



REMAINS OF DRWRY'S

REMAINS OF DEWEY'S
WARSHIP FOUND IN
MISSISSIPPI RIVER. Baton Rouge, La., June 16—A quantity of shells and human bones, believed to be the remains of a Federal war vessel commanded by George Dewey, later Admiral Dewey, damaged by Confederate batteries during the Civil War near Port Hudson, have been pumped up by a gravel dredge a few miles north of here. The shells include ome identified as Confederate ammunition.

The vessel commanded by Dewey was one of Admiral Farragut's fleet and became disabled below Port Hudson when struck by a Confederate salvo. It drifted down the river and finally grounded a few miles north of here, where it burst into flames, Most of the crew escaped.
