liquor stolen therefrom and some papers and a book of memoranda. It is said the book furnished the clue to the names of the witnesses used at the trial on which McDonald is now in prison. This piece of delicate work, it is said, was done without any papers being issued by overzealous individuals who are now known and who will be called on to answer to a charge of burglary.

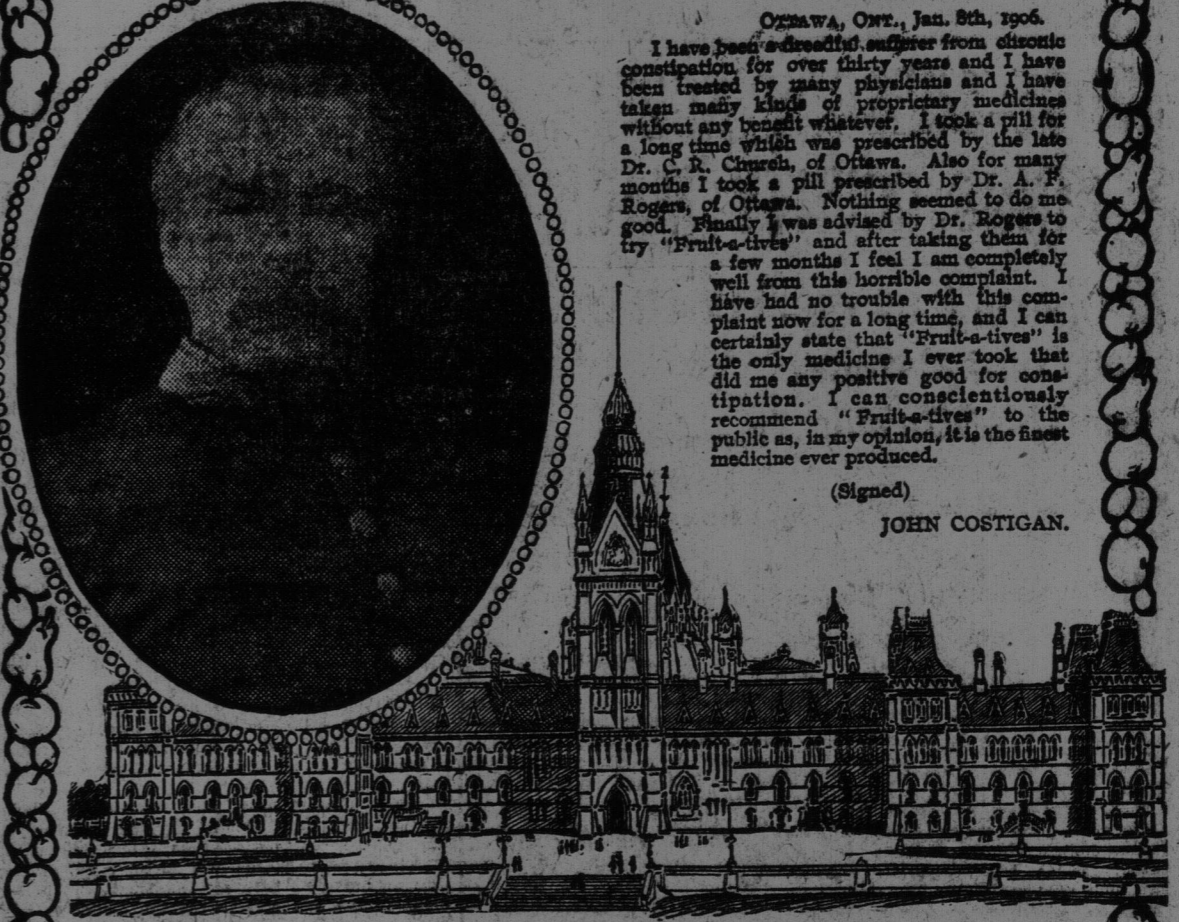
