

EVERAL weeks ago I asked my reader friends to join with me in a discussion on class distinction.

Almost everyone admits there is such a fact as class. But not everyone is satisfied with the vulgar notion that the possession of money is the proper class criterion.

Therefore, I thought it would be interesting to find out what thinking people do make their class criterion; what qualities they consider place a man or woman

letters have come to me on this subject.

I regret that I can only print a few.

"You ask your readers to give their opinions on class distinction. Why not attribute class distinction to nature? The good authority which says all people are born free and equal is true as far as birth goes, but nature soon shows they are far from being equal and while children are more truly diemocratic than their elders, class distinction is soon in evidence in all our schools without regard to wealth or poverty. So it is evident that nature is the true author of class distinction and the "upper class" is the class we all look up to whether wealthy or otherwise. Am I not right?"

"To my way of thinking the upper class consists of those who possess that innate refinement which cannot be fully acquired but must, be born in one—that refinement which, by ts very nature, makes itself felt at all times. The individual who acts the perfect gentleman or lady under all circumstances and to all fellow creatures, no matter what their station in life, belongs to this class. Success or wealth count for nothing unless accompanied by refinement and culture; but the latter could be overlooked if the former were there. Without this refinement, the seame to this class is hidden."

"In my country (Germany) are many classes, all fully recognized. However, I believe there is only one class that is recognized as the best all over the world, as it brings forth our best and greatest thinkers and creators, our most intelligent and diligent men and women. We call it the 'educated,' or better, the 'refined (cultured) middle class.' The people of that class are never too rich, often very poor, and yet they will always be recognized, by the 'highest' class as well as the lowest, as THE CLASS."

HOW COUNTRY IS PROGRESSING

Average Gain of Forty Per Cent. in Building Operations for June Over Same Period Last Year-St. John Shows Average Increase

(Construction, Toronto)

An average gain of 40 per cent., representing a total investment of \$1,902,258 as against \$10,364,478 in the corresponding period of last year, briefly summarizes the building situation as based on operations undertaken in the thirty-one cities reporting to "Construction" for the month of June. Taking into account the tremendously heavy investment of the preceding month, the showing made clearly indicates that as regards structural development, the country in general is moving on apace. Twenty-two gains in all were noted in the thirty-one cities referred to, the totals in a large number of instances denoting a decidedly marked increase.

Winnipeg's total of \$2,790,250 is the largest amount registered; Toronto's expenditure of \$2,380,400 shows the next heaviest investment; and Calgary comes third with an amount of \$1,826,250. Calgary's advance, in view of the high state of activity experienced in the month of May, reflects a most remarkable expansion; her increase of 186 per cent. being proportionately greater than that noted in the case of Winnipeg of Toronto, where the gains registered were 15 per cent, and 3 per cent, in order named. The west in fact moved along with its characteristic stride; the only two places to suffer a loss being Brandon and Vancouver, their respective decreases bing 69 and 22 pr cent. Vancouver's set-back can be attributed to a great extent to labor troubles affecting several branches of the building trades. So far Vancouver has a two and a quarter million dollars increase over the same period of last year; and according to a report from Building Inspector Jarrett, his department feel confident of an increase cor respondingly as great for the next sin months.


