Mutton or Lamb Pie

Cook two pounds of mutton or lamb in little water until all meat slips from bones. Salt after cooking. Place meat in pudding dish. Measure broth, and to each cup add one cup of milk, Blend a heaping tablespoon of flour for each cup of liquid; boil and turn over meat in dish. Season to taste. Make biscuit dough of one cup of flour, two teaspoons of lard, half teaspoon salt and three teaspoons of baking powder. Cut with knife until all is well mixed. Add half cup of cold cooked rice and half cup of milk or water, bit of butter on each, place on top of meat, and bake 12 minutes in hot oven.

INVISIBLE AEROPLANE

German Invents One With Wings of Transparent Celluloid.

A German engineer named Knobel, living at Munster, has invented a more or less invisible aeroplane, which is considered in military circles to be of considerable value for war purposes.

SEUMAS MAC MANUS. FOR WIDER DIVORCE LAW Proposed English Measure Would Put Sexes on the Same Basis

London, June 3—Another divorce law reform bill has come to the front in addition to Lord Gorell's matrimonial causes bill.

Lord Gorell's measure embodies recommendations of both the majority and the minority reports of the royal commission which recently inquired into the working of the divorce laws.

That of the minority report is signed by the Archbishop of York, Sir William Anson, M. P.; Sir Lewis Dibdin, and the late Lord Gorell.

The majority report goes further, and its recommendations are embodied in a bill which has been read for the first time twice in the House of Commons. This bill is supported by 'the Divorce Law Reform Union.

The secretary of the union said it would be pushed forward in preference to Lord Gorell's measure.

"Our bill," he said, "gives perfect equality between the sexes. It would enable any married man or woman to sue for divorce on any of the following grounds:

Misconduct, desertion for three years or upward, cruelty, incurable insanity after five years' confinement, habitual drunkenness, and imprisonment under a commuted death sentence.


